▲ he Odisha Revenue Department is gearing up to launch a mobile application that will allow citizens to apply for and obtain crucial revenue certificates without visiting government offices. The move, announced on Monday by Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh

lays, ending harassment, and reducing corruption in tehsillevel services.

"The app is ready and will soon be rolled out. It will allow people to access around 18 key services, including caste, income, legal heir, resident and solvency certificates," Pujari said.

As per the proposed system, revenue officials, primarily tehsildars, will be required to issue certificates within a stipulated timeframe. Failure to do ing deductions from the official's salary. Citizens will also have the option to lodge complaints directly through the app against erring officials.

The initiative marks a major departure from the past, where the single-window system often failed due to lax enforcement. Applicants were routinely forced to make multiple visits and faced unofficial demands to expedite service.

"The mobile app will shift the power back to the people. It will particularly benefit those in remote and rural areas, where access to tehsil offices is difficult and time-consuming," a senior department official said.

However, retired bureaucrats and governance experts have warned that while digital platforms improve access, real change depends on implementation. "The success of this move will lie in holding officials accountable online or offline," a former revenue officer remarked.

DHE-IGNOU pact for UG-PG, diploma courses in Odia

he Department of Higher Education (DHE) on Monday signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) to offer undergraduate, postgraduate, diploma, and certificate courses in Odia through the distance learning mode.

The initiative aims to empower Odia-speaking students especially those in rural and remote regions to pursue higher education in their mother tongue. The programme aligns with the goals of the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, which emphasises education in regional languages for better learning outcomes and inclusivity

The MoU was signed in the presence of Higher Education Minister Suryabanshi Suraj and IGNOU Vice-Chancellor Prof Uma Kanjilal.

the IGNOU will translate and deliver major academic programmes in Odia, including BA, BCom, MA in subjects like Education, Rural Development, Public Administration, Hindi and Social Work. Diploma and certificate programmes in areas such as Early Childhood Care, Nutrition, Tourism and Environmental Studies will also be

available in Odia. The IGNOU has already rolled out an MBA programme in Odia earlier this year, becoming the first national open university to do so. With this MoU, the IGNOU will now expand its Odia offerings to all 43 study centres across Odisha.

Naveen flags collapse of health, women, farm sectors

Calls for Ianajagaran Abhiyan to reach out to people

Leader of Opposition and BJD president Naveen Patnaik on Tuesday launched a sharp attack on the BIP-led Odisha Government, accusing it of failing to deliver on key fronts like healthcare, women's welfare and farmers' rights. Addressing party leaders at Shankha Bhavan, Patnaik outlined the BJD's role as a responsible Opposition and called for intensified public outreach through the party's Janajagaran Abhiyan.

"In a democracy, people are the real masters. Today we are in Opposition by their mandate, but we continue to work for their welfare," Patnaik

He alleged that the health



system in Odisha is on the verge of collapse. "Under our government, 90% of people benefited from Biju Swasthya Kalyan Yojana. But now, patients are left without medicines, and hospital services have deteriorated. Out of 30 districts, 19 CDMO posts are lying vacant," he stated.

Criticising the weakening of the Mission Shakti movement, he said, "Over 70 lakh women had been empowered, but today many are facing harass-

shaken, and the movement has been derailed.

He also slammed the government for failing farmers. "Despite tall promises, distress sale continues. Farmers are not getting MSP and face hurdles in accessing loans. Irrigation projects initiated during our tenure have stalled," he said.

On the financial front, Patnaik noted that the State's

debt burden was Rs 18,000 crore in 2000, and the BJD left a surplus of Rs 45,000 crore in 2024. "But the BJP government is pushing Odisha into a cycle of record borrowings," he warned. Ex-cop's son held for alleged Rs 1.08-cr fraud

m T}$ he Cuttack-Bhubaneswar Commissionerate Police on Tuesday arrested a 32-yearold man for allegedly defrauding a businessman of over Rs 1.08 crore under the guise of facilitating a discounted luxury car purchase.

The accused, identified as Sambit Panda of Sailashree Vihar here, is the son of retired police officer Bidyut Chandra Panda. At the time of his arrest from a NEXA showroom in Cuttack, he was employed as a showroom manager.

According to police, complainant Rohit Roshan Mohanty was contacted by Panda on March 19, 2023. Panda, posing as a freelance car broker and former Audi Bhubaneswar manager, convinced Mohanty of his credentials, promising delivery of a high-end car within a month.

Engineers queue up for Home Guard posts

1 n a stark reflection of Odisha's deepening unemployment crisis, more than 10,000 candidates, many of them highly educated with B Tech, M Tech, MBA and MCA degrees, appeared for a written examination on Monday to secure a Home Guard position in Rourkela.

The startling mismatch lies in the fact that the position requires only a Class-V qualification and offers a modest daily wage of Rs 612. The recruitment was conducted for just 107 posts; yet, it drew an overwhelming number of

overqualified youths. The exam was conducted in

two sittings and included Odia essay writing and general knowledge. "A total of 9,060 candidates appeared for the exam and others withdrew after seeing the huge number of aspirants. The process went smoothly with heavy deployment of security personnel," said Rourkela Additional SP Ramakanta Sahoo

Social observers and academics have raised alarm over the incident, terming it a troubling sign of underemployment and economic stagnation. "When thousands of engineers and postgraduates apply for Class-V-level posts, it's not a statistic, it's a cry for help," said a senior econo-

Many candidates, who showed up for the exam, had prepared for competitive services but were left directionless due to limited government recruitment and insufficient private sector absorption. The lack of skillbased, industry-linked employment has become a recurring theme in Odisha's development narrative.

Experts have called for urgent, coordinated action from both the State and Union Governments to bridge the gap between educational output and market demand, especially in emerging sectors like IT, green energy, tourism and logistics.

Christians seek Prez's intervention amid rising persecution

In a growing chorus of concern over alleged religious persecution, Christian communities across Odisha staged coordinated protests on Monday, submitting memorandums to the President of India through district Collectors. The protests, held under the banner of the Rastriya Christian Morcha (RCM), sought urgent intervention to curb what the community describes as a disturbing rise in targeted violence and discrimination.

Speaking to the media, RCM State secretary general Dr Pallab Lima revealed that 54 incidents of persecution have been reported in Odisha alone over the last six months, marking a record high. "These are not isolated incidents but signs of a larger, more dangerous trend involving denial of basic human and constitutional rights," Dr Lima stated.

Among the most troubling allegations are false accusations of forced conversions, denial of burial rights, and even cases of exhumation of Christian bodies. Several recent reports have highlighted instances where families were either coerced into abandoning their faith or forced to

bury their loved ones in distant areas due to opposition from local groups.

The protestors, supported by groups such as BAMCEF and Bharat Mukti Morcha, urged the Union Government to uphold the rights enshrined under Articles 25 to 28 of the Constitution, which guarantee freedom of religion and the right to practice and propagate faith.

The memorandums demand immediate action against perpetrators of violence, a judicial inquiry into reported incidents and strict enforcement of Constitutional protections for religious minorities. "We have faith in the Constitution. But when rights are violated repeatedly and go unchecked, it becomes a national concern," Dr Lima added.

Vehicle owners left in the lurch SAROJ MISHRA Bhubaneswar

The Central Government made it mandatory in 2019 for fixing of High Security Registration plates (HSRP) for vehicles and the automobile dealers were authorised by State authorities, upload HSRP details after receiving them from vehicle owners.

This includes the vehicle's registration number, chassis number, engine number, and other pertinent details. These details are then used to create the HSRP and associate it with the specific vehicle.

However, as the dealers are not uploading the HRPC data on the Vahan portal many of the vehicle owners are facing problems in getting their documents.

Road Safety expert Subrat Kumar Nanda said there are



more than 600 automobile dealers in the State. More than 1.86 lakh vehicles are yet to be fitted with HSRPs. The highest number of 24,403 vehicles in in Bhubaneswar RTO I, Cuttack RTO 17,703, Sambalpur RTO 11, 971, Ganjam RTO 10,862, Korapur

RTO 8, 532, Kalahandi RTO 7,295, Bhubanewar RTO II 6,946 and Balangir RTO 6,733 are some of the examples.

"As per rules, the HSRP details must be uploaded to the Vahan portal within seven days after it is fixed on the vehicle. However, in many cases,

dealers delay this process for months. This causes significant inconvenience for vehicle owners. But surprisingly the Transport Department instead of blocking the dealership registration of the automobile dealers remained surprisingly silent over the matter, said Nanda.

The department's action would have effectively prohibited these dealers from selling new vehicles or registering them with the RTO, deeming any sales or registrations they process as unauthorised, Nanda said.

