Punjab Govt has lost Credibility and Public Trust, alleges Haryana CM

Making a brief foray in Punjab, Haryana Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini on Saturday attacked the Punjab Government, stating that the AAP government in the state has been built on a foundation of lies. He said the government has neither undertaken any meaningful work for public welfare nor does it have the will to do so and the people of Punjab have now realized this truth.

Speaking to Reporters in Sangrur, Saini said that the Punjab Government has completely failed to fulfill the promises it made during the elections, adding that their deception has already been exposed in Delhi, as lies cannot survive for long. "In Punjab too, the public support for the AAP government has eroded, and people are ready to show them doors in the upcoming by-elections", Saini said.

The Chief Minister said that for the past 11 years, under the leadership of Prime Minister, Sh. Narendra Modi, public welfare schemes are being effectively implemented in Haryana and the trust of the people in the government's policies and working style has only grown stronger.

Referring to the Ludhiana by-election, he said that people there have made up



their minds that Punjab too should move ahead swiftly under Prime Minister Modi's leadership.

Saini alleged that the Punjab Government is not implementing the Central Government's welfare schemes, depriving the public of their benefits. In contrast, the Haryana Government is procuring all crops from farmers at Minimum Support Price and urged the Punjab Government to show concern for its farmers and ensure they receive fair prices for their produce.

He said that the Haryana Government has provided over Rs. 15,500 crore as compensation to farmers for crop damage due to nat-

ural disasters over the past 10 years. Additionally, vegetable farmers are receiving compensation under the Bhavantar Bharpai Yojana. People in Haryana are also benefiting from the Ayushman Bharat scheme, whereas the people of Punjab remain deprived of its benefits, he added.

Saini emphasized that the Punjab Government must abandon the politics of false promises and begin working at the grassroots level to ensure real benefits from Central Government schemes reach the people.

The Haryana Chief Minister expressed condolences on the demise of former Union Minister Sardar Sukhdev Singh Dhindsa. He was a respected leader whose life serves as an inspiration for all. Saini prayed to the Almighty to grant eternal peace to the departed soul and strength to the family to bear this irreparable loss.

Illegal arms smuggling racket busted in Amritsar, 3 held

The Anti-Narcotics Task Force (ANTF) Border Range Amritsar has arrested three associates of jailed kingpin Jugraj Singh and recovered six sophisticated foreign-made weapons smuggled from across the border from their possession, Director General of Police (DGP) Punjab Gaurav Yadav here on Saturday.

Those arrested have been identified as Rajan, a resident of Bhagatnawa Gate in Amritsar; Paramjit Singh, a resident of Heer Hall in Ghannupur, Amritsar; and Dinesh Kumar, a resident of Narainagar, Amritsar. The recovered weapons include two Glock 19X Pistols (Made in Austria),

two .30 bore Pistols (Made in Italy), one .30 bore Star Mark Pistol and one Baretta .30 bore Pistol (Made in Italy). Apart from this, police teams have also impounded their Yamaha R15 motorcycle without a number plate and Honda Grania scooter without a number plate, which they were using to deliver the consignments.

Yadav said that preliminary investigations revealed that the arrested accused persons were working under the directions of Jugraj Singh of village Mode in Amritsar, who is currently lodged in Central Jail at Sri

Goindwal Sahib, and actively running the smuggling racket through his advocate's Munshi identified as Rajan. The kingpin Jugraj Singh, who has been facing several criminal cases under the NDPS and Arms act, is reportedly in contact with Pakistani drug traffickers from within the jail, he said. The DGP said that these weapons were smuggled from across the border and were likely meant to be supplied to criminal elements in Punjab. Further investigations are on to establish forward and backward linkages in this case, he added.

Sharing operation details, Additional Director General of Police (ADGP) ANTF Nilabh Kishore said that ANTF Border Range Amritsar team had received cred-

ible inputs about the trio's involvement in retrieving weapons on the directions of their jailed handler Jugraj Singh. Acting swiftly on the inputs, police teams led by Superintendent of Police (SP) ANTF Border Range Amritsar Gurpreet Singh launched an intelligence-led operation and apprehended accused persons from opposite Khalsa College in Amritsar and recovered weapon consignments from their possession, he said. The ADGP said that police teams will bring accused Jugraj Singh from jail on production warrant to carry out further investigation in this case and identify more persons involved in this smuggling racket. More arrests and recoveries are likely in coming days..

Punjab CM Offers Healing Touch to Bereaved Families in Samana

Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann on Saturday assured justice for the bereaved families who lost their seven children in a tragic road mishap, vowing that the severest action will be taken against those who attempted to hinder the investigation.

Talking to Reporters after consoling the grieving families, he said that the unfortunate incident had claimed the lives of bright and promising students. He described it as an irreparable loss and expressed his deep condolences. Mann assured that the state government stands firmly with the bereaved families during this difficult time and will leave no stone unturned to ensure justice is served.

He affirmed that those responsible for this shocking incident will not be spared, and exemplary action will be taken against them. He emphasized that even influential individuals who tried to delay the case and obstruct justice will face strict punishment. Such actions, Bhagwant Singh Mann said, are a heinous crime and the punishment will serve as a deterrent to others.

Additionally, Mann announced that the state government will launch a special drive against illegal mining and overloaded vehicles. He said strict instructions have been issued to the police and transport departments to take firm action against violators. Bhagwant Singh Mann described these offenses as unpardonable and said the government will not allow anyone to endanger



the lives of common citizens.

He also announced the construction of a children's memorial park in memory of the deceased and said the memorial would serve as a lasting tribute to the young victims of the tragic mishap. Further, Mann announced that the existing road from Samana to Patran will be upgraded into a four-lane road.

The CM noted that frequent accidents occur on this stretch due to heavy traffic, making the upgrade imperative for public safety. He also declared that the government hospital in Samana will be upgraded and equipped with state-of-the-art infrastructure and to strengthen emergency medical services, a fleet of seven new ambulances will be added to the region's healthcare system.

Specialist doctors to be available 'on-call' in Haryana govt hospitals: Health Min

Specialist doctors will be available in Haryana government hospitals under the "on-call" system now, so that serious patients can get timely treatment, Health and Family Welfare Minister Arti Singh Rao said on Saturday.

In a statement, she said that now, the no-node formula is being implemented for doctors in government hospitals under the PPP (Public Private Partnership) model. With this initiative, specialist medical services will be made available even in rural and remote areas. Specialist doctors will attend patients on-call in hospitals. Specialist doctors will be available for services like anesthesia, surgery and radiology, gynecology and pediatrics. She informed that this service is being made available in the initial phase in five districts:

Hisar, Jind, Mewat, Sonapat and Kaithal.

The Health Minister said this is a pilot project, which will later be expanded to the entire state. "This scheme will not only provide high quality medical facilities to the patients, but will also reduce the need for a referral system at the district level. The aim of the state government is to provide timely, quality and accessible health services to every citizen," she said, adding that this new initiative is a strong and positive effort in that direction.

Rao said this initiative is part of the government's broader effort to strengthen health services through technology, decentralization, and innovation. She added, "Our government is committed to providing accessible, affordable, and quality healthcare. This is not just a policy shift—it is a people-centric reform aimed at saving lives and improving health outcomes."

Harsimrat Badal appeals to EAM to initiate dialogue with UAE & sensitise it about Sikh articles of faith

Senior Shiromani Akali Dal (SAD) leader and Bathinda MP Harsimrat Kaur Badal on Saturday appealed to External Affairs minister Dr S Jaishankar to initiate a dialogue with the UAE government to sensitize it about the religious significance of the five 'kakkars', especially the kirpan and kataar, and the importance of allowing Sikhs to observe their faith without fear or restriction.

