



## Four tigers found dead in Karnataka

In what has emerged as one of the most alarming wildlife incidents in recent years, four tigers—including an adult tigress and her four cubs—were found dead in a single day in Karnataka. The incident has sent shockwaves across conservation circles, wildlife departments, and policy forums, sparking calls for urgent action as well as introspection.

The carcasses were discovered in the Hoogyam Range of the Male Mahadeshwara Hills Wildlife Division, Chamarajanagar circle—a region long regarded as critical tiger habitat. Karnataka, home to 563 tigers according to the last All India Tiger Estimation, is often lauded as a flagship success story of Project Tiger. Yet this very success comes with its own complexities: as populations recover and densities rise, tigers inevitably move beyond



protected area boundaries into human-dominated landscapes, where the risks of conflict, poisoning, and electrocution are all heightened.

Initial field assessments suggest that at least some of the deaths may have been caused by electrocution from illegal fencing or power lines, while others could be linked to deliberate poisoning. However, the precise causes will only be confirmed after detailed postmortem and forensic analysis.

Taking serious note of the

matter, the National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) issued an Office Memorandum dated June 26, 2025, constituting a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to probe the circumstances comprehensively. The SIT comprises Harini V, Assistant Inspector General (NTCA), Regional Office Bengaluru, and Thenmozhi V, Additional Inspector General of Forests, Regional Deputy Director (South Region) of the Wildlife Crime Control Bureau.

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## Student raped by seniors in Kolkata law college

The Kolkata Police in the small hours of Friday arrested Manojit Mishra a Trinamool Congress Chhatra Parishad leader and a newly graduated lawyer on charges of raping one of his juniors inside the guard room of the South Calcutta Law College, barely 500 metres from the Kasba Police Station. Mishra is a student leader, allegedly serving as a link between the college and the TMC leadership.

Apart from Manojit police arrested two of his associates Pratik Mukherjee and Jahid Ahmed, both third year students, who stood guard at, when Mishra committed the dastardly act.

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## Noida horror: Elderly locked up in dungeons

In a shocking and deeply disturbing incident, at least 42 elderly people were rescued from an "illegal" old-age home after a police raid at the institution found living in inhuman and abusive conditions. Some women tied up and many of the residents holed up in "basement-like" rooms without clothes. While most of the elderly men were not wearing clothes, the women were given partial clothing. Many of them were found with urine-stained or feces-stained clothes.

A joint team of the Uttar Pradesh State Women Commission (UPSWC), Noida Police, the Social Welfare Department, and the District Probation Welfare Department

carried out a surprise inspection, found the old-age home was found in a deplorable condition and subsequently sealed the premises. The rescue operation was launched after a disturbing video surfaced on social media, showing an elderly woman tied up inside the facility.

A video of the poor state of the old-age home, which went viral, was also recently sent to the Social Welfare Department of Lucknow. The short clip showed an elderly woman kept in a room with her hands tied. Soon after, the State Women's Commission and the Noida police raided the home on Thursday and rescued 39 senior citizens.

When the officials reached the spot, they found many elderly people tied up in their clothes and locked in rooms.

Meenakshi Bharala, a women's commission member, said the Anand Niketan Vridha Seva Ashram at C-5, Sector 55, Noida was an illegal old-age home.

"During the raid, an elderly woman was found tied up while other elderly people were locked in basement-like rooms," she said. Some men were found locked in rooms resembling basements, many without clothes. Women were also found barely dressed. It

felt like they were living in conditions worse than hell," Bharala said.

This old age home is completely illegal. There were 42 elderly people living in the ashram, out of which three elderly people will be shifted to an old-age home run by the social welfare department on Friday and the rest will be shifted to other Government-approved old-age homes in the next five days, she added. Bharala said the old-age home will be sealed with the help of the administration.

Additionally, officials found there was no proper staff to take care of the senior citizens.

During the inspection, it was revealed that there were no qualified medical or caregiving staff on duty.

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## India rejects arbitration ruling on IWT

India has rejected a Court of Arbitration ruling that issued a "supplemental award" on its competence concerning the Kishenganga and Ratle hydroelectric projects in Jammu and Kashmir. The dams are being built on the Indus river system, and the development came after India had paused the Indus Waters Treaty following the Pahalgalam terror attack in April.

Calling the move a "challenge at Pakistan's behest," India called the ruling another desperate attempt by Pakistan to escape account-

ability for its role as the global epicentre of terrorism.

A statement released by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said that India never recognised the existence in law of the so-called Court of Arbitration and that the body is in itself a violation of the Indus Waters Treaty, a key water-sharing agreement between India and Pakistan, which was brokered by the World Bank and consequently any proceedings before this forum and any award or decision taken by it are also for that reason illegal and per se void.

"Today, the illegal Court of Arbitration, purportedly constituted under the Indus Waters Treaty 1960, albeit in brazen violation of it, has issued what it characterises as a supplemental award" on its competence concerning the Kishenganga and Ratle hydroelectric projects in the Indian Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir," it said.

## High alert in J and K

With the annual Amarnath Yatra set to commence on July 3, security forces in Jammu and Kashmir are on high alert, intensifying search operations in the Bihali area of Basantgarh, Udhampur district, to neutralise a group of Pakistan-based Jaish-e-Mohammad (JeM) terrorists.

One highly trained JeM terrorist, identified as Haider, alias Maulvi, from Pakistan, was killed in a fierce encounter with security forces on Thursday, while three of his associates remain trapped in the dense, forested terrain of the Basantgarh belt.

The dead body of the terrorist could not be retrieved from the encounter site on Thursday due to adverse weather conditions in the upper reaches.

Despite challenging weather conditions, including incessant rain and dense fog, which temporarily halted the operation late Thursday evening, the search operations resumed on Friday morning.

Security forces have deployed advanced drones, sniffer dogs, and additional reinforcements to tighten the cordon and eliminate the remaining three terrorists, who are believed to be heavily armed and trained in jungle warfare.

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## India-China discuss de-escalation, border row

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh has proposed that the lingering border dispute between India and China should be solved under a structured roadmap comprising steps to deescalate tensions along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) and rejuvenate the existing mechanism to demarcate the borders.

He mooted these suggestions to his Chinese counterpart Admiral Dong Jun during bilateral talks on the sidelines of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) conclave in Qingdao, China on Thursday. The talks were held with a focus on maintaining peace and tranquility at the LAC.

Rajnath Singh said both the countries should solve the "complex issues" under a structured roadmap comprising steps to de-escalate tensions along the frontiers and rejuvenate the existing mechanism to demarcate the borders. He emphasised the need to create "good neighbourly conditions" to achieve the best mutual benefits and called for "taking action on

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the ground" to bridge the "trust deficit" resulting from the 2020 eastern Ladakh border standoff, according to an Indian readout.

Rajnath Singh also briefed Dong on the Pahalgalam terror attack targeting innocent civilians, and India's Operation Sindoor to dismantle the terrorist networks in Pakistan,

the defence ministry said in New Delhi.

The two ministers agreed to continue consultations at various levels to achieve progress on issues related to disengagement, de-escalation, border management and eventual delimitation through existing mechanisms, it said. The meeting came amid efforts

by both New Delhi and Beijing to reset their ties following an understanding last October to end the military standoff along the LAC in eastern Ladakh.

In a social media post, Rajnath Singh described the talks with Dong as "constructive". "We had a constructive and forward-looking exchange of views on issues pertaining to bilateral relations. Expressed my happiness on the restarting of the Kailash Mansarovar Yatra after a gap of nearly six years," he said.

"It is incumbent on both sides to maintain this positive momentum and avoid adding new complexities in the bilateral relationship," he added.

The defence ministry said both the leaders held in-depth discussions on the need to maintain peace and tranquility along the Indo-China border.

It said Rajnath Singh acknowledged the work being undertaken by both sides to bring back a semblance of normalcy in the bilateral relations.

"He highlighted the necessity of solving the complex issues through a structured roadmap of permanent engagement and de-escalation," it said in the readout.

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## MP CM motorcade stranded at night over adulterated fuel

A motorcade arranged to take Madhya Pradesh Chief Minister Mohan Yadav to an industrial conclave in Ratlam, faced an unexpected and troubling setback late on Thursday night, 15 hours before the event was scheduled to begin.

The convoy, consisting of 19 SUVs, was stranded just meters from a petrol pump in Dosigaon after adulterated diesel, mixed with water, was filled into the vehicles. This caused widespread panic among the officials and raised serious concerns over the situation.

The convoy was part of the arrangements made to take CM Yadav, who was expected to arrive by air in Ratlam on

Friday for the much-anticipated industrial conclave. However, the vehicles ground to a halt shortly after refueling at Bharat Petrol Pump, rendering them immobile and unable to proceed further.

The officials reached the spot confirmed that the vehicles had been filled with diesel mixed with water into the vehicles at Bharat Petrol Pump. As a result, the vehicles got stranded, and repairs were immediately initiated. A dri-

ver, Shubham Parmar, who was part of the convoy, expressed his shock, saying, "It's unprecedented to find water in diesel, and this caused an immediate breakdown of the vehicles."

Mechanics worked throughout the night, with fuel tanks being removed and emptied, and repairs were carried out under intense pressure to get the convoy operational again. Despite the technical setbacks, authorities quickly arranged alternative vehicles to ensure the Chief Minister's convoy could be transported from the airstrip to the industrial conclave venue in time.

However, questions have arisen regarding how such a situation occurred in the first place.

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## No fuel, fines soon for overage vehicles in Capital

Race yourself for long queues and chaos from July 1 at fuel stations. Beginning next month, fuel stations are prohibited from dispensing fuel to diesel vehicles older than ten years and petrol vehicles older than 15 years, regardless of their State of registration. This measure is aimed at reducing air pollution in the National Capital Region (NCR).

Given the challenge of implementing this strict measure, Delhi Transport Department, Delhi Police and Commission for Air Quality Management (CAQM) on Friday held a meeting to ensure smooth roll out.

Vehicle owners found violating the regulation will face strict penalties with a fine of ₹10,000 for four-wheelers and

₹5,000 for two-wheelers, in addition to towing and parking charges. Additionally, owners will be required to sign an undertaking stating that the vehicle will no longer be used or parked in any public place in Delhi and will be removed

from the National Capital Territory. According to officials, End-of-life vehicles detected at fuel stations or found parked at public places will be impounded and a penalty of ₹10,000 imposed on four-wheeler owners and

₹5,000 on two-wheeler owners starting July 1.

As per the VAHAN database, Delhi alone has over 62 lakh End-of-Life vehicles, including 41 lakh two-wheelers and 18 lakh four-wheelers.

# Delhi residents experience sunny, humid Friday

With the monsoon delayed in the national Capital, residents experienced a sunny and humid Friday under clear skies. Despite forecasts of rain and thunderstorms over the past week, the much-anticipated monsoon continued to elude Delhi.

The India Meteorological Department (IMD) had initially predicted that the monsoon would reach Delhi on June 24, but that did not happen. It was then expected to arrive on Wednesday, but once again, the forecast did not materialise. The IMD revised its prediction, stating that the monsoon will likely hit the Capital on Thursday, but it failed again.

It's not just a one-off mistake either. Time and again, the IMD has struggled to forecast Delhi's weather with any meaningful accuracy. From missing sudden storms that blow roofs off metro stations to underestimating rainfall that paralyses entire city, India's official weather agency finds itself repeatedly caught off guard.

This time, IMD predicts that the current weather pattern is likely to change in the next 3 to 4 days. The east-west monsoon trough is expected to shift northward, while the anti-cyclonic ridge is predicted to weaken, both of which could allow the monsoon to enter Delhi. However, no official date has been predicted this time.

The long-period average (LPA) date for the monsoon's arrival in Delhi is June 27. Last

year, the monsoon reached the city on June 28, a day later than the average. In previous years, the monsoon arrived on June 25 in 2023, June 30 in 2022 and as late as July 13 in 2021, according to the IMD.

The weather department noted that the city experienced cloudy conditions for the past three to four days. However, only light to very light rainfall occurred in a few areas.

The IMD added that Delhi experienced persistent south-easterly winds during this period due to the presence of an east-west seasonal trough and a convergence line running to the south of the city, up to about two km above the surface level. As a result, there was consistent moisture incursion into the city, leading to low to medium cloud formation and scattered

light rainfall. However, the mid- and upper-level wind and circulation patterns were dominated

by an anti-cyclonic circulation or ridge over the region, which has been inhibiting the advance

of the monsoon towards Delhi. The same pattern was observed over southwest

Uttar Pradesh and adjoining parts of Haryana and Rajasthan, the IMD said.

This pattern, however, is expected to change over the next three to four days with the northward movement of the seasonal east-west trough and the weakening of the mid- and upper-level anti-cyclonic circulation and ridge over the region, the department added.