The people had to shell out money for HSRP number plates. Nowhere these number plates are being checked. On the basis of number plates not even one vehicle has been seized. The organisations which were given responsibility of manufacturing these HSRPs made profits worth crores of rupees at the common man's cost.

ndia's population is estimated to reach 1.46 billion in 2025, continuing to be the highest in the world. This comes from a new United Nations demographic report which also reveals that the country's total fertility rate has fallen to 1.9, below the replacement level of 2.1 signaling a significant demographic shift. The Total Fertility Rate (TFR) in India is currently 2.0 children per woman. This means that on average, a woman in India would be expected to have 2 children during her childbearing years (typically ages 15-49). This rate has remained constant since 2020, according to the Sample Registration System (SRS) report for 2021.

According to the United Nations Population Fund's (UNFPA) 2025 State of World Population (SOWP) Report, one in three adult Indians (36 per cent) face unintended pregnancies, while 30 per cent experience unfulfilled desire for having either more or fewer children.

Notably, in 1960, when India's population was about 436 million, the average woman had nearly six children. In the 1970s, women on average had nearly five children. Now, they have close to two. This milestone reflects progress in health and education, but masks regional diversity in the Total Fertility Rate, which is the average number of children a woman will have in her lifetime.

The 2025 State of World Population (SOWP) report underscores that the real crisis

lies not in population size, but in the widespread challenges to support individuals' right to decide freely and responsibly if, when, and how many children

Despite the slowing birth rate, India's youth population remains significant, with 24 per cent in the age bracket of 0-14, 17 per cent in 10-19, and 26 per cent in 10-24. The country's 68 per cent of the population is of working age (15-64), providing a potential demographic dividend, if matched by adequate employment and policy support. The elderly population (65 and older) currently stands at seven per cent, a figure that is expected to rise in the coming decades as life expectancy improves. As of 2025, life expectancy at birth is projected to be 71 years for men and 74 years for women.

According to the report, India is now the world's most populous nation, with nearly 1.5 billion people - a number expected to grow to about 1.7 billion before it begins to fall, around 40 years from now. The elderly population currently stands at seven per cent, a figure that is expected to rise in the coming decades as life expectancy improves.

Behind these numbers are estimated at 79 years.


Sonam. other accused to be taken to Meghalaya

n the sensational Raja Raghuvanshi murder Lase, Meghalaya Police have successfully secured transit remands for all five accused, including the victim's wife, Sonam Raghuvanshi, paving the way for their transport to Shillong for further interrogation and investigation. Sonam Raghuvanshi, accused of orchestrating her husband's murder, was located at a roadside eatery near the Varanasi-Ghazipur main road in Uttar Pradesh. After being initially held at a Sakhi One Stop Centre and undergoing a medical examination, Sonam was produced before a local magistrate in Ghazipur on Monday night. Meghalaya Police successfully secured a three-day transit remand from the court. Subsequently, she was taken to Phulwari Sharif police station in Patna, Bihar, on Tuesday and reached Shillong in the evening. Sonam has reportedly claimed to have no memory of how she reached Ghazipur, attributing it to being drugged by abductors.

CM Majhi presents report card on first anniversary

COVID cases rise again in Odisha Health Dept Cuttack with 18. Puri, set to

OVID-19 cases in Odisha have begun to rise again, prompting health authorities to issue a fresh advisory ahead of the annual Rath Yatra in Puri. On Tuesday, five new infections were reported, taking the total number of COVID-19 cases in the State this year to 57. Of these, 18 have recovered while 39 are currently undergoing treatment, Public Health Director Dr Nilakant Mishra said.

COVID-19 infections have been reported across 12 districts. Khordha tops the list with 23 cases followed by host the Rath Yatra later this month, has recorded three Baleswar,

Jagatsinghpur Sundargarh reported two cases each while Keonjhar, Angul, Bargarh, Kandhamal, Ganjam and Subarnapur have reported one case each.

With cases spreading steadily and the Rath Yatra expected to draw lakhs of devotees, the Health Department has urged caution. It has advised individuals showing COVID-like symptoms, the elderly and those with comorbidities or serious illnesses to avoid participating in the event. Attendees have been urged to wear masks, wash hands regularly and consume only clean drinking water. The ICU facility in Puri, set up for the Rath Yatra, has been temporarily shut for review and possible upgrades.

At the national level, the COVID situation is also witnessing a gradual uptick. Active cases across India have reached 6,815. Kerala has the highest count with 2,053 active cases followed by Gujarat (1,109), West Bengal (747), Delhi (691), Maharashtra (613), Karnataka (559), Uttar Pradesh (225) and Tamil Nadu

The Union Health Ministry has advised the States to ensure adequate medical facilities and oxygen availability while urging the public to maintain hygiene and observe respiratory precautions.





Authorities issue oil spill advisory for Kerala coast

s fire continued to rage on and explosions rocked the Singapore-flagged ship off the Kerala coast on Tuesday, authorities issued an oil spill advisory while a Chinese engineer rescued from the burning vessel suffered critical injuries.

While 18 crew members were recovered from MV Wan Hai 503 and brought to Mangaluru late on Monday, four remain unaccounted for.

Port workers described emotional scenes as the injured disembarked — some helped by fellow crewmates, others in stretchers, whispering prayers of gratitude or anxiously inquiring about their missing

The vessel caught fire on Monday, and more than 24 hours later, flames were reported from the mid-ship area and container bay just ahead of Indian Coast Guard officials

The forward bay fire has been brought under control, but thick smoke continues to rise from the vessel. The ship is listing approximately 10 to 15 degrees to port, and more containers have reportedly fallen overboard, they said. ICG ships Samudra Prahari

and Sachet are carrying out firefighting and boundary cooling operations at sea to prevent the flames from spreading further.

Meanwhile, Coast Guard vessel Samarth, carrying a team of salvors, is being deployed from Kochi to support ongoing efforts.

An ICG Dornier aircraft conducted an aerial survey of the incident site.

The major fire broke out on board the Singapore-flagged ship after a container explo-

Following the incident, the Indian National Centre for

Ocean Information Services (INCOIS) issued advisories warning of drifting containers and a potential oil spill.

The ship, which was en route to Nhava Sheva, Mumbai from Colombo, experienced an explosion in one of its containers, sparking a massive onboard fire while sailing roughly 70 nautical miles off Kozhikode. The vessel is currently adrift.

In response, INCOIS activated its Search and Rescue Aid Tool (SARAT) to track possible drift patterns of containers, debris, or people who may have gone overboard. According to the latest simulations, there is a 70-80 per cent probability that drifting objects may move south-south-

site over the next three days. "Simulations show that the containers are likely to contin-

eastward from the incident

next three days and might take longer to reach the beach. However, caution is advised about a few containers beaching between Kozhikode and Kochi. The situation is closely monitored and updated drift directions will be provided," INCOIS said in a statement. Local authorities have been

urged to step up coastal surveillance and prepare communities for possible navigational or shoreline hazards, it said.

Earlier, 18 crew members were rescued from the blaze-hit container ship and safely brought to the New Mangalore Port Authority (NMPA) Coast Guard berth at Panambur by Indian Naval Ship INS Surat. Among the rescued, two are

said to be in critical condition, while four sustained minor Twelve others suffered vary-

ing levels of trauma. The injured were evacuated

and transported to AJ Hospital in Kuntikana late on Monday night.Dinesh Kadam, Plastic Surgeon at AJ Hospital said, "Around 11.30 pm, six of them were bought by the Coast Guard. They were all on the ship. They had not jumped into water as it was reported. They were all in the vessel and were rescued from lifeboat by the Coast Guard.'

"Out of the six, two are critically injured. One has 40 per cent burns and another 30 per cent. The one who sustained 40 per cent burns is a 47-year-old male, a Chinese national. He is an engineer. He sustained burns on the face, upper and lower limbs. They both have airway burns that is much more serious. Airway burns is one thing which is likely to worsen in next few hours or

few days," he said. According to the doctor, both of them also have deep burns so they may probably require some surgical procedures later.

Panel drafts report on quota in Jammu and Kashmir

→he Cabinet sub-committee tasked by the Jammu and Kashmir (J and K) Government with reviewing the Union Territory's reservation policy has finalised its draft report, according to a statement by Minister for Education Sakina Ittoo. The report, completed within the stipulated six-month timeframe, is set to be presented at the next cabinet meeting, marking a significant step in addressing the contentious issue of reservations in J and K.

The sub-committee was constituted in December 2024 following widespread protests led by students outside the residence of Chief Minister Omar Abdullah in Srinagar.

The demonstrations, spearheaded by National Conference

(NC) leader and Lok Sabha member from Srinagar, Aga Ruhullah Mehdi, were in response to the existing reservation policy, which allocates only 30 per cent of seats for open merit candidates in educational institutions and government jobs. The remaining 70 per cent are reserved for various communities, a distribution that has sparked significant debate and dissatisfaction among open merit aspirants.

The protests were further by the Central Government's decision to grant reservation status to the Paharispeaking community in J and K, which further reduced the open merit quota. This move intensified concerns among students and other stakeholders, who argued that the limited open merit allocation restricts opporunder reserved categories.

