# US devastates Iran's nuclear sites

he United States inserted itself into Israel's war against Iran by dropping 30,000pound bombs on a uranium enrichment site early Sunday, raising urgent questions about what remains of Tehran's nuclear programme and how its weakened military might respond.

Iran lashed out at the US for crossing "a very big red line" with its risky gambit to launch strikes on three Iranian nuclear sites with missiles and the bunker-buster bombs.

"The warmongering and lawless administration in Washington is solely and fully responsible for the dangerous consequences and far-reaching implications of its act of aggression," Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said, adding that he would immediately fly to Moscow to coordinate positions with close ally Russia.

Amid fears of a wider regional conflict, the Trump administration sent a clear message that it wanted to restart diplomatic talks with Iran. Defence Secretary Pete Hegseth told reporters that the US "does not seek war" with Iran. But Tehran said the time for diplomacy had passed and that it had the right to defend itself.

President Donald Trump earlier warned there would be additional strikes if Tehran retaliated against US forces. "There will either be peace or there will be tragedy for Iran," said Trump, who acted without congressional authorisation.

The Atomic Energy Organisation of Iran confirmed that attacks took place on the

facilities as well as the Isfahan nuclear site. Both Iran and the UN nuclear watchdog said there were no immediate signs of radioactive contamination around the sites.

Trump claimed the US "completely and fully obliterated" the sites, but the Pentagon reported "sustained, extremely severe damage and destruction." US defence officials said an assessment was ongoing.

With the attack, the United States has inserted itself into a war it spent decades trying to avoid. Success could mean ending Iran's nuclear ambitions and eliminating the last significant State threat to the security of Israel, its close ally. Failure — or overreach could plunge the US into another long and unpredictable conflict in the Middle East.

For Iran's supreme leader, it could mark the end of an ambitious campaign to transform the Islamic Republic into a greater regional power that holds enriched nuclear material a step away from weapons-grade.

Ayatollah Ali Khamenei last spoke publicly on Wednesday, warning the US that strikes targeting the Islamic Republic will "result in irreparable damage for them. Iran, battered by Israel's

largest-ever assault on it that began on June 13, has a few ways it could retaliate. It could launch a wave of attacks on US forces stationed in the Middle East with the missiles and rockets that Israel hasn't destroyed. It could attempt to close a key bottleneck for global oil supplies, the Strait of Hormuz between it and the United Arab Emirates.

### Modi urges Iran for dialogue, diplomacy

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Sunday conveyed to Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian India's "deep concern" over Iran's conflict with Israel and called for immediate de-escalation of the situation through "dialogue and diplomacy".

The phone conversation between Modi and Pezeshkian came hours after the US bombed three major nuclear sites - Fordow, Natanz and Isfahan - in Iran, bringing itself into the Israel-Iran conflict.

In a social media post, Modi said he expressed "deep concern" at the recent escalations and that dialogue and diplomacy is the way forward for the early restoration of regional peace. "We discussed in detail about the current situation. Expressed deep concern at the recent escalations," Modi said.

'Reiterated our call for immediate de-escalation, dialogue and diplomacy as the way forward and for early restoration of regional peace, security and stability," the Prime Minister added.

The US attack on the Iranian nuclear facilities has triggered fears of a wider regional conflict, with many leading countries and blocs calling for restraint.

Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi said the US has committed a "grave violation" of the UN Charter, international law and the nuclear non-proliferation treaty by attacking Iran's

tions". The Iranian Foreign Minister said he is travelling to Moscow to meet Russian President Vladimir Putin.

"The events this morning are outrageous and will have everlasting consequences. Each and every member of the UN must be alarmed over this extremely dangerous, lawless and criminal behaviour," he said. Iran reserves all options to defend its sovereignty, he said in a statement.

On its part, Russia strongly condemned the "irresponsible" US strikes on the Iranian nuclear facilities and said it "grossly" violated international law, the UN Charter and UNSC resolutions.

China too strongly condemned the US bombing of the nuclear facilities, saying the actions "seriously" violated the purposes and principles of the UN Charter and international law and have "exacerbated tensions" in the Middle-East.

"China calls on the parties to the conflict, Israel in particular, to reach a ceasefire as soon as possible, ensure the safety of civilians and start dialogue and negotiation," the Chinese Foreign Ministry said. The 27-nation EU urged "peaceful nuclear installa- all sides to step back.

#### 311 Indian nationals evacuated from Iran

India on Sunday evacuated more than 300 Indian nationals from Iran amid the escalating tensions between the Persian Gulf nation and Israel following the US bombing of Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said 311 Indians landed in Delhi on a special flight from the Iranian city of Mashhad. With the fresh batch of evacuees, the total number of those brought back from Iran now stands at 1.428. Three-hundred eleven Indian nationals arrived in New Delhi on a special flight from Mashhad at 1630 hours on June 22, **External Affairs Ministry** He said a total of 1,428 Indian nationals have been evacuated from Iran so far. India launched Operation Sindhu last week to bring back Indians from Iran and Israel in view of increasing hostilities between the two nations.

### NIA arrests two Pahalgam residents

n a significant development in the investigation Linto the 'horrific' Pahalgam terror attack, the National Investigation Agency (NIA) has arrested two Pahalgambased residents for harbouring the terrorists before the attack.

The NIA has also confirmed that the three terrorists who carried out the brutal massacre, which claimed 26 lives and left 16 others grievously injured, were Pakistani nationals and cadres of the proscribed Pakistanbased terror outfit Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT).

The duo arrested by the NIA has been identified as Parvaiz Ahmad Jothar of Batkote, Pahalgam and Bashir Ahmad Jothar of Hill Park, Pahalgam. The arrests, made under Section 19 of the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act, 1967, mark the first significant breakthrough in the case, coming exactly two months after the attack.

According to local reports, both the arrested men were staying with their families and working as pony wallahs during peak tourist season to earn a livelihood. 26-yearold Parvaiz and 33-year-old Bashir Ahmad used to escort tourists on ponies hired from others during the peak season. Sleuths of the National Investigation Agency zeroed in on these men based on initial leads about the possible involvement of locals in

According to an official NIA statement, Parvaiz and Bashir knowingly harboured the three LeT terrorists in a seasonal hut (dhok) in the Hill Park area of Pahalgam before the assault. They provided food, shelter and logistical support to the terrorists, who selectively killed tourists based on their religious identity, making it one of the most gruesome terrorist attacks ever."

During interrogation, the arrested individuals confirmed that the attackers were Pakistani nationals and revealed their identities, marking a breakthrough in the case registered 02/2025/NIA/JMU.

Former Jammu and Kashmir Chief Minister and President of the National Conference Farooq Abdullah welcomed the arrests, stating, "Now we will find out who they [the terrorists] were and where they came from."

The NIA took over the investigation from the Jammu and Kashmir police on April 27, 2025, following orders from the Ministry of Home Affairs.

Since then, the agency has questioned over 2,000 individuals, detained more than 150, and conducted extensive searches across Kashmir, including Shopian, Kulgam Pulwama, Sopore and Kupwara. Forensic evidence, including over 40 cartridges recovered from the scene and satellite phone activity in Baisaran Valley, further corroborates Pakistan's involvement in the deadly attack.

Sketches of three suspects were released on April 24, with a ₹20 lakh bounty offered for information leading to their capture. Currently, the NIA is actively pursuing leads to locate the three absconding terrorists, believed to be either hiding in Kashmir or having fled to Pakistan.

In the absence of their whereabouts, it is suspected that they may be using encrypted communication devices to evade detection. Meanwhile, the NIA is expected to produce the accused before a special court in Jammu.

### Two more arrested in Raja Raghuvanshi murder case

**◄**he Special Investigation Team (SIT) of the Meghalaya Police has arrested two more persons from Madhya Pradesh in connection with the sensational murder of Indore-based transport businessman Raja Raghuvanshi, bringing the total number of arrests in the case to seven.

Raghuvanshi, who went missing during a honeymoon trip to Meghalaya in late May, was found brutally murdered in a gorge near the Weisawdong Falls in Sohra (Cherrapunji) on June 2.

The 32-year-old was allegedly killed by three men on May 23 with machetes near a secluded parking lot in the East Khasi Hills district. His wife, Sonam



Raghuvanshi, is accused of conspiring in the murder along with her alleged lover Raj Kushwaha and his associates.

On Saturday evening, Meghalaya Police arrested Silome James, a property dealer from Indore, at Bhonrasa toll plaza in Dewas district as he attempted to flee to Bhopal. James, who runs a property management firm, had leased a flat in Heera Bagh Colony, Indore, where Sonam stayed after returning from Meghalaya and allegedly concealed a box containing jewellery, documents, and possibly a firearm.

Later that night, around 2 am on Sunday, the SIT apprehended Balla Ahirwar, a security guard posted at the same property, from his native village in Ashok Nagar district.

### CM makes emergency landing as MP weather turns rough

→he southwest monsoon has swept through Madhya Pradesh with unusual speed and intensity, drenching the entire state within just five days of its onset. After entering the state on June 13-14—only a day behind its usual date-the monsoon quickly covered all 55 districts, bringing widespread rainfall, cooling temperatures, and triggering a series of rain-related incidents.

On Sunday alone, more than 22 districts reported significant rainfall, with Tikamgarh receiving the highest at 2 inches in just nine hours. Mandla recorded 1.5 inches, followed by Narmadapuram (1.4 inches) and Gwalior (1 inch). Bhopal experienced steady rainfall throughout the day, which eased by evening, while heavy showers also lashed Ratlam, Betul, Dhar, Indore, Shivpuri, Ujjain, Chhindwara, and Balaghat's Malajkhand region.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) has forecast continued heavy rainfall through June 24, with temperatures expected to hover between 23°C and 27°C. While a brief pause in the downpour is anticipated, another intense spell is likely from June 24 onward, prompting officials to remain on high alert for potential dis-

The quick advancement of the monsoon comes after an initial delay. Despite entering India eight days early, the monsoon stalled at the Maharashtra-Chhattisgarh border for 15 days before entering Madhya Pradesh. Within three days, it had

spread to 53 districts, and by June 21, it had completed its progression with Bhind and Mauganj being the last to receive rainfall—an acceleration in stark contrast to last vear's June 21 arrival.

The heavy rains have caused structural damages in several areas. In Ujjain, a portion of the plaster ceiling collapsed in the tunnel connecting Palki Hall to the Ambulance Gate of the Shri Mahakaleshwar Temple around 8 am Sunday. Constructed under the

Temple Expansion Scheme for emergency access, the tunnel had been leaking for days. Fortunately, no injuries were reported as visitors were being evacuated through the tunnel at the time. Temple authorities have initiated an investigation and are expected to conduct a full structural assessment.