Typically, the southwest monsoon reaches Delhi around June 27-30. Meanwhile, the national capital on Friday recorded a maximum temperature of 39.1 degrees Celsius, 1.9 notches below the season's average, according to the IMD.

The minimum temperature was 29 degrees Celsius, 1.1 notches above the season's average, with the relative humidity was 72 per cent at 5.30 pm.

The IMD forecast predicted cloudy skies with moderate rain and thunderstorms with rain for Saturday and issued a yellow alert.

The MCD has cleared over 1.93 lakh metric tonnes of silt from drains across the national capital, completing nearly 92.5 per cent of its desilting target ahead of the monsoon. A total of 12,892 small drains and 350 major drains have been covered across the city's 12 zones, according to data compiled by the civic body. From January 1 to June 23 this year, a total of 1,56,148.67 metric tonnes of silt has been removed from large drains across Delhi.

The south zone recorded the highest removal of 36,072.56 MT of silt, followed by Najafgarh with 34,541.65 MT and west Delhi with 20,251.49 MT.

## Gangster Manjit Mahal nephew gunned down in gang war

Panic spread in outer north Delhi's, Bawana area, when a 43-year-old man was shot dead in front of his daughter who also suffered a bullet injury in the attack. Unidentified men shot at them while they were out on a morning walk on Friday morning. According to the police, the victim, identified as Deepak, is believed to be the nephew of gangster Manjit Mahal.



This incident is being seen as another episode in the ongoing gang war in Delhi, with city police struggling to contain the violence. Police suspect the case seems to be of gang war between Kapil Sangwan alias Nandu gang and Manjit Mahal gang. Kapil Sangwan is said to be stationed in London, United Kingdom and has a network of his gang spread across Delhi. However, Deepak had no recent contact with Mahal and has no prior involvement in any criminal case, a source in the police said.

The incident occurred when Deepak, a share trader, had gone for a morning walk with his 10-year-old daughter and his father was sitting outside their house. Deepak was shot dead by unidentified assailants just 700-800 metres away from his home, a senior police officer said.

"Deepak suffered multiple bullet injuries and died on the spot. His daughter received a gunshot wound on her hand during the attack. Both were immediately taken to a hospital, where Deepak was declared dead and his daughter was said to be out of danger," the officer added.

"Initial investigation suggests that the shooters knew all the entry and exit routes of his

house. They had likely conducted proper reconnaissance of the area and were waiting for the right time," a police source said.

He said that the moment Deepak came out of his house and walked some distance, the shooters approached and shot multiple times from a close range. A case has been registered, and teams have been formed to identify and nab the attackers. The motive behind the shooting is yet to be ascertained, police said. Forensic teams have examined the crime scene and the CCTV footage from the nearby area is being scanned, the officer said.

Sources in the police said that they are investigating the entire incident from all angles, including the long-standing feud between Mahal and United Kingdom-based gangster Nandu. "Deepak was a share trader by profession and was a nephew of Mahal as well. Teams are checking what led to the shootout if it was a property-related case of gang activities," said the source. He is survived by his wife, two children and parents.

However, sources also said that no gang war had taken place in the last couple of months between the Nandu gang and the Manjeet Mahal

## 45-point plan launched to rejuvenate Yamuna

The Delhi Government has launched a comprehensive 45-point action plan to rejuvenate the Yamuna River within the next two years with the involvement of multiple agencies to deal with challenges of sewerage treatment and trapping drains flowing in the river.

The plan, approved by Chief Minister Rekha Gupta, will be primarily carried by the Delhi Jal Board (DJB), Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC) Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD), Irrigation and Flood Control department and Delhi Development Authority (DDA) among others. The ongoing projects for Yamuna cleaning and rejuvenation and the new plans and projects have been clubbed together with specific deadlines under 10 working heads, they said.

The ambitious action plan was approved in a DJB meeting headed by the chief minister earlier this month. The plan, the officials said, largely involves projects under main heads — sewage management, drain trapping, solid waste management, storm water management and adding flow to the Yamuna River.

According to a recently published report, Delhi contributes a staggering 76 per cent of the Yamuna's total pollution load despite accounting for just two per cent of its length. To add flow into the river from three STPs — Coronation Pillar, Yamuna Vihar and Okhla (sewage treatment plant) STP — the DJB has to

create a conveyance system. It is mandatory to add treated water back into the river to maintain flow. The deadline for this work is September 2026. The Okhla STP is the largest such STP in Asia, the officials claimed.

The Yamuna in Delhi flows for 52 kilometres, of which a critical 22 km segment from Wazirabad to Okhla is highly polluted and has become the focal point of multiple planning and policy efforts.

As per the Government document, the I&FC will be adding floating skimmers on the Yamuna River and Najafgarh Drain. These devices are used to collect floating debris in a body of water. Floating pontoons on each of the major drain having an outfall in the river will be done by this month end. The MCD has been directed to monitor and prevent the falling of solid waste in drains and sub-drains.

In addition to that, the DDA has been asked to clear any waste dumps on the Yamuna floodplains. The action plan also has projects regarding enforcement by the land-owning agency to remove encroachments from floodplains and drains by November this year. A crucial project for Yamuna cleaning, the Interceptor Sewage Project (ISP) is also part of the long-term plan. The DJB has for the past few years been working on this, which entails trapping all the drains and diverting the wastewater flowing in them to the nearby STP.

Cleaning of the Yamuna is one of the promises of the Government and in the first Budget, the water and sewerage sector has been given ₹9,000 crore.

## LG approves proposal to link police stations to hospitals

With the objective of providing quicker, more efficient medical and forensic support to crime victims, Delhi Lt Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena has approved a proposal to link and re-distribution of police stations to hospitals across the national Capital.

This move will provide the much needed succour to victims involved in cases such as rape, road accidents and other emergencies requiring immediate medico-legal intervention.

This re-distribution is being implemented under Section 194(3) of the BNSS Act, 2023, and will serve to better align police stations with hospitals equipped to manage medico-legal cases and conduct post-mortem examinations.

The aim is to ensure that victims of crimes and accidents receive immediate medical attention and that medico-legal

procedures are conducted promptly and efficiently, minimising procedural delays that can hamper justice delivery.

A statement from Raj Niwas on Friday said in a major reform envisaged under the three new Criminal Justice Acts, Delhi Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena has approved a significant proposal concerning the linking and re-distribution of police stations to hospitals across the National Capital Territory for the purpose of handling Medico Legal Cases (MLCs) and conducting Post Mortem Examinations (PMEs).

The approval follows an extensive review and collaboration between Delhi Police, the Home Department and the Health and Family Welfare Department of the GNCTD.

The process began with Delhi Police submitting a consolidated list of police stations along with their corresponding designated hospitals, as well as alternative

hospitals. The Health and Family Welfare Department, thereafter, formulated a comprehensive proposal addressing the current needs and challenges in medico-legal case management.

A dedicated Committee was formed under the Health and Family Welfare Department to analyse and recommend an optimal linkage between police stations and hospitals, aiming to eliminate delays in providing urgent medical treatment and facilitating the medico-legal examination of victims.

The Committee's recommendations were then thoroughly examined by the Home Department in consultation with both Delhi Police and Health officials to ensure feasibility and effectiveness.

Following this, the draft notification outlining the re-distribution was vetted by the Law Department of GNCTD, which reviewed and suggested necessary amendments to align it with legal provisions.

## CM flags off 105 new orange-coloured DEVI electric buses

Delhi Chief Minister Rekha Gupta on Friday flagged off 105 new orange-coloured DEVI (Delhi EV Inter-connector) electric buses and inaugurated the newly built Sector A9 depot in Narela, calling it a step towards cleaner and more efficient public transport for the Capital.

The Chief Minister said the depot was completed in just 90 days and claimed it reflects the BJP Government's commitment to deliver on promises made to Delhi residents. She also attacked the previous AAP Government, accusing it of pushing Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC) into losses and fostering a corrupt system.

"Buses are Delhi's lifeline. But under the previous Government, routes were cut, buses reduced and corruption seeped in," she said. Referring to the CAG report, Gupta claimed

that DTC had incurred losses amounting to ₹ 65,000 crore during the earlier regime.

She alleged that even the free bus ride scheme for women was marred by corruption and panic buttons were installed "just for show". Highlighting features of the new nine-metre-long electric buses, Gupta said they are equipped with air conditioning, panic buttons and real-time monitoring systems. "When we removed paper tickets and moved to cards, AAP spread lies that women would no longer travel for free. But the move was only to curb corruption," she said.

Meanwhile, Delhi Transport Minister Pankaj Singh, who was present at the event, said the previous Government denied people their right to better buses. "These buses should have arrived by last monsoon, but the former Government failed to deliver. Today, the BJP is fulfilling that promise," he said.

He said that earlier DEVI buses were green in colour and this is the first time an entire fleet of orange-coloured buses has been introduced. This adds more vibrancy and we will continue increasing their numbers, as we have been doing since the launch of the DEVI buses.

Delhi BJP leader Yogender Chandolia dismissed AAP's claim that this was just a rebranding exercise. "If these were AAP's buses, they would have been on the roads months ago. These are new buses, purchased and brought in under the BJP. AAP never procured small electric buses — they reused old ones," he said.

Chandolia said the new compact DEVI buses, with seating for 23 and standing space for 17 passengers, are ideal for navigating Delhi's narrow lanes and will benefit people. "This is the real Rekha Gupta Model — clean, modern and efficient public transport," he added.

## Chhatarpur to get 80 MGD water treatment plant: Verma

Delhi Public Works Department (PWD) and Water Minister, Parvesh Sahib Singh Verma, on Friday, announced the development of an 80 MGD (Million Gallons per Day) Water Treatment Plant (WTP) in South Delhi's Chhatarpur.

The plant will draw raw water from Himachal Pradesh, ensuring a reliable and clean water supply for thousands of residents. Complementing this project, the Minister also confirmed that 85 tube wells have already been sanctioned for the constituency, with installation work now underway.

The announcements came during the Minister's visit to the Chhatarpur Assembly constituency, where he undertook a review of development

projects and interacted with residents at several locations, including 100 Feet Road, CDR Chowk, Jonapur Village, Neb Sarai Chaupal and Maidangarhi Village.

Describing the WTP as a transformative project, Singh said the facility would significantly ease water scarcity in the region and offer long-term sustainability. He emphasised that the water will be treated to the highest standards before distribution, providing much-needed relief in a region that has often struggled with inconsistent and inadequate water access.

Singh also reviewed ongoing work to improve the water distribution network, including fast-progressing Underground Reservoir (UGR) connectivity projects that aim to enhance storage capacity and last-mile delivery.

Speaking on sanitation, he informed residents that tendering for sewerage works has been completed and that execution will begin shortly. The works are expected to modernize sewage systems across multiple villages, addressing hygiene challenges and reducing the risk of water-borne diseases.

Additionally, Singh also confirmed that Mandi Road is in the process of being handed over to the National Highways Authority of India (NHAI). Once transferred, the road will be widened and upgraded to national standards, offering smoother and safer commutes and resolving long-

standing issues of congestion and disrepair.

Underscoring the urgency of implementation, the Minister instructed all departments to ensure that ongoing projects meet their deadlines with full transparency and adherence to quality standards. He assured residents that financial constraints would not hinder development, saying, "Whether it is roads, clean water, or sewer systems — every essential service is being prioritised. And let me assure you — funds will never be a hurdle for the progress of Delhi's rural belt. We are building not just infrastructure, but trust."

The Minister was accompanied by senior officials from PWD, the Delhi Jal Board, and other line departments responsible for infrastructure, sanitation and water supply.

## Jaishankar accuses Congress, Rahul of hypocrisy over constitutional values

In a veiled dig at the Congress party and its leader Rahul Gandhi, Union External Affairs minister S Jaishankar on Friday accused them of hypocrisy over their public display of constitutional values. Without naming anyone directly, Jaishankar criticised those who "flash the Constitution" but fail to uphold its spirit. "What

respect can you see towards the Constitution by those who are still not apologising for the Emergency?" he said.

Reflecting on 1975 Emergency, Jaishankar said, "Some people flash the Constitution in their hands but the feeling in their hearts are different. Political parties also have a DNA and they have, to date, never expressed regret for imposing Emergency. Has Congress ever apologised for

the Emergency, during which it choked both the Constitution and democracy?"

Speaking at an event organised by the BJP Yuva Morcha to mark the 50th anniversary of the Emergency, Jaishankar highlights how constitutional and legal tools were used to suppress democracy during 1975-77. He reveals that within just two years, five constitutional amendments and 48 ordinances were passed. The

38th Amendment made it impossible to challenge the declaration of Emergency in court, while the 42nd Amendment diluted fundamental rights and reduced the powers of the judiciary.