Formed to examine these grievances and recommend revisions to the reservation policy, the sub-committee was given a six-month deadline to submit its findings. Minister Sakina Ittoo, in a post on her official X handle, confirmed the timely completion of the draft report, stating, "The Cabinet Sub-Committee constituted to examine the issue of reservations has drafted its report within the stipulated timeframe of six months. The report will be placed before the Cabinet when it meets." While the specifics of the report remain undisclosed, its submission is expected to initiate critical discussions within the cabinet on balancing the demands of open merit candidates with the affirmative action policies benefiting reserved com-

Ayodhya circle rates hiked after eight years

fter an eight-year gap, Ayodhya's circle rates the government-fixed minimum property valuation for registration — have been revised significantly upward, with hikes ranging from 30 per cent to as much as 200 per cent in certain locations, officials confirmed on Monday.

The steepest increase is seen in areas surrounding the Ram Janmabhoomi Temple, where land values have surged over 150 per cent, reflecting a sharp rise in demand following the rapid development and religious tourism boom.

The revised rates, which came into effect on Monday, apply to residential, commercial and agricultural land categories and vary according to land use and proximity to key urban and religious sites.

Officials said the areas within a 10-kilometre radius of the Ram temple are among the most impacted.

According to the new rate chart, land prices in prime areas around the Ram temple now range from ₹26,600 to ₹27,900 per square metre, up from the earlier rates of ₹6,650 to ₹6,975

"These revised rates were proposed in September 2024, and after resolving all objections, they were approved by District Magistrate Tikaram Funde. They are now in force," said Shanti Bhushan Chaubey, sub-registrar of Sadar

the shifting land dynamics in Ayodhya, particularly in areas witnessing heightened real estate activity. "The highest jump has been recorded in localities like Rakaabganj, Devkali, and the Awadh Vihar Yoiana. These are now the most expensive residential zones in the district," he added.

"Circle rates have been updated based on locationspecific demand. Residential, commercial, and agricultural plots have each been assessed differently. This rationalisation

Chaubey explained. Real estate players have

offered mixed reactions, with many supporting the move for its potential to bring greater transparency to property deals. "While a higher circle rate

results in increased stamp duty for buyers, it also enhances the official valuation of land, which is beneficial for landowners in securing loans and selling property at realistic prices," said Saurabh Vikram Singh, director of a local real estate firm operating in Ayodhya.

Vivek Agrawal, another real estate developer active in the region, welcomed the step, noting that it could reduce unaccounted transactions.

"By aligning circle rates closer to market values, the old practice of dual pricing white and black money - can be curtailed. It promotes a more transparent property market," he said.

Local resident Ram Prakash Yadav, who owns ancestral land near Devkali, expressed concern over the timing of the rate revision, suggesting that it may disproportionately benefit real estate developers.

"For years, big builders have been quietly buying land here at older, much cheaper rates. Now that the government has raised the circle rates, they have a perfect pretext to sell at much higher prices," Yadav

"Ordinary locals like us didn't get a chance to sell when the rates were low, and now land has slipped out of our reach. It feels like the system is favouring developers who had insider foresight."

Yadav added that while higher land valuation might look good on paper, the actu-

Impactful eleven years of Modi Government

From bold reforms to welfare breakthroughs, the Modi era has redefined the narrative of governance

s Prime Minister Narendra Modi completes 11 years in office, the occasion marks a significant chapter in India's political and developmental journey. Over the past decade, the Modi Government has overseen a broad transformation — economically, socially, and ideologically - ushering in what can be termed as a new era of governance focused on performance, accountability, and national pride. BJP President JP Nadda has also emphasised key achievements of the Government ranging from social-economic to political achievements of the Modi Government.


Under Modi's leadership, India has risen from the 10th to the 4th largest economy globally. Welfare schemes targeting the poor, such as Jan Dhan, Ayushman Bharat, Ujjwala Yojana and housing initiatives, have lifted an estimated 25 crore people out of poverty, reflecting what the Government calls its "gareeb kalyan" model of development.

A strong push for women-led development has seen the expansion of maternity leave, the rise of self-help groups like 'Lakhpati Didis,' and women making major strides in sectors ranging from grassroots entrepreneurship to space exploration. The Government also claims credit for shifting Indian politics from identity-based appeasement to a results-oriented model, where report cards, not rhetoric, define public leadership. One of the most testing periods of Modi's tenure was the COVID-19 pandemic, during which India conducted the world's largest free vaccination drive, delivering over 220 crore doses. This was accompanied by swift emergency operations like Vaccine Maitri and Operation Ganga, enhancing India's stature as a responsible global actor. In Jammu and Kashmir, the Government's decision to abrogate Article 370 marked a turning point in India's internal integration efforts. The move, followed by record voter turnout in local elections, is presented as proof of deeper democratic normalisation in the region.

Infrastructure too has been a defining pillar, with the long-pending Chenab Bridge project finally completed and inaugurated this year. Other headline reforms over the years include the abolition of Triple Talaq, the Citizenship Amendment Act, and changes to Waqf laws, all aimed, according to the Government, at correcting long-standing social imbalances.

The Modi Government continues to project the vision of a "Viksit Bharat" by 2047, guided by the principle of "Sabka Saath, Sabka Vikas, Sabka Vishwas, Sabka Prayas." While critics point to concerns over democratic freedoms and centralisation of power, even detractors acknowledge the sweeping nature of the changes witnessed under Modi's leadership

At the end of 11 years, Narendra Modi's tenure has not only redefined governance in India but has also reshaped the expectations citizens have from their leaders. Whether viewed as transformational or polarising, the Modi era has left an unmistakable imprint on the nation's political and developmental psyche.

Debate on India's defence doctrine

The larger question looms: Can India afford costly engagements with transient outcomes, without a comprehensive reimagining of its military doctrine, defence spending and national security policy?

DS Gen Anil Chauhan has made the startling comment that costs don't matter, outcomes do. He was answering questions from Bloomberg in Singapore about the number of Indian jets downed in Op Sindoor. Some previous combat losses: World War II — Allies 91,105 aircraft; Axis Powers 70,900 aircraft. In 1965, IAF 59 aircraft, and Pakistan Air Force (PAF) 43 aircraft in 22 days.

At Balakot both sides incurred the loss of one aircraft each while India also lost a helicopter due to friendly fire, all within 48 hours. There are other examples of air assets lost. But all these engagements were contact wars, some spread over years. Op Sindoor was an 88-hour non-contact, Beyond Visual Range (BVR) conflict.

For India, a developing economy and aspiring to be a developed nation by 2047, the cost of conflict and resultant homelandinstability impinge negatively on development, especially when the outcome is nondecisive and deterrence only transitory. Pakistan will not cease to wage war, skirmishes and proxy wars as it has for the last

Delhi failed to terminate wars decisively because of not appreciating the strength of military power and the use of force. Hard power is built over time with costs and investments. The muscular counter-terrorism policy the BJP Government has adopted for over a decade was built on rhetoric, spending less than 2 per cent of GDP on defence. The absence of credible deterrence, erratic use of force and the unresolved issue of Kashmir led to the Pahalgam carnage and other terrorist incidents in Kashmir. Had a more serious view been taken of comprehensive national power, Pakistan would not have dared to bait India periodically. Op Sindoor, its tactical successes and strategic flaws necessitate an immediate defence review encompassing the entire span of the current BJP rule.

Since the appointment of CDS and Department of Military Affairs and the centrality of National Security Adviser and the Defence Planning Committee he leads, strategic thinking ought to have led to the enunciation of defence and security doctrines which in turn could have facilitated the formation of Integrated Theatre Commands, still waiting to happen. The domination of air power will rejuvenate the debate on the indivisibility of air assets and put a spoke in the wheel of the early fruition of Theatre Commands.

First salvos in this regard have already been fired by IAF veterans. No longer is the IAF a support arm as late CDS Gen Bipin Rawat had forcefully averred. After Op





Sindoor, it emerged as the sword arm, per-suading Army Chief Gen Upendra Dwivedi to skip the CII Military Partnership Summit, Delhi for blessings from Rajguru of Chitrakoot temple who sought from Army Chief PoK as Guru Dakshina. While Air Chief Marshal AP Singh

modestly stole the lime-

light at the summit fol-

lowing the stand-off campaign of attrition of Pakistan Air Force air and land assets, Gen Dwivedi kept alive the relevance of land forces in the territorial conquest of PoK and in capturing and holding ground.

Returning to reforms, the Government must immediately commit to higher defence spending, which is the manifest trend the world over following the Ukraine war entering its fourth year, the Gaza outrage in its third year, compound instabilities in West Asia and turbulence in the Indo-Pacific, especially the South China Sea. President Trump is telling NATO and Indo-Pacific allies to spend more on defence — 5 per cent for NATO and substantial but unspecified increases for Japan and South Korea. Earlier this month, Prime Minister Keir Starmer

Defence Review and an increase from 2 to 2.5 per cent of GDP by 2027 and ultimately, targeting 3 per cent by 2034. He said these are not aspirational but achievable targets. He announced an immediate increase in defence spending of GBP 15 bn, saying additional capabilities will deter conflict, naming Russia (and China) as the main threat.