A similar incident occurred in the Garoth area of Mandsaur district, where water seepage caused the plaster ceiling of a police station to fall. No casualties were reported.

The agriculture sector, meanwhile, is viewing the rains as a boon. With soil moisture improving significantly, farmers have been advised to begin sowing operations. Vidisha district recorded an average of 16.1 mm rainfall, with some pockets receiving up to 40 mm, greatly benefiting agricultural planning.

In a related development underscoring the severity of the weather, Chief Minister Mohan Yadav's helicopter was forced to make an emergency landing at the Pipariya helipad on Sunday afternoon due to inclement weather. The chief minister and his family were en route to the Pachmarhi hill station when heavy rain made further air travel unsafe. They completed the journey by road and later returned to Bhopal in the evening.

The rapid onset of the mon-soon and its immediate impact across multiple sectors-transport, infrastructure, and agriculture-highlight the urgent need for improved monsoon preparedness and resilient systems to manage extreme weather events. Authorities continue to monitor the situation closely as more rain is expected in the coming days.

#### Rare and complex Bentall Surgery performed at AIIMS ment of both the aorta and the

Department of Cardiothoracic and Vascular Surgery (CTVS) at AIIMS Bhopal has successfully performed a highly complex and life-saving Bentall procedure on a 44-year-old male patient from Sehore district. The patient had been suffering from persistent chest pain and palpitations for six months, and medical investigations revealed a dangerously enlarged Aortic Aneurysm measuring 8–10 cm along with severe leakage in the aortic valve.

Despite consulting multiple hospitals, the patient and his family found no viable solution until they approached AIIMS Bhopal. After a thorough evaluation by the CTVS team, it was determined that the patient required an urgent Bentall surgery—a procedure involving the replace-

aortic valve with artificial grafts. The complexity of the case was further heightened by the patient's rare B-negative blood group, which posed additional challenges for intraoperative management. The surgical team, comprising

Dr. Yogesh K. Niwaria, Dr. M. Kishan, Dr. Surendra Singh Yadav, Dr. Rahul Sharma, Dr. Vikram Watti, and Dr. Aditya Sirohi, carried out the high-risk surgery with exceptional precision. The damaged section of the aorta and the leaking valve were successfully removed and replaced. Remarkably, the surgery was completed without the need for a blood transfusion, despite the patient's rare blood type—a testament to the surgical expertise and meticulous planning of the team.

Following the procedure, the patient was transferred to the

ICU, where he is recovering steadily and showing consistent signs of improvement. Executive Director of AIIMS Bhopal, Prof. (Dr.) Ajai Singh, lauded the team's achievement, stating, "This case is a shining example of AIIMS Bhopal's clinical excellence. Woman and two children abducted at gunpoint

n a chilling incident that has shocked residents of Sumeri village under Lavkushnagar police station of Chhatarpur district, a woman and her two young children were forcibly abducted at gunpoint in broad daylight on Saturday afternoon by a group of armed men.

According to police, the abduction was orchestrated by Sanjay Singh Rajput, son of notorious former dacoit Panchu Lodhi. Sanjay, accompanied by nearly a dozen armed accomplices, stormed the village wielding firearms ly opened fire before forcibly dragging 26-year-old Mithlesh Prajapati, her 4year-old son Sarthak, and 5year-old daughter Bhumi into a waiting vehicle.

The victim's husband, Hariram Prajapati, who attempted to intervene, was brutally assaulted by the

ous injuries and is currently undergoing treatment at the district hospital. "Sanjay had been stalking my wife. He was loitering outside our house the previous day. When I confronted him, he threatened me. Now he's taken her away," Hariram said, recounting the harrowing incident. A disturbing video of the kidnapping, reportedly filmed by a bystander, shows Sanjay dragging the woman against her will as his associates brandish weapons and threaten

local villagers. The children are seen being forcibly pushed into the vehicle. Officer of Police (SDOP) Naveen Dubey confirmed that police have seized a Bolero SUV and a motorcycle believed to be used in the

crime. Two suspects were initially detained, and later, three more were arrested as part of the expanding investigation. Search operations are underthe region to apprehend the remaining accused. Chhatarpur Superintendent

of Police Agam Jain has announced a reward of Rs 10,000 for information leading to the arrest of the main accused, Sanjay Singh Rajput. Five dedicated police teams have been constituted to trace the abducted woman and her children and bring the perpetrators to justice.

A case has been registered under multiple sections of the Indian Penal Code, including kidnapping and criminal assault, along with relevant provisions of the Atrocities) Act.

Officials said that the search is progressing swiftly and expressed confidence that the abducted victims will be recovered soon. The incident has sparked fear and outrage in the village, as residents demand swift justice and enhanced security in the area.

The probe follows serious accusations raised by Bhopal MP Alok Sharma, who alleged that the institute has been bypassing central pro-curement norms and directly purchasing medicines at significantly higher rates compared to other AIIMS facilities across the country. The visiting officials arrived at the AIIMS campus early in the morning and spent several hours reviewing procurement-related documents and purchase records. They also held a detailed meeting with the Executive Director

The controversy came into the spotlight after MP Alok Sharma, who is also a member of the AIIMS Standing Committee on Finance, raised the issue during a high-level meeting of the committee held in New Delhi on May 15. The meeting, chaired by Union Health Secretary Punya Salila Srivastava, included senior officials from AIIMS institutions across India. Sharma presented comparative data indicating stark discrepancies in medicine prices at AIIMS

The Gwalior on Friday night. The victims, who were riding a motorcycle along with the woman's son, died on the spot. The boy survived with injuries and is undergoing treatment.

The accused was already absconding in an attempted murder case from April 2023 but had remained at large. He was arrested after police traced his mobile phone location, which contradicted his claim of being out of town during the time of the fatal

A video that surfaced soon after the incident shows Harsh Rai and his friend, Harsh Kumar, performing dangerous stunts in a black Thar near Motijheel's Badnapura turn—the very

are seen standing with doors open in the moving vehicle, while friends recorded the act. The video has added weight to allegations of reckless and negligent driving. Local residents expressed outrage over the delayed police response, claiming that officers arrived at the scene nearly two hours after the incident. Senior Superintendent of Police

Dharmveer Singh confirmed that the vehicle had been seized and that the accused misled authorities about his location. "We are taking strict action. The suspect claimed to be out of Gwalior, but his phone records placed him near the scene of the incident," Singh said.

Harsh Rai has a known history of criminal activity. In April 2023, he was booked in an attempted murder case after allegedly opening fire on his friend Ankesh following a heated altercation during a resort party. Despite a case being registered, he had been evading arrest for over a year. The Rai family wields considerable political influence in the region. Harsh's mother, Rekha Rai, is a sitting BJP councillor from Ward-4 (Ghasmandi Rai Colony), while his father previously held the same position. The family is reportedly closely associated with Madhya Pradesh Energy Minister Pradyuman Tomar and Assembly Speaker Narendra Tomar. Rekha Rai declined to comment on the matter.

who had come for a morning walk, said, "That turn looks like it was inspired by a TikTok transition. Swipe left and crash."

Some Bhopalis are calling for disclaimers. Richa Tiwari, 35, a banker who stopped by with her son, remarked, "It should come with a warning board: 'Turn at your own risk. Life not included." Robin Anthony, 33, a tourist from Indore taking selfies with his friends, quipped, "In Indore, we have poha and traffic. In Bhopal, you have poha and parachute landings. What a

Even those familiar with construction are baffled. Govind Ahirwar, a 40-year-old labourer from BHEL who has worked on road projects, stood staring at the

curve. "I've helped build bridges. This one looks like the architect gave up and said, 'Jo hoga dekha jayega." ("We'll deal with whatever happens.")

Some memes have already gone viral. A reel by 17-year-old Kareem Ali, who was shooting videos with his friends, was being passed around on phones. Captioned "Me trying to make U-turns in life, but the bridge said—hold my concrete," it had gathered over a thousand shares. Honestly, my school van uncle

already drives like it's Formula One. This bridge completes the vibe," Kareem said. But not everyone found it funny.

Jitendra Sahu, 52, an auto-rickshaw driver waiting near the corner, said, "I showed it to my auto. It stalled. That was the engine's way of saying 'Mujhse naa ho payega." ("I can't do this.") Jyoti Kashyap, 29, a software

engineer out for a walk with her headphones on, chuckled while pointing to the bend. "ChatGPT would say 'Invalid route' looking at that turn. Honestly, I'd rather code my resignation than drive through that stunt."

Retired maths teacher Sanjeev Dubey, 67, walking with a stick and looking closely at the gradient, said, "That's not 88 degrees. That's a right hook from life. This turn belongs in MMA, not civil engineering."

Others seemed to be turning to prayer. Nitin Patel, who runs a paan shop nearby, observed, Every time I see that turn, I mentally chant 'Jai Bajrang Bali.' It's my own pre-drive puja now." Pankaj Baghel, 26, a Zomato delivery boy who rides past the bridge on his daily route, shook his head and said, "Zomato should offer a 'risk allowance' for this route. Imagine delivering

For now, the Aishbagh ROB remains closed to vehicles but wide open to observation, commentary, and comic relief. It hasn't yet connected roads-but it has connected the city through jokes, jibes, and a shared sense of disbelief.

eeking to ensure greater accuracy in electoral rolls in Bihar where assembly polls are due later this year, the Election Commission (EC) is mulling intensive house-to-house verification during the revision of the voter list in the State.

In the past, concerns have been raised by various civil society organisations, political parties and others persistently over the inclusion or deletion of names in the electoral rolls. Several parties, including the Congress, have accused the poll authority of fudging data to help the BJP.

Officials lamented that despite following a detailed protocol, insinuations and allegations are often made against the EC of arbitrarily inflating the electoral roll, even though the exercise is conducted with complete transparency and under constant scrutiny of political parties.

To make the system robust and free of any kind of errors,

the poll panel is contemplating an intensive house-to-house verification during the upcoming electoral roll revision before Bihar assembly polls to "purify" the electoral rolls, sources said.

Such intensive and rigorous revision of the electoral rolls has been done in the past as well with the last such exercise undertaken in 2004, they pointed out.

The regular exercise of revision of electoral rolls is undertaken annually throughout the country by the EC and also before the holding of elections or bypolls.