In a letter to the External Affairs minister, the Bathinda MP said she was making this appeal in the wake of a recent Advisory by the Indian Embassy in UAE directing Indians not to carry sharp objects while visiting the country in view of Article 405 of the UAE penal law which prohibits the same.

Asserting that this move had caused deep distress and mental agony to Sikh travellers and residents alike, Harsimrat Badal said there have been instances of Sikhs being detained and compelled to remove their kirpan and kataar. She also cited a recent case of an elderly man being detained in Abu Dhabi for wearing the kirpan and turban.

Badal asserted in her letter that such incidents had caused distress within the Sikh community as they contravened the rights of Sikhs to practice their faith besides rais-

ing serious concerns about the protection of religious freedom for minorities in the UAE. "The Sikh community has always contributed positively to societies worldwide, including in the UAE, and demand the freedom to practice its faith in accordance with its tenets. Denying Sikhs the right to wear their five kakkars, particularly the kirpan, is a curtailment of religious freedom and contrary to the principles of mutual respect and pluralism that India stands for," she said in the letter.

The MP also requested S Jaishankar to consider sending a high-level delegation, including representatives from the National Commission for Minorities and the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee (SGPC), to engage with UAE authorities and relevant international agencies and sensitise them about Sikh articles of faith.

She said that the kirpan, one of the Five Ks (panj kakaar), was a sacred symbol and an inseparable part of Sikh identity, mandated by Sikh tenets since the time of Guru Gobind Singh Ji. "Its significance is spiritual and symbolic, representing the duty to uphold justice and protect the oppressed, and not as a weapon for aggression or harm. The kirpan is worn at all times by Amritdhari Sikhs as a matter of religious obligation and conscience", she added.

A spokesperson of IGMCH stated that she had come for a routine medical check-up as a part of preventive and diagnostic care. He said that a few routine medical checks were conducted under the supervision of specialized doctors, and she was medically fit and fine. He stated that all necessary protocols were maintained without disturbing the visitors.

Sant Kabir Jayanti to be Celebrated in Sirsa on June 11


Chandigarh: Haryana Chief Minister Nayab Singh Saini on Saturday said that the real strength of this country lies in its poor, laborers, and marginalized communities and these are the very people who, through their hard work, are making the biggest contribution to transforming India into a developed nation. Book On Kashmir Insurgency Released

Chandigarh: A book on one of India's most traumatic chapters, Kashmir Insurgency: Deconstructing the State Response – Revisiting 1989–90, authored by Col. Yoginder Kandhari (Retd.), was formally released at the Chandigarh Press Club on Saturday. The ceremony was presided over by General V. P. Malik, former Chief of the Army Staff, while Col. Daljeet Singh Cheema, author and motivational speaker, was also present. The book has been published by White Falcon Publishing. Drawing on first-hand experiences during counter-insurgency operations in Kashmir, Right to Information (RTI) disclosures, and interviews, Kandhari's book offers an account of the genesis and trajectory of the 1989–90 insurgency. The author provides a sobering critique of the state's paralysis, institutional failures, intelligence lapses, and the moral vacuum that accompanied the mass displacement of the Kashmiri Pandit community—what he calls one of the most successful campaigns of ethnic cleansing in modern history. General V. P. Malik, in his address, said, "Why did law and order and security situation in Jammu and Kashmir reach the level of implosion experienced in 1990? How Kashmiriyat culture was eliminated (which resulted in exodus of Kashmiri Pandits) and Islamist culture got adopted in the Valley? This book explores all that, and more, through the eyes of witnesses, interviews of then policy makers, and a plethora of research material. Someone has said 'Study the past if you would define the future.' 'Kashmir Insurgency' is an interesting book, it carries huge lessons for today and tomorrow in Jammu and Kashmir", Gen. Malik added.

Over 45,000 youths enrolled in skill development schemes, says Himachal CM

Shimla: Chief Minister Sukhvinder Singh Sukhu on Friday said that over 45,000 youths have been enrolled in various schemes and projects under Himachal Pradesh Skill Development Corporation since January 1, 2023. Chairing the 16th Board of Directors meeting of Himachal Pradesh Kaushal Vikas Nigam (HPKVN), he said that out of the 45,455 youth enrolled 39,794 have been given training certificates and 8,586 trainees have been placed, a statement said. Q : How has the International Day of Yoga (IDY) helped people improve their well-being over the years?

From schools to workplaces and even prisons and rehabilitation centres, Yoga has reached people across ages and health conditions. Studies by reputed institutes have shown that regular yoga practice reduces stress, enhances mental focus and improves immunity. IDY has played a crucial role in making these benefits accessible to the masses-democratising wellness through large-scale public participation and localised Yoga Protocols suited to various needs like senior citizens, children, women and persons with disabilities.

Q: What are the signature events planned under IDY 2025, and how do they reflect India's leadership in global wellness?

A: This year, 10 signature events are being organised across different themes to highlight how Yoga intersects with wellbeing, science, diplomacy, environment, inclusivity and more.

In fact, the past decade of IDY has transformed Yoga into a shared global heritage-strengthening India's identity as a Vishwa Guru (global teacher) in holistic living.

Q: What is special for citizens and yoga enthusiasts in IDY 2025? How can they participate this year?

A: IDY 2025 is special as it marks the 11th International Day of Yoga, with a strong emphasis on inclusivity and mass participation. Several citizen-centric initiatives are being rolled out:

- Yoga Sangam, the flagship initiative, invites community-led yoga demonstrations at over 1 lakh locations across India, covering RWAs, schools, offices and local bodies.
- Yoga Samavesh, a dedicated series under IDY 2025, will highlight customised yoga protocols designed for diverse groups-such as persons with diabetes, asthma, disabilities, senior citizens, transgender individuals, children and more.
- Enhanced digital engagement tools, such as the Y-Break App, M-Yoga App and Namaste Yoga App, will support daily practice and increase accessibility for all age groups and professions.

■ Special IDY Ambassadors, including influential personalities and cultural figures, will amplify the message of yoga across grassroots and digital platforms.

■ More than 30000 organisations have already registered for "Yoga Sangam" through the dedicated registration portal

Through these efforts, IDY 2025 becomes not just a celebration of one day, but a powerful movement for daily wellness and collective well-being.

Q: How does Yoga and IDY connect people across diverse backgrounds and regions?

A: Yoga has proven to be a unifying force across geographies, languages and belief systems. IDY has played a unique role in building a shared sense of purpose and collective consciousness. Whether it's fishermen doing Yoga by the sea in Kerala, school children in Leh practising under open skies, or tribal communities in Jharkhand integrating local wellness practices with yoga-as a medium, it fosters connection and compassion.

In IDY 2025, the "Yoga Samavesh" campaign is spotlighting sessions that bring together different communities MM, generations and abilities-proving that in an increasingly fragmented world, Yoga is one of the few practices that unites without imposing. India's yoga ecosystem is already a billion-dollar industry, with over 5 crore households practicing yoga daily, according to the latest NSSO survey.

Q: What efforts are being made by the Ministry of Ayush in the field of yoga research?

At the heart of this celebration is Yoga Sangam, scheduled for 21st June 2025, which will witness a synchronised mass yoga demonstration based on the Common Yoga Protocol (CYP) at over one lakh locations across the country-symbolising India's unified commitment to the ancient science of wellness.

Q: How does India's approach align with WHO's principles for Traditional Medicine?