As India is afraid to name China as a threat, it does not have a written national security policy. Imagine Prime Minister Modi making similar announcements in his Mann ki Baat or an interview with ANI like Starmer did on BBC. He outlined the key ingredients of defence preparedness — the type of equipment the UK would build for its strategic and conventional deterrence and its focus on NATO First. NATO and Europe have three nuclear-armed nations to deter Russia and China

The other two original nuclear-armed owers all together constitute the P5 in the UN Security Council. India's defence forces, on the other hand, have been hollowed out over time due to inadequate funding and lethargic procurement procedures. While Aatm-nirbharta is an undeniable great virtue, Delhi's dependence on Russia, France, the US, Israel, the UK and Germany for niche technologies makes self-reliance somewhat suspect.

Immediate injection of resources, especially in R&D, is imperative if the new normal of enhanced thresholds of non-contact and hot war under the nuclear overhang is to be sustained. Business Standard's AK Bhattacharya, a long-term advocate of higher defence spending, recently suggested that there were two ways to do this: first, to break the limit on fiscal deficit; and the other to reduce capex to transfer funds to defence.

As this will affect growth, he said, accepting a higher fiscal deficit was the better option. There is a third way too. Past Finance Commissions have tossed ideas but the Government has not shown political courage to make the right choices as those will hurt its welfare schemes and impose a fresh burden on the taxpayer.

Periodic clashes with Pakistan have created uncertainties and instabilities that will deter FDI and discourage shifting supply chains to India. Delhi's import reliance on China is increasing phenomenally; in 2023-24 to USD 110 bn, which is almost twice India's defence budget. China remains the primary challenge, rival and competitor. Enhanced defence allocation will have meaning if defence acquisition processes are streamlined to ensure full utilisation of funds by the end of the fiscal. For too long, modernisation funds have had to be surrendered. Costs matter as much as outcomes.

India needs a smarter approach to crowd management

n India, large gatherings are not rare disruptions. They are the norm. Cricket victories, political rallies, religious fes-Ltivals, celebrity appearances, airport inaugurations — each can summon thousands, sometimes hundreds of thousands, into open public spaces, often with little formal planning. These crowds reflect India's energy and scale.

But they also present a persistent challenge: how to manage such gatherings safely, predictably, and without incident. Recent tragedies have highlighted the cost of poor crowd management. But the solution lies not in stricter

enforcement or post-incident inquiry. It lies in something India's governance structures too often overlook: systemic planning. Crowds in India are changing. They no longer assemble only for annual religious rituals or pre-scheduled political events. Instead, many now form spontaneously — mobilised in minutes via social media, often in semi-urban spaces not designed to handle them. They are less hierarchical, more mobile, and more

complex to anticipate. Policing such crowds with traditional methods — barricades, loudhailers, baton units — is both inefficient and increasingly inadequate. Frontline officers are experienced but often

better governance. India would benefit from codifying its have access to this technology in a usable, integrated form.

approach to mass gatherings into a National Framework for Crowd Management. This would not be a one-size-fits-all mandate but a flexible, tiered system of planning protocols — classified by crowd size, event type, and infrastructure profile.

Such a framework could formalise practices that are currently ad hoc. Risk assessments, exit planning, inter-agency co-ordination, and deployment checklists should be standard procedures, not left to individual discretion. Crowd safety should be integrated into disaster management plans and urban planning policies, rather than remaining solely the responsibility of district police officers. At the district level, the introduction of Joint Operations Centres (JOCs) — multi-agency

units that co-ordinate planning and response during significant events — could vastly improve efficiency. Police, health services, fire departments, transportation authorities, and municipal bodies should work from a shared playbook with clear lines of authority and command. Technology can also do more of the heavy lifting. Many Indian cities are now equipped with CCTV networks and drone units.

These assets, combined with crowd-modelling software and AI-based density tracking, can provide real-time alerts and enable pre-emptive responses. In high-risk events, AI heatmaps can help guide crowd dispersal, monitor entry flows, and identify potential pressure points before they

Partnerships with Indian research institutions and private tech firms could yield homegrown solutions suited to India's unique conditions. Physical infrastruc ture often determines whether a crowd flows or clogs. India's urban spaces frequently lack adequate signage, multiple exits, or directional guidance for mass movement. Cities should be encouraged, through innovative city programmes or urban development grants, to incorporate crowd-conscious design into their routine infrastructure upgrades. For recurring highdensity events, such as pilgrimages or local festivals, temporary modular infrastructure (barricades, elevated walkways, digital signage, and mobile medical units) can be deployed.

No system of control is complete without public co-operation. In moments of panic, communication — fast, accurate, and trusted — is critical. Police forces should develop public messaging strategies tailored to event type and local language, using both digital platforms and community networks. In areas with recurring gatherings, citizen engagement, through resident welfare associations, local leaders, and panchayats, can enhance both awareness and compliance. India's police forces learn constantly, but often in isolation. A national repository of After-Action Reports — brief, structured analyses of crowd events — could be maintained by the Bureau of Police Research and Development. Accountability, too, must evolve.

PM Modi to attend G7 summit

Prime Minister Narendra Modi's invitation to the upcoming G7 outreach meeting in Canada next week is seen as a precondition for Modi's participation in the day-long meeting, which follows the G7 Summit, amid ongoing tensions over the Hardeep Singh Nijjar killing. Carney had placed "conditions" on the invitation to the Indian Prime Minister, and Modi asked for time to decide on whether to accept the conditions or not.

Carney, facing domestic criticism for inviting Modi so soon after the RCMP accused Indian agents of involvement in Nijjar's murder. The resumption of law enforcement dialogue can be seen as a step toward rebuilding bad ties, but Canadian officials stress that justice and ongoing investigations remain central to their agenda

propos of the front-page news (June 9) on India's snub on the Indus Water Treaty 1960, post-Pahalgam massacre and Operation Sindoor, the reversal of the suspension of the treaty looks politically improbable fearing an outrage in India. The infrastructure plans for diverting Indus river tributaries to water-deficient regions of Jammu-Kashmir, Punjab, Haryana, and Rajasthan are under implementation. Free food scheme is inherently prone to misuse

As the Government continues to provide free foodgrain to over 800 million people, a closer look reveals troubling patterns of misuse, policy distortion, and an urgent need for reform. The question now is not whether food should reach the poor — but how best to do it without enriching the corrupt



ast year, the Indian Council For Research On International Economic Relations (ICRIER) released a Study titled 'Rationalising Public Distribution System in India' saying there was grain leakage under the Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana (PMGKAY) of 20 million tons entailing an estimated annual fiscal cost of around ₹70,000 crore to the

central exchequer.
Under the PMGKAY, the Union Government asks the Food Corporation of India (FCI) and other state agencies to procure food from the farmers at MSP (minimum support price) and organise its distribution to around 820 million people for free. This is done through a network of fair-price shops under the Public Distribution System (PDS). The entire cost i.e. MSP paid to farmers plus handling and distribution cost (HDC) is reimbursed to the FCI/other state agencies as a subsidy.

While, the PMGKAY has been in force since January 1, 2023, before that, the Centre was giving food to 820 million persons at a heavily subsidised price of ₹2/3/1 per kg for wheat/rice/coarse cereals under the National Food Security Act or NFSA. In addition, since April 2020, it has given 5 kg of food per person per month for "free" to all 820 million beneficiaries under PMGKAY to mitigate the effect of the COVID-19 pandemic.

From January 1, 2023, they have been getting free food under the PMGKAY. Umpteen ground reports corroborate the substantial leakage of cereals from the PDS. The most recent revelation is from Uttar Pradesh's Bareilly, Agra and Meerut divisions where between 2015 and 2018, the heavily subsidised food at ₹2/3/1 per kg for wheat/rice/coarse cereals under the NFSA was given to 'ineligible persons' thereby depriving the real beneficiaries of their due.

Last year, there were reports of a massive scam in West Bengal where rice meant for distribution through the PDS made its way to privately owned rice mills who after re-milling (polishing) sold in the open market raking in a moolah.

The scale of diversion can be gauged from the fact that the Enforcement Directorate (ED) - currently investigating - estimates the proceeds of crime to be ₹9,000-10,000 crore. The leakage has con-

tinued for more than a decade. In 2016, there were reports of the disappearance

of a significant amount of food grain stocks from godowns in Punjab raising concerns about potential losses and the financial implications for banks involved in the state's food borrowing program.