He also referenced the Raj Babbar-Shabana Azmi starring 'Kissa Kursi Ka' in taking a jibe at the Congress on 'Emergency' from 1975 to 1977 during Indira Gandhi's regime. "All this happened because of

one family," the 70-year-old minister said, on 50 years of the imposition of 'Emergency'.

Jaishankar also referenced the issue of Sri Lanka arresting Indian fishermen stems from an agreement during the Emergency under which their rights for fishing in some specific areas were given up.

The agreement with Sri Lanka would not have been possible if a genuine Parliament functioned at that

time, Jaishankar said. Katchatheevu, an uninhabited island was ceded to Sri Lanka by then Indira Gandhi regime in the country under a maritime agreement in 1974. Further, another agreement signed in 1976 restricted the fishermen of both countries from fishing in the other's exclusive economic zones.

Jaishankar said big decisions were sometimes taken without any parliamentary debate dur-

ing the Emergency period. "We hear about our fishermen arrested by Sri Lanka. The reason is that an agreement was entered into during Emergency under which the rights of the fishermen for fishing in some sea waters of Sri Lanka were abandoned," Jaishankar said.

Had a genuine Parliament functioned at the time, there would have been a debate and this decision would not be accepted, the minister said.

The consequences of this decision are still visible in Tamil Nadu, he added. Jaishankar said he was a student when the Emergency was imposed in 1975, and he will never forget what happened and what everyone had to go through.

The lesson I took away from Emergency was, "never take freedom for granted." Everybody assumes Emergency is related to politics, but it was always more than that.

# Rajnath Singh talks upgrading Sukhoi with Russian counterpart

Upgrading India's Sukhoi-30MKI fighter fleet, production of air-to-air missiles and expeditious supply of two batches of S-400 missile systems figured prominently in Defence Minister Rajnath Singh's talks with his Russian counterpart Andrey Belousov in the Chinese city of Qingdao.

The two defence ministers held a bilateral meeting on the sidelines of a conclave of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) on Thursday. The Indian Air Force is operating around 260 Sukhoi 30-MKI jets and it is looking at upgrading the fleet under an ambitious plan.

The Russian-origin Sukhoi jets played a key role in Operation Sindoor last month.

Rajnath Singh and Belousov held in-depth discussions on a range of subjects covering current geopolitical situations, cross-border terrorism and Indo-Russian defence cooper-

ation, the Defence Ministry said on Friday.

The Russian Defence Minister highlighted the long-standing Indo-Russian relations and expressed solidarity with India on the horrendous and cowardly Pahalgam terrorist attack, it

said. "Supply of S-400 systems, Su-30 MKI upgrades and procurement of critical military hardware in expeditious time-frames were some of the key takeaways of the meeting," the ministry said in a statement.

"It was one of the most

important recent meetings between the leaders of the two nations, being held in the backdrop of Operation Sindoor and the consequent necessity of augmenting defence production, especially in critical items such as air defence, air-to-air

missiles, modern capabilities and upgrades of air platforms," it said. In his talks with Belousov, Rajnath pressed for expediting the supply of two remaining units of S-400 Triumf surface-to-air missile systems to India, it is learnt.

Russia has already supplied three units of the long-range missile systems to India under a \$5.5 billion deal. The missile systems were used extensively by the Indian Air Force during the May 7-10 military conflict with Pakistan.

Rajnath Singh also held separate bilateral talks with his counterparts from Belarus, Tajikistan and Kazakhstan on the margins of the SCO meet.

"In his interaction with the ministers, Raksha Mantri highlighted the importance of continued engagement in defence cooperation and exploring new opportunities for collaboration in areas of technical collaboration," the Defence Ministry said.

He highlighted the rapid advances made by India in the field of defence production.

# India slams SCO statement; Jaishankar calls it unacceptable

Union External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar on Friday said India wanted a reference to terrorism in the outcome document of the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) defence ministers' meeting, but it was not acceptable to one member country, an oblique reference to Pakistan.

Jaishankar said Defence Minister Rajnath Singh's view on the matter was right since the main purpose of SCO was to fight terrorism and without a reference on it (on India's concerns on terrorism), he would not accept the outcome document.

Rajnath Singh on Thursday refused to sign a joint communiqué of the SCO following the omission of the Pahalgam terror attack and not explicitly addressing India's concerns over Pakistan-backed cross-border terrorism.

At a conference of SCO, Singh demanded inclusion of the terror attack in the com-

muniqué while the Pakistani side pressed for having a paragraph on militant activities in Balochistan in an apparent attempt to blame New Delhi, top sources said.

The objective of SCO that runs through consensus was to fight terrorism, Jaishankar said in a press conference when asked about Singh's stand. "In the discussion on

outcome document of the defence ministers' meeting, one country — you can guess which one — said 'no we don't want reference to that,' he said.

The SCO runs by unanimity, Jaishankar said, but when one country said it will not accept any mention of terrorism, Singh communicated that the outcome document was not acceptable to India.

# Bangladesh's proximity with Pakistan-China discussed at parliamentary meet

"Former foreign secretary and ex-National Security Advisor Shivshankar Menon, Lt General Syed Ata Hasnain, former High Commissioner of India to Bangladesh Riva Ganguly Das and well-known academician Amitabh Mattoo appeared as experts and "gave us very good insights and excellent ideas," Standing Committee on External Affairs Chairman Shashi Tharoor said.

In reply to a question about infiltration from Bangladesh, he said one figure that has come up before

the committee suggests that its number has gone down.

An MP said some members flagged concerns about the strain in ties with Bangladesh under the interim Government of Muhammad Yunus after Sheikh Hasina was deposed last year.

An expert said despite concerns about radicalisation of youths in the country its army is not extremist like Pakistan's.

That China is getting a foothold in the country which is strategically important for India was another issue for some MPs of the panel, sources said, noting

that Pakistan is also trying to strengthen its ties with Bangladesh.

BJP MP Kiran Choudhry, sources said, recalled India's role in liberating Bangladesh, noting that her father Brigadier Atma Singh of 17 Kumaon Regiment had played a heroic role in the 1971 war and had suffered bullet injuries. Singh was called the "founding father" of the regiment and his unit battle honours.

An MP asked if South Asian Association for Regional Cooperation can be revived to counter Chinese bid to grow its influence in the region and also floated the idea of exchange of journalists to boost people to people engagement with Bangladesh.

The law-maker flagged the implications of India-Bangladesh ties on West Bengal, which shares a long border with the country and has been at the received end of suspected large-scale infiltration.

# BJP appoints State election officers to oversee organisational polls

The BJP on Friday appointed 'State election officers' to oversee its organisational elections in Maharashtra, Uttarakhand and West Bengal.

Union Ministers Kiren Rijju and Harsh Malhotra and former Union Minister Ravi Shankar Prasad have been assigned the task for the three States, respectively.

The three MPs will be the central leaders in charge of the

elections of presidents and national council members from these States, K Laxman, the national returning officer for organisational elections, said in a statement.

The appointment is likely to give a fresh push to complete the already drawn-out exercise for organisational polls in the party, which will culminate with the election of a new national president to replace incumbent JP Nadda, who is also a Union Minister.

A source said there is a possibility that the party may

have a new national president next month.

He said the presidents of a few state units, including Andhra Pradesh and

Telangana, are likely to be elected next week and some others may follow suit soon after.

The ruling BJP has 37 organisational States in total and the electoral process must be completed in at least 19 of them before the official procedure to elect the national president begins. So far, the exercise is complete in 14 of them.

However, the BJP is yet to elect its presidents in a number of key States, including Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka and

Gujarat. It had appointed 'state election officers' for these states in January.

The exercise, in line with the party's constitution, had begun with a nationwide membership drive in September last year and was expected to end early this year.

The tenure of the national president is three years, and Nadda assumed the office in January 2020. His term was extended due to the Lok Sabha elections in 2024, and he will continue in office till the election of his replacement.

# Man gets ₹5 lakh for jail delay in release

Following Supreme Court's reprimand, the UP Government on Friday said a man, whose release from prison was delayed for about a month after getting bail, has been compensated with ₹5 lakh. The man, booked under the provisions of the state's anti-conversion law, was granted bail by the top court on April 29 but released from Ghaziabad district jail only on June 24 — indicating a delay of 28 days.

On June 25, the top court while pulling up the state authorities over the delay, ordered a ₹5 lakh compensation and asked UP Government to report on compliance. On Friday, the state's counsel informed a bench of Justices KV Viswanathan and N Kotiwar Singh that the state had complied with the direction and paid the compensation. The man's counsel confirmed having received the amount.

The top court granted bail to the accused on April 29 and subsequently on May 27, a trial court in Ghaziabad issued his release.

On June 25, when the top court was informed about

the man's release the previous day, it said liberty was a "very valuable and precious" right guaranteed under the Constitution.

The man, the top court said, had lost his liberty for at least 28 days due to a "trivial non-issue".

The bench also took strong exception over the delay on the ground that a sub-section of a provision of Uttar Pradesh Prohibition of Unlawful Conversion of Religion Act, 2021 was not mentioned in the bail order.

It had passed the order on a plea by the accused seeking a modification of the April 29 order to specifically include clause (1) of section 5 of the 2021 Act. The bench then ordered an enquiry into the matter by the principal district and sessions judge, Ghaziabad.

The enquiry's focus was directed to be on the reason behind the delay. On June 25, the state's counsel said the trial court's May 27 order mentioned all details except Sub-Section (1) of Section 5 of the Act and, therefore, a plea for correction was filed by the jail authorities on May 28.

Since the application was not disposed of earlier, she said, the petitioner was not released.

# India evacuates 4,400 Indian nationals from Iran, Israel

India has evacuated more than 4,400 Indian nationals from Iran and Israel so far in 19 special flights under Operation Sindhu launched on June 18 to bring home its citizens amid the ongoing conflict between the two countries, according to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA).

A fresh batch of 173 Indians evacuated from Iran reached Delhi late Thursday night in a flight from Armenian capital Yerevan, the MEA said in a post on X. At his weekly media briefing a day before, External Affairs Ministry spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal, in response to queries on Operation Sindhu, said New Delhi was assessing the situation on the ground and a decision on the future course of action would be taken based on it.

Over 3,400 Indian nationals have been evacuated so far in 14 flights from Iran since the start of Operation Sindhu, according to data shared by him during the briefing.

Jaiswal later shared updated

evacuee figures in the post on X after the arrival of the flight from Yeravan. "A special evacuation flight from Yerevan, Armenia landed in New Delhi at 22:30 hrs on 26th June, bringing home 173 Indian nationals from Iran," he wrote.

"As part of #OperationSindhu, a total of 4415 Indian nationals (3597 from Iran and 818 from Israel) have been evacuated so far using 19 special evacuation flights including 3 IAF aircraft. 14 OCI card-holders, 9 Nepali nationals, 4 Sri Lankan nationals and 1 Iranian spouse of an Indian national were also evacuated from Iran," he added.

On June 24, India said while it remained "deeply concerned about the prospects for overall and sustained regional security and stability", it welcomed reports of a ceasefire between Iran and Israel.

Hours after US President Donald Trump's claims of an Iran-Israel ceasefire, the MEA in a statement had said "India stands ready to play its part" to resolve the situation and insisted on "dialogue and



diplomacy" as the way forward. Jaiswal on Thursday was asked if India would continue Operation Sindhu after the Iran-Israel ceasefire, and about the total number of India nationals evacuated from the two countries so far.

"We launched Operation Sindhu on June 18. We have around 10,000 people. Indian community members in Iran,

And, around 40,000 people in Israel who are Indian nationals," he had said.

One Iranian woman, who is the wife of an Indian national has also been evacuated, he added. The MEA spokesperson had said, "In all, we mounted, 14 flights to bring back Indian nationals from Iran. These flights flew from Mashhad, as also from Yerevan in Armenia,

and Ashgabat in Turkmenistan. I understand that one more flight is on its way from Armenia, and it will land later this evening. With that we would have completed.. All those people who wish to be evacuated from Iran."

A special flight carrying 272 Indian and three Nepalese nationals from Iran arrived in Delhi a little past midnight

(June 26) from the Iranian city of Mashhad, Jaiswal had posted on X earlier. India on Wednesday evacuated 296 Indian citizens and four Nepalese nationals from Iran.

"As far as Israel is concerned, we have so far evacuated 818 Indian nationals in four flights. As you are aware the airspace in Israel was closed, so we had to take our people to bordering countries, i.e., Jordan and Egypt, and from both these countries they were put on special flights, and they came back home," he told reporters.