The provisions regarding eligibility to be registered as a voter and disqualification are of the Constitution and Section 16 of the Representation of the People Act, 1950 respectively,

The voter list is revised regularly due to deaths and inclusion of new voters. Inter-state and intra-state movement of voters is another key reason why rolls need updation.

For instance, during 2024, according to the forms received by the EC, 46.26 lakh people shifted their residence, 2.32 crore applied for corrections and 33.16 lakh requested for replacement.

Thus, in a single year, nearly 3.15 crore changes were required to be made across the country. According to EC, there are several reasons why continuous updating of the voter list is necessary:

Change of residence: People in the country frequently move from one state, district, or area to another for reasons such as marriage, employment, education, or family

Removal of names of deceased voters: Usually, fam-

Commission about the death of a voter, due to which names of deceased persons remain in

Inclusion of new youth turning 18: Every year, a large number of young people turn 18 and need to be added to the

Corrections in voter details: People also apply for changes in their names, photos, addresses, etc., which makes it necessary to update Reorganisation of polling

stations: This is being done for multiple reasons, particularly because the Election Commission has now set a maximum limit of 1,200 voters per polling station, down from the earlier limit of 1,500.

The Commission also wants to ensure that no voter has to travel more than two kilometres to cast their vote.

Identification and removal of illegal foreign nationals: If a foreign illegal citizen is found to be listed in the electoral roll, they are identified and

The Left parties said Israel launched an attack on Iran on June 12 to sabotage any potential negotiations between the latter and the US and now, the US has joined Israel in this act of aggression, even though President Donald Trump had given a two-week window to Iran for talks.

### NGT seeks response from CPCB over felling of palm trees in Bihar

≺he National Green Tribunal (NGT) has sought a response from the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) and others in a matter related to the largescale felling of palm trees in Bihar which is reportedly causing an increase in lightning-related deaths.

The green body was hearing a matter where it had taken suo motu cognisance of a newspaper report on alleged widespread cutting of palm trees that is directly linked to a sharp increase in lightningrelated fatalities, with over 2,000 lives lost since 2016 in Bihar.

In an order dated June 5, a bench of NGT's judicial member Justice Arun Kumar Tyagi and expert member A Senthil Vel said, "According to the

article, dozens of towering palm trees are being felled, leading to more frequent lightning strikes that result in

According to the report, after the ban on toddy tapping due to Bihar's prohibition policy, palm trees lost their economic value and have since been widely cut down. This ecological loss appeared to have made rural areas more vulnerable to lightning strikes, with the state recording over 2,000 lightning-related deaths since 2016.

"The article states that the number of lightning deaths began to rise following the rampant felling of palm trees. The worst-affected districts include Aurangabad, Patna, Nalanda, Kaimur, Rohtas, Bhojpur and Buxar. Most lightning-related deaths occur between 12:30 and 4:30 pm, when many people are outside for work," the NGT said, citing the report.

It further noted that the area under palm tree cultivation in the state had decreased by 40 per cent and that plantation of the trees had almost stopped.

### Air India to reduce 118 weekly flights operated with narrow-body planes

ir India on Sunday A said it will temporarily reduce 118 weekly flights operated with narrow-body planes on 19 routes as well as suspend services on three routes.

The temporary cuts in services account for about 5 per cent of the airline's overall narrow-body operations and the move is aimed at ensuring operational stability amid disruptions in the wake of the fatal plane crash in Ahmedabad on June 12.

All the 19 routes where reduction in narrow-body services have been done are domestic and of the three routes where flights have been suspended, two are international and one is domestic.

The announcement comes days after the Tata Groupowned carrier said it will cut international flights operated with wide-body planes by

15 per cent temporarily. In a statement, the airline said it is going for "temporary cuts of less than 5 per cent to its overall narrow-body net-

"This voluntary decision leads to the temporary suspension of Air India's services on 3 routes and reduction of frequency on 19 routes. The changes are effective until at least 15 July 2025," it said.

As many as seven weekly flights each on three routes Bengaluru-Singapore, Pune-Singapore Mumbai-Bagdogra — have been suspended till at least July 15.

Flights on various other routes, including Delhi-Bengaluru and Delhi-Mumbai, have been reduced.

On the Bengaluru-Chandigarh route, the weekly services have been cut to seven, Delhi-Bengaluru to 113, Delhi-Mumbai to 165, Delhi-Kolkata to 63, Delhi-Coimbatore to 12, Delhi-Goa (Dabolim) and DelhiGoa (Mopa) to seven each. Also, weekly flights on the Delhi-Hyderabad route have been reduced to 76, Delhi-Indore to 14, Delhi-Lucknow

### Sivankutty alleges Raj Bhavan behind ABVP protests, BJP accuses CPI(M) for violence

### Second FIR in a week against Bengal BJP chief

n a politically charged up electoral season filled with Ifilthy slangs used by mutually competing netas an FIR has been lodged against Bengal BJP president Sukanta Majumdar for comparing the State police with sex workers.

The incident comes barely a week after the police lodged a previous FIR against the junior Union Minister for hurling a pair of sandals — during an agitation outside Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee's residence — at a crowd that "inadvertently" landed on the head of a Sikh gentleman.

In her police complaint a woman Trinamool Congress councilor Sunanda Sarkar has alleged that Majumdar during his Saturday speech compared the law and order situation in Bengal with the sex workers of Sonagachi — which incidentally has the dubious distinction of Asia's oldest and arguably the country's largest red-light area. The larger portion of Sonagachi falls within

Sarkar's Ward Number 18, she alleged adding such "derogatory and sexists" remarks were not only insulting to the police but also the women engaged in the trade. In tandem with lodging the FIR the TMC also shared a post where Majumdar was shown saying that the police had turned the law and order situation into a state of affairs found in Sonagachi.

"You have turned the law and order situation of West Bengal into the sex workers of Sonagachi," he was allegedly quoted by the TMC as saying.

The development took place close on the heels of Majumdar referring to an attack on him at Budge Budge in South 24 Parganas where he stones and shoes were thrown at him by

alleged TMC goons - all in presence of the police men who instead of preventing such attack looked right through it. Shah promptly wrote letters bringing the incident to the notice of Union Home Minister Amit Shah, Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla complaining breach of privilege and BJP national president JP Nadda. He alleged willful negligence, dereliction of duty, and enabling political violence." The TMC leadership immediately shot back alleging Majumdar's statement was not only filthy but it also emitted the kind of "hate" that they nourished against the womanhood. A TMC post read "this is the

filth that passes for political discourse in BJP, today. Their state president Dr Sukanta compared Bengal's law and order situation to 'sex workers'. This filth came from a Central minister. Not some fringe troll. #### Railways to boost crime control, passenger safety measures: GRP Chiefs PIONEER NEWS SERVICE

n a major step towards enhancing safety on trains and railway premises, Indian Railways through a joint effort by the Railway Protection Force (RPF) and Government Railway Police (GRP) has announced several new initiatives to strengthen crime control and protect passengers.

These include converting theft complaints from the Rail Madad portal into formal FIRs, using facial recognition technology for tracking suspects, deploying "Meri Saheli" teams for women's safety and improving coordination among states to target inter-

state gangs.
These decisions were part of the 6th All India Conference of GRP Chiefs, which concluded in New Delhi under the chairmanship of RPF Director General Manoj Yadava.

The event brought together DGPs, ADGPs and senior GRP officers from states and union territories, along with officials from the Ministry of Railways.

The conference focused on better coordination and intelligence-sharing among security agencies to tackle the growing incidents of theft, fraud, smuggling and crimes against



women and children on trains and at railway stations.

Officials discussed the need for joint strategies, proactive surveillance and inter-agency teamwork to prevent criminals from taking advantage of jurisdictional gaps.

Special attention was given to curbing theft of passenger

belongings and creating public awareness about common tricks used by thieves.

The conversion of theft complaints into FIRs is expected to improve investigation and raise conviction rates.

The safety of women passengers remained a top priority, with officials calling for more targeted patrolling, wider CCTV coverage at stations and inside trains, and the presence of Meri Saheli teams

to assist female travelers. The conference also addressed concerns over drug trafficking through rail routes, urging tighter checks and use of real-time intelligence to

The Intelligence Bureau made a key presentation on possible terror threats to railway infrastructure, high-lighting the need for stronger security protocols and vulnerabil-

Child safety was also discussed, with a focus on timely rescue and rehabilitation of vulnerable children at risk of trafficking or exploitation.



# Anatomy of a manufactured catastrophe


This is not merely a war between two nations — it is a theatre where the myths of empire and the machinery of global power collide, leaving civilian lives shattered and the region teetering on the brink of deeper disintegration

hat was brutal and predicated on years of fabricated deceit. But that is how power operates. Netanyahu is not acting in isolation; he was ushered into this calamity with calculated endorsement from the West. For both Iran and Israel, this is a zero-sum confrontation — a tragic entanglement where ancient antagonisms, contemporary geopolitics, and enduring colonial residues violently intersect.

What is most intellectually arresting is the glaring paradox Western powers routinely embrace. When Netanyahu launches a premeditated and unlawful assault on Iran, it is euphemistically labelled as a measure of selfdefence. Yet when Vladimir Putin deploys forces into Ukraine, the West decries it as an unprovoked invasion.

This hypocrisy in moral reasoning illustrates the incoherence of Western ethical frameworks - marked by selective outrage, selective jurisprudence, and selective memory. Netanyahu is actively courting American bombardment of Tehran, even venturing so far as to suggest the types of ordnance most suitable for maximum devastation. Trump, meanwhile, hesitates — not over Iran's fate, but because the ensuing ramifications will inevitably encircle him. This cynical arithmetic typifies the geopolitical stage on which empires perform their cruelties. A week has now passed since Netanyahu's incursion into Iran — a deliberate campaign tacitly sanctioned by the United States and its constellation of affluent allies, whose modern prosperity is inseparable from centuries of extraction and systemic plunder. War, whether desirable or not, remains the central mechanism by which empires assert dominion, redraw territories, and dismantle resistance. Israel's open defiance of international law — manifest in its missile barrage on Iranian soil — lays bare an unsettling truth: if global powers truly revered international legal norms, Netanyahu's actions would face unequivocal denunciation. Instead, one could argue — chillingly - that he affirms history's most ominous prophecies.