Under directions from the Reserve Bank of India (RBI), banks were forced to make provisions for such losses estimated to be around ₹12,000 crore. This was even as the Central Government didn't allow this loss to be absorbed under the 'food sub-

There could be other numerous instances of leaks hidden from public glare. All put together, these could be denting the state exchequer by colossal amounts. So, when we talk of the ever-increasing food subsidy bill of the Centre (over $\ref{200,000}$ crore during FY 2024-25), it includes a sizeable portion towards the leak

Its root cause has to do with how food subsidy is administered. Under the extant system, the subsidy is built into the price which under this Scheme is Żero; even under regular NFSA from 2013 till December 2022, the price was close to zero at ₹2/3/1 per kg.

Compare this with the cost of supply (MSP plus HDC) which is currently around ₹27 per kg for wheat and ₹39 per kg for rice. The availability of a mammoth of around 55 million tons (the quantity distributed through the PDS) in the supply chain with zero price tag is an open invitation to

dubious stakeholders to derive unintended gains. Fundamentally, subsidised food is meant for the

poor. The number of poor isn't more than 15-20 per cent of India's population. Yet, the current number of beneficiaries is 59 per cent of the population. Even as per the Shanta Kumar Committee (2015), the beneficiary number under the then NFSA shouldn't be more than 40 per cent. Furthermore, according to Niti Aayog, since 2015, 250 million persons have come out of poverty. This should have led to a corresponding reduction in the number of beneficiaries. But, this was

Even as millions of 'undeserving' people refuse to exit, the Supreme Court (SC) has directed the Central Government to update the list of beneficiaries to take into account the population during 2021 (the existing list is based on 2011 Census estimates). On this basis, the latter will need to give free food to an additional 100 million. With no deletion, the Scheme will have to cater to 920

The NFSA legislation enacted in 2013 required beneficiaries to pay ₹2/3/1 per kg for wheat/rice/coarse cereals. It froze these rates for three years. Since 2016, there has been no legal bar on increasing the price. Yet, far from increasing, the Modi-Government has reduced the price to

The nexus of corrupt politicians/officials and local ration dealers/millers stares at the 'huge differential' between the zero-priced PDS stuff and the high market price with hawkish eyes.

They can circumvent even the best of technology interventions made by the Modi-Government; those include installing PoS (point of sale machines) at ration shops; digitisation of the supply chain from procurement to distribution; authentication of beneficiaries with their Aadhaar numbers and so on.

On the procurement front, cases have come to

light where small/poor farmers are unable to sell their produce to the State agencies — despite registering at the latter's portal. This deprives them of the MSP benefit and guaranteed purchase even as dubious traders acting in collusion with the officials manipulate the system to their advantage. Leakage can be curbed in fact, eliminated if only

the Government gives subsidy directly to the beneficiaries using DBT mode. For instance, taking the cost of supplying wheat ₹27 per kg, it can transfer ₹135 a month (₹1620 per annum) to a beneficiary's account being the eligible subsidy amount for 5 kg of monthly food entitlement under the

With this money, she can purchase her needs from the market. The ration shops — currently catering to PDS — will have to recalibrate and work like any normal retailer.

The state agencies need not procure food for distribution to the beneficiaries which under the proposed DBT mechanism, won't be required. The farmers will sell their produce in the same manner as happens for any other commodity in a market-driven framework. The three central farm laws should be revived as that will give them more options to them sell their farm output and fetchig a good price.

With no zero-priced food available in the system, there won't be any temptation to divert. Also, there won't be any clamour to corner food (albeit free) in the name of fake beneficiaries.

The Government will be able to better target subsidies by excluding the undeserving persons. It will also be spared the 'guaranteed' purchase from farmers and associated high cost and subsidy outgo which it can't avoid under the existing dispensation.

In short, by restructuring the Scheme, the Government has much to gain by way of eliminating misuse and leakages, bringing about huge savings in subsidy, putting in place competitive/efficiently driven markets and ensuring remunerative prices to farmers.

Indian Rail Reaches Kashmir Heights: A Marvel of Indian Engineering

n a clear June day, draped in marigold flow ers and national pride, the Vande Bharat Express began its maiden journey from Shri Mata Vaishno Devi Katra to Srinagar. Flagged off by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, the moment marked more than the launch of a highspeed train. It was the culmination of a centuryold dream — one forged in steel, vision, and unyielding resolve. The rail unification of Kashmir with the rest of India is that resolve. It is evident on the happy faces of the people travelling on the train. Train to Kashmir with an ultra-modern travel experience runs on the solid foundation of our engineers. Cutting short the travel time, highspeed Vande Bharat trains are running twice a day, six times a week from both sides. They are not only bringing much-needed push for the local economic development in the valley but are also proving to be a boon for the tourists from across the country. The picturesque journey with ultra-modern comforts in such a short time of three hours visà-vis road journey of six to seven hours has truly unified hilly Kashmir with the rest of India in all weathers for us. For decades, Kashmir's story has been told through the lens of conflict and remoteness. It's heartening to see it being rewritten in the language of infrastructure — bridges, tunnels, and rail lines threading their way through the mountains. Coming on the eve of 11 years of Prime Minister Shri Narendra

Modi's governance at the centre, the special trains and the connecting link are all set to change the destiny of locals in Kashmir.

In its 172-year history of service to the nation, Indian Railways has proudly crossed many important milestones. Generations of dedicated railway men and women have toiled to make connectivity and carriage a daily reality. But to paraphrase a line from an iconic Indian advertisement: Indian Railways doesn't just build tracks-it also knits the fabric of national unity!

From Isolation to Integration

Historically, Kashmir's isolation was more than metaphorical — it was geographic and punishingly real. Tucked high in the Himalayas and routinely cut off by snow for days, the region remained distant not just in reach but even in experience. Roads were often treacherous, air travel limited, and full rail connectivity a mirage long promised.

A British-era proposal for a Kashmir rail link remained on the drawing board for decades, hindered by complex geopolitical challenges. After countless rounds of deliberations, feasibility studies, technical evaluations, and consultations with both domestic and international experts, the Udhampur-Srinagar-Baramulla Rail Link (USBRL) was officially sanctioned in 1994. While the northern and southern sections progressed



steadily and were effectively completed within a decade, the central stretch — from Katra to posed an engineering and security challenge of Himalayan proportions. For years, the rail line lingered as two disconnected segments — like outstretched hands reaching across a chasm of mountains. But that chasm symbolised more than just physical terrain. The final push to complete the USBRL project came when the Government declared it a national priority. With firm resolve and cutting-edge technology working in tandem, the project finally saw light at the end of

the tunnel — quite literally. As Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw aptly remarked, this was far more than a transportation initiative; it was a nation-building effort.

Where Steel Defies the Sky

The USBRL project may well be the most ambitious rail initiative since Independence. The 272-km stretch between Udhampur and Baramulla snakes through 40 tunnels and over 900 bridges. And at the centre of it all is the record-breaking Chenab Bridge the tallest railway bridge in the

world, standing 359 metres above the riverbed. This marvel of engineering is capable of withstanding wind speeds up to 260 kmph and tremors of seismic zone V. Beside it stands the Anji Khad Bridge, India's first cable-stayed railway bridge, stretching asymmetrically across a valley, anchored by a single pylon and supported by 96 cables.

Tunnels, including the 11-kilometre-long T-80 (Banihal-Qazigund) tunnel through the Pir Panjal range, have been carved through fragile rock with a mix of dynamite and human grit.

Physical surveys were done on horseback, while drones and satellite imaging provided aerial support. Workers laboured through harsh winters, sudden landslides, and the looming threat of Pakoonsored terrorist attacks.

Today, more than 190 km of tunnels and thousands of tonnes of steel later, the line stands com-

plete — a feat that combines precision engineering with a certain audacity of vision, linking the Valley to the rest of the nation in a way that is profoundly symbolic.

A Train Called Hope

In many ways, the Vande Bharat Express is not just a train — it is a metaphor. It glides quietly through meadows and valleys, bridging distances both physical and psychological, proclaiming that Kashmir is no longer distant!

It has reduced travel time between Srinagar and Katra to just over three hours, down from nearly six. What was once a treacherous road journey through landslide-prone hairpin bends and unpredictable weather, is now a smooth ride through tunnels and bridges that defy belief. It connects not only cities, but lives. Children in faroff villages are now talking about universities in Jammu and Delhi. Local artisans, apple growers, and carpet weavers now see their goods reaching markets beyond the valley — fresher, faster, further. "Where there were once checkpoints and delays," said a young shopkeeper in Srinagar, "there is now the sound of a train. It feels like we're no longer waiting for the rest of the country to arrive

we are moving with it." A New Journey, Still Unfolding

This is not to suggest that one train will solve Kashmir's complex problems. Infrastructure cannot erase history or immediately heal wounds -security concerns will need addressing yet. But it can open doors — both literal and symbolic. And it can lay the groundwork for integration that is economic, social, and, ultimately, emotional.

What began as a dream on drawing boards in colonial offices has become a reality on steel rails blending with Himalayan rock. The rail line to Kashmir is the story of a country that refused to be daunted by terrain, terror, or time. From mountain shadows to sunlit stations, a new journey has begun!