The MEA spokesperson said, "We are thankful to the government of Egypt and Jordan for their support." Indian embassies in Israel, Jordan and Egypt "collaborated very closely" with the MEA headquarters in Delhi, in mounting the evacuation operation.

"But, we would also like to thank Government of Iran, as you would know that we made our requests, they opened their airspace for us to evacuate, our nationals. We are grateful to the government of Iran for this special gesture," he said.

# Thackeray cousins to walk together against MahaYuti Government

The stage is now set for the two Thackeray cousins — Uddhav and Raj — to take out a joint morcha to the Azad Maidan on July 5 in protest against the BJP-led MahaYuti Government's decision to make Hindi as a "third language" for the 1st to 5th standard students in Marathi and English medium schools in the state.

A day after they announced their plans to take separate morchas on the Hindi "imposition" issue, Uddhav and Raj reconsidered their earlier plans and announced that their parties would come together to take one single morcha to Azad Maidan in south Mumbai on July 5 to force the Devendra Fadnavis government to thrust Hindi as the third language in schools in the state.

Making an announcement by the joint morcha, Shiv Sena (UBT)'s Rajya Sabha member and party's chief spokesperson Sanjay Raut, on Friday morn-

Hours earlier, Raj Thackeray took to "X" to announce that there is a small charge in the earlier plan and that the morcha will be held on July 5 (Saturday).

"For the Marathi people, a march was announced for the upcoming 6th of July. There is a slight change in that plan; the march will now take place on Saturday, July 5, at 10 AM instead of Sunday, July 6. The location and all other details remain unchanged. Therefore, the media and the people of Maharashtra should take note of this change"

"There will be no flags in that march. The entire march will be taken out by the Marathi people. The Marathi agenda will be the only focus. The leadership of that march will be by a Marathi person. Let the Government understand once and for all what is in the hearts of Maharashtra."

"I also want to see who participates in this march and who chooses not to come. We will speak with educationists and linguists. We will invite all students and parents to the march. Let the Government understand once and for all what is in the hearts of Maharashtra. Everyone will participate in the anti-Hindi march. We will speak with all political parties in Maharashtra. Maharashtra is bigger than any dispute and you will realize this on the morcha day," Raj wrote.

Both the Shiv Sena (UBT) chief and MNS president have appealed to all Marathi-speaking citizens, writers, artists, actors, and sportspersons—to support the initiatives.

On his part, Uddhav said: "The BJP is trying to divide people on the basis of language. The BJP is imposing a language Emergency in the state. They are making Hindi compulsory in the predominantly Marathi speaking state. We are not against Hindi but such an imposition"

Castigating the Devendra Fadnavis-led government for "imposing" Hindi on students in schools in the state, Uddhav said the Hindi language decision had stemmed from "linguistic emergency" declared by the ruling BJP.

"What is happening is nothing but a 'linguistic emergency'. India's federal structure is built around linguistic states, but the government is not implementing policies to promote Marathi despite many pleas and efforts as part of the BJP's covert agenda," the Sena (UBT) chief said.

"We are not against Hindi or any other language. It's an issue of Marathi pride. The Hindi film industry was born in Maharashtra, but forcibly

implementing the decision is not acceptable. This is a move to impose 'one language, one party'. So we are taking it to the streets. The matter can be resolved in two minutes if the chief minister rolls back the decision," Uddhav said.

It may be recalled that in its circular dated June 17, 2025 which amended its earlier order issued on April 16, 2025, the State Education department stated that Hindi would "generally" be the third language, instead of being "mandatory", but gave an option to opt out of Hindi if 20 students per grade in a school expressed the desire to study any Indian language other than Hindi.

"If the students want to opt for any other Indian language other than Hindi as a third language, the class strength should be at least 20 and those students would be taught the language they selected, either in school by appointing a teacher or through online mode," the circular had said.

# Assam to tighten Aadhaar issuance rules to check infiltration: Himanta

The Assam Government is mulling stricter Aadhaar card issuance rules for adults as part of its efforts to curb illegal immigration from Bangladesh, Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma said on Friday.

Toughened Aadhaar card issuance rules will also further boost the state government's efforts in detecting and deporting illegal foreigners, he added.

"Today, we discussed a proposal where Aadhaar cards for adults will be issued only after thorough verification. The Cabinet will take a decision in this regard soon," he said while addressing a press conference after chairing a Cabinet meeting.

Highlighting that nearly 100 per cent of adults in Assam already have Aadhaar cards, Sarma added, "If any adult applies for an Aadhaar card, we will conduct a thorough check. Only the District Commissioner will be authorised to approve its issuance once the new rules come into

effect." "This will ensure that no illegal immigrant can obtain an Aadhaar card, and we can track and deport them easily," he said.

Sarma also maintained that tightening of rules will help in its deportation efforts.

"Last night we deported 20 more Bangladeshis as part of our ongoing efforts to detect and push back illegal infiltrators. The decision to toughen Aadhaar issuance rules will only aid our efforts in this direction," he added.

Among the decisions taken at the Cabinet meeting are approval for allotment of land under 'Basundhara 3.0' to var-

ious temples, 'namghars' (Vaishnavite place of worship), clubs, educational institutions and socio-cultural organisations.

The council of ministers also okayed the reservation of zilla parishad president and vice-president seats for women, Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe persons on basis of lottery.

The Cabinet gave its nod for amendment of existing provisions of autonomous councils for Moran and Matak communities, which will henceforth allow only people of these communities to vote in the council elections.

# ONGC well in Assam capped after 16 days of gas leakage

ONGC on Friday successfully capped the blowout of its crude oil well in Assam's Sivasagar district after 16 days of gas leakage from there, Union Minister Hardeep Singh Puri said. Petroleum and Natural Gas minister said the capping was done without any injury, casualty or fire.

"ONGC has successfully capped the blowout of well RDS#147A at 1115 hours hrs today. This blowout started on 12th June and has been capped successfully within shortest possible time following all the best practices," Puri said in a post on X.

He said the crisis management team of Oil and Natural Gas Corporation (ONGC) along with the international well control experts "finally brought the curtains down on the gas well blowout through meticulous planning and concerted efforts in a safe manner, without any injury, casualty or fire, testifying the competen-



cy of crisis management".

Puri also thanked Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma and State Government officials for their support to the team on the ground.

The blowout took place on June 12 at Well No RDS 147A of Rig No SKP 135 of Rudrasagar oil field of ONGC at Barichuk in Bhatiapar. A private firm, SK Petro Services, was operating the well on

behalf of the state-run Maharatna company.

Around 350 families were evacuated from the neighbouring areas as a safety measure, with the State Government announcing ex-gratia of Rs 25,000 to each of the affected families.

Sarma, thanking Puri and ONGC for their capping efforts, also acknowledged the perseverance and cooperation

of local people in the operation.

"Thank you Hon'ble Minister Shri @HardeepSPuriji for your exceptional leadership and persistence in sealing the gas leak at #RDS147A, Sivasagar-which has been a great cause of concern for all of us," he said in a post on X.

He also acknowledged the tireless efforts put in by the

ONGC team and members of the state administration.

"But above all, my deepest gratitude to the brave men and women of Sivasagar, especially those residing in the affected areas, for displaying extraordinary levels of perseverance and extending unstinted cooperation with all concerned agencies over the last two weeks," the chief minister added.

Sharing details of the capping process, an ONGC statement said, "At the break of dawn, ONGC's Crisis Management Team (CMT), along with experts from Cudd and local operations teams, commenced the critical operation to safely remove the damaged Blowout Preventer (BOP) from the wellhead."

The effort was carried out with high precision and coordination to ensure stability and prevent any imbalance or toppling during the lifting process.

Once the BOP was safely removed, the pre-positioned capping stack, prepared at the staging area, was carefully and

accurately placed onto the wellhead. This pivotal action redirected the gas flow securely to the top of the capping stack, ensuring containment and control, the statement said. The capping stack was firmly installed and secured, following which the BOP was successfully closed, effectively bringing an end to the gas discharge from Well RDS#147A, it added.

Subsequent steps in the well control roadmap will now be taken up as per operational protocols.

The operation was executed with utmost safety, without a single injury, fatality or incident of fire, and ONGC maintained full transparency throughout the operation, issuing daily press releases over the fortnight to keep all stakeholders informed, the statement said.

The corporation extended its gratitude to the district and state administrations, the Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas and the local community for their support and cooperation.

# Mamata inaugurates Jagannath Rath Yatra

With State elections barely a year away the 'Rath Rajniti' gained momentum in Bengal — keeping pace with the Hindutva narrative — as Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee on Friday inaugurated the first Jagannath Rath Yatra from the newly constructed ₹200 crore Jagannath Temple — at beach town of Digha — a grand and exquisite replica of its ancient Puri alter ego.

This, whereas Opposition Elder Suwendu Adhikari — who earlier called Banerjee's devotion towards Jagannath a "fake" one and only to pull the wools before the eyes of the Sanatani Hindus "for all that sin she has committed by appeasing and inviting the Bangladeshis and Rohingyas in Bengal," — celebrated the festival in Kolkata and his hometown Tamluk by pulling at the ropes of the Lord's chariot.

Banerjee along with her

cabinet colleagues pulled the ropes of the Lord's chariot and those of his two siblings Balabhadra and Subhadra amid loud chanting of "Joy Jagannath" by thousands of pilgrims, including foreigners. After Odisha, Jagannath Rath Yatra is largely celebrated in Bengal with the 600-year-old Rath Yatra at Mahesh in Hooghly district being the second oldest such tradition after Puri in the country.

Banerjee who was accompanied by the sadhus of International Society of Krishna Consciousness began around 2 pm with the ceremonially sweeping of the road — with specially designed a golden broom — on which the three chariots rolled.

This even as thousands of people gathered on the two sides of the road in the beach town celebrating the festivities.

Meanwhile, Adhikari who pulled the Lord's ropes both in Kolkata and Tamluk called the Rath Yatra inaugurated by the Chief Minister a sham.

# CBI nabs cyber crime kingpin fleecing Canadian, US citizens

In a crackdown against a cybercrime syndicate, the CBI has arrested the alleged kingpin of the "Royal Tiger Gang", a transnational racket accused of fleecing victims in the United States and Canada through cyber posing as Government officials, officials said Friday.

The agency arrested Prince Jasvantlal Anand from Mumbai on Thursday after a coordinated search operation that began the previous day across the bustling metropolis and Ahmedabad, officials said.

Anand, alleged to be the gang's prima donna, had been living an opulent lifestyle that ultimately betrayed his trail. The searches at his hideout blew the lid off a sophisticated organised system used for committing cyber frauds with a telecom

infrastructure, pre-drafted scam scripts, and forged identification paraphernalia -- including forged ID badges of Canadian law enforcement officers.

The searches at Anand's premises laid bare the indulgences of a high-flying conman with luxury cars, designer accessories, frequent international travel records, and significant unaccounted wealth.

"Further, Virtual Digital Assets worth approximately \$ 45,000 were seized from the possession of the accused (Anand)," a CBI spokesperson stated. The operation was part of 'Operation Chakra V', the CBI's ongoing action against cybercriminal networks.

The CBI said that the United States Federal Communications Commission (FCC) had earlier identified the "Royal Tiger Gang", operated by the accused (Anand) as a significant Consumer Communication

Information Services Threat (C-CIST).

"The gang is accused of generating and transmitting unlawful robocalls impersonating Government agencies, banks, and utility service providers in a systematic manner, aimed at deceiving and defrauding US consumers," the spokesperson said.

Investigators allege that Anand and his associates preyed on fear and confusion by impersonating officials from government institutions and financial bodies, then extorting money from their victims under the pretext of fabricated criminal allegations.

The ill-gotten proceeds were largely funnelled through cryptocurrencies to mask the financial trail. Anand was presented before a Special Court which sent him to four days for CBI custody for further interrogation.

# ARRWA accuses officials of illegally targeting them

In a strong protest against a demolition by the Sohna Municipal Corporation, members of the Aravali Retreat Welfare Association (ARRWA) have accused administration officials of illegally targeting them.

In a detailed statement, ARRWA president Rajesh Vats condemned the repeated illegal actions and harassment faced by the residents of Aravali Retreat, a farmhouse society developed by Ansal Properties and Infrastructure Limited.

"Aravali Retreat was developed in the years 1988-90, after obtaining all requisite approvals and No Objection Certificates (NOCs) from the Director General, Town and Country Planning, Haryana, and the Forest Department, Government of Haryana.

The developer undertook massive infrastructure development, including internal

roads, water pipelines, tree plantation, tube-well installation, farmhouse construction, and the establishment of electricity and telephone lines and connections.