Western media, complicit in sanitising this act of aggression, frames it as an "unprecedented" strike - yet again resorting to euphemism to mask illegality. This was not an improvisational operation; it was the culmination of extensive clandestine preparation by Netanyahu and his ultranationalist Orthodox coalition. Israel's intelligence apparatus has, over decades, embedded itself within the architecture of Iranian society, executing key figures and orchestrating strategic assassinations. The latest Friday strikes were not merely military engagements — they constituted a coordinated political decapitation, targeting senior officials central to the Iranian

The 1953 CIA-backed coup in Iran — toppling the democratically elected Prime Minister Mohammad Mossadegh and reinstating the autocratic Shah — is emblematic of this trajectory. For decades, Western powers suppressed indigenous sovereignty while installing

upheaval; it was a radical assertion of national agency forged in the crucible of sustained foreign domination. In the revolution's wake, Iranian society was reconstituted through a deep-rooted collectivism and assertive nationalism that continues to shape its resistance against external coercion.

Viewed through this prism, Netanyahu's tenure may be remembered as one of the most corrosive in Israel's history. By fusing religious chauvinism with militaristic expansionism, he has eviscerated Israel's democratic ethos. transforming "security" into a tool of territorial expropriation and systemic Palestinian disenfranchisement. His escalation against Iran is not merely a tactical error; it is an incitement to regional disintegration. Framed as a crusade for "unconditional surrender", his belligerence risks igniting a broader conflagration whose consequences will inevitably recoil upon Israel itself.

Netanyahu, then, appears less as a strategist than as a provocateur, recklessly agitating the region's deepest historical and sectarian fissures. According to Haaretz, an independent Israeli media outlet operating despite a severely censored and often propagandistic Israeli media environment, several prominent progressive Jewish groups were notably absent from the so-called "joint unity statement" backing Israel's strikes on Iran. They argue that diplomacy, not bombs, has proven effective in preventing nuclear proliferation — revealing significant divisions within the Jewish community over Netanyahu's war. Despite sustained bombardment, millions of Iranians remain in Tehran. Their refusal to flee is not naïveté—it is a visceral affirmation of identity and resistance. The Iranian public con-

tive defiance often misread in the West. The state's nationalist discourse resonates beyond clerical authority; it channels a cultural memory of resistance against imperial intrusion. Moreover, the disproportionate risk to civilians is staggering. Israeli operations ostensibly targeting senior military personnel inevitably endanger entire urban populations, as these individuals live and operate within densely populated civilian zones.

The International Atomic Energy Agency has repeatedly found no conclusive evidence that Iran is pursuing a nuclear weapon systematically. Yet, Western powers wield this unverified threat as a pretext for military aggression. The contradictory statements from US officials — from intelligence directors denying Iran's weaponisation efforts to presidents asserting Tehran is "very close" to the bomb reflect a politicisation of intelligence designed to justify interventionism. History has shown the futility of liberal interventionist fantasies: that democracy can be air-dropped or imposed through market restructuring.

The Arab Spring, once heralded as a democratic revival, instead expedited the collapse of fragile states and exacerbated regional instability. Netanyahu's war on Iran is not an anomaly — it is the terminal result of accumulated imperial failures, ideological rigidity, and historical amnesia. It confirms a grim axiom: when utopias collapse, it is always the powerless who bleed. His offensive, cloaked in the pieties of national security, belongs to longer, darker one whose conclusion will define the fate of West Asia and the very contours of justice in

the ongoing conflict between Israel and Iran marks the most intense direct military confrontation between two Middle Eastern nations in decades. On June 13, 2025, Israel launched "Operation Rising Lion", deploying over 200 aircraft to target Iran's nuclear and military installations at Natanz, Tabriz, and areas near Tehran. The strikes reportedly set back Iran's uranium enrichment programme by several years. In swift retaliation, Iran launched waves of ballistic missiles and drone swarms targeting Israeli civilian areas

prompting mass evacuations in cities like Haifa and Tel Aviv. Israel's strategic calculus is centred on preemption and deterrence.

Faced with Tehran's decade-long pursuit of nuclear weapons, Israel opted for precise air strikes instead of a prolonged ground campaign — aiming to decapitate Iran's atomic leadership, cripple enrichment facilities, and weaken the Quds Force, the external operations arm of the Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps (IRGC). Iran, in contrast, has relied on asymmetrical warfare: launching over 100 missiles at Israeli urban centres, mobilising its proxy networks in Syria, Lebanon, and Iraq, and deploying cyberattacks to complement its kinetic operations. Domestically, economic turmoil and rising public discontent in Iran may be pressuring Supreme Leader Ayatollah deepening defence cooperation, and intensified intelligence

he publicly vows retaliation. The Israel-Iran confrontation has shaken global oil markets. In early June, Brent crude spiked nearly \$10 per barrel, peaking at \$78 amid fears of disruptions to the Strait of Hormuz, a critical chokepoint through which one-fifth of the world's seaborne oil flows. The volatility underscores the fragility of energy markets, where even minor strikes on oil infrastructure can trigger disproportionate swings in futures, fuelling global inflationary pressures. For India, which imports between 80 and 85 per cent of its crude oil, such price shocks have immediate consequences. On June 13, the Reserve Bank of India intervened in currency markets as the rupee

slid to a two-month low of ₹86.20 against the US dollar. Rising fuel costs threaten to widen the trade deficit, erode household purchasing power, and reignite inflationary pressures. Yet, India's projected 7.5 per cent GDP growth in FY2025 provides some fiscal room to absorb external shocks.

Additionally, the Government's proactive fuel hedging strategies and a diversified supplier base offer crucial buffers against supply volatility.

India maintains robust ties with both Iran and Israel. Tehran remains a strategic partner in energy and regional connectivity, particularly through the Chabahar Port project, which facilitates access to Central Asia despite Western sanctions. Simultaneously, India-Israel relations have flourished, with bilateral trade exceeding \$7 billion,

Ali Khamenei to explore diplomatic back channels, even as sharing on counterterrorism. Navigating this tightrope requires deft diplomacy to avoid alienating either side while preserving broader strategic alignments with the US and Gulf nations. India's dual engagement underscores its commitment to strategic autonomy and multipolar diplomacy. Beyond immediate crisis management, India has the opportunity to assume a proactive diplomatic role. Leveraging its upcoming G20 presidency and leadership within the Quad, India could initiate a "West Asia Stability Dialogue" — a Track II peace process involving the Arab League, the EU, Iran, and Israel under one neutral platform. Simultaneously, fast-tracking the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC) would reinforce India's position as a key trade and energy

our century.

Deepening partnerships in green hydrogen and solar energy with Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) nations would also help reduce oil dependence while supporting a broader regional stability agenda. The Israel–Iran conflict illustrates the perils of unchecked nuclear proliferation and proxy warfare. For India, this is a test of diplomatic agility, energy resilience, and economic foresight, as well as a chance to assert leadership in shaping a multipolar, rules-based order in West Asia. By championing multilateralism, reinforcing strategic autonomy, and accelerating its energy transition, India can not only safeguard its national interests but also play a pivotal role in stabilising one of the world's most volatile regions.

#### **US joins the Israel-Iran war**

By launching strikes and claiming the obliteration of Iranian nuclear sites, the US has formally joined Israel in the war between the two nations.

If it were to develop a nuclear weapon, who will be its immediate or eventual target is a foregone conclusion, not with standing its assertion of 'using nuclear energy for peaceful purposes'. One can now expect a long-drawn-out conflict in the Middle East, with the oil prices shooting up as the immediate fallout, causing misery to the people the world over.

#### **Concerns about nuclear proliferation**

The Financial Action Task Force (FATF) has flagged a 2020 incident involving a Chinese-origin cargo bound for Pakistan that was seized by Indian authorities at Gujarat's Kandla Port. The shipment, mis-declared as industrial dryers, was found to contain autoclaves — equipment that can be used in the production of ballistic missile components. Investigations linked the consignment to Pakistan's National Development Complex, which is involved in developing long-range missiles.

The vessel, Da Cui Yun, had originated from China's Jiangyin Port and was headed for Karachi's Port Qasim. India's intelligence agency, R&AW, had received inputs that the cargo included dual-use technology — items that can be used for both civilian and military purposes.

The autoclaves are listed under the Missile Technology Control Regime (MTCR), of which India is a member but Pakistan is not. In a more recent development from March 2024, Indian authorities seized Computer Numerical Control (CNC) machinery — another dual-use item — at Mumbai's Nhava Sheva Port, again en route from China to Pakistan.

These incidents highlight growing concerns about nuclear and missile proliferation in the region. The FATF may face renewed pressure from India to re-list Pakistan on its grey list over terrorism financing and WMD.

### NITI Aayog's Push for Genetically Modified Imports Sparks Outrage

NITI Aayog's recommendation to allow genetically modified (GM) agricultural imports under the proposed India-US trade agreement has sparked strong opposition from farmer organisations. This could undermine India's food security and erode the country's agricultural sovereignty



few days ago, in a working paper, NITI Aayog recommended, to the Indian Government that the import of genetically modified (GM) agricultural products should be allowed in the currently proposed India-US trade agreement. In this, NITI Aayog has also specifically mentioned crops like maize and soybean. It has also been suggested in the working paper that the Government should also offer opening of the import of those agricultural products also, which are either not produced in India or their production is so low that their import will not have any significant impact on the farmers. In this regard, the working paper gives examples of rice, black pepper, soybean oil, shrimp, tea, coffee, dairy products, poultry, apples, almonds, pistachio etc., whose import has been recommended to be opened.

After the recommendations by NITI Aayog in this working paper, there have been strong reactions from the farmer organisations including the Bharatiya Kisan Sangh (BKS) and in this regard, NITI Aayog has been vehemently criticised and it has been said that these suggestions are against the interests of the country in general and farmers in particular. For example, the BKS has said that these suggestions are against the interests of the country and the farmers. The BKS also says that NITI Aayog has kneeled before the US, which is not a happy sign.

On the other hand, there is also news that the trade talks between India and America have come to a halt because the Government is not ready to concede the US demand for opening markets for the USA'S GM and other agricultural products. In such a situation, this working paper of NITI Aayog is not able to acknowledge the position of the Government. This may also be interpreted that Niti Ayog is trying to impact the anti-GM position of the Government. Both these situations are not good for the country. Previously

are not good for the country. Previously Also NITI Aayog had Supported GM. This is not the first time that NITI Aayog has advocated GM crops. Earlier also, Aayog, under the vice-chairmanship of Prof Arvind Panagariya, also had released a report in favour of GM crops. At that time too, there was strong opposition to the same.