India's approach to Traditional Medicine aligns closely with WHO's vision of safe, inclusive and evidence-based TM practices. The country has emphasised regulation, sustainability, preservation of indigenous knowledge and environmental responsibility. Over the time, the Ministry of Ayush has established a strategic collaboration with the World Health Organisation (WHO) to globalise and mainstream traditional medicine. A landmark achievement in this partnership is the establishment of the WHO Global Traditional Medicine Centre in Jamnagar, Gujarat- the first-of-its-kind institution globally dedicated to traditional medicine. Other key milestones include the successful hosting of the first WHO Traditional Medicine Global Summit in India in August 2023. Q: What is the WHO Global Traditional Medicine Strategy 2025-2034, and how is India contributing to it?

A: The WHO Global Traditional Medicine Strategy 2025-2034 aims to support Member States in integrating traditional medicine into their health systems through regulation, scientific research, and safe practices. India has been a key contributor, having demonstrated strong leadership during the previous strategy (2014-2023). India's efforts now extend to actively shaping and supporting the new strategy, especially through the WHO Global Traditional Medicine Centre (GTMC) in Jamnagar. This Centre, established with India's support, is a global hub for policy research, data analytics, and international collaboration in traditional medicine.

Q: What role does the WHO Global Traditional Medicine Centre in Jamnagar play?

A: The WHO Global Traditional Medicine Centre (GTMC), inaugurated in 2022 by Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi and WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Ghebreyesus, is the first of its kind globally. Located in Jamnagar, Gujarat, the Centre plays a pivotal role in strengthening the global TM ecosystem. It focuses on evidence-based policy support, setting international standards, fostering global research partnerships and using data analytics to inform best practices. It also positions India as a leader in the scientific validation and global promotion of traditional healthcare systems.

Q: What is the significance of the recent Donor Agreement between the Ministry of Ayush and WHO?

A: On May 24, 2025, the Ministry of Ayush and WHO signed a landmark Donor Agreement to develop a Traditional Medicine module under the International Classification of Health Interventions (ICHI).

This initiative will create a standardised, scientific framework to document and classify health interventions used in systems like Ayurveda and Unani. As highlighted by Prime Minister Modi in his Mann Ki Baat address, this is a major step toward global recognition, scientific credibility and mainstreaming of Ayush systems internationally.

Darshan of Ram Darbar in Ayodhya Temple likely to begin within 10 days: Nripendra Mishra

Devotees visiting Ayodhya could soon witness another spiritual milestone. The darshan of the newly consecrated Ram Darbar on the first floor of the Ram Temple is likely to begin within the next ten days, Ram Mandir Construction Committee Chairman Nripendra Mishra announced on Saturday.

Speaking to reporters after reviewing the ongoing construction work, Mishra said the Shri Ram Janmabhoomi Teerth Darbar, depicting Lord Ram, Sita, Kshetra Trust is actively considering

opening the first floor of the temple to devotees. "Darshan of the Ram Darbar could start within 10 days. The trust is working on the arrangements," he said, adding that structural consultations are underway with experts from the Central Building Research Institute (CBRI) to finalise access plans.

With this development, the construction of the Ram Temple has entered its final phase. While the idol of Ram Lalla has already been installed on the ground floor, the first floor houses the Ram Darbar, depicting Lord Ram, Sita, Lakshman and Hanuman. Mishra further

revealed that the second floor will serve as a repository for rare and ancient scriptures related to Lord Ram.

Meanwhile, the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) is carrying out a detailed survey at the exact spot where Ram Lalla was placed in a tent before being shifted to the sanctum earlier this year. This location, considered the original birthplace of Lord Ram, will now be studied for its archaeological and historical value. "The ASI team will conduct research around the five-century-old legacy of this site," Mishra said.

Other works in the temple complex are also nearing completion. The Pushkarni Kund, a sacred pond being constructed between the Saptarishi temples, is in its final stage.

Mishra said efforts are being made to preserve the natural ecology of the Panchvati area. Native trees are being planted to ensure that birds and animals have access to water and shelter without disturbing the area's natural balance.

The northern entrance of the temple, currently under construction, is expected to be completed by August 15. Mishra also mentioned that the master plan for the temple complex, including landscaping and support infrastructure, will be finalised within a month.

He acknowledged the support of several national institutions in completing the temple. These include the Railway Ministry, CBRI, and the Defence Ministry, which is assisting with the installation of titanium mesh for security.

All agencies involved have been compensated by the temple trust. "With the opening of the Ram Darbar for darshan just days away, the temple is on the brink of full readiness," Mishra said, noting that Ayodhya is rapidly transforming into a global spiritual hub.

Haryana Police had summoned Punjab-based YouTuber Jasbir Singh on June 6 in the Jyoti Malhotra espionage case but before he could join the investigation, he was arrested by Punjab Police, Singh's counsel claimed on Saturday. He also denied the charge that Singh was an agent of Pakistan's spy agency ISI.

A Mohali court on Saturday extended for two days the police remand of Singh, who was arrested on espionage charges on June 4. Singh was produced before the court after his three-day police remand ended on Saturday. Police sought a seven-day remand of Singh but the court granted them two days, said his counsel.

Jasbir Singh alias Jaan Mahal (41), a resident of village Mahlan in Rupnagar district, was running a YouTube channel "JaanMahal Video" with over 11

lakh subscribers, ostensibly posting travel and cooking vlogs. Singh was allegedly in close touch with Haryana-based influencer Jyoti Malhotra, who is in custody on charges of spying for Pakistan. After Singh's arrest, Punjab police had claimed that it unearthed a "terror-backed espionage network" linking him to Pakistani intelligence and army officials.

Police had said that the YouTuber was allegedly spying for Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI). Speaking to reporters on Saturday, Singh's counsel Mohit Dhupar said he met him in the court on Saturday. "We spoke to him. There is no such thing that is being said in the media that he was an ISI agent," said Dhupar, claiming he was just a vlogger. Dhupar said Singh was summoned by Punjab Police from May 17 till May 30. He had already given his mobile phone and laptop to the police, said the counsel.

Sonia Gandhi rushed to hospital during Shimla visit

India must give Gill crack at Test captaincy: Ponting

India have taken the right decision by handing the reins of the Test team to Shubman Gill and now the youngster must given a long rope to prove his credentials, says Ricky Ponting, who is also confident that India can handle the ongoing transition phase better than other countries. India will be without stalwarts Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma, Ravichandran Ashwin, who all retired recently, and pacer Mohammed Shami when they begin their five-Test tour of England on June 20.

While Kohli and Rohit retired from Tests last month, Ashwin had hung up his boots during the Australia tour last year and Shami was ruled out on fitness grounds for the tour of the Old Blighty.

"I actually think it's the right move. I know there's a lot of other people out there, pundits out there saying they can't understand why it must be Bumrah and why they have gone to Shubman, but I think it's pretty simple," Ponting told The ICC Review.

"Bumrah's injuries are holding him back a bit in the last couple of years and you don't want that with a captain. You can't have a captain coming in and missing games here and there, so I think it's the right decision." "Now that they've made it, it's one they've got to stick with and give him (Gill) a good crack at it for a long period of time," he said. Ponting said it would be tough to replace players with experience but said India should be able to handle the transitional phase better than any other

Test-playing side. "It's always very hard to replace players like that, (given) that have been around for so long that have played that much Test cricket. But if any country can do it and do it quickly, India can, because of the amount of young talent that they have," Ponting said.

"I've seen it first hand for 10 years now around the IPL and we've seen the emergence of (Yashasvi) Jaiswal and these sort of guys that have come into international cricket with India and (have) done really well pretty much straight away."