"An official inquiry was also conducted pursuant to the Chairman, HSPCB's letter bearing Memo No. HSPCB/08/2036 dated 29/01/2009. The inquiry was conducted by a team of senior revenue officials, including the Revenue Commissioner, Gurugram Division; the District Collector, Gurugram; the Tehsildar, Sohna; and the Halqa Patwari, Village Raisina, Sohna," the statement read.

"The findings of this comprehensive inquiry unequiv-

cally confirmed that Ansal's associate companies had legally purchased land in the year 1987-88 in Khewat Nos. 28 and 29 of the revenue estate of Village Raisina."

The statement went on to note that it was further verified that the developer had invested heavily in developing the area into a full-fledged farmhouse society by constructing roads, laying water supply pipelines, installing tube wells, planting trees, building houses and boundary gates, and establishing electricity and telephone lines. Aravali Retreat Welfare Association, in accordance with established legal procedures.

"Despite these clear and conclusive findings, the residents of Aravali Retreat continued to face harassment. Starting from 2006, the Haryana State Pollution Control Board filed nearly 600 criminal complaints against residents of the "Aravali Retreat" society before the Hon'ble Special Environment

Court, Faridabad. However, every single complaint has resulted in acquittal, confirming the baseless nature of the allegations. Only 9 complaints remain pending as of today," Vats said.

"Further distress was caused during the first wave of the COVID-19 pandemic, when on May 27, 2020, the Municipal Council, Sohna, issued notices to residents. The matter was taken to court, and the Hon'ble Civil Court granted injunction orders against the Municipal Council after considering all relevant facts and documents," he added.

"Yet, in a shocking development, in June 2020, the District Collector, Gurugram, passed an arbitrary five-line order reclassifying the nature of the land from "Gair Mumkin Farm House" to "Gair Mumkin Pahar," without any notice or legal hearing. The ARRWA immediately approached the Hon'ble Punjab and Haryana High

Court, which granted a stay on the collector's order," he asserted.

"However, despite the stay and judicial directions, officials went ahead and illegally changed the land classification in violation of court orders and established law. The authorities continue to harass residents under the guise of false classifications and baseless actions."

The "ARRWA" is now preparing to file a formal criminal complaint before the Anti-Corruption Bureau, Haryana, against all officials involved in these unlawful actions.

"All residents of the Aravali Retreat society/members of ARRWA have followed every legal procedure and proven our lawful rights at every stage through government inquiries, revenue records, and court verdicts," Vats emphasised.

"Yet, some officials continue to act with total impunity. This fight is now not just about land, but it is about the rule of law and the dignity of every law-abiding citizen."

# Apple farmers oppose import duty reduction in upcoming Indo-US trade deal

The Apple Farmers Federation of India (AFFI) has appealed to MLAs and MPs of Jammu and Kashmir and Himachal Pradesh to send their Chief Ministers in a joint delegation to meet Prime Minister Narendra Modi and demand that changes to the import duty on Washington apples be non-negotiable in the on-going discussion on the India-US trade deal.

A delegation led by MY Tarigami MLA and Convenor of AFFI and Rakesh Singha, former MLA and Co-convenor

of AFFI met Jagat Singh Negi, Horticulture Minister of HP in Shimla. He assured the delegation that he will speak with Chief Minister Sukhwinder Singh Sukhu.

MY Tarigami also met the Jammu and Kashmir Agriculture/Horticulture Minister Javid Ahmad Darand Nasir Aslam Wani, Advisor to the Chief Minister of J and K Omar Abdullah in Srinagar on the same issue.

They too extended support on opposing the tariff reduction and also conveyed that the Union Minister for Agriculture Shivraj Singh Chouhan on his upcoming J and K visit will be asked to protect the interests of



domestic apple growers over the US, said AFFI in a Statement.

"Both the Government representatives have responded positively to the suggestion of a joint Chief Ministerial delegation. It is relevant here to note that imports are forecast this year to reach six lakh metric tonnes (MT) from the actual five lakh+MT in 2023/24 season as shipments from the US continue to grow from last year's record (even without the tariff reduction). Since 2001, our apple imports have climbed from 0.2.lakh MT to 6 lakh MT, from 1.7 per cent of domestic production to 22.5 per cent," said AFFI leaders.

# Death toll reaches six in HP flash floods

The death toll in Wednesday's flash floods in Himachal Pradesh's Kangra district has gone up to six as one more body has been found, officials said.

The body was found at a hydro-project site near the Manuni Khad area in Khaniyara village, taking the total number of victims in the tragic incident to six, Additional Superintendent of Police (ASP), Kangra, Aditi Singh, said on Friday evening.

Rains hampered the search-and-rescue operations jointly undertaken by the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), police and home guards. The search for two more persons would resume on Saturday morning, Singh said.

Lovely from Chamba district, who was rescued by the search teams from a forest area near the project site on Thursday, said there were 13 labourers at a camp, five of whom ran towards the hills while the rest were swept away by the gushing waters.

## India refuses to sign SCO joint declaration

India's strong stand at SCO underlines its approach to terrorism signalling its assertive foreign policy posture

There has been a paradigm shift in India's approach to foreign policy post Pahalgam massacre. The country has taken and rightly so, a zero tolerance policy towards terrorism. It is unflinching in its approach to condemn terrorism on all international fora. It was once again at display in China. At the recently concluded Shanghai Cooperation Organisation (SCO) Defence Ministers' Meeting held in Qingdao, China on June 26, 2025, India refused to sign the joint declaration — a move that underscores its principled stance on terrorism and regional security. Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, representing India, chose not to endorse the final communiqué, citing the deliberate exclusion of India's terrorism-related concerns from the draft; an issue India considers critical to regional peace and stability. This lack of consensus made it impossible for the declaration to be adopted unanimously. The SCO Defence Ministers' Meeting brought together representatives from major regional powers, including China, Russia, Iran, Pakistan, and several Central Asian nations.

It was expected to culminate in a joint declaration reinforcing collective commitment to peace, security, and cooperation in the region. However, the talks stumbled when India pressed for strong language condemning terrorism, particularly cross-border terrorism and the threat of non-state actors accessing weapons of mass destruction (WMDs). One member state's opposition to these inclusions — especially the reference to the April 22 terror attack in Pahalgam, Jammu & Kashmir, which killed several tourists — led to a diplomatic impasse.

In his address, Rajnath Singh made India's position clear. He called for accountability for "perpetrators, organisers, financiers, and sponsors" of terrorism and insisted that no compromise should be made when it comes to combating this menace. He warned about the risks of WMDs falling into the hands of terrorist organisations, stressing the urgent need for collective, decisive action. India's objection also stemmed from what it considered a clear imbalance in the draft declaration.

While it allegedly included references to terror incidents in Pakistan, it omitted any mention of the Pahalgam attack in India. This, New Delhi argued, undermined the credibility of the statement. India maintained that a credible security declaration must address all instances of terrorism without exception or political convenience. The failure to do so prompted India to withhold its signature. India's refusal to toe the line reflects its increasingly assertive foreign policy. Rather than yielding for the sake of consensus, New Delhi chose to send a clear message: counter-terrorism cannot be diluted or selectively applied in regional diplomacy. While this move might strain relations with some member countries, particularly Pakistan and possibly China — the host of the event — it also positions India as a nation willing to take principled stands even on contentious multilateral platforms. As the SCO continues to grapple with internal divides and conflicting priorities among members, India's position may act as an catalyst, a much-needed conversation on the need for integrity and unanimity in confronting the global threat of terrorism.

## Resurgent fundamentalism in Bangladesh

Fundamentalist groups in Bangladesh are positioning to enter Parliament through street mobilisation and polarising rhetoric — posing serious threat to the country's minority rights and secular governance

Militant fundamentalist Islamist parties and organisations are growing and becoming more strident in Bangladesh under the interim Government headed by Chief Advisor Muhammad Yunus. They hold processions, demonstrations and mega rallies.

The Hefazat-e-Islam Bangladesh's massive gathering in Dhaka on May 3, 2025, is an example. They are gearing up to contest the country's 13th general elections which seem likely to be held in February. According to a report by Salman Tareque Sakil published in the *Dhaka Tribune* on June 25, 2025, under the heading "Five religious parties on path to electoral compromise," the Islami Andolan Bangladesh (IAB), Khilafat Majlish (KM), Bangladesh Khilafat Majlish (BKM), Jamiat Ulama-e-Islam (JUel) and Nezam-e-Islam (NI), have formed a liaison committee to push unity among themselves in the context of the forthcoming elections. What form electoral cooperation among the five will take — whether the Bangladesh Jamaat-e-Islami (Jamaat) will be a part of it — remains undecided. The JUel's secretary general, Maulana Manjurul Islam Afendi, told Sakil on June 24, 2025, "We have taken the initiative to make the five Islamic parties float one candidate and one ballot box. That initiative is ongoing. The entire process has not been officially finalised yet." He had added, "We have formed a liaison committee. There has been no clear decision on the election process. There are differences of opinion on how we will unite, where we will all go together, whether we will join a large alliance. This is where we are."

A number of things are not clear. According to the *Dhaka Tribune's* report, the Jamaat, which opposed the Liberation War in 1971, has not been included in this probable electoral compromise.

Nor are the five parties ready to say definitively whether it will be part of it. But then the electoral impact of a successful alliance between the five Islamist parties and the Jamaat may not be earth-shaking. Even if one ignores the outcomes of the 2024, 2018 and 2014 elections which were allegedly rigged, the results of four preceding elections are revealing. The Jamaat won 18 of the 300 parliamentary seats and 12.13 per cent of the votes polled in 1991. The corresponding figures for the elections in 1996, 2001 and 2008 are three seats and 8.6 per cent, 17 seats and 4.28 per cent, and two seats and 4.70 per cent. It had an alliance with the Bangladesh Nationalist Party in 2001 and 2008. The figures for the Islami Oikya Jote were: one seat and 0.79 per cent in 1991, one seat and 1.09 per cent in 1996 and one seat and 0.68 per cent in 2001. It did not get a single seat in 2008 and received 0.15 per cent of the votes. Even



if the Islamist parties do significantly better in the next elections, they can only hope to get a toehold as a junior partner in a coalition Government to be formed.

The danger lies in their trying to impose their agenda through intimidation and violence, as the Jamaat had done when it was a part of a coalition Government with the BNP from 2001 to 2006. The question arises: what is the agenda of the Islamist parties? An AFP report published in the *Dhaka Tribune* of May 3, 2025, under the heading "Influential Islamists promise sharia as they ready for polls," quotes Muhammad Mamunul Haque, BKM's ameer, as saying, "We will implement sharia," and adding, "Everything will be guided by the Koran." A look at what Islamist parties and organisations are doing in Bangladesh now gives an idea of what will happen under their rule.

The AFP report states, "Islamists have demanded an end to a swath of activities, including cultural events deemed 'anti-Islamic' — from music to theatre festivals, women's football matches and kite-flying celebrations." A report by Mujib Mashal and Saif Hasnat, datelined April 1, 2025, and published in The New York Times, states, "As Bangladesh tries to rebuild its democracy and chart a new future for its 175 million people, a streak of Islamist extremism that had long lurked beneath the country's secular facade is bubbling to the surface." It added, "In interviews, representatives of several Islamist parties and organisations — some of which had previously been

banned — made clear that they were working to push Bangladesh in a more fundamentalist direction, a shift that has been little noticed outside the country."

Women's rights are among the main targets. Islamist fundamentalists have viciously attacked forward-looking recommendations of the Women Affairs Reforms Commission, such as recognising forced sex within marriage as rape under the criminal code and ensuring the labour rights and dignity of sex workers by amending the country's labour laws. A report bylined Tribune Report and published in the *Dhaka Tribune* of April 30, 2025, under the heading "Islamic parties reject proposals of the Women Reform Commission" quoted Mamunul Haque, KM's secretary-general as saying, "We make a clear appeal: grant women their just rights. Do not push them into prostitution or turn mothers into symbols of disgrace." Dr Shafiqur Rahaman, Jamaat's ameer, said, "We reject the commission outright as it stands against the values and laws of Allah and the thoughts and beliefs of the nation."

There is resistance from a section of the civil society and the media. An editorial in the *Dhaka Tribune* of February 22, 2025, stated, "Time and again, the interim Government has proven itself utterly incapable when it comes to reining in extremists who now feel emboldened to carry out their intolerant and regressive agendas — not only has the void in comprehensive law enforcement paved the way to a sharp rise in crime, but it now appears the threat of agitating extremists is also an element that must be dealt with." The same paper had said in another editorial on March 20, 2025, "While the overwhelming majority of Bangladesh still subscribes to communal harmony, the void in law enforcement

has certainly resulted in fringe right-wing groups trying to make their presence known." It added, "The onus, then, lands squarely on the interim Government to call a spade a spade and brand such groups for what they are: Extremists." Six women, including three leaders of the National Citizen Committee sent, through their lawyer, a legal notice on May 5, 2025, demanding an explanation within seven days from the Hefazat for using abusive language against members of the Women Affairs Reform Commission.