There has been opposition to GM crops in the country for a long time. Proponents of GM have constantly been making efforts in favour of GM. However, due to strong opposition to GM and its solid arguments, GM sup-

porters could not succeed. There are many reasons for their opposition:

The first reason is that most GM crops are herbicide tolerant. That is, when these crops are grown, all the surrounding herbs can be destroyed by using designated herbicides and GM crops are not affected. The International Agency for Research on

Cancer (IARC) has classified glyphosate as "probably carcinogenic to humans". It is worth noting

that when these herbicides are used during the production of GM crops, some of their residues remain in those agricultural products and soil, which can cause cancer. Statistics show that in the USA, there are 350 cancer patients per lakh of the population, whereas in India this figure is 100 per lakh. One reason for this is also the excessive use of herbicides in GM crops in the USA.

Although the use and import of GM food products are prohibited in India, due to the shortage of edible oils, the import of edible oils from the US and other countries has been increasing for some time, out of which some

amount of GM edible oils is also being imported unknowingly. The Government of India has also accepted this earlier. Due to this, the incidence of cancer in India is continuously increasing. Where there were only 8 lakh cancer patients in 2000, by the year 2024 their number has reached 15 lakh. Consumption of GM edible oils could also be one

of the reasons for the same.

The second reason for the opposition to the import of GM crops is that the production and import of GM crops are not legally allowed in the country, as per the law of the land. In international trade, no dispute can be raised by other partner countries in this regard, while respecting our rules. Under the WTO rules, every country has the right to ban goods coming from other countries given its right to protect the health of its citizens.

As per international rules, it is possible to stop

GM products coming from the US from entering
the country.

Since Indian farmers are already suffering financial losses due lack of remunerative prices for their produce, if cheap GM products are allowed to be imported, our farmers will suffer, and in such a situation, if farmers stop practising agriculture, the food security of the country itself may be in danger.

Thirdly, the sale of GM products is not possible under the food safety rules framed by the Food Security and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI), which mandates that food products cannot have more than a threshold limit of GM ingredients. In

such a situation, after allowing the import of GM products into the country, they will become part of the food chain in India, which will not only circumvent the rules of the country but will also pose a threat to the health of the citizens.

Apart from the above reasons, a fourth reason, which goes against the import of GM products in the country, is that the GM products whose import has been recommended by the NITI Aayog are generally not actually consumed by humans in the US.

In the US, corn and soya are mostly used either as animal feed or for making ethanol. It is worth noting that in the US, 40 to 50 per cent of GM corn is used as animal feed, 30 to 40 per cent is used in making ethanol and only 10 per cent is used in food processing. Similarly, soya is also mostly used as animal feed. The inclusion of such GM products in the food chain of India is not only harmful to the health of the countrymen but is also an insult to the people of this country.

Although GM products are constantly advocated by the people sitting in NITI Aayog, due to the opposition by the farmers and enlightened scientists in the country and due to the lack of judicial permission in this regard, they are not able to succeed. In such a situation, when the trade agreement with America is under negotiations, and the ban on GM food in India can be used as a shield to protect the interests of farmers and dairy, such recommendations by NITI Aayog are indicative of their indifference towards farmers, and the health of the people and the food security of the country.

Moreover, we need to realise that India exports nearly 50 billion USD worth of agricultural food products, and a major attraction of Indian food is that it carries a non-GM tag.

Moment, GM enters into our food chain, we may lose a major chunk of our export markets, as Middle Eastern countries Europe and many other countries, do not allow the import of GM food products. Perhaps, NITI Aayog fails to factor in this important risk associated with GM imports and production in India.

The Government of India should ignore these recommendations of NITI Aayog and should rather use the ban on GM food as an argument in international trade agreements and as a shield in the trade war while protecting the farmers, dairy, food security and public health of the country. It seems that despite the opposition of most of the farming organisations of the country, GM supporters want to allow the import of GM into the country at any cost. We should understand that once the import of GM is allowed in the country, it will pave the path for bringing GMOs into agriculture. We need to be cautious of any such efforts.

### Crushed by Celebration: A mirror to our misplaced priorities

t a time when our society is overwhelmed by daily concerns, chaos, and confusion, the Chinnaswamy Stadium tragedy — like so many heartbreaking incidents before it — will soon fade into oblivion. As always, we will return to our routines, and the media will quickly move on to newer topics of debate and distraction. What will remain in the cricketing records, however, is Royal Challengers Bengaluru's (RCB's) long-awaited and well-deserved Indian Premier League (IPL) triumph.

A sobering truth: over 300,000 fans surged into a stadium built for only 35,000, leading to a deadly stampede caused by overcrowding and mismanagement. Eleven young lives were lost — most of them in their twenties — and more than 75 others were injured. In response, each grieving family was offered ₹15 lakh in compensation: ₹5 lakh from RCB and the Karnataka State Cricket Association, and ₹10 lakh from the state Government.

This compensation comes against the backdrop of the IPL's staggering growth — its top 10 franchises reportedly doubled their combined revenue to ₹6,797 crore in FY24, up from ₹3,082 crore the previous year. Stampede deaths are, tragically, not uncommon in our country — most often witnessed at religious gatherings. Each such incident reveals how desperately we lose ourselves in life's lesser priorities. The recent

Each such incident reveals how desperately we lose ourselves in life's lesser priorities. The recent tragedy at the Bengaluru stadium is no different. A catastrophe born of misplaced priorities should shake us to the core. But will it? In truth, many of us understand that a life anchored in meaningful goals offers deeper fulfilment.

Yet, in the end, it all comes down to priorities: spectacle over substance, fleeting euphoria over value-driven living, short-term gains over long-term vision, and emotional manipulation over true societal upliftment. The culture of our land was once shaped by unquestioning obeisance to royalty — often at the expense of individuality. Though those days are long past, a significant section of our population continues to indulge in hero worship.

This tendency plays out vividly across the three most popular arenas of public life: cricket, cinema, and — most of all — politics, the ultimate theatre of showmanship and hypocrisy. Ironically, these very spectacles distract us from what truly matters.

They push us to devote our time and energy to lesser priorities, drawing us into emotional pageantry while the real work of nation-building remains neglected. Broadly speaking, human beings long for celebration. We seek joy, purpose, and collective euphoria to escape the monotony and burdens of everyday life. This longing is deeply human. That is why we have created rit-

uals of celebration — festivals, ceremonies, and, in contemporary times, grand spectacles like the IPL. Given all this, should we not pause and ask: What is it that we so eagerly celebrate — and what, in truth, does it cost us? We might say there are two kinds of celebrations. The first is born of genuine effort — where sweat, discipline and dedication converge to yield success.

A team's triumph, for instance, is the result of unwavering commitment, strategic planning, and relentless training. The second is what we call "substitute celebration" — a momentary euphoria borrowed from someone else's achievement. It is a mass-manufactured high, served on a platter, requiring nothing from us but our presence and our frenzy.

This is where the tragedy lies.

The massive crowd that descended upon the stadium contributed nothing to RCB's 18-yearlong struggle. They were mere supporters — spectators with no real stake, only a desire to bask in borrowed glory. Their connection was purely geographical. Their thrill comes without toil; their applause, without a trace of personal achievement. While the nation's gaze remained fixed on RCB's celebrations, a moment quieter in spectacle yet far more significant — and deserving of national acclaim — unfolded in Karnataka around the same time.

In a landmark moment for Indian literature, Kannada author Banu Mushtaq received the 2025 International Booker Prize for Heart Lamp, a luminous collection of short stories written in the language of her roots. But where was the mass euphoria? The public frenzy? No rallies. Not even a ripple of excitement compared to the deafening jubilation over the IPL.

The recognition was confined to a quiet state Government felicitation, accompanied by a modest cash award of ₹10 lakh each to the author and her translator, Deepa Bhasthi.

This striking difference reveals a deeper, more troubling truth: we are being conditioned to applaud spectacles that bear little relevance to our lives while ignoring achievements that hold the power to genuinely transform society. This is not to diminish — even remotely — RCB's well-earned achievement; they deserve their moment. However, what does this say about our collective priorities when we glorify such victories, yet overlook far more consequential achievements — achievements that bring far greater honour to the nation?

Here lies the hard truth: when life feels monotonous and insignificant, many seek borrowed glory, mistaking it for their triumph. The more hollow life feels, the more desperate the urge to cling to something larger — even if it bears no relation to their own lived experience. Thus, substitute celebration becomes a balm for a bruised identity. Why has cricket become our national

mania? It isn't our indigenous sport. It was a colonial pastime, brought by our former rulers. And yet, it eclipses every other game — hockey, kabaddi, athletics, football, tennis. Why? One word: money. Because money has become the status-obsessed deity — lavishly worshipped and desperately invoked as life's ultimate pursuit. Cricket — especially the IPL — is a multi-billion-rupee industry. In 2023 alone, IPL revenue touched ₹11,770 crores, with the BCCI posting a surplus of ₹5,120 crores. Over three years, its cumulative profits crossed ₹15,000 crores.

And yet, the world's richest sports body pays no tax — shielded by a "charitable" status. In stark contrast, research labs and educational institutions are taxed. As cricket-loving masses erupt in cheer, India's research laboratories quietly scramble for funds.

India's national spending on research and development reportedly remains at a modest 0.6 to 0.7 per cent of GDP — well below the global average of 2.6 per cent. In comparison, the United States allocates 3.5 per cent, China 2.4 per cent, and South Korea a remarkable 5 per cent. Strikingly, more than half of India's R&D expenditure continues to come from the Government, with only minimal contributions from the private sector. What message does this send?

It's time we ask the uncomfortable questions. With all due love and reverence for sport, we must still wonder: has cricket — so often exalted to the skies — become a grand distraction in disguise? Why are cricketers deified, their every gesture imitated? Because they sell dreams. They sell brands. They sell products. They sustain illusions. But illusions—however dazzling — do not build nations. They may soothe us, but they do not strengthen us.

In the manufactured euphoria surrounding India's most popular sport claimed 11 lives — not of the rich or powerful but of the nameless, faceless, and easily forgotten. A fulfilled individual does not perish in a stampede — nor joins a frenzy that feeds on illusion.

So yes, let us grieve. But let us also reflect—and change. It's not enough to mourn 11 deaths. We must mourn the deeper tragedy: a society where lives are lost over spectacles that add no real value.

Let us grieve the cultural void — the misplaced priorities, the intellectual neglect — that keeps us cheering from the sidelines of borrowed games is undeniablee be responsible custodians of her greatness? Let this be our moment of reckoning.