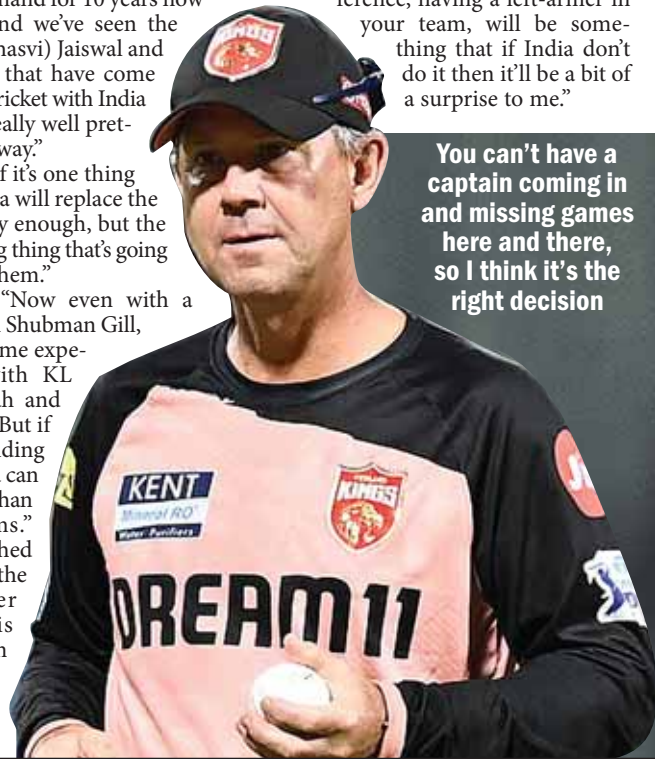
"The skill side of it's one thing to replace and India will replace the skill side of it easily enough, but the experience is the big thing that's going to be missing for them."

He continued, "Now even with a young captain with Shubman Gill, they'll still have some experience around with KL Rahul and Bumrah and these sort of guys. But if you look at a rebuilding sort of phase, India can cope with it better than most other teams."

Ponting, who coached Punjab Kings to the Indian Premier League final this year, said left-arm pacer Arshdeep Singh should be named in the play-

ing XI for the first Test at Headingley.

"I would actually have him in their Test team at the start (of the England series). He's very skillful, he has played County cricket, he knows the conditions there and the Dukes Ball will help him in the UK as well," he said. "To have that point of difference, having a left-armer in your team, will be something that if India don't do it then it'll be a bit of a surprise to me."

The Indian team recently had a promising outing at the Four Nations Tournament in Rosario, Argentina, from where it headed straight to Belgium.

India will begin the tour with three matches against Belgium at the Hockey Center of Excellence, Wilrijkse Plein, in Antwerp. The Indians will then face Australia at Beerschot Tennis Hockey Padel Club, in Kontich, before wrapping up the tour with a match against the Netherlands at Hockey Club Kampong, in Utrecht.

In Argentina, the Indian side delivered strong performances against quality opposition. India registered a 2-1 win and a 2-2 (2-3 SO) loss against Chile, earned a 1-1 (2-0 SO) win and a 2-4 loss against hosts Argentina, and defeated Uruguay twice - 3-2 and 2-2 (3-1 SO).

Facing strong international opponents in varied conditions will help fine-tune the squad's combinations, build match temperament, and instill confidence required to perform at the world stage.

"This extended tour is an excellent opportunity for our team. We had a valuable learning experience in Argentina, and now moving straight into matches against Belgium, Australia, and the Netherlands will allow us to build on that



momentum," Indian junior women's hockey team coach Tushar Khandker said in a release. "These are high calibre teams that will test our tactical and technical depth, as well as our consistency. For many of these players, this is a critical phase in their development, and such tours give them the kind of exposure that can't be replicated in training sessions alone." Most importantly, this tour plays a crucial role in our preparations for the FIH Hockey Women's Junior World Cup 2025 later this year. Every match we play now helps us get one step closer to being ready for that challenge," he added.

Diksha adds another solid round in Spain to move into tied third place

Diksha Dagar followed up her opening round with another strong effort, carding a three-under 69 on the second day to lie tied third at the Tenerife Women's Open on the Ladies European Tour here. The 24-year-old has carded rounds of 70 and 69 to sit at five-under after two rounds. She is four shots behind sole leader Lauren Walsh (67-68), who is nine-under at Abama Golf.

Avani Prashanth played three-over par 75 on the second day to fall down the standings to tied 43. Tvesa Malik (73-75), Hitaashree Bakshi (72-76) and Sneha Singh (77-79) failed to make the cut, which was set at three-over par.

Starting her day on the first tee, Diksha picked up a shot on the third hole before dropping one on the fifth but immediately got it back on the sixth and grabbed one more on the ninth.

On the back nine, Diksha made birdies on the 11th and 12th holes. She dropped a double bogey on the 16th hole before recovering a shot on the 17th for a day's work of 69. With her father Narendar on the bag, Diksha had a rollercoaster day with six birdies and three birdies, that included some excellent approaches and a brilliant bounce-back birdie on the 17th.

"I'm really looking forward to the weekend. I need to continue the same level of game. I'm playing well but need to keep steady. I'll focus on myself and won't look at the scores," the two-time LET winner said. "Dad has been doing a good job on the bag reading the greens. We have been discussing it a lot. Because of him, I got some good birdies opportunities."

Norway crushes Italy 3-0 in World Cup qualifier

Erling Haaland scored and Norway humbled Italy 3-0 for the first time in 25 years in qualifying for the 2026 World Cup.

Haaland on Friday collected a through ball from playmaker Martin Odegaard and rounded goalkeeper Gianluigi Donnarumma in the box for the third goal three minutes before halftime.

It was his 41st goal in his 42nd match for Norway to the delight of the spectators at Ullevaal Stadium in Oslo, including King Harald V of Norway.

Haaland also scored when Moldova was beaten 5-0 and Israel 4-2. Norway remained perfect in qualifying after three games in Europe Group I.

Striker Alexander Sorloth received a precise pass from Antonio Nusa then beat Donnarumma with a left foot shot. Nusa, the 20-year-old attacking midfielder, was a constant threat to the Italian defense. He left behind two defenders and doubled the advantage with a rising shot from inside the area.

Italy was missing some regulars for its first qualifying match, while others failed to impress, including Mateo Retegui, the best Serie A scorer.

Defenders Alessandro Buongiorno and Mattia Gabbia, defensive midfielder Manuel Locatelli and forward Moise Kean were all injured while key center back Francesco Acerbi, who was meant to mark Haaland, turned down his callup. Diego Coppola played centre back in the three-man defensive line used by coach Luciano Spalletti that was not able to stop Norway.

Norway dominates, Italy in trouble

In the other Group I game, Israel won in Estonia 3-1 for a second win and second place. The Azzurri are under pressure from the start of their qualifying after failing to reach the last two World Cups. Winning the group is the only way to ensure direct qualification to next year's tournament in North America.

The second-placed team goes into the playoffs — the stage where Italy was eliminated by Sweden and North Macedonia and ruled out of the 2018 and 2022 World Cups, respectively. A four-time World Cup champion, the only other time Italy didn't qualify was for the 1958 edition.

Italy hosts Moldova on Monday when Norway will be in action at Estonia.

Croatia cruises, Belgium held

Croatia opened its qualifying with a 7-0 rout of minnow Gibraltar. Mario Pašalic and Ante Budimir struck twice for Croatia within two minutes to break the deadlock after half an hour. In the second half, substitutes Andrej Kramaric and Franjo Ivanovis scored a couple each and Ivan Perisic piled on. Croatia was runner-up in the 2018 World Cup and third in 2022.