There have been civil society protests on a number of other issues as well. And the interim Government? If it has taken any action against Islamist fundamentalists for their relentless persecution of Hindus and the destruction of their temples, homes and businesses, it is of a special kind whose results are not visible.

The same applies in the case of those disrupting sporting events and cultural performances. Rather, it is doing other things. According to a BSS report published on February 28, 2025, in the *Dhaka Tribune* under the heading "Khalid: Govt takes diverse initiatives to promote Islamic culture, values," the Religious Affairs Adviser, Dr AFM Khalid Hossain, said while speaking as a chief guest at an event in Dhaka, that the Government was undertaking various initiatives to promote and develop Islamic culture and values. The Religious Affairs Adviser is a Naye-e-Ameer of Hefazat-e-Islam Bangladesh and an advisor to Islami Andolan Bangladesh. Can one expect the Muhammad Yunus-led Interim Government to act resolutely against fundamentalist Islamist violence?

Phrases like "I am depressed" or "I am anxious" may feel like honest descriptions, but repeated often enough, they hardwire the brain to see those states not as experiences, but as truths. The key lies in shifting from fixed identity language to growth-oriented statements — like "I'm learning to manage my anxiety" or "I'm healing from emotional wounds."

These reframes don't deny reality; they open up possibility. This principle finds resonance in the science of neuroplasticity — the brain's proven ability to change and adapt based on repeated patterns. In a time of widespread stress, emotional fatigue, and digital overload, the Law of Identification offers a timely counterforce. Many, especially younger generations, are overwhelmed by curated social media personas and societal ideals, internalising harmful beliefs about who they are or should be. The pandemic years further disoriented our sense of self. Locked in survival mode, many lost touch with deeper aspects of their identity. In such a climate, choosing to identify with your ideal self — one that is resilient, balanced, and capable — is no longer just a motivational idea; it becomes a survival skill. When the outside world feels uncertain, the internal world becomes the one place where transformation is still possible. This law also

plays a critical role in the current mental health discourse. As conversations around mental well-being become more open

and destigmatised, the Law of Identification offers a next step. It bridges the gap between awareness and active change. It urges people not just to name their struggles, but to begin imagining who they want to become. In a world quick to highlight what's broken, choosing to identify with what's possible becomes a revolutionary act of healing. Language is a powerful lever in this process. How we speak about ourselves becomes the scaffolding for how we think and feel. Saying "I'm terrible with stress" repeatedly wires the brain to accept that limitation. But saying "I'm learning to stay calm" or "I'm becoming more mindful" sends the brain a different message — one of growth and renewal. These are not empty affirmations; they are mental instructions. Identity is shaped not just internally, but by the people and media we surround ourselves with. Immersing yourself in content, conversations, and relationships that reinforce your desired identity — ones that affirm peace, confidence, and resilience — can radically shift your mental and emotional baseline. Books, podcasts, and communities that support this identity are not luxuries; they are lifelines. The Law of Identification isn't magic, nor is it a replacement for therapy. It reminds us that while we may not control everything about our circumstances, we do have agency over the identity we choose to strengthen. And from that chosen identity, a new life can begin to take shape. Even when setbacks occur, a grounded self-image becomes an anchor — holding us steady, reminding us who we are becoming, and guiding us back to our truest self.

### ECI delisting 345 unreconised parties

The Election Commission of India on Thursday, June 26, said it has started proceedings for delisting of 345 registered unrecognised political parties (RUPPs) which have failed to fulfil the essential condition of contesting even a single election in the last six years since 2019.

The offices of these parties could also not be physically located anywhere, the ECI claimed. These RUPPs are from different states and UTs across the country. The Supreme Court had earlier barred EC from "derecognising" political parties noting that it was not prescribed under law. However, the EC has found a way to "delist parties". Parties delisted can be listed again by the poll authority without getting into the process of giving them fresh recognition, a former EC functionary pointed out.

Apart from over 2,800 RUPPs, there are six national and 67 state-recognised political parties in the country. The move comes ahead of Bihar elections later this year. Parties delisted cannot field their candidates to contest elections. While the Supreme Court barred "derecognition," delisting offers an alternative.

Delisted parties cannot contest elections but may be re-listed without fresh recognition. The move precedes Bihar polls. It streamlines the political landscape, ensuring that only active and accountable parties feature in the democratic exercise.

# Beyond the blackboards: Future-proofing skill education for the Gen next

The Central Government's decision to introduce vocational education from Grade 6 under the 'Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan' signals a long-overdue shift towards skill-based learning. However, unless this reform is backed by robust infrastructure and industry collaboration its purpose may be defeated

The Union Government's initiative to integrate vocational education starting from Grade 6 under the 'Samagra Shiksha Abhiyan' is a progressive step aimed at addressing the ongoing gap between academic learning and employability. As India strives to become a \$5 trillion economy, it is essential to equip its youth with skills early on. However, without a solid strategy, strong alignment with industry needs, and adequate infrastructure, this initiative risks becoming another well-intentioned yet poorly executed reform.

## The Stark Skills Gap

The India Skills Report 2024 indicates that only 47.2 per cent of Indian youth are deemed employable, primarily due to a mismatch between the skills taught in educational institutions and those needed in the job market. A mere 4.1 per cent of individuals aged 15 to 59 have received any formal vocational training, compared to over 75 per cent in Germany and 50 per cent in China. This highlights the urgent need for a comprehensive overhaul of India's vocational education system, from early integration in schools to the development of market-relevant skill training programs.

## Learning from Global Leaders

India has the opportunity to learn valuable lessons from the German Dual System, which effectively combines classroom education with practical apprenticeships in various industries. Approximately 50 per cent of German students opt for vocational pathways after completing secondary school. Similarly, China boasts 11,300 vocational institutions and nearly 31 million enrolments, producing 10 million skilled graduates each year. These graduates support sectors ranging from services and manufacturing to artificial intelligence (AI). South Korea's impressive 96 per cent employment rate among vocational graduates is a result of rigorous standardisation and quality assurance. These examples serve as replicable blueprints, particularly in terms of industry collaboration and co-creating curricula.

## Patchy Progress Across States

West Bengal's Utkarsh Bangla Scheme, which offers vocational courses in nearly 2,000 schools, is an ambitious model. Annually, over 600,000 students are trained across various sectors, including electronics, hospitality, information technology, and healthcare. However, limited engagement with industry partners diminishes job placement opportunities.

In contrast, states like Punjab, Haryana, and Tamil Nadu maintain close collaboration with industries and polytechnic institutes, facilitating smoother



transitions from school to work.

States such as Andhra Pradesh and Karnataka have taken a step further by aligning their vocational courses with future-oriented fields, including renewable energy, AI, robotics, and wellness. This initiative aligns with the Skill India Digital Vision 2024.

## Infrastructure and Implementation

The National Education Infrastructure Survey 2023 reveals that 38 per cent of Government secondary schools still lack essential laboratory and workshop facilities. In Punjab, urban areas generally perform better, while rural regions continue to struggle with faculty shortages and outdated equipment.

The poor effectiveness of previous initiatives, such as the Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY), highlighted that high enrollment numbers did not necessarily lead to employment, pri-

marily due to inadequate training quality. A phased implementation model — starting with urban centres and gradually expanding to rural districts — can ensure that infrastructure, faculty, and educational content develop in tandem.

## Bystander to Stakeholder

A 2023 survey by FICCI and EY reveals that 70 per cent of employers in India are facing skill shortages, yet only a small percentage are actively participating in vocational training programs. In Gujarat, effective Public-Private Partnerships (PPPs) in Industrial Training Institutes (ITIs) have successfully developed demand-driven courses and updated curricula.

Karnataka's collaboration with major tech companies, such as Infosys, Wipro, and Bosch, to train high school students in coding, data analytics, and mechatronics serves as a scalable model for other states. On the other hand, West Bengal remains dependent on Government-led initiatives and needs to enhance industry collaboration, not only

# Thailand on the brink: Border crisis with Cambodia fuels fears of imminent coup

While global attention remains riveted on the recently halted conflict between Israel and Iran-ignited by President Trump's provocative assaults on purported nuclear sites — a far more seismic and overlooked upheaval is unfolding in Southeast Asia, heralding the spectres of Governmental disintegration, regional turmoil, and the re-emergence of virulent ultranationalist authoritarianism. At the heart of this crisis lies the embattled Thai Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra, caught between the unforgiving gears of royalist militarism and an inflammatory border dispute with Cambodia that has become less about territorial delineation and more a proxy war for the soul of Thai democracy. To view the Thailand-Cambodia border standoff merely through the lens of cartographic claims over temples and ancient ruins would be to profoundly underestimate its broader implications. The border is merely the stage.

The actors — the Thai military, the royalist aristocracy, the remnants of the Shinawatra political dynasty, and Cambodia's enduring autocracy — are embroiled in a deeper conflict over legitimacy, memory, and geopolitics. The roots of the current impasse lie in the historical ambiguities left unresolved by the Franco-Siamese treaties of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The contentious zones surrounding the Ta Moan Thom, Ta Krabei, and the Preah Vihear temples have, for over a century, oscillated between national pride and imperial cartographic error. The 1962 International Court of Justice ruling, which awarded Preah Vihear to Cambodia, never fully settled the Thai military's grievance — and in many ways, enshrined a mythos of loss that nationalists have continually resurrected to justify belligerent posturing.

Yet, what is occurring in 2025 cannot be explained merely by revisiting colonial maps. This is a crisis deliberately escalated — a choreography of confrontation designed to reinvigorate military influence within a faltering Thai polity. The fatal clash on May 28, which left a Cambodian soldier dead, may have been spontaneous in execution but was the predictable outcome of months of nationalist agitation, thinly veiled threats from mid-level Thai army commanders, and the re-militarisation of border provinces under the guise of sovereignty defence. Paetongtarn's beleaguered premiership, marked by populist inexperience and elite antipathy, has provided the ideal vacuum for this crisis to metastasise. It is no coincidence that her leaked 17-minute phone call with former Cambodian Prime Minister Hun Sen, now Senate President and once again donning military fatigues as the "Senior Logistics Officer", has become the fulcrum of a political maelstrom.

That conversation — intended as a gesture of diplomatic candour — was met not with gratitude, but with fury. Within Thailand, it was perceived

by the military and conservative establishment as an unforgivable trespass on hierarchical protocol, not least because Paetongtarn appeared to denounce a regional Thai commander and supplicate before a foreign autocrat. The fact that it was leaked by a Cambodian official only highlights the performative nature of this outrage: it served as both a domestic scandal and a geopolitical warning. The response from Bhumjithai, a pivotal coalition partner, to exit the governing alliance under the pretext of defending Thai sovereignty is performative no less — a carefully calibrated manoeuvre designed to prelude a no-confidence motion and probable parliamentary collapse. Their claim that the Prime Minister's leaked conversation compromised national security conveniently elides the fact that Thai military officers have themselves engaged in far more clandestine — and often destabilising — operations across the Cambodian border for decades, including support for anti-Vietnamese insurgents and alleged interference in Cambodian domestic affairs.

Paetongtarn's position is now untenable. Her coalition is haemorrhaging credibility, the military has shuttered land borders under the guise of "national security," and conservative senators have launched judicial petitions against her. The spectre of a constitutional court dismissal — Thailand's now-traditional soft coup method — looms ever larger. Meanwhile, the military has revived its Cold War-era national security discourse, linking the border issue to broader narratives of sovereignty, moral decay, and the need for military stewardship. But history offers chilling parallels.

The October 1976 Thammasat massacre, followed by an immediate coup, was preceded by similar nationalist fervour and royalist mobilisation against student demonstrators accused of harbouring communist sympathies. The 2006 coup that deposed Thaksin Shinawatra, Paetongtarn's father, was couched in identical rhetoric — the moral failings of a populist demagogue, the threat to the monarchy, and the need for intervention. Even the 2014 coup, conducted by then-General Prayuth Chan-ocha, was justified on the grounds of restoring order and "rebalancing" foreign relations.