COVID-19 cases rise again: What's driving the surge and how to stay safe

fter months of relative calm, COVID-19 cases are once again climbing in India and many parts of the world. As of early June 2025, several states have reported a noticeable uptick in daily infections, with urban clusters seeing a higher positivity rate. While the numbers are not yet alarming compared to previous waves, the increase has reignited public concern and drawn the attention of health authorities. So what is driving this latest rise, how is it different from earlier waves, and what should people do now?

What's Causing the Spike?

Experts attribute the current surge to a mix of factors. One of the key drivers is the emergence of new variants, particularly FLiRT variants such as KP.2 and KP.3, sub-lineages of Omicron that have evolved with mutations helping them partially evade immunity from previous infections or vaccinations. These variants are not necessarily more severe, but they are more transmissible.

Another contributor is seasonal behaviour. Just like flu tends to peak during certain times of the year, COVID-19 now appears to show a seasonal trend, especially with the monsoon approaching in India. People are spending more time indoors, increasing the likelihood of airborne transmission in poorly ventilated spaces.

Increased travel, public gatherings, and a general sense of pandemic fatigue where people have relaxed masking and distancing norms — also play a role. Many no longer adhere to precautions like wearing masks in crowded spaces or staying home when symptomatic, which adds fuel to the spread.

Are the Symptoms Any Different This

According to doctors, the symptoms seen in the current wave are broadly similar to those in previous Omicron-driven surges. Patients typically report mild to moderate symptoms such as fever, sore throat, nasal congestion, fatigue, and cough. Some also experience body aches, headaches, and gastrointestinal symptoms like nausea or diarrhoea.

What's different, however, is that most cases are milder, especially among vaccinated individuals. Hospitalisations and ICU admissions remain low, with a majority of patients recovering at home. Those most at risk continue to be the elderly, people with weakened immunity, and those with underlying conditions such as diabetes or lung disease

Despite the lower severity, public health experts caution that a mild virus can still pose a threat at the population level if it spreads unchecked. Even a small percentage of severe cases from a large infected population can strain healthcare resources

Mortality Rate and Serious Illness As of now, the mortality rate remains low, though isolated deaths have been reported, often in individ-

uals with comorbidities or advanced age. It's impor-

tant to note that COVID-19, while less deadly now than in the early pandemic years, still carries a risk of serious complications, including long-term COVID-19 — an umbrella term for persistent symptoms that can affect the lungs, brain, heart, and more.

India reported a few recent deaths in individuals who tested positive for COVID-19, but health officials are cautious about linking the deaths directly to the virus without deeper investigation. COVID likely acted as an aggravating factor in people already unwell from other causes.

Vaccination: Is There a Need for a Booster Now? India had seen impressive uptake for the first two vaccine doses, but booster coverage remains low, particularly among younger adults. Many took their last dose more than a year ago. While vaccine - induced immunity does wane over time, it still offers substantial protection against severe disease.

Globally, updated vaccines targeting newer variants are being developed, but in India, the availability of such formulations is still limited. Current vac-

cines — primarily Covishield and Covaxin — do still offer partial protection. At this point, experts are not recommending universal re-vaccination, but those who are elderly, immunocompromised, or have underlying illnesses may benefit from a booster in consultation with their doctors and in accordance with Government guidelines. The concept of herd immunity also needs to be revisited. With the virus evolving and immunity waning, the population's collective defence is not as robust as once assumed. Hence, periodic vaccination or updated boosters may become a seasonal norm much like the

flu shot in the future. Should We Be Worried?

This is not a situation that calls for panic, but complacency is also dangerous. The rise in cases is a reminder that COVID-19 has not disappeared. Instead, it's transitioning into an endemic pattern present in the population at lower, fluctuating levels. So far, no alarming red flags have been raised. However, given India's large and dense population, authorities remain cautious and are urging people to report symptoms and get tested if necessary. What Precautions Should People Take?

The tools to stay safe remain the same, and they are simple but effective: Wear a mask in crowded indoor spaces or when visiting healthcare settings.

Wash your hands regularly and avoid touching your face unnecessarily. Do not ignore symptoms like persistent fever, chest discomfort, or shortness of breath — seek medical help early. Community awareness campaigns must be revived to prevent the false sense of safety that can lead to sudden spikes.

Jaishankar meets EU chief in Belgium

xternal Minister S Jaishankar on Tuesday met ■E uropean Commission President Ursula von der Leyen here and praised her "strong condemnation" of the Pahalgam attack and solidarity in combating terrorism. Jaishankar called on the top EU leader during his visit to Belgium and Luxembourg. "Pleased to call @EU_Commission President @vonderleyen this morning. Welcomed her strong condemnation of terrorist attack in Pahalgam and solidarity in combatting terror-

ism," he said in an X post. The April 22 Pahalgam terror attack claimed 26 lives, following which tensions between India and Pakistan escalated. India carried out precision strikes on terror infrastructure in Pakistan and Pakistan-occupied Kashmir

Jaishankar and von der Leyen also discussed efforts that are underway to deepen the India-EU partnership. "Agreed on the potential benefits of stronger cooperation in trade, technology, connectivity and security for both our regions," Jaishankar added.

Von der Leyen also took to X after the meeting and said, "The EU-India strategic partnership is getting stronger."

"We're working on a Strategic Agenda based on growth with an ambitious FTA, tech & innovation and security & defence. I look forward to adopting it with @narendramodi at our next Summit," she said.

In June 2022, India and the 27-nation bloc resumed negotiations for a comprehensive Free Trade Agreement, an investment protection agreement and a pact on Geographical Indications after a gap of over eight years.

The negotiations stalled in

2013 due to differences over Modi the level of opening up of the markets. On February 28,

European and Commission chief agreed to Prime Minister Narendra trade deal by the end of this

Luxembourg, Saurabh Kumar. In a post on X, he said it was "good to meet" David McAllister, Chair of the

Foreign Affairs Committee of the European Parliament, Sandro Gozi, Chair of the Delegation to EU-UK Parliamentary Assembly, and Greek parliamentarian Nikos Papandreou.

The meetings followed an interaction with members of the Indian community on Monday evening.

Earlier in the day, Jaishankar held wide-ranging discussions with his Belgium counterpart Maxime Prevot on deepening bilateral cooperation, including in trade, investment, technology, defence and security, clean energy and mobility.

During his week-long tour of Europe, Jaishankar will also hold talks with leaders of the European Union and France to boost bilateral ties and reaffirm India's policy of zero-tolerance against terrorism.

US-China trade talks in London enter second day

⊣he US and China are holding a second day of talks on Tuesday in London aimed at easing their trade dispute, after President Donald Trump said China is "not easy" but the US was "doing well" at the negotiations.

A Chinese delegation led by Vice Premier He Lifeng met US Commerce Secretary Howard Lutnick, Treasury Secretary Scott Bessent and Trade Representative Jamieson Greer for several hours on Monday at Lancaster House, an ornate 200-year-old mansion near Buckingham Palace.

Wang Wentao, China's commerce minister, and trade negotiator Li Chenggang are also in Beijing's delegation.

Asked late on Monday how the negotiations were going, Trump told reporters: "We are doing well with China. China's not easy."

The two sides are trying to

build on negotiations in Geneva last month that agreed to a 90day suspension of most of the 100 per cent-plus tariffs they had imposed on each other in an escalating trade war that had

sparked fears of recession. Since the Geneva talks, the US and China have exchanged angry words over advanced semiconductors that power artificial intelligence, visas for Chinese students at American universities and "rare earth ' minerals that are vital to car-

Japanese warship arrives in Australia as Tokyo bids for defence deal

state-of-the-art A Japanese warship has arrived in Australia as part of a high-stakes campaign to secure a \$6.5 billion contract to build the country's next fleet of general-purpose frigates.

The JS Yahagi, a Mogami-class stealth frigate from Japan's Maritime Self-Defence Force, is docked in Darwin in Australia's Northern Territory in what appears a symbolic and strategic move aimed at strengthening defense ties with Australia and showcasing Japanese naval technology.

Japan's bid, led by Mitsubishi Heavy Industries, was short-listed in November for the Royal Australian Navy's SEA 3000 frigate project and is competing against Germany's MEKO A-200 offered by Thyssenkrupp Marine Systems.

Australian Government is expected to this year, with construction for 11 new vessels slated to begin the following year.

Japan would jointly develop and produce the frigates for the Australian navy.

Bolstering defence industry

As part of its military buildup, Japan is pushing to strengthen its largely domestic defence industry by participating in joint development, including a next-generation fighter jet with Britain and Italy, and promoting foreign sales like the Mogami-class ships.

In a sign of its commitment and heavy investment Japan has pledged to prioritise the RAN's order over its own naval procurement.

The project not only serves to further deepen cooperation between Japan and Australia but also to enhance Japan's warship capabilities, Defense Minister General Nakatani has said. The Japanese Mogami-class design boasts advanced combat systems, anti-submarine ners like Australia.

and anti-air warfare capabilities, and mine countermeasure operations - all operated by a lean crew of around 90, helping to address ongoing recruitment challenges in the Australian Navy.