# **Blended Learning: Driving educational transformation**

e are living in an era of education that is creating enabling circumstances for students and working professionals, and in which blended learning would be a key game-chang-Within India, the implementation of the National Educational Policy of India (NEP) 2020 is going to revamp the teaching-learning process in India. The vision of NEP 2020 is to reimagine the Indian education system aligned with SDG 4, which focuses on equal opportunity, inclusion and equity. Blended teaching-learning environments, Open Educational Resources (OERs) under Creative Commons (CC) and Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) are essential requirements to build a strong Indian education ecosystem across regions and socioeconomic strata. An online survey has been conducted among academic communities including students, faculty members, and library professionals to know the perception during the defence of my doctoral thesis. The survey revealed a low level of awareness among students and faculty members about unconventional learning opportunities and resources that leverage IT infrastructure like online courses which provide access to a large number of students to the

latest technical skill enhancement courses. Encouragingly and somewhat expectedly, faculty members surveyed displayed a higher awareness of these matters relative to students or even library professionals. It emphasised that when faculty members incorporate OER educational resources into traditional classroom settings, the quality of OER resources improves, hence enhancing the overall quality of online education. The various stakeholders were found to have the view of integrating OERs with the Library Management System (LMS)

and having a strong OER policy framework in the HEIs in India. The favourable views of stakeholders towards integrating OERs with LMS should enable the academic community to gain a better understanding of the culture of open-access licenses and blended learning environments. This is therefore an opportunity to speed up blended learning education, particularly among the periurban population and disadvantaged communities living in remote areas. As per 'All Indian Survey on Higher Education (AISHE) 2021-22, the distance enrolment mode in Bihar and Assam is one of the lowest despite high population growth and the people are keen on higher education and have little access to direct university enrolment within the state. This is important for climate literacy and climate education.

The actual adoption of OERs by Higher Educational Institutions (HEIs) depends upon various factors such as - time and cost, languages, userfriendliness, infrastructure, quality and library support. The evolution of pedagogical practices is linked to the awareness of Open Educational Resources


(OERs), which facilitate the integration of OER materials into traditional teaching methods during in-person classes. Furthermore, Governmental support would augment the utilisation and advancement of OERs at higher education institutions and facilitate the bridging of disparities between information-rich and information-poor entities through high-quality open educational resources, aligning with one of

the aims of Sustainable Development Goal #4.

The aim of NEP 2020 is to empower students/ learners to inculcate diversified skills by permitting them to pursue two degrees simultaneously. In theory, such flexibilities should empower not only students but potentially the entire workforce for future needs while enabling holistic approaches to education. However, this goal cannot be efficiently achieved and scaled up to address current needs through the conventional classroom pedagogy with its attendance mandates. Rather, it requires a softer and digital approach wherein online learning can be brought to par with regular classroom learning.

Consequently, digital educational resources, online education, Artificial Intelligence (AI) technology, and virtual reality can interact to address the necessity

for a transformation in the education system in the present and future eras. This initiative assists students from diverse backgrounds in comprehending the interdisciplinary nature of education while providing extensive exposure to various tools and strategies of online learning. This exposure aids in the development of knowledge to tackle challenges at local, regional, and global levels, and to devise solutions aimed at achieving the UN Sustainable Development Goals in a meaningful manner. Enhance leadership skills in their

# White House releases situation room photos during Iran strike

ne image shows President Donald staring straight ahead stone-faced, monitoring the mission that took out three Iranian nuclear enrichment sites on Saturday.

In another image, Trump stands as his chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Dan Caine, appears to speak. And whenever Trump is pictured, he is donning a bright red hat blaring his signature campaign slogan, "Make America Great Again."

The series of photos that the White House published on its X account Saturday gives the public a rare glimpse inside the Situation Room — again stirring the intrigue that occurs any time pictures from the highly secret complex are released.

The photos from Saturday portrayed Trump with senior members of his team, including Vice President JD Vance, Secretary of State Marco Rubio



al security adviser — White House chief of staff Susie Wiles and Defense Secretary Pete Hegseth. They are gathered around a large wooden table in the main conference room of the Situation Room, known as the "JFK Room" — named for the president who was in office when the Situation Room was established.

Trump is always in sharp focus whenever he is pictured, even as other officials in the foreground — like Hegseth or Vance — are softly blurred.

The two officials closest to Trump when he's seated are Vance and Rubio, perhaps underscoring the depth of their influence as Trump deliberated for days whether to strike Iran. But the president isn't always sitting still. At points, Trump was roaming around the room, standing behind his top aide Wiles as Caine appeared to speak.

### Democrats demand 'clear answers' from Trump

President Donald Trump must provide American people "clear are" people "clear answers" on his decision to strike Iranian nuclear sites, a democratic senator said, asserting that no president should be allowed to unilaterally march the country into something "as consequential as war".

Democratic Senate leader Chuck Schumer said the danger of wider, longer and more devastating war had dramatically increased after the US bombed three major nuclear sites - Fordow, Natanz and Isfahan — in Iran, bringing itself into the Israel-Iran conflict. "We must enforce the War Powers Act," he said, calling on all senators on both sides of the aisle to vote for it.

The War Powers Act is a congressional resolution designed to limit the US president's abil-

ity to initiate or escalate military actions abroad. Trump must provide the American people and Congress clear answers on the actions taken tonight (Saturday night) and their implications for the safety of Americans, Schumer said.

"No president should be allowed to unilaterally march this nation into something as consequential as war with erratic threats and no strategy. Confronting Iran's ruthless campaign of terror, nuclear ambitions, and regional aggression demands strength, resolve and strategic clarity," he said.

Former House Speaker Nancy Pelosi said Trump ignored the Constitution by unilaterally engaging the American military without civilians, the region, and the Congressional authorisation.

"I join my colleagues in demanding answers from the administration on this operation which endangers American lives and risks fur-

ther escalation and dangerous destabilisation of the region," she said. Meanwhile, UN Secretary General Antonio Guterres said he was gravely alarmed by the use of force by the US against Iran. Guterres described it as a "dangerous escalation" in a region already on the edge - and a direct threat to international peace

and security. Guterres cautioned that at this perilous hour, it is critical to avoid a spiral of chaos. "There is no military solution. The only path forward is diplomacy. The only hope is peace," he said.

"There is a growing risk that this conflict could rapidly get out of control - with catastrophic consequences for world," the UN chief said, calling on member states to de-escalate and uphold their obligations under the UN Charter and other rules of

### Nations react to US strikes on Iran with calls for diplomacy

**♦**he US strike on Iran fuelled fears that Israel's war with Tehran could escalate to a wider regional conflict, and other countries began reacting on Sunday with calls for diplomacy and words

President Donald Trump had said Thursday that he would decide within two weeks whether to get involved. In the end, it took just days, and Washington inserted itself into Israel's campaign with its early Sunday attack.

It remained unclear early on how much damage had been inflicted, but Iran had pledged to retaliate if the US joined the Israeli assault. Some have questioned whether a weakened Iran would capitulate or remain defiant and begin striking with allies at US targets scattered across the Gulf region.

Here is a look at reactions from governments and officials around the world.

Lebanon

Lebanese President Joseph Aoun said the US bombing could lead to a regional conflict that no country could bear and called for negotiations.

"Lebanon, its leadership, parties, and people, are aware today, more than ever before, that it has paid a heavy price for the wars that erupted on its land and in the region," Aoun said in a statement on X.

"It is unwilling to pay more, and there is no national interest in doing so, especially since the cost of these wars was and will be greater than its ability to bear.

Lebanon's new leadership, which came after Israel and the Hezbollah's militant group's devastating war, has urged that the country avoids being dragged into more conflict as it tries to rebuild itself and pull itself from years-long economic crisis.

Hezbollah has not taken military action against Israel in solidarity with its key ally Iran in the conflict, but has not yet

commented on Washington's overnight strikes.

Prime Minister Nawaf Salam said that Lebanon needs to stay away from any possible regional spillover from the conflict. "It is increasingly important for us to adhere strictly to the supreme national interest, which is the need to avoid Lebanon being ... Drawn into the ongoing regional confrontation in any way," Salam said in a post on X.

#### **New Zealand**

New Zealand Foreign Minister Winston Peters urged "all parties to return to talks".

He wouldn't tell reporters Sunday whether New Zealand supported President Trump's actions, saying they had only just happened. The threetime foreign minister said the crisis is "the most serious I've ever dealt with" and that it was "critical further escalation is avoided". Yemen and Hamas have condemned the US strikes. The Houthis vowed to support Iran in its fight against "the Zionist and American aggression". In a statement on Sunday, the Houthi political bureau called on Muslim nations to join "the Jihad and resistance option as one front against the Zionist-American arrogance".

Hamas and the Houthis are part of Iran's so-called "Axis of Resistance", the collection of pro-Iranian proxies stretching from Yemen to Lebanon that for years gave Iran considerable power across the region.

A flash commentary from China's government-run media asked whether the US is "repeating its Iraq mistake in Iran".

The online piece by CGTN, the foreign-language arm of the state broadcaster, said the US strikes mark a dangerous turning point. "History has repeatedly shown that military interventions in the Middle East often produce unintended consequences, including prolonged conflicts and regional destabilisation," it said, citing the American invasion of Iraq in 2003.

It said a measured, diplomatic approach that prioritises dialogue over military confrontation offers the best hope for stability in the Middle East.

#### South Korea

South Korea's presidential office held an emergency meeting on Sunday to discuss the potential security and economic ramifications of the US strikes.

National security director, Wi Sung-lac, asked officials to coordinate closely to minimise any negative impacts on South Korea, emphasising that the top priority is ensuring the safety of the South Korean people and the continuation of their stable daily lives, according to the presi-

On Thursday, Chinese President Xi Jinping held telephone talks with his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin on the Israel-Iran war and called for an immediate ceasefire "especially" by Israel and stop attacks on civilians.

In his first comments on the current Israel and Iran conflict, Xi said a ceasefire is an urgent priority and the use of force is not the right way to resolve international disputes.