Indeed, Thailand's military has mastered the art of coup legitimisation, consistently invoking border crises, alleged threats to the monarchy, or judicial irregularities to sanctify its usurpation of power. The judiciary, long infiltrated by royalist ideologues, has become a reliable accomplice, dissolving political parties and annulling elections

with antiseptic legalese. Paetongtarn's potential removal by either coup or coup is not a question of "if" but "when." In this complex interplay of power, Cambodia plays its part. Hun Sen's re-entry into military affairs — symbolically announced in uniform from the frontlines — is less about logistics and more about symbolism. His historical disdain for Thai military adventurism, combined with a shrewd understanding of domestic optics, makes his posture politically advantageous. By invoking "an enemy that has invaded Cambodia," he galvanises nationalist fervour at home while drawing Thailand deeper into a diplomatic quagmire. Cambodia's filing of a case at The Hague over the disputed zones is not merely legal posturing but geopolitical provocation — an invitation for international adjudication that Thailand will likely reject, reinforcing Cambodia's narrative of victimhood.

Beneath these tensions lie deeper regional anxieties. China's increasing influence in Cambodia, through infrastructure projects and military agreements, unnerves Thai strategists who fear encirclement. Simultaneously, Thailand's drift from democratic norms has strained its relations with Western allies, giving Beijing further room to manoeuvre. The border crisis, thus, becomes more than a bilateral squabble — it is a proxy terrain where great power interests intersect with local authoritarianism.

The bottom line is that what is at stake is not merely Paetongtarn's premiership or the fate of a few kilometres of disputed land, but the broader architecture of Thai political life. The resurgence of military assertiveness, the weaponisation of nationalism, the suppression of civil society, and the systematic dismantling of electoral legitimacy represent a retreat from the democratic aspirations of the 1997 constitution — itself long dead in spirit if not in name.

Thailand teeters on the precipice of yet another putsch — an outcome both banal in its predictability and tragic in its implications. And yet the international community remains inert, transfixed by conflicts elsewhere, blind to the slow strangulation of Southeast Asia's once-promising democracy. The coming coup, whether judicial, parliamentary or military, will not just remove a prime minister. It will reaffirm the militarised state as the ultimate arbiter of power in Thailand, further ossifying a regime where ballots are tolerated only when they yield the correct result.

And as the borders close, both physically and ideologically, the spectre of armed conflict with Cambodia offers the military not only an external adversary but the ultimate alibi — the eternal justification for suspending liberty in the name of order.

# Jammu and Kashmir cannot afford political uncertainty

Everything comes with an expiry date and so does my patience: Omar Abdullah, Chief Minister Jammu and Kashmir

They made the observations on separate occasions but with the same intent of one-upmanship in the fragile constitutional framework of Jammu and Kashmir. More so after August 5, 2019 when the special status of the Jammu and Kashmir was done away with, and made a powerless Union Territory with confusing lines of power-sharing between an elected Government and the Raj Bhawan. Is the eight-month-long truce between the self-effacing chief minister and all empowered Lt Governor, being the sole representative of the Centre, over? Is Mr Abdullah's discomfiture manifested in his "expiry date" expression outcome of the increasing public pressure reminding him of his poll promise on reinstating statehood and subsequent restoration of Article 370 in its old form?

Jammu and Kashmir, particularly Kashmir, is not a static entity, both strategically and politically.

Are the observations made by the two constitutional authorities in Jammu and Kashmir, an indication of yet another political turmoil and the related uncertainty?

At a time when the Union Territory has been trying to come to terms with the fallout of the latest round of Indo-Pak armed confrontation in the aftermath of Pahalgal terrorist attack in which 26 innocent people were killed by the gun-totting terrorists, this is the last thing anyone not only in Jammu and Kashmir but the entire nation will expect. Jammu and Kashmir cannot afford yet another round of political uncertainty only to satisfy the urges of powerful groups in New Delhi and J and K. A realisation must dawn on all that such a situation is least in the national interest.

The Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir shares its status with Delhi and Puducherry, UTs with assembly, with limited powers to the elected Government. Realistically speaking, as the one who has witnessed developments in Delhi from a reporter's prism, through close quarters since 1993 when it acquired its current constitutional status, this model is flawed and unworkable. This model was born more out of political expediency rather than the well-being of the people.

Nevertheless, all three cases should be viewed and reviewed differently by the powers that be. At least J&K with its strategic location and sensitivity did not deserve this treatment.

## Quality Through Accountability

Since 2015, the Skill India Mission has certified over 1.3 crore individuals; however, only about 50 per cent of these individuals have secured employment. One of the main challenges is inconsistent quality. There is an urgent need for third-party audits, employer-validated certifications, and real-time tracking of placements to ensure transparency and accountability.

Singapore's Workforce Skills Qualification (WSQ) system is considered a benchmark, as industry councils update training modules quarterly in response to labour market needs. India must invest in similar National Skill Registries and adaptive learning platforms aligned with the vision outlined in the National Education Policy.

## A Five-Point Reform Agenda for the Future

1. Curriculum Modernisation: Shift the focus from traditional trades to high-growth sectors such as electric vehicle (EV) maintenance, renewable energy, robotics, artificial intelligence (AI), and healthcare technology.
2. Mandatory Industry Partnerships: Each school offering vocational courses must partner with an industry or sector skills council to co-design the curriculum and conduct evaluations.
3. Digital-First Infrastructure: Utilise the upcoming Skill India Digital Platform to provide virtual labs, remote mentorship, and modular learning opportunities, even in rural areas.
4. Quality Assurance Mechanisms: Establish a National Vocational Education Quality Council (NVEQC) to oversee standards, conduct audits, and implement employer feedback systems.
5. Incentivising Adoption: Offer tax benefits to companies that provide apprenticeships and performance-linked grants to schools based on their placement records.

## Need for Deeper Reforms

India boasts one of the youngest populations globally. To transform this demographic dividend into a developmental advantage, practical skills must start early. Integrating vocational education from Grade 6 is a positive step; however, without significant reforms, it risks repeating past mistakes.

Vocational education should not be considered a fallback option for students who struggle academically. With the right policy initiatives, infrastructure improvements, and strong corporate partnerships, vocational education can lead India's human capital revolution. It is time to move from intention to implementation, as skills will become the new currency in the future of work.

Unfortunately, the main stakeholders (the people) had no say when this model of UTs was formulated. This is entirely true of Jammu and Kashmir where a progressive state — the national parameters would bear this out despite three-decade-long terrorism and political instability from time to time to satisfy the whims and fancies of the political leaders in New Delhi and J and K, was unceremoniously divested of its status. Never ever the people were taken on board when this decision of far-reaching dimensions was taken.

Carrying forward this spirit would entail exhibiting, more so on the part of the Centre and Raj Bhawan, a sense of adjustment and mutual trust while bearing in mind that pressure all the time will be on the elected Government being directly answerable to the people.

Jammu and Kashmir assembly in its present form is a well-balanced House. On one side is the National Conference-led ruling alliance with a strong majority and on the other hand there is a strong opposition primarily the BJP. This balanced formulation, in terms of the number game, of the assembly was a perfect platform for the Centre — Raj Bhawan combo, to take the democratic processes forward with elected representatives of both ruling and opposition varieties becoming the show window.

Under the circumstances, Mr Abdullah citing the expiry date of his patience is but natural as he seems to be under growing pressure from not only the electorates but also his party. The situation would have eased or at least not reached a situation where the chasm between the Lt Governor and the CM threatens to become open, had the Centre engaged the UT Government on the issue of restoration of statehood. Barring an occasional observation from the BJP's central leadership and the Centre that this would be done at an "appropriate time", there is nothing to show intent and give people a ray of hope. And a face-saver to Mr Abdullah.

# Thailand starts banning sale of cannabis without prescription

Thailand has started banning the sale of cannabis to those without a prescription, three years after becoming the first country in Asia to decriminalise the plant. The new order, signed by Health Minister Somsak Thepsutin earlier this week, came into effect Thursday after it was published in the Royal Gazette. It bans shops from selling cannabis to customers without a prescription and reclassifies cannabis buds as a controlled herb. A violation could result in a maximum one-year jail term and a 20,000-baht (\$614) fine, according to the order.

The Department of Thai Traditional and Alternative Medicine, in charge of enforc-



ing regulations related to cannabis, held a meeting Friday with officials across the country

to prepare them for the change. The move to decriminalise in 2022 had boosted Thailand's

tourism and farming industries, and spawned thousands of shops. But the country has

faced public backlash over allegations that a lack of regulation made the drug available to children and caused addiction.

Treechada Srithada, spokesperson for the Health Ministry, said in a statement Thursday that cannabis use in Thailand would become "fully for medical purposes".

She said shops that violate the order will be closed and the ministry will also tighten requirements for approval of a new license in the future. She said there are currently 18,000 shops that hold a licence to sell cannabis. The ruling Pheu Thai Party previously promised to criminalise the drug again, but faced strong resistance from its former partner in the coalition government, the Bhumjaithai Party, which supported decriminalisation.

# German lawmakers vote to suspend family reunions for migrants

German lawmakers voted Friday to suspend family reunions for many migrants, part of a drive by the new conservative-led government for a tougher approach to migration.

Parliament's lower house voted 444-135 to suspend the possibility of family reunions for two years for migrants who have "subsidiary protection", a status that falls short of asylum. At the end of March, more than 388,000 people living in Germany had the status, which was granted to many people fleeing Syria's civil war.

New Chancellor Friedrich Merz made tougher migration policy a central plank of his campaign for Germany's election in February. Just after he took office in early May, the

government stationed more police at the border and said some asylum-seekers trying to enter Europe's biggest economy would be turned away.

The bill approved Friday is the first legislation on migration since Merz took office. It will suspend rules dating to 2018 that allowed up to 1,000 close relatives per month to join the migrants granted limited protection, with authorities making case-by-case decisions on humanitarian grounds rather than granting an automatic right for reunions.

Interior Minister Alexander Dobrindt told lawmakers that the change would result in 12,000 fewer people being able to come to Germany each year and "break a business model" for smugglers.

People often know they won't get full recognition as refugees, "but they set off for Germany because it is known

that, even without asylum recognition ... You can have your family follow", Dobrindt said. "That is a significant pull effect and we are removing this pull effect today." Dobrindt said "our country's capacity for integration simply has a limit".

Liberal opposition lawmakers decried the government's approach. Marcel Emmerich, of the Greens, described the legislation as "an attack on the core of every society, on a truly central value — the family".

Anyone who wants integration must bring families together," he said. The far-right, anti-migration Alternative for Germany described the move as a very small step in the right direction. German Governments have for years faced pressure to curb migration as shelters across the country filled up.

# Bangladesh interim Government forms panel to probe over last three elections

The interim government of Bangladesh has formed a committee to investigate allegations of irregularities, corruption and administrative involvement in the 2014, 2018, and 2024 general elections and make recommendations on ensuring fair elections in the future, a notification said.

The five-member panel led by former high court justice Shamim Hasnain will submit a report by September 30 on allegations that the three elections were manipulated to secure victories for the then-ruling Awami League party by systematically depriving citizens of their voting rights, BD NEWS 24 quoted the cabinet division notification as saying on Thursday.

The notification said the rule of law, democracy, and fundamental human rights were reportedly undermined during the elections, which faced widespread criticism both domestically and internationally.

It said the committee would analyse reports from election observers, domestic and international monitoring bodies, civil society organisations, and media regarding the 2014, 2018, and 2024 elections and collect and review expert opinions on the overall integrity and acceptability of these elections.

The committee will also assess the role of the then-ruling party and associated entities in restricting political participation and obstructing the exercise of voting rights, evaluate the functions of the election commissions, their secretariats, and the administration

during those elections, and examine the roles played by law enforcement and intelligence agencies, it said.

Additionally, it will investigate financial irregularities reportedly committed by the respective election commissions and determine accountability for the irregularities observed in those elections, the notification said.

It will then provide recommendations regarding necessary reforms in laws, regulations, the role of the election commission, and administrative arrangements to ensure free, fair, and credible elections in the future.

The notification further said the committee may also summon documents from any office and interrogate relevant individuals, and if necessary, co-opt additional members to support the investigation.

# Talks with US complicated by US strike: Iran's diplomat

Iran's top diplomat said the possibility of new negotiations with the United States on his country's nuclear programme has been "complicated" by the American attack on three of the sites, which he conceded caused "serious damage".

The US was one of the parties to the 2015 nuclear deal in which Iran agreed to limits on its uranium enrichment program in exchange for sanctions relief and other benefits.

That deal unravelled after US President Donald Trump pulled the US out unilaterally during his first term. Trump has suggested he is interested in new talks with Iran and said the two sides would meet next week.

In an interview on Iranian state television broadcast late Thursday, Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi left open the possibility that his country would again enter talks on its nuclear program, but suggested it would not be anytime soon.

"No agreement has been made for



resuming the negotiations," he said. "No time has been set, no promise has been made, and we haven't even talked about restarting the talks."

The American decision to intervene militarily "made it more complicated and more difficult" for talks on Iran's nuclear program, Araghchi said.

In Friday prayers, many imams stressed Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei's message from the day

before that the war had been a victory for Iran.