In the same Group I, Adam Hložek and Patrik Schick each scored as the unbeaten Czech Republic beat Montenegro 2-0 for a third straight win. Belgium was 1-0 up on a goal by defender Maxim De Cuyper but Ezgjan Alioski salvaged a draw for North Macedonia in a surprise in Group J.

Wales tops the group with seven points from three games after a 3-0 victory over Liechtenstein.

Magnus Carlsen wins Norway Chess title for seventh time

World champion D Gukesh committed a costly blunder against American Grandmaster Fabiano Caruana in the final round to finish third, as five-time world champion Magnus Carlsen clinched a record-extending seventh Norway Chess title here.

Gukesh, after being in a disadvantageous position against 2018 Norway Chess champion Fabiano Caruana, tried to stage a late comeback but ran out of time and committed a blunder, instantly realising his chances had slipped away.

Gukesh offered a handshake, grimaced, closed his eyes, and buried his face in both hands in frustration. It was a golden opportunity for the young Indian world champion to win his maiden Norway Chess title in only his second appearance, after a roller-coaster tournament that saw him start on a poor note before turning things around with impressive Classical wins over Magnus Carlsen, compatriot Arjun Erigaisi, and China's Wei Yi.

Defending champion Carlsen, who was the overnight leader with 15 points after round 9, ended the tournament with 16 points after fashioning the great escape against GM Erigaisi and steering the game to a draw in the 10th round on Friday. Gukesh finished third — the same as in the 2023 edition — with 14.5 points, while Caruana was second with 15.5 points. Erigaisi finished fifth with 13 points. Erigaisi won the Armageddon tie-break against Carsen following the miraculous draw by the Norwegian, but it did not matter in the end as the five-time world champion had already secured a point with the stalemate to win the title. While Gukesh quietly walked out of the

arena after losing to Caruana, Carlsen said he had to "literally fight for his life" to stay in the match against Arjun Erigaisi.

A defeat for the Norwegian would have been catastrophic, as the Gukesh-Caruana game was still in progress, and a Classical win for either would have dashed his hopes of a seventh Norway Chess title and the accompanying prize purse of approximately \$69,500. In fact, had Gukesh managed to draw his game against the American Grandmaster, he would have secured the title-provided Carlsen had lost his Classical encounter against Erigaisi.

Under the Norway Chess format, a Classical win earns three points, while a draw gives each player one point. A drawn game is followed by an Armageddon tie-break to decide the winner, who is awarded an additional half point. "I don't know what to say, like I kind of provoked him (Erigaisi) into concrete action and then I obviously missed something pretty big. But I thought I was doing well when he completely out-calculated me

and I just had to yeah fight for my life," said Carlsen. "It's just trying to find practical chances that keep the game alive, and it seemed that he (Erigaisi) got a bit nervous at some point... gave me very good chances." Carlsen admitted that part of his attention was on the Gukesh-Caruana game, given the significant impact it could have had on his title-winning chances. "I was just not good enough to find the win but looking at the other game (between Gukesh and Caruana), I kind of figured out at some point that I probably wouldn't need to win and that helped me," said Carlsen. "Yeah, of course it's (the win) a huge relief after a day like this in the tournament. Obviously, you know, my struggles have been well documented here but at least I fought till the end so I'm happy with that. It's been a roller-coaster ride and we're talking about classical chess."

Carlsen said he would not be playing a lot of classical chess in times to come.

"Not a lot (of classical chess) for sure. I'm not going to say that this tournament

was my last for sure but I enjoy other forms of chess a lot more."

On whether the title felt like a statement amid talks of the next generation rising, Carlsen said: "Had I actually won the tournament convincingly, we might have been having these talks. But honestly, there were at least three people who could have won this tournament easily, and I kind of stumbled into it. I don't think that's much of a statement. "It's good to see that I feel like, at least in parts of the game, I am a lot better than the kids who are trying to take over. It's rare to see so many twists and turns... the quality wasn't perfect, but there was a lot of good chess as well."

Anna Muzychuk wins women's title

In the women's section, overnight leader and two-time world blitz champion, Ukraine's Anna Muzychuk won the title with 16.5 points despite an Armageddon tie-break loss to India's R Vaishali in the final round. Muzychuk's draw in the classical game against the Indian earned both players a point each, while Vaishali secured another half a point by beating the Ukrainian in the Armageddon sudden death to finish on 11 points. Had Vaishali defeated Muzychuk — who was on 15.5 points overnight — in the Classical game, she would have deprived the Ukrainian Grandmaster of three points, which would have propelled Koneru Humpy to the title had the two-time world rapid champion too got the better of Chinese world champion Ju Wenjun in the Classical game.

Unfortunately, Humpy, who was on 13.5 points overnight after round 9, could only manage a draw with white pieces to earn one point. She got another half point by overcoming Wenjun in the Armageddon tie-break to earn 1.5 points, and finish with 15 points and a third-place finish.

India's archery hopes crash in Antalya debacle

Indian archery endured a forgettable outing at Stage 3 of the World Cup here on Saturday, returning empty-handed in a performance that raised serious questions over team selection, preparation and mental fortitude, especially with the Asian Games just a year away.

The high of Shanghai last month, where India stood second on the medal tally with two gold, one silver and four bronze medals, now seems like a distant past.

The third leg in Antalya saw both recurve and compound archers flop spectacularly, with not a single podium finish, even in their traditionally strong compound category.

A day after India's compound archers crashed out in both individual and team events, the recurve results were equally dismal, with seasoned names like four-time Olympians Deepika Kumari and Tarundeep Rai also failing to reach the medal rounds.

The only fight came from Simranjeet Kaur, who shocked everyone by stretching Korean Olympic gold medalist An San to a shoot-off in the quarterfinals on Saturday. Simranjeet, who barely made the cut at 54th with the third-lowest qualification score, was on the verge of a historic win, leading 5-3 and needing just a point to seal it against Korean star An San.

But, as has often been the case with Indian archers, nerves took over in the decider. A poor fifth set saw her shoot a 5 and an 8, allowing An San to force a shoot-off. The Korean nailed an 11 under the new scoring system, while Simranjeet faltered with an 8, losing 5-6 (29-28, 24-29, 27-24, 27-27, 23-29) (8-11).

Her second set, where she landed an



arrow in the blue ring (6), also proved costly. An San, meanwhile, defeated Indian star Deepika three times in a row.

The South Korean had earlier ousted the Indian star in the second round with a 6-0 rout (29-30, 27-28, 28-30) dashing her hope for a successive medal. Deepika had bagged a bronze in Shanghai last month.

Deepika, the former world number 1, continues to falter against elite opponents and has failed to learn from repeated mistakes, particularly against the dominant Koreans. Ankita Bhakat, who was India's best archer in qualification at 32nd, exited in the opening round, losing 2-6 (27-26, 26-28, 29-30, 28-29) to Dunya Yenhilyat — another lead squandered after going up 2-0.

Men fared no better

Former youth world champion and Shanghai bronze medalist Parth Salunkhe suffered a shock first-round exit to Lu Shuai of China 2-6 (28-29, 25-28, 28-25,

27-30), while Rai, at 41, showed little justification for his selection as he went down 2-6 to Germany's Mathias Kramer (28-30, 29-28, 27-31, 29-32).