### US strikes may not be enough to destroy Iran, says Chinese experts

The strikes have only served to push the situation further toward the abyss, it said. Chinese experts said the true effectiveness of the American operation remains unclear, and that the strikes may not have been sufficient to completely destroy Iran's under

ground nuclear facilities. Fordo's nuclear facility lies nearly 100 meters underground, making it extremely difficult to destroy completely with just one or two strikes, even using bunker-buster bombs, Li Zixin, an assistant research fellow at the China Institute of International Studies, told staterun Global Times. Zhang Junshe, a military affairs expert shared a similar view. He said the first wave of US strikes may not have been sufficient to destroy Iran's underground nuclear facilities. For example, the Fordo site lies 90 meters beneath solid rock, making it highly resistant. While Israel sees it as a key target, it lacks the means to strike it effectively. Zhang said the US uses B-2

pound GBU-5/ bunker busters which are believed to be able to penetrate only about 65 meters. In theory, two bombs used in sequence might be needed, but this tactic has never been publicly tested, so the success of the initial strike remains uncer-

tain, he said. Referring to the Iranian official's assertion to the BBC that Iran "didn't suffer a major blow because the materials had already been taken out,", he said, "This further demonstrates the difficulty for the US military to completely destroy

Iran's nuclear materials." Regardless of whether the Fordo facility was fully destroyed in the first wave of strikes, it is clear that the US airstrikes inflicted substantial damage to Iran's nuclear infrastructure, he said.

the Indian Government continue to occur sporadically in the rural parts of Chhattisgarh and Jharkhand that border with Telangana, Maharashtra.

## 'Robotaxi' to give Tesla lift after boycotts, sales plunge: Musk

lon Musk promised in 2019 that driverless Tesla "robotaxis" would ■be on the road "next year," but it didn't happen. A year later, he promised to deliver them the next year, but that didn't happen either.

Despite the empty pledges the promises kept coming. Last year in January, Musk said, "Next year for sure, we'll have over a million robotaxis.

#### Would you settle for 10 or 12?

Musk appears to be on the verge of making his robotaxi vision a reality with a test run of a small squad of self-driving cabs in Austin, Texas, starting Sunday. Reaching a million may take a year or more, however, although the billionaire should be able to expand the service this year if the Austin demo is a success.

The stakes couldn't be higher, nor the challenges.

While Musk was making those "next year" promises,

rival Waymo was busy deploying driverless taxis in Los Angeles, San Diego, Austin and other cities by using a different technology that allowed it to get to market faster. It just completed its 10 millionth paid ride. Boycotts related to Musk's politics have tanked Tesla's sales. Rival electric vehicle makers with newly competitive models have stolen market share. And investors are on edge after a \$150 billion stock wipeout when Musk picked a social media fight with a US president overseeing federal car regulators who could make the robotaxi rollout much more difficult. The stock has recovered somewhat after Musk said he regretted some of his remarks.

Tesla shareholders have stood by Musk over the years because he's defied the odds by building a successful standalone electric vehicle company self-driving car promises aside — and making them a lot of money in the process. A decade ago, Tesla shares traded for around \$18. The shares closed Friday at \$322. Musk says the Austin test will begin



modestly enough, with just 10 or 12 vehicles picking up passengers in a limited area. But then it will quickly ramp up and spread to other cities, eventually reaching hundreds of thousands if not a million vehicles next year.

Some Musk watchers on Wall Street are sceptical.

"How quickly can he expand the fleet?" asks Garrett Nelson, an analyst at CFRA. "We're talking maybe a dozen vehicles initially. It's very small."

Morningstar's Seth Goldstein says Musk is being classic Musk: Promising too much, too quickly.

"When anyone in Austin can download the app and use a robotaxi, that will be a success, but I don't think that will

Musk's tendency to push up the stock high with a bit of hyperbole is well known among investors.

In 2018, he told Tesla stockholders he had "funding secured" to buy all their shares at a massive premium and take the company private.

The system still requires drivers to keep their eyes on the road because they may need to intervene and take control at any moment.

"Tesla will have, I don't know," Musk mused in an conference call with investors, "99 per cent market share or something ridiculous." Given Waymo's head start and potential competition from Amazon and others, dominating the driverless market to that extent could be a reach.

But Dan Ives, a Wedbush Securities analyst and big Musk fan, says this time Musk may actually pull it off because of Tesla's ability to scale up quickly. And even sceptics like Morningstar's Goldstein acknowledge that Musk occasionally does gets things right, and spectacularly so.

He upended the car industry by getting people to buy expensive electric vehicles, brought his Starlink satellite internet service to rural areas and, more recently, performed a gee-whiz trick of landing an unmanned SpaceX rocket on a platform back on earth.

"Maybe his timelines aren't realistic," Goldstein says, "but he can develop futuristic technology products.

### Israel recovers remains of three more hostages from Gaza

he Israeli military said on Sunday that it has recovered the remains of three hostages held in the Gaza Strip. At least four Palestinians were killed in an Israeli airstrike and 22 wounded while waiting for humanitarian aid, according to a local hospital.

The military identified the remains as those of Yonatan Samerano, 21; Ofra Keidar, 70; and Shay Levinson, 19. All three were killed during Hamas' October 7, 2023, attack into Israel that ignited the ongoing war. The militant group is still holding 50 hostages, less than half of them believed to be alive.

The military did not provide any details about the recovery operation, and it was unclear if the airstrike was related to it.

"The campaign to return the hostages continues consistently and is happening alongside the campaign against Iran," Prime Minister Benjamin

Netanyahu said in a statement. Kobi Samerano said in a Facebook post that his son's remains were returned on what would have been Yonatan's 23rd birthday.

#### War in Gaza rages on as new front opens with Iran

Hamas-led militants killed some 1,200 people, mostly civilians, and abducted 251 people in the October 7 attack. More than half the hostages have been returned in ceasefire agreements or other deals, eight have been rescued alive and Israeli forces have recovered dozens of bodies.

Israel's retaliatory offensive has killed over 55,000 Palestinians, according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which has said that women and children make up more than half of the dead. It does not distinguish between civilians and combatants. Four people were killed on Sunday in an airstrike in the built-up Nuseirat

needed food, killing hundreds of people in recent weeks. The military says it has fired warning shots at people it said approached its forces in a suspicious manner.

Separately, World Central Kitchen, the charity run by celebrity chef Jose Andres said it had resumed the distribution of hot meals in Gaza for the first time in six weeks after shutting down because of Israel's blockade, which was loosened last month amid fears of famine.

### Japan, South Korea mark 60 years of ties

apan and South Korea are marking the 60th anniversary of the normalisation of their diplomatic relations Sunday. The two Asian powers, rivals and neighbours, have often had little to celebrate, much of their rancour linked to Japan's brutal colonial rule of Korea in the early 20th century. Things have gotten better in recent years, but both nations — each a strong ally of the United States - now face political uncertainty and a growing unease about the future of their ties.

Here's a look at one of Northeast Asia's most crucial relationships, from both capitals, by two correspondents from The Associated Press.

#### The view from Seoul

South Korea's new liberal president, Lee Jae Myung, is determined to break sharply from the policies of his disgraced predecessor, Yoon Suk Yeol, who now faces a trial on charges of leading an insurrection over his imposition of martial law in December.

Relations with Japan, however, are one area where Lee, who describes himself as a pragmatist in foreign policy, may find himself cautiously building on Yoon's approach.

Before his removal from office in April, the conservative former president tried to repair relations with Japan. Yoon wanted to also tighten the countries' three-way secu-

cooperation with Washington to counter North Korean nuclear threats. In 2023, Yoon announced

a South Korea-funded compensation plan for colonialera forced laborers. That decision caused a strong backlash from victims and their supporters, who had demanded direct payments from Japanese companies and a fresh apology from Tokyo.

Yoon's outreach boosted tourism and business ties, but there's still lingering resentment in South Korea that Japan failed to reciprocate Seoul's diplomatic concession by addressing historical grievances more sincerely.

While advocating for pragmatism and problem-solving in foreign policy, Lee has also long criticized Japan for allegedly clinging to its imperialist past and blamed that for hurting cooperation between the countries. Some experts say the stabil-

ity of the countries' improved ties could soon be tested, possibly around the August 15 anniversary of Korea's liberation from Japanese colonial rule at the end of World War II, when Lee is expected to publicly address the nation's painful history with Japan.

Some in Seoul want Japanese Prime Minister Shigeru Ishiba to mark the anniversary with a stronger statement of remorse over Japan's wartime past to put bilateral ties on firmer

## Iran-Israel war escalation to impact India's trade: Experts

ny further escalation of the ongoing war between Iran and ■Israel will have wider implications for India's trade with West Asian countries, including Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, and Yemen, say experts. They said that the war has already started impacting India's exports to Iran and Israel.

The US attacked three sites in Iran early Sunday, inserting itself into Israel's war aimed at destroying the country's nuclear programme in a risky gambit to weaken a longtime foe that prompted fears of a wider regional conflict as Tehran accused Washington of launching "a dangerous war".

"We are in for big trouble now because of this war. It will have a cascading effect on India's trade with West Asian countries," Mumbai-based exporter and founder chairman of Technocraft Industries India Sharad Kumar Saraf said.

Saraf said that his company is also holding back consignments to both these countries. factures drum closures, nylon and plastic plugs, capseal closures, and clamps.

There will be a cascading effect of this war," he added.

Another exporter said that the Indian traders community is already reeling under the impact of the Israel-Hamas conflict and involvement of Yemen-backed Houthis' attack on shipping vessels in the Red Sea. Due to that, shipping lines from India were taking consignments from the Cape of Good Hope, encircling the

Now, because of the Iran-Israel war, another key trading route — the Strait of Hormuz is getting affected.

This route will hit the movement of oil tankers. I have a feeling that oil tankers will find new routes but that will push crude oil prices. It will have implications on inflation as crude oil prices are the mother of all prices," Saraf said. Think tank Global Trade Research Initiative (GTRI) said that a wider regional escalation could threaten India's much larger trade with the broader

West Asian region, including Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Syria, and Yemen, where Indian exports total \$8.6 billion and imports stand at \$33.1 billion.

"Any disruption to shipping lanes, port access, or financial systems in this corridor would severely impact India's trade flows, inflate freight and insurance costs, and introduce fresh supply chain risks for Indian businesses," GTRI Founder Ajay Srivastava said.

India's exports to Iran stood at \$1.24 billion in FY2025, with key items including banana (\$53.2 million), soya meal (\$70.6 million), Bengal gram (\$27.9 million), and tea (\$25.5 million). Imports stood at \$441.8 billion last fiscal.

With Israel, India's exports stood at \$2.1 billion and \$1.6 billion in imports in 2024-25. He said that the ongoing US-

threat of wider conflict could significantly disrupt this trade.

Payment channels already strained by US sanctions may face further blockages, while heightened shipping risks in the Gulf could drive up insurance costs and delay shipments. Perishable exports like rice, bananas, and tea are especially vulnerable. A prolonged conflict could dampen Iranian demand and squeeze Indian exporters, particularly in the agricultural sector." Srivastava said.