The vessel's commanding officer, Tamura Masayoshi, said the ship's smaller crew was an aim of the Mogamiclass ship.

"The Japanese Maritime Self-Defence Force thought we need stealth, and less people, and a little bit smaller ship," Masayoshi told the Australian Broadcasting Corporation.

Ten dead in Austria school shooting

t least 10 people were killed in a shooting at a **L** school in the Austrian city of Graz on Tuesday, and the suspected perpetrator also died, the city's mayor said.

Mayor Elke Kahr described the events as a "terrible tragedy," the Austria Press Agency reported. It added that the fatalities were seven students and one adult. Kahr said that many people were taken to hospitals with injuries.

Police said they believe the assailant acted alone.

Special forces were among those sent to the BORG Dreierschützengasse high school, about a kilometre from Graz's historic centre, after a call at 10 am. At 11.30 am, police wrote on social network X that the school had been evacuated and everyone had been taken to a safe meet-

ing point. They wrote that the situation was "secured" and there is no longer believed to be any danger.

Police deployed in large numbers, with police and other

emergency vehicles guarding the area around the school and with at least one police helicopter flying above the area, according to photos published by the regional newspaper

Kleine Zeitung. Graz, Austria's second-biggest city, is located in the southeast of the country and has about 300,000 inhabitants. Austrian Chancellor Christian Stocker, who is going to Graz, said the shooting "is a national tragedy that deeply shocks our whole country."

"There are no words for the pain and grief that all of us the whole of Austria — feel now," he wrote in a statement posted on X.

President Alexander Van der Bellen said that "this horror cannot be captured in words."

"These were young people who had their whole lives ahead of them. A teacher who accompanied them on their way," he said. Interior Minister Gerhard Karner was also on his way to Graz.

"Schools are symbols for youth, hope and the future," European Commission President Ursula von der Leyen wrote on X.

Indian students at Harvard navigate uncertainties

ndian students at Harvard say they are navigating a "rollercoaster" of uncertainty and anxiety amid the Trump administration's relentless battle against the university while also dealing with a dearth of job opportunities.

"It's just been a time of not quite knowing what to do, whether we should make our moves back home, or whether we should try and figure something out here," an Indian student, who graduated last month from the Harvard Kennedy School, said, not wishing to be identified.

Indian students at Harvard speaking to media on condition of anonymity, shared their concerns and experiences of the last few months during which the prestigious university has seen relentless attacks by the Trump administration.

a "rollercoaster." "With all the uncertainty, I can say that a lot of people who are hiring were generally hesitant of international students, and maybe the Harvard tag helped earlier, but that's not the same right now at this particular moment," she said

The student from Harvard Kennedy School pointed out that she is in a "desperate job search" at the moment, noting how difficult it is to get a job

entertaining any international students, forget international

students from Harvard, because our visa statuses are so volatile that who would want to employ us right now." She said she doesn't know whether she will be going back to India, staying back or heading to a different country altogether.

"That uncertainty is a lot in a country like America where you're paying" huge amounts of money in rent. She added that she thinks this is a shortterm turbulence and things

will settle down in the future. "But while we're caught in the crossfire, I think it's been difficult to plan, and so it's stressful for sure." The students also pointed out that funding cuts initiated by the Trump administration are impacting jobs in the policy space, climate change, healthcare and public health sectors.

Russia launches another large-scale drone, missile attack on Ukraine, kills 3, wounds 13

ussia sent waves of drones and missiles in an attack on two Ukrainian cities early on Tuesday that killed three people and wounded at least 13 others, Ukrainian

officials said. The attack struck the capital, Kyiv, and the southern port city of Odesa. Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelenskyy in an online statement called the attack on Kyiv "one of the biggest" in the war that has raged for over three years, and said that Moscow's forces had fired over 315 drones, mostly Shaheds, and seven missiles at

Ukraine overnight. "Russian missile and Shahed strikes are louder than the efforts of the United States and others around the world to force Russia into peace,' Zelenskyy wrote, urging "concrete action" from the US and Europe in response to the attack. A maternity hospital and residential buildings in the centre of the southern port city of Odesa were damaged in the attack, regional head Oleh Kiper said. Two people were killed and nine injured in the city, according to a statement from the regional prosecutor's office.

An additional victim was found in Kyiv's Obolon district, regional head Tymur Tkachenko wrote on Telegram.

"Russian strikes are once again hitting not military targets but the lives of ordinary people. This once again shows the true nature of what we are dealing with," Tkachenko said.

Attacks continue despite talks

The fresh attacks came a day after Moscow launched almost 500 drones at Ukraine in the biggest overnight drone bombardment in the three-year war. Ukrainian and Western officials have been anticipating a Russian response to Ukraine's audacious June 1 drone attack on distant Russian air bases.

Russia has been launching a record-breaking number of drones and missiles targeting Ukraine in recent days, despite both sides trading memoranda during direct peace talks in Istanbul on June 2 that set out conditions for a potential ceasefire.

However, the inclusion of clauses that both sides see as nonstarters make any quick deal unlikely, and a ceasefire, long sought by Kyiv, remains elusive. The only tangible outcome of the talks has been in the exchange of prisoners of war, with a swap starting on Monday to release soldiers aged between 18 and 25.

ndian-American social entrepreneur, who filmed a video of a young Indian man being "handcuffed, crying and treated like a criminal" at a US airport, has said that he felt "helpless and heartbroken" over what he described as a "human tragedy."



Inflow into equity MFs hits 13-month low at ₹19,000 crore

 nflow in equity mutual funds slumped to its lowest level in 13 months to . ₹19,013 crore in May, with large-cap, mid-cap and smallcap funds experiencing lowered inflows, primarily triggered by profit booking by investors.

This also marks the fifth consecutive month of decline in inflow in equity funds and nearly 22 per cent drop in net inflow on a month-on-month basis from ₹24,269 crore registered in April, according to data released by the Association of Mutual Funds in India (Amfi) on Tuesday.

Despite the deceleration, May marked the 51st consecutive month of positive flows into equity-oriented schemes, reflecting sustained investor confidence.

Also, systematic investment plan (SIP) contributions remained robust, registering a record ₹26,688 crore in inflows in May, higher than Rs 26,632 crore in the preceding month. Overall, the mutual fund industry experienced an infu-

May compared to ₹2.77 lakh crore in the preceding month. The inflow has lifted the

industry's assets under management to a record ₹72.2 lakh crore as of May from Rs 70 lakh crore in April-end.

According to the data, equity-oriented mutual funds saw an inflow of ₹19,013 crore in May, making it the lowest level since April 2024, when such funds experienced an inflow of ₹18,917 crore.

Such funds witnessed an sion of over ₹29,000 crore in inflow of ₹24,269 crore in

April, ₹25,082 crore in March, ₹29,303 crore in February, ₹39,688 crore in January, and ₹41,156 crore in December.

'Hiring outlook steady for upcoming quarter'

orporate India has a steady hiring outlook for the next three months, driven by strong growth in the private services sector and hopes of economic benefits stemming from shifts in global trade dynamics, a report said on Tuesday.

According to the latest ManpowerGroup Employment Outlook Survey, employers reported a Net Employment Outlook (NEO) of 42 per cent — the second highest outlook globally and emerging as a key player in the global employment landscape.

The NEO is calculated by subtracting the percentage of employers who anticipate reductions in staffing levels from those who plan to hire.

"As we enter the third quarter of 2025, India's employment Outlook remains robust, with a NEO of 42 per cent — among the highest globally. Despite a slight dip from the previous quarter, the 12-point year-on-year gain highlights sustained employer confidence and growth momentum in the labour market," said Sandeep Gulati, Managing Director, Managing Director, ManpowerGroup India and

As per the survey findings, the majority of employers - 54 per cent anticipate an increase in hiring, 32 per cent expect to maintain current staffing levels, 12 per cent anticipate a decrease, and 2 per cent are

Globally, the UAE reported the strongest NEO of 48 per cent, followed by India (42 per cent) and Costa Rica (41 per cent) in the second and third position, respectively.

The other countries in the top five most bullish hiring outlook include — Brazil with 33 per cent at the fourth position and the Netherlands with 30 per cent at the 5th rank.

This optimism is driven by strong hiring intent in sectors such as Information Technology, Energy & Utilities, and Financial Services, where companies are actively expanding and accelerating digital transformation.

He added India is seeing renewed overseas inflows and the Government is open to suggestions and will adopt new measures to promote FDI in the country.

Over the last eleven financial years (2014-25), India attracted FDI worth \$ 748.78 billion, an increase of 143 per cent over the previous eleven years (2003-14), which saw \$ 308.38 billion in inflows.

Additionally, the number of source countries for FDI increased from 89 in 2013-14 to 112 in 2024-25, underscoring India's growing global appeal as an investment destination.