Another seasoned campaigner Atanu Das, after leading 4-2, surrendered meekly to world no. 1 Brady Ellison 4-6 (28-27, 30-31, 31-30, 30-31, 27-30) from being 4-2 up. Dhiraj Bommadevara, India's top qualifier with 13th rank, also threw away a 4-2 lead to lose 4-6 (30-30, 30-30, 31-30, 28-29, 28-30) to Chinese Taipei's Tang Chin-Chun. With this, India's campaign in Antalya came to an end without a medal. The closest the team came to a podium finish was in the recurve men's and compound women's team events, but both units lost their respective bronze medal matches.

Compound heartbreak

The compound women's team had lost 238-239 to the USA by a single point. The recurve men's team was complete-

ly outplayed 1-5 by France. The compound men's team, once considered among the best in the world, crashed out in the very first round.

The compound mixed team also couldn't find synergy and exited in the quarterfinals, exposing their downward spiral.

In the recurve mixed team, things were worse as they couldn't even make it past the opening round.

The recurve women's team, after a promising start, folded in the quarterfinals.

In the individual compound category, Rishabh Yadav and Madhura Dhamangaonkar were the only bright spots, both reaching the quarterfinals before bowing out.

For India, the bigger concern lies in the alarming dip in form of top-ranked compound archers Abhishek Verma and Jyothi Surekha Vennam.

World Number 3 Jyothi, a consistent podium finisher until 2023, crashed out in the second round of 32, extending her medal drought beyond a year.

Her last medal came in April 2023 — a gold at the Shanghai World Cup. Since then, it's been a downward spiral for the Asian Games gold medalist and world championship silver medalist.

Two-time Asian Games silver medalist Verma was eliminated in the round of 16 by teammate Rishabh Yadav. Verma hasn't won a medal since June 2023 when he had won a gold in Medellin.

Selections sans vision

Questions will be asked on the team selection especially persisting with a Rai, who has shown little firepower in high-pressure events. Deepika too continues to choke against elite rivals, particularly Koreans.

Grilled Paneer & Veg Skewers with Mint Yoghurt Dip

PERFECT FOR: Light outdoor grilling when the rain has just stopped.

INGREDIENTS:

- 200g paneer, cubed
- 1 red pepper, chopped

- 1 courgette, sliced
- 1 red onion, quartered
- 1 tbsp olive oil
- Salt & pepper to taste
- ½ tsp paprika or chaat masala

MINT YOGHURT DIP:

- ½ cup plain yoghurt
- 10 mint leaves
- ½ tsp cumin powder
- Salt to taste
- METHOD:
- Thread paneer and veg onto skewers.
- Drizzle with olive oil, salt, pepper and paprika or chaat masala.
- Grill or cook on a non-stick pan until golden.
- Blend the dip ingredients and serve chilled.

Masala Chaas (Spiced Buttermilk)

Perfect for: Cooling your system while humidity builds.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup plain yoghurt
- 2 cups water
- ¼ tsp roasted cumin powder
- Salt to taste

- Pinch of black pepper
- Few mint or coriander leaves

METHOD:

- Blend yoghurt and water until frothy.
- Stir in spices and herbs.
- Serve chilled

- Oil for shallow frying

METHOD:

- Mix all ingredients into a thick batter.
- Drop spoonfuls onto a hot pan and fry until golden.
- Serve hot with green chutney.

Sweetcorn & Spinach Pakoras (Fritters)



Lemon Rice with Roasted Peanuts

PERFECT FOR: Light lunch on a cool, drizzly summer day.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 cup cooked basmati rice (cooled)
- 1 tbsp oil
- ½ tsp mustard seeds
- 1 dried red chilli
- 8-10 curry leaves
- ¼ tsp turmeric
- Juice of 1 lemon
- Salt to taste
- 2 tbsp roasted peanuts

METHOD:

- Heat oil and add mustard seeds, chilli and curry leaves.
- Add turmeric, then stir in rice, lemon juice and salt.
- Mix well and top with roasted peanuts.

Chilled Cucumber & Mint Soup

PERFECT FOR: Humid days when you don't want anything hot.

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 large cucumber, peeled & chopped
- 1 cup plain yoghurt
- 6 mint leaves

- Salt & black pepper
- Splash of lemon juice

METHOD:

- Blend all ingredients until smooth.
- Chill for 30 minutes before serving.
- Garnish with fresh mint.

You walk into a chemist shop with a simple prescription one tablet, maybe two. The pharmacist looks you and says, “We do not sell one tablet. You have to buy the whole strip.” There is no room for discussion. You are forced to pay for more than you need, knowing some of it will expire unused in a corner of your cabinet. You leave, annoyed, not just at the pharmacist but at a system built to bleed the sick.

This is not an isolated incident. It is how the pharmaceutical business operates, built not around patients but around profit. Why can you not buy a single tablet? Why does a medicine that costs ₹13 at the factory gate sell for ₹130 at the counter? How is this allowed in a country where so many struggle to access basic healthcare? People are routinely cornered into making impossible choices, medicine or meals, prescriptions or school fees. In a country that boasts of medical advancements and world-class drug manufacturing, the harsh truth is this: access to affordable medicine is a myth for the average Indian.

Generic drugs, meant to be the great equaliser, are no better. The transparency is nonexistent. Medicines manufactured cheaply are sold with little accountability. Chemist shops refuse to break a strip. Doctors scribble illegible prescriptions, sometimes linked to incentives from pharmaceutical companies. The authorities that are meant to regulate and protect, like the NPPA, have remained largely ineffective in fixing this rot. This is not a flaw in the system. This is the system. Designed to prioritise margins over lives, packaging over patients, and commerce over care.

Jan Aushadhi Kendras are being opened under Pradhan Mantri Bhartiya Janaushadhi Pariyojana claiming a huge saving to commoners ranging from 50-90 per cent on purchase of generic medicines from these about 10000 centres throughout the country with average monthly sale of just ₹1.50 lakhs per month for each centre. Much more can be achieved by fixing a maximum trade margin on all medicines and medical-consumables including generic medicines of say 30 per cent between ex-factory price and Maximum-Retail-Price (MRP).

EX-FACTORY PRICES OF DIFFERENT BRANDED MEDICINES FOR SAME BASIC SALT HAS VAST DIFFERENCE. BRANDED MEDICINES FROM DIFFERENT RENOWNED COMPANIES ARE PRICED WITH HEAVY DIFFERENCE DEPENDING ON POPULARITY OF BRAND

Same is case with thousands of generic medicines manufactured by various companies Even branded medicines had varying trade-margins with a box of 10 strips of 10 capsules each of Bifilac-HP with total printed MRP of rupees 2300 per box was available at rupees 1350 per box. World Health Organisation established that essential drugs in India with

lowest printed MRP are exorbitantly priced over manufacturing-cost followed by abnormally high trade-margin between ex-factory price and MRP. Same holds good for other medical-consumables like a box of 200 Accu-Check Safe T Pro Uno single-use lancing device with printed MRP of ₹2200 used to be available at just ₹600 only.

Drug-manufacturers at times pack just eight lozenges per strip of commonly advertised cough-medicines instead of usually ten because consumers judge by price per strip rather than per lozenge.

Many drug-manufacturers have started packing medicines in strips of fifteen rather than earlier ten to boost up sale because most chemists sell complete medicine-strip rather than cutting the strip to sell in loose. National Pharmaceutical Pricing Authority (NPPA) should direct all medicines to be packed in units of 1, 2, 5, 10, 20, 50, 100, 200, 500, 1000 and higher multiples unless permission. Name of medicine is usually printed just once on a side of medicine-strip. Wrapping-foil must be so designed that name of medicine may appear for each packed tablet/capsule with name of medicine also embossed/printed on each tablet/capsule.