GTRI said that a key concern

is the potential disruption to the Strait of Hormuz, through which roughly 60-65 per cent of India's crude imports transit. "Any blockade or military escalation in this vital maritime corridor would severely impact India's energy security, drive up oil prices, and trigger inflationary pressures at home," it added. India enjoys deep historical, cultural, and economic ties with Iran, once a major crude oil supplier and views Iran's Chabahar Port as a strategic gateway to Afghanistan and Central Asia, providing crucial connectivity while bypassing Pakistan. Yet India also maintains robust relations with the US, Israel, and Gulf Arab states, each now directly or indirectly involved in the unfolding confrontation, Srivastava said.

India's crude oil and half of its LNG imports pass through the Strait of Hormuz, which Iran has threatened to close. This narrow waterway, only 21 miles wide at its narrowest point, handles nearly a fifth of global oil trade and is indispensable to India, which depends on imports for over 80 per cent of its energy needs.

The Strait of Hormuz, which lies between Iran to the north and Oman and the United Arab Emirates to the south, serves as the main route for oil exports from Saudi Arabia, Iran, Iraq, Kuwait, and the UAE. Many liquefied natural gas (LNG) shipments, especially from Qatar, also pass through the strait.

According to the Delhi-based economic think tank, any closure or military disruption in the Strait of Hormuz would sharply increase oil prices, shipping costs, and insurance premiums, trigger ing inflation, pressuring the rupee, and complicating India's fiscal management.

The present conflict that began with an attack on Israel on October 7, 2023, has brought cargo movement through Red Sea routes to a halt due to attacks by Houthi rebels on commercial shipping. Last year, the situation around the Bab-el-Mandeb Strait, a crucial shipping route connecting the Red Sea and the Mediterranean Sea to the Indian Ocean, escalated due to attacks by Yemen-based

Houthi militants. Around 80 per cent of India's merchandise trade with Europe passes through the Red Sea, and substantial trade with the US also takes this route. Both these geographies account for 34 per cent of the country's total exports. The Red Sea Strait is vital for 30 per cent of global container traffic and 12 per cent of world trade.

Based on the tariff war impact, the WTO has already said that global trade will contract 0.2 per cent in 2025 as against the earlier projection of 2.7 per cent expansion.

### Coal India arm to bring two new mines in financial year

oal India arm Central Coalfields Ltd plans to ✓ bring two new coal mines into production in the current financial year which would ramp up its capacity by 10-12 million tonnes per annum, a top official said on Sunday. The move assumes significance as Central Coalfields Ltd (CCL) aims to cross 110 million tonnes production in the current financial year and 150 million tonnes by 2030.

"We have planned to open two new mines this year," CCL Chairman and Managing Director (CMD) Nilendu Kumar Singh told reporters here. The company plans to begin the production at Kotre Basantpur block (coking coal mine) with a peak rated capacity of 5 million tonnes (MT) by October. In the case of Chandragupt open cast project (non-coking coal) with a capac-

### **COFFEE EXPORTS UP 125 PER CENT IN LAST 11 YEARS**

→he country's coffee exports have jumped L about 125 per cent to \$ 1.8 billion in the last 11 vears on account of a series of measures taken by the Coffee Board of India, according to

central Government data.

The exports stood at over \$ 800 million in 2014-15. It was \$ 1.28 billion in 2023-24 and \$ 1.14 billion in 2022-23, the data showed. Europe remains the top destination for the country's coffee exports. The major countries which import the commodity from India include Italy, Germany, Belgium, Middle East nations, Korea, and

The major initiatives taken by the Coffee Board of India to push the exports include online issuance with digital

cum-membership certificate (RCMC), export permit, certificate of origin, regular interaction with the exporters to discuss bottlenecks and addressing those issues, and providing regular global market information and market intelligence.

The other export promotion steps included transit/freight assistance to maximise export earnings by enhancing the market share of value-added coffee. The Government provides ₹3 per kg for export of value-added products; ₹2 for shipments of high value green coffees to far-off high value markets such as the US, Canada, Japan, Australia, New Zealand, South Korea, and Finland, Norway, and

Denmark. To support the business community for value addition, the board supports indi-

signature of registration- viduals, self-help groups, and growers. It provides 40 per cent cost of machinery with a ceiling of Rs 15 lakh for installation of roasting, grinding and packaging machinery. "These measures are helping us to reach newer markets," Vidi's Coffee Founder Divya Shree G S said.

Further, according to Coffee Board CEO and Secretary M Kurma Rao, in India coffee is cultivated under a diverse canopy of native and mixed shade trees and this system supports biodiversity, ensures soil and water conservation, enhances carbon sequestration and sustains livelihoods for small and marginal farmers by offering opportunities for crop diversification.

Veteran Coffee grower from Coorg Bose Mandana said India is one of the few countries which is promoting shade grown coffee.



### Indian women eye fresh start in Asian Cup Qualifiers

ore than three years after a COVID outbreak in the team derailed their campaign in the last AFC Women's Asian Cup, India will make a fresh bid for a place in the continental showpiece, with Mongolia being their first test in the Qualifiers here on Monday.

The upcoming edition of the premier tournament will be held in Australia next year.

It wouldn't be wrong to says that the continent's top competition has been somewhat illfated for the Blue Tigresses in the last few decades.

India last made it to the AFC Women's Asian Cup in 2003. And when they hosted the tournament in 2022, a COVID outbreak in the side meant that India had to withdraw after only the first game and the results were declared void.

While India do have three podium finishes in the erstwhile Asian Women's Championship (runners-up in 1980 and 1983, and third place in 1981), they have not achieved anything for more than 40 years.

Besides the opener against Mongolia, India (ranked 70th) will face Timor Leste (ranked 158th) on June 29, Iraq (ranked 173rd) on July 2 and hosts Thailand (ranked 46th) on July 5, at the Chiang Mai Stadium.

Only the group winners will qualify for the final tournament in Australia in March 2026, which will also serve as a qualifier for the FIFA Women's World Cup in 2027.



Apart from Thailand, India have never faced the other three Group B opponents

Leeds: India and England players wore black armbands to pay their respect to former fast bowler David Lawrence, who passed away on Sunday. He was 61. Lawrence, who was

"Both teams are wearing black armbands to pay their respects to former England Cricketer, David 'Syd' Lawrence, who has sadly passed away. There was a moment's applause before the start of play on Day 3," the BCCI said in a statement.

Lawrence was diagnosed with the disease in 2024, a degenerative condition that affects the brain and nerves, leading to muscle wastage and there is no known cure to it.

He had also authored a book

'Syd's Voice' to create awareness

about MND and was involved in charity to raise funds for other patients. A Gloucestershire legend, Lawrence amassed 515 wickets from 185 First-Class matches

List A games. A promising bowler with extreme pace of his time, Lawrence's international caree ended when he suffered a serious kneecap injury while bowling against New Zealand at



county circuit, Lawrence was beginning to establish himself in tests and a five-for against the West Indies in 1991 helped England seal a series-levelling win at the Oval, with Viv Richards among his haul.

Lawrence also played a sole one-day international against the West Indies at Lord's in 1991, taking 4-67. For Gloucestershire, he grabbed 625 wickets in 280 matches. The England and India teams gave Lawrence a moment's silence on Sunday in Leeds before the third day's play in the first test. Lawrence became a competitive bodybuilder following his retirement and he was also a nightclub owner in Bristol. After he detailed his experiences of racism during his playing career, Gloucestershire issued an unreserved apology in September 2021, and six months later he became the county's first Black president.

Only last week, Lawrence received an MBE in King Charles III's birthday honors for outstanding

### Minjee Lee has 1st bogey-free round at windy Women's PGA

injee Lee knows how to play in windy conditions having growing up in Australia and now living in North Texas. She also has experience winning majors.

The two-time major champion is in position for another one after the first bogey-free round for anyone during the windswept KPMG Women's PGA Championship. Her 3-under 69 in the third round Saturday pushed her into the lead, four strokes ahead of Jeeno Thitikul. "I'm constantly practicing in windy conditions... It is windy, but not this windy, and it's really consistent as well," Lee said. 'Yes, I can hit a knock-down shot, but you also have to play the wind. You have to play so much extra out here that you have to be a little more creative." Lee was at 6-under 210 after beginning the round three strokes behind Thitikul, the world's No. 2-ranked player who led alone at the end of each of the

first two days. Lee went ahead to

outside Seattle where the Women's PGA was last year, Fields Ranch East at PGA Frisco is much more open and exposed to the ever-present Texas wind that was the strongest it had been all week. There were gusts of more than 30 mph Saturday, with much the same forecast for Sunday. Temperatures were again in the mid-90s.

Nelly Korda, the world's topranked player, described the conditions as "just brutal" after her round of 72 that began with backto-back bogeys. She finished with five birdies and five bogeys and is tied for sixth at 2-over 218. Lee and Thitikul, seeking her first major title, were the only players still under par and will play together again Sunday. Lexi Thompson (75), after a triplebogey start, was tied for third at 1 over with Hye Jin Choi (72) and Miyu Yamashita (73).

Thitikul, from Thailand, had the only birdie Saturday among the 78 players on the 172-yard, par-3 eighth hole, which generally plays downwind and where only 29 per cent of the tee shots all week have stayed on the green. That 13-foot birdie was her first of the day and got her to 5 under, two strokes ahead of Lee. But Thitikul's lead was gone after back-to-back bogeys on the back side. She pushed a 4-foot par chance past the hole at the 383-yard 11th, her first miss inside 5 feet this week. Then her drive at the 417-yard 12th hole went way right into a penalty area.

Lee, who won the 2022 U.S. Women's Open and 2021 Evian Championship in France, was steady Saturday with eight consecutive pars before a 4-foot birdie at the 487-yard ninth hole. Her other birdies were an 18-footer at the 515-yard, par-5 14th and a 1 1/2-foot at the bunker-surrounded 236-yard par 4 15th hole. While acknowledging that a four-stroke lead "feels really big," Lee isn't taking anything for granted. "Obviously, major Sunday is a different story. This is round three, so I think, you know, I have to still dig deep and post a score, even with a four-shot lead," she said. "So I'm just going to put my head down and just work on the things that I can do and do it to the best of my abil-Thitikul three-putt

from 50 feet at No. 14 was her third bogey in a four-hole stretch. "Definitely frustrated about the result today a little bit, like not really making putts like the first two days, Thitikul said. "But like still on the positive side that, just two players making under par after three rounds, and I'm one."