In 2024-25, India received a total FDI of \$81 billion, which is the highest in the last three years, he said.

→ EBI has sent notices to stock broker OPG Securities and its directors asking them to pay ₹5.35 crore, in a case of unfair access to secondary market servers in connection with the NSE colocation issue, and warned of attachment of assets as well as bank accounts if they fail to make the payment within 15 days.

The demand notices came after the entities failed to pay the fine imposed by the Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) in April 2025.

In three separate recovery notices issued on Monday, the regulator directed OPG Securities and its directors -Sanjay Gupta, Sangeeta Gupta, and Om Prakash Gupta — to pay dues totalling ₹5.35 crore within 15 days. This included a penalty amount and an interest.

In the event of non-payment of dues, the market regulator said it will recover the amount by attaching and selling their moveable and immovable properties. Besides, they face attachment of bank accounts and arrest.

In its order passed in April, SEBI levied

a fine of ₹5 crore on OPG Securities and 1 connected to the secondary server conits directors jointly for engaging in unfair trade practices.

Additionally, SEBI imposed a fine of ₹10 lakh each on OPG Securities and Sanjay Gupta for non-compliance with the regulator's code of conduct and hampering the investigation, respectively.

Noticee 1 (OPG Securities) gained an unfair advantage by repeatedly accessing the Secondary POP Server, thereby making unlawful gain. Regardless of the quantum of such unlawful gain, it is evident that the manner in which Noticee

stituted an unfair practice, which was recurrent in nature. This amounts to a serious violation," SEBI had stated.

Furthermore, the regulator had highlighted that OPG Securities failed to uphold standards of integrity, due skill, care, and diligence in its business operations, while also neglecting to ensure ompliance with statutory requirements.

Since the Guptas were directors of OPG Securities during the period of violation, they were deemed vicariously liable for the company's actions, it had added.

disruption in rare earth magnet supplies lasting beyond a month can impact production of passenger vehicles, including electric models, weighing on the domestic automobile industry's growth momentum, a report on Tuesday said. Rare earth magnets, low in cost but critical in function, could emerge as a key supply-side risk for India's automotive sector if China's export restrictions and delays in shipment clearances persist, Crisil Ratings said in a statement.

"The supply squeeze comes just as the auto sector is preparing for aggressive EV rollouts. Over a dozen new electric models are planned for launch, most built on PMSM platforms," Crisil Ratings Senior Director Anuj Sethi said.

While most automakers currently have 4-6 weeks of inventory, prolonged delays could start affecting vehicle production, with EV models facing deferrals or rescheduling from July 2025, he added.

A broader impact on two-wheelers and ICE PVs may follow if the supply bottlenecks persist for an extended period, Sethi said.

"The shortage of rare earth magnets is forcing automakers to reassess supply-chain

per cent of a vehicle's cost, these magnets are indispensable for EV motors and electric steering systems," said Crisil Ratings Director Poonam Upadhyay. Automakers are actively engaging with alternative suppliers in countries such as Vietnam, Indonesia, Japan, Australia, and the US, while also optimising existing inventories, she noted.

◄itagarh Rail Systems Ltd (TRSL) has entered the forged wheel manufacturing business through a joint venture with Ramkrishna Forgings, aiming to ease the country's ongoing shortage of wheelsets which is crucial for train and coach production, an official said on Tuesday.

The company's Freight Rolling Stock vertical reported a 5.6 per cent jump in consolidated revenue to ₹3,610 crore for FY25, the official said adding that the new vertical aligns with the Centre's push for import substitution and self-reliance under the Atmanirbhar Bharat initia-

The company stated that its plan to stabilise production at around 950 to 1,000 wagons per month was hampered over the past two quarters due to a shortage of wheelsets. It attributed the issue to supply constraints at the Rail Wheel Factory in Bangalore, the mandated supplier under railway board contracts.

However, the situation is expected to improve from June onwards as production at the factory is likely to normalise, the TRSL official said. "One of the most significant

developments of the year has been our foray into wheel manufacturing. We see this as a national service and a big

dependence must end," Vice Chairman and Managing Director Umesh Chowdhary India has been heavily



Star West Indies batter Nicholas Pooran on Tuesday stunningly announced his retirement from international cricket at the age of 29 without specifying any reasons but insisted that "much thought and reflection" had gone into taking the call.

His decision came days after he opted out of selection for the T20I series against England. The swashbuckling left-handed batter finished as West Indies' most capped T20I player with 106 matches and also its highest rungetter, with a tally of 2275 at an average of 26.14 and strike rate of 136.39. In 61 ODI appearances, he scored 1983 runs at an average of 39.66 and strike rate of 99.15.

"After much thought and reflection, I've decided to announce my retirement from international cricket," Pooran, a former West Indies white-ball captain, wrote on his social media pages.

"This game we love has given and will continue to

give so much - joy, purpose, England after playing the full unforgettable memories, and Indian Premier League (IPL) a chance to represent the season for Lucknow Super people of the West Indies," Giants (LSG). said the Trinidadian who

inning the ICC World Test Championship title for the second consecutive time here will be an important step in establishing the current side as one of the greatest Australian teams of all times, feels star off-spinner Nathan Lyon. The 37-year-old Nathan Lyon is part of Andrew McDonald's squad that will take on South Africa at Lord's in the final of the ICC World Test Championship 2023-25 cycle.

Australia will be looking to defend the title they clinched in 2023 with a 209-run victory over India at the Oval and Lyon is keen to build on the progress made since that triumph.

'It is important that we look at this week as a celebration piece. We've done incredibly well over the last couple of years, at home and away, and that is something that as a team, we should be really proud of," he was quoted as saying by the ICC.

"In my eyes, we're on a journey to becoming a great Australian team. We're not there yet, I'm well aware of that, but that's our goal too.

This game is another step up that ladder," said the spin ace who took the match-winning wicket of Mohammed Sirai in Australia's win



against India in 2023.

Australia finished second in the league table during the 2023-25 WTC cycle, behind South Africa, having claimed 67.54 per cent of the

points on offer to them. Australia were also the only side 25 cycle, winning four of the six series they played. Their percentage was only bettered by the table-topping Proteas' 69.44 per cent.

Lyon has taken 56 wickets against South Africa in 18 matches and expects a fierce contest with the side captained by Temba Bavuma. "Yes, we've been here before, but South Africa qualified first during this World Test Championship," said Lyon who has taken 553 wickets from 136 matches since making his Test debut in 2011.

"Throughout these two years, they've done something really well to finish top, and so they deserve that home changing room leading into this game.

"It's international cricket. We're expecting an extremely hard challenge and there's going to be a lot of problems out there, but we're going to have to be good enough to solve those problems ASAP."

The presence of multiple experienced and skilled bowlers in the Australian camp like captain Pat Cummins, Josh Hazlewood, Mitchell Starc and Scott Boland only adds to the Australian fire-power, said Lyon.

"As a bowling squad, we are very proud of where we are currently at," he said. "But we're not leaving any stone unturned and we're still trying to get better as a bowling group. Í feel that spurs each and every one of us on to get better."

Australia last featured in a Test series in England during the 2023 Ashes — the opening assignment of the 2023-25 World Test Championship cycle — but several members of the squad have since returned to ply their trade in county cricket. Lyon turned out for Lancashire in 2024, while Marnus Labuschagne, Cameron Green and Beau Webster represented Glamorgan, Gloucestershire and Warwickshire, respectively, during the ongoing season.

"I feel like you get a lot of understanding of how the game is played over here in these conditions, how the Dukes ball moves around and how the overhead conditions play a role," he said.

"It's been amazing to have Greeny over here. I think he's played four or five games for Gloucestershire and done really well. So, hopefully, that gives him the confidence to pick things up from where he left off.

"It's important, especially for the younger players, like Greeny, to come over here and play county cricket."

Australia faces South Africa in World Test Championship

hen it comes to major cricket finals, Australia is in a league of its own.

Only Australia has won all four men's global trophies. It is hard to beat in finals, having won 10 of 13 across the 50over World Cup, 20-over World Cup, Champions Trophy and World Test Championship. And let's not get started on the women's team, which is even more dominant.

The men go for world title No. 11 from Wednesday in the WTC final against South Africa at neutral Lord's.

That ruthless focus Australia brings on the biggest stages is in marked contrast to South Africa, a perennial underachiever. The Proteas have won just one major title, the Champions Trophy in 1998, when most of the current Proteas were toddlers.

An experienced squad average age 29 1/2 — compensates with a bond that can't be underestimated, a determination to have each other's backs. That showed often in the

2023-25 WTC cycle as the Proteas, who used 30 players, more than any other team, found a run-scorer or wickettaker at just the right time. They won their last seven tests and were first to qualify for the "We haven't been super

dominant in our performances," South Africa captain Temba Bavuma said when the team qualified in December. 'We definitely haven't been clinical or ruthless when the opportunity or the situation is called upon. But I think what we've done is that we've found