Ex-factory prices of different branded medicines for same basic salt has vast difference. Branded medicines from different renowned companies are priced with heavy difference depending on popularity of brand like Calmpose and Valium-5 both having Diazepam-5 as basic salt have huge price-difference. Medicines are put in different categories for price-regulation with Calmpose and Valium-5 put in a category where there is no price-regulation. System of having multiple categorisation for medicines must be removed because patients have to take prescribed medicine irrespective of their categorisation.

A study conducted by a prominent newspaper in the year 2018 revealed that five chemist-shops around Post Graduate Institute of Medical Education and Research (PGIMER) at Chandigarh were selling a particular medicine having price ranging from ₹255 to ₹1550. NPPA should devise a mechanism whereby drug-companies may be allowed to have some basic profit-margin on all types of drugs irrespective of their categorisation allowing



any price-revision only once in a year say in January or April every year. Madras High Court once directed Income Tax Department to submit details of claims made by pharmaceutical-companies towards tax-deduction for gifts made to doctors. Any type of gifts by drug-companies must be banned.

Paying commission to medical practitioners by pathological laboratories, investigating centers and hospitals should be criminal offence to ensure economical medical investigations. Private hospitals should be directed not to take any share from consulting/visiting fees of medical practitioners. Some upper limit should be fixed for consultation-fees of medical practitioners. Since wholesale medicine-market of Bhagirath Palace (Delhi) has virtually turned to be a retail market giving 20-25 per cent discount even on single strips of medicines, tenders can be invited for opening chemist-

THE WHOPPING PRICE DIFFERENCE

There is a huge trade-margin specially on generic medicines considered to be economical substitute of branded medicines. A box of 10 strips is at times available with distributors at about one-tenth of printed MRP. Following table depicts comparison of wholesale price and Maximum-Retail-Price (MRP) of generic medicines

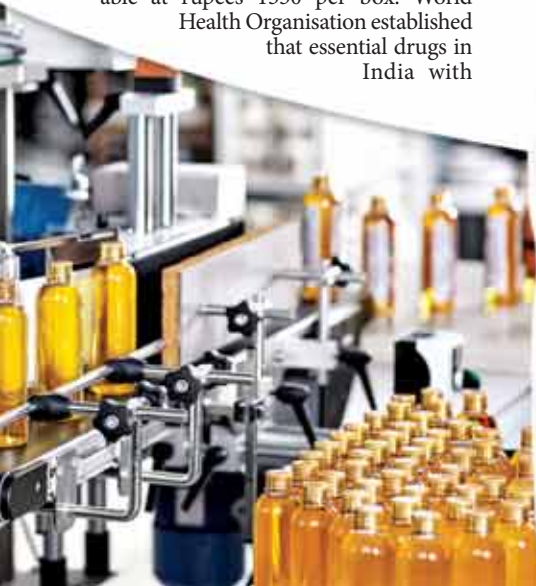

Mahtab raised issue of generic drugs in Lok Sabha on 19.07.2019, rightly demanding an inquiry to find out the efficacy of generic drugs quoting a book-study that Indian drug manufacturers were producing quality generic medicines for US and European countries with sub-standard generic medicines marketed in domestic market. NPPA should ensure that generic medicines sold in Indian markets are of export-quality. Export of world-class generic medicines can provide country adequate foreign-exchange and reputation because of Indian generic medicines are economical than foreign-branded medicines. Lucknow bench of Allahabad High Court in the year 2018 imposed fine on three doctors for illegible hand-writing on injury-reports. Odisha High Court on 13.08.2020 advised doctors to write legible prescriptions preferably in capital letters. Medical-practitioners should compulsorily issue computerised prescriptions. Union Health Ministry should develop user-friendly softwares separately for hospitals, pathological laboratories and medical practitioners providing unique ID for each patient so that complete medical history may be available even online to the patient. Dual pricing must not be allowed in health-services including for pathological and biochemical tests for normal patients and those covered under Central Government Health scheme. All hospitals getting land at subsidised cost/lease from Governments should be declared as public-authorities under section 2(h) of RTI Act, or else pay market-price of land provided to these hospitals at market rates.

BETWEEN HILLS AND HEAVEN

Wheels may take you there, but what stays is the stillness between the stones. Through the lens of **PANKAJ KUMAR**, journey into Ranakpur, a place where light, shadow and silence hold their own space

LOCALS AND DAILY LIFE

The villagers of Ranakpur often double up as caretakers, storytellers and guides. Most speak a mix of Hindi and Mewari. A few understand Gujarati. English is heard rarely, but hands and eyes bridge that gap. During the off-season, which stretches from May to early July, the crowd thins. You see the temple stand quieter and the local boys play cricket near the steps without being told to stop.

BY TEAM AGENDA

Ranakpur is a place that reveals itself slowly, as if testing whether you're ready to see it. As the train halts at *Falna*, and the road begins to rise towards the hills, the noise of the world starts to fade. You look out the window, fields stretch flat at first, then give way to forests, ochre ridges, and occasional temple spires that catch the light. This is not a journey measured in hours. It is felt in pauses, glances and stillness. Located in the Aravalli hills of Rajasthan, *Ranakpur* holds its own presence. Life here moves with purpose, without urgency.

Where Marble Tells a Story

The Jain Temple, built in the 15th century, rises through

detail. From the outside, it resembles a stone garden, layered, measured. Once inside, it shifts, becoming a forest of pillars, each carved differently. Light enters through carved windows and dances across the floor. Calm fills the space. You feel invited.

Every surface has been touched by a hand, shaped by tools guided by skill and belief. There are carvings of gods, dancers, vines and stories that spiral upward across the domes.

The centre of the temple holds attention. Time is measured here by movement of light and feet, by the way heads tilt upward when people forget their cameras and simply look.

Outside the Temple Walls

Step beyond the temple, and *Ranakpur* continues. It is a living landscape. Hills curve in the distance. Streams appear after turns in the road. Banyan trees spread their roots into stone. Monkeys move through branches like wind.

And in quiet moments, you may spot a lone deer or the flash of a peacock crossing a village path. The nearby forest area offers walking trails once

used by traders and monks. Nothing here is staged. Yet every stone has history beneath it, every path leads to a story someone remembers. Small shrines, some forgotten by guidebooks, appear without announcement. A walk becomes a meditation. In the nearby town, life continues at its own pace. You see potters shaping clay, women drying red chillies on rooftops, children chasing tyres across open ground. Local food stalls serve hot kachoris and jaggery-sweetened tea. You sit, not for the taste, but to stay a little longer.

A Place That Respects Time

There's something about *Ranakpur* that slows thought. Maybe it's the absence of noise. Maybe it's the way the mountains curve like a protective hand. Temples stand without barriers. Paths wind without interruption. You hear the sound of dry leaves under foot, the steady turning of prayer beads, the simple flow of a hand sweeping stone steps. In the evenings, the sky shifts into warm gold and birds return to the trees. You watch villagers carry water pots over shoulders, their outlines lit by the last light. No one hurries. You realise you haven't either.

A Paradise Preserved

To call *Ranakpur* peaceful is not enough. It is precise. What remains here is presence. The hills have seen kingdoms rise and vanish, yet their contours remain unchanged. Nature, architecture, belief, coexist here without tension. This is a place where you feel small in the best way possible.

You return not with a checklist of sights, but with a shift in pace, a quieter breath, a clearer sense of space. You don't remember your trip by date or distance. You remember it by light falling on carved stone, by the silence between temple bells, by the way the road looked when it turned one last time toward the station. What if the journey is about reaching a place and discovering how a destination like Ranakpur leaves its mark on you?

GETTING THERE: KEY TRAIN ROUTES AND CITY CONNECTIONS

Ranakpur is not served by an airport or major highways. The journey involves a train to Falna and a quiet road into the hills, perfect for those seeking distance from noise.

- From Delhi, the Ashram Express and Bhuj Express reach Falna overnight.
- From Mumbai, the Aravali Express traces a scenic path across western India.
- From Ahmedabad, Vadodara, Surat, Pune, Bangalore, and Chennai, regular trains connect to Falna.
- Falna to Ranakpur is approximately a one-hour drive by

taxi or private car. Local buses also run, though less frequently.

Ranakpur stays quiet. It welcomes slowly, through cool marble floors, winding village roads, and soft-spoken locals. As one of Rajasthan's lesser-known places, it lets you explore at your own pace whether it's sitting by the river, walking to the nearby Sadri town or watching the hills change colour at sunset. You leave with photos maybe a morning memory or a name someone told you to remember. And that stays with you.

Living Slowly in Village Peace

In India's villages, travellers find quiet living, local food, rich stories and a simpler way, says **SAKSHI PRIYA**

In an age where travel often means curated experiences and crowded landmarks, a quieter shift is taking place. A growing number of travellers are heading into India's villages, not for a getaway, but for something real. They're choosing mud homes over boutique hotels, morning cowbells over alarm clocks, and home-cooked lentils over buffet spreads.

Across India, villages are opening their doors and hearts to people eager to live life as the locals do. Travellers from metros and even foreign countries are packing light and stepping into the shoes of rural families. They're wearing what villagers wear, light cotton dhotis and lungis in the South, handwoven phaneks and innaphis in the North East or colourful ghagras and dupattas in Rajasthan. It's a gesture of respect and often an attempt to understand life without filters.

Foreigners especially are showing deep interest in staying in one place for weeks, sometimes months. In states like *Himachal Pradesh*, *Uttarakhand* and *Sikkim*, it's common to meet travellers from Europe or Japan helping with farming, learning to make roti on a chulha or walking with village women to col-



lect firewood. They sit with elders under banyan trees, drink tea from steel tumblers and eat what the locals eat, rice with mustard oil chutney, bajra rotis with curd or fresh bamboo shoot curry depending on the region. Many simplify their daily routines.

They rise with the sun, sleep early and immerse themselves in village life. They learn how to milk cows by hand, spending gentle moments with the animals, discovering a connection often lost in city life. Watching a potter shape clay or joining women

grinding spices by hand offers a grounding experience. For many, it is a revelation to see how happiness thrives without endless material needs. In the North East, places like *Ziro* in *Arunachal Pradesh* and *Reiek* in *Mizoram* have become popular among those who want to experience close-knit tribal culture.

In *Ziro*, travellers often stay in wooden houses on stilts, walk through rice fields and witness how the Apatani tribe practices sustainable living. They eat smoked meat, watch dances performed during seed-sowing ceremonies and often return home with a different sense of connection. In rural *Thanjavur* or *Kumbakonam*, guests take part in morning prayers at temples, eat off banana leaves and join the household in making rangolis. In *Karnataka*, travellers live with Lambani tribes, dress in their bright traditional clothes and attend local fairs. Even *Kerala's* tribal hamlets are offering home stays where visitors learn to cook jackfruit dishes or tap toddy. For those tired of schedules and selfies, there's something refreshing in letting go and letting the village show you how to live again.

LONG STAYS AND DEEP BONDS

Foreigners too are drawn to India's rural charm. Many end up staying longer than planned, charmed by the pace of life and the openness of the people. Some find themselves living in Ladakhi villages, learning how to insulate homes with mud and straw, while others join cultural immersion programmes in *Karnataka's* tribal hamlets. It is common to see them waking up at dawn to join morning chores the kitchen.

The journey from loneliness to this enriching state is open to all of us. It's about finding inner peace and purpose, then sharing that calm with the world

From Loneliness to Solitude: A Journey Back to the Self



High in the Himalayas, i saw a lone yogi sitting on the edge of a cliff, watching the early sun scatter gold over the snow-capped peaks. The wind carried the scent of pine and silence. For days he had neither spoken nor heard another voice. Yet, in that very silence, it appeared to me he felt no lack. Instead, a fullness I saw — so deep, so intimate — embraced him. He was alone, but not lonely. This was not isolation. This was presence. This was solitude.

That yogi could be anyone — perhaps even you or me — when we pause our lives and begin the deeper journey inward. I remember a time when I stood on a quiet hillside in Uttarakhand, seeking a break from the chaos of life. My phone had no signal, the roads were far behind, and the only sound was the gurgling of a distant stream. At first, the silence felt oppressive.

There were no distractions, no one to talk to, no list to check off. Just me. And in that stillness, something stirred. What I thought was loneliness slowly started shifting into something profound — a sense of being accompanied by God, by nature, and by my own soul. That was the beginning of my personal pilgrimage from loneliness to solitude.

Sri Ramana Maharshi once said, “Solitude is not about being in a forest; it is being free from the noise of the mind.” How true. Loneliness is often misunderstood as physical aloneness, but it's really about disconnection — from our purpose, from meaning, and most importantly, from ourselves.

Guillermo Maldonado beautifully captured this with his words: “Loneliness is not lack of company, loneliness is lack of purpose.” We can be surrounded by people, and yet feel completely alone. And conversely, we can be physically isolated, but feel vibrantly connected — to our dharma, to nature, to the divine.

The journey from loneliness to solitude is not always easy, but it is deeply rewarding. It begins with acceptance. The first step is to stop resisting the silence. Most of us fear being alone because we're afraid of what we might find within — the hurts we've buried, the dreams we've abandoned, the truths we've silenced. But once we sit with those parts of ourselves, like a compassionate friend, something magical happens. The inner noise lessens. Clarity arises.

In the sacred mountains — be it Kailash, Kedarnath, or the quiet hills of Kumaon — many sages sought this kind of solitude. Not to escape the world, but to align more deeply with it. Solitude offers space for integration. It's where the soul breathes.

In solitude, prayer becomes deeper. Not a request, but a communion. I remember during my journey to Bhavishya Badri, I sat under a deodar tree, chanting softly. My words were not aimed at any deity in the sky but felt like echoes from within. In that moment, God was not a being outside, but a presence within and around. That moment of realisation - that I was not truly alone — transformed my understanding of solitude forever. Here's how you too can walk this journey:

Find your space of silence. It could be a room, a temple, a mountaintop, or even a walk at dawn. Make it a ritual.

Replace noise with nature. Let the sound of rivers, birds, and wind remind you of the sacred rhythms of life. Nature holds you without judgment.

Connect with purpose. Ask yourself gently — What stirs my soul? What can I give? Even one small act aligned with your truth can dissolve loneliness.

Speak to God — then listen. Prayer isn't always words. Sometimes it's tears, or just sitting in awe. In silence, answers come without asking.

Be your own companion. Read scriptures, journal your thoughts, or write poetry. Learn to enjoy your own presence. This isn't about turning your back on the world. In fact, solitude prepares you for deeper engagement with life. When you know how to sit with yourself, you stop expecting others to fill your emptiness. You begin to offer love, not from need, but from wholeness.

In solitude, you realise you are never truly alone. The mountains and sky are with you. Your breath is with you. And God, quiet and constant, walks with you at every step. So, if you're feeling lonely, don't run from it. Sit. Listen. Let it lead you inward. There you will find not emptiness, but eternity. And when you return from that sacred place of solitude, you'll carry its peace like a fragrance, touching every life around you.