Cleric Hamzeh Khalili, who also is the deputy chief justice of Iran, vowed during a prayer service in Tehran that the courts would prosecute people accused of spying for Israel "in a special way".

During the war with Israel, Iran hanged several people who it already had in custody on espionage charges,

sparking fears from activists that it could conduct a wave of executions after the conflict ended. Authorities reportedly have detained dozens in various cities on the charge of cooperation with Israel.

Israel attacked Iran on June 13, targeting its nuclear sites, defense systems, high-ranking military officials and atomic scientists in relentless attacks.

In 12 days of strikes, Israel said it killed some 30 Iranian commanders and 11 nuclear scientists, while hitting eight nuclear-related facilities and more than 720 military infrastructure sites. More than 1,000 people were killed, including at least 417 civilians, according to the Washington-based Human Rights Activists group.

Iran fired more than 550 ballistic missiles at Israel, most of which were intercepted but those that got through caused damage in many areas and killed 28 people.

Israeli military spokesperson Brig. Gen Effie Defrin told reporters Friday that in some areas it had exceeded its operational goals, but needed to remain vigilant.

# Wildfire prompts evacuations near Athens as heat wave hits Greece

A large wildfire broke out south of Athens on Thursday, triggering authorities to issue evacuation orders and shut down parts of the coastal road linking the Greek capital to Souinion, location of the ancient Temple of Poseidon, a major tourist attraction.

The fire came as temperatures approached 40 degrees Celsius (104 Fahrenheit) in Greece's first heatwave of the summer.

"Right now, strong land and air forces are fighting a huge battle against the flames, mainly among homes," fire department spokesman Col. Vassilis Vathrakogiannis said during a press briefing Thursday afternoon.

Twelve water-dropping planes and 12 helicopters were providing air support to 130 firefighters, backed up by volunteer firefighters in the Palaia Fokaia seaside area south of Athens, Vathrakogiannis said. A coast guard firefighting vessel doused the flames from the sea. The fire, which reportedly broke out within a populated area, was fanned by strong winds that frequently changed

direction, sending plumes of smoke fanning out across the sky. Television footage showed at least one home burning.

Local mayor Dimitris Loukas said on Greece's state-run ERT television that several houses were believed to have been damaged by the blaze, but added that exact information on property destruction was not immediately available.

The coast guard said two patrol boats and nine private vessels were on standby in the Palaia Fokaia area in case an evacuation by sea became necessary. Ambulances were also on standby but had not been required by Thursday afternoon, authorities said. "We're telling people to leave their homes," local town councilor Apostolos Papadakis said on Greece's state-run ERT television. Parts of the coastal road connecting Athens to Souinion were closed in both directions, with people urged to take alternate routes to leave the area.

Fire department spokesman Vassilis Vathrakogiannis said 40 people had been evacuated by police, while evacuation orders were issued for a total of five areas.

The cause of the fire was

not immediately known, but the fire department spokesman said that an arson investigation unit had been sent to the area.

The entire wider Athens area, as well as several Aegean islands, were on Level 4 of a 5-level scale for the danger of wildfires due to the weather conditions, with the heatwave expected to last until the weekend.

Earlier in the week, hundreds of firefighters took four days to bring a major wildfire under control on the eastern Aegean island of Chios. More than a dozen evacuation orders had been issued for Chios, where the flames devoured forest and farmland. The fire department said one woman had been arrested on suspicion of having contributed to that fire's start - reportedly by discarding a cigarette.

Wildfires are frequent in Greece during its hot, dry summers. In 2018, a massive fire swept through the seaside town of Mati, east of Athens, trapping people in their homes and on roads as they tried to flee. More than 100 died, including some who drowned trying to swim away from the flames.

# Starmer waters down planned welfare cuts after revolt in Labour Party

British Prime Minister Keir Starmer gave way to political pressure on Friday, watering down planned welfare reforms to avoid defeat by his own party's lawmakers. It's the latest forced U-turn for a centre-left Government caught between conflicting goals of cutting spending and improving public services.

The government planned to bring a bill to Parliament next week that would tighten eligibility for a key disability benefit, removing the Personal Independence Payment from hundreds of thousands of people with long-term physical or mental health conditions.

Another health-related benefit received by people on low

incomes would also be reduced under the plans.

The Government said the proposed changes would help people find jobs while preserving a safety net for those who can never work. It would also save an estimated 5 billion pounds (\$7 billion) a year from a welfare bill that has ballooned since the COVID-19 pandemic. But many Labour lawmakers balked at the changes, which the Institute for Fiscal Studies think tank estimated would cut the income of 3.2 million people by 2030.

More than 120 of the 403 Labour legislators signed a motion that would effectively kill the bill if it were to be passed. Defeat at the hands of his own party in the vote planned for Tuesday would have seriously damaged Starmer's authority.

To avoid that, the government said it would ensure no one who currently receives the PIP benefit will lose it.

Starmer was elected a year ago in a landslide victory, winning a commanding majority of seats in the House of Commons. Since then his popularity has plunged as a sluggish economy and stubbornly high inflation resist efforts to raise living standards and ease a cost-of-living squeeze.

Even as Starmer enjoyed success on the world stage — charming US President Donald Trump and securing a trade deal to exempt Britain from some US tariffs — Labour lawmakers have grown restive at the party's sagging poll ratings and the rise of the hard-right Reform UK party led by Nigel Farage.

# Israel-Iran tensions wake-up call for Asia

Asia's dependence on Middle East oil and gas — and its relatively slow shift to clean energy — make it vulnerable to disruptions in shipments through the Strait of Hormuz, a strategic weakness highlighted by the war between Israel and Iran.

Iran sits on the strait, which handles about 20 per cent of shipments of the world's oil and liquefied natural gas, or LNG. Four countries — China, India, Japan and South Korea — account for 75 per cent of those imports.

Japan and South Korea face the highest risk, according to analysis by the research group Zero Carbon Analytics, followed by India and China. All have been slow to scale up use of renewable energy.

In 2023, renewables made up just nine per cent of South Korea's power mix — well below the 33 per cent average among other members of the Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development, or OECD. In

the same year, Japan relied more heavily on fossil fuels than any other country in the Group of Seven, or G7.

A truce in the 12-day Israel-Iran war appeared to be holding, reducing the potential for trouble for now. But experts say the only way to counter lingering uncertainty is to scale back reliance on imported fossil fuels and accelerate Asia's shift to clean, domestic energy sources.

"These are very real risks that countries should be alive to — and should be thinking about in terms of their energy and economic security," said Murray Worthy, a research analyst at Zero Carbon Analytics.

**Japan and South Korea are vulnerable**

China and India are the biggest buyers of oil and LNG passing through the potential chokepoint at the Strait of Hormuz, but Japan and South Korea are more vulnerable.

Japan depends on imported fossil fuels for 87 per cent of its total energy use and South Korea imports 81 per cent.

# Using TikTok could be making you more politically polarised: Study

People on TikTok tend to follow accounts that align with their own political beliefs, meaning the platform is creating political echo chambers among its users.

These findings, from a study my collaborators, Yanlin Li and Homero Gil de Zúñiga, and I published in the academic journal New Media & Society, show that people mostly hear from voices they already agree with.

We analysed the structure of different political networks on TikTok and found that right-leaning communities are more isolated from other political groups and from mainstream news outlets. Looking at their internal structures, the right-leaning communities are more tightly connected than their left-leaning counterparts.

In other words, conservative TikTok users tend to stick together. They rarely follow accounts with opposing views or mainstream media



accounts. Liberal users, on the other hand, are more likely to follow a mix of accounts, including those they might disagree with.

Our study is based on a massive dataset of over 16 million TikTok videos from more than 160,000 public accounts between 2019 and 2023. We saw a spike of political TikTok videos during the 2020 US presidential election.

More importantly, people aren't just passively watching political content; they're actively creating political content themselves.

Some people are more outspoken about politics than

others. We found that users with stronger political leanings and those who get more likes and comments on their videos are more motivated to keep posting. This shows the power of partisanship, but also the power of TikTok's social rewards system. Engagement signals — likes, shares, comments — are like a fuel, encouraging users to create even more. Why it matters

People are turning to TikTok not just for a good laugh. A recent Pew Research Centre survey shows that almost 40 per cent of US adults under 30 regularly get news on TikTok.

# One killed, 11 wounded in Israeli strikes on Lebanon

Israel's air force carried out intense airstrikes on mountains overlooking a southern city in Lebanon on Friday, in an attack that the Israeli military said targeted underground assets of the Hezbollah militant group. Shortly afterward, an apartment building in the nearby city of Nabatieh was struck, killing one woman, wounding 11 and knocking out the building's top floor, according to Lebanon's state news agency. The state-run National News Agency reported that the woman killed lived in Germany

and had come back to Lebanon less than a month earlier to visit family. It wasn't immediately clear if she was a German citizen. The woman's apartment was hit by an Israeli drone strike, according to the report. The Israeli army, in a statement posted on X, denied targeting a civilian building. The statement said the building was hit by a Hezbollah rocket that had been stored at another location that was targeted by an airstrike and "launched, and exploded as a result." It blamed Hezbollah for storing weapons near residential areas. Since the 14-month Israel-Hezbollah war ended with a US-brokered ceasefire in November,

Israel has carried out almost daily airstrikes on southern Lebanon. Friday's strikes were more intense than usual. "We are steadfast no matter how much you bomb us with your fighter jets and drones," Hassan Ghandour, a Shiite cleric from Nabatieh, told The Associated Press at the scene of the building. Lebanon's president and

prime minister condemned the Israeli strikes on south Lebanon, saying they violated the ceasefire deal. The airstrikes on the mountains overlooking Nabatieh came in two waves, and bunker busters were used, Lebanon's state-run National News Agency reported. NNA said that four people were slightly wounded in the airstrikes outside the city. The Israeli military said in a statement that its fighter jets struck a site used by Hezbollah to manage its fire and defense array in the area and is part of a significant underground project that was completely taken out of use.

The Israeli army said that it identified rehabilitation attempts by Hezbollah beforehand and struck infrastructure sites in the area. There was no immediate comment from Hezbollah. Hezbollah suffered significant losses on the battlefield during the war, which left more than 4,000 people dead in Lebanon and caused destruction amounting to USD 11 billion. In Israel, 127 people died, including 80 soldiers. As part of the ceasefire deal, Hezbollah was pushed away from areas bordering Israel in south Lebanon and isn't allowed to have an armed presence south of the Litani River.



## UK military base break in: Four arrested

British counterterrorism police said Friday that they have arrested four people in connection with a break-in at a military base last week, during which two planes were vandalised. Counter Terrorism Policing South East said in a statement that two men, 24 and 36, from London were arrested Thursday along with a 29-year-old woman of no fixed address "on suspicion of the commission, preparation or instigation of acts of terrorism". A 41-year-old woman, of no fixed address, was also arrested on suspicion of assisting an offender.

**They remain in police custody** The arrests relate to a break-in at the Royal Air Force base in Brize Norton, during which two planes were damaged with red paint. The pro-Palestinian activist group Palestine Action subsequently released video footage appearing to show one of the two activists who entered the base spraying the paint into a jet's turbine engines. The group alleged that Britain was continuing to "send military cargo, fly spy planes over Gaza and refuel US/Israeli fighter jets," and

condemned the country as "an active participant in the Gaza genocide and war crimes across the Middle East". Earlier this week, the British government said it will ban Palestine Action under anti-terrorism laws. The measure means it will be a criminal offense to belong to or support the group, with a maximum of

14 years in prison. # Pardon letters being crafted with a man in mind: Trump

Pounding away on a prison typewriter, Chad Scott seemed worlds apart from President Donald Trump. But when the disgraced narcotics agent wrote the White House seeking clemency for his corruption conviction, Scott sought to draw Trump's attention to what they have in common. Both men had survived a bullet wound to the ear, Scott wrote, and had been convicted of falsifying records. They were also each a victim of "political persecution," the type of catchphrase the former agent hoped would resonate with a man who has long complained of witch hunts. By helping him, Scott argued, Trump would be showing he had "the back of law enforcement."

"Chad Scott is a hero in this country's war on drugs," his attorney wrote in a clemency petition reviewed by The Associated Press, adding it would be a "gross waste of taxpayer money" to house and feed the former US Drug Enforcement Administration agent for six more years. Scott's application is hardly unique, according to prisoners, defense attorneys and officials. The White House and the Justice Department have received a wave of such requests - all carefully crafted to capture the attention and fancy of Trump or those who know his inclinations. The flurry, legal experts said, has been sparked by Trump's frequent and eyebrow-raising grants of clemency since retaking office in January. The Republican president has pardoned and commuted the sentences of more than 1,600 people, including many political allies, former GOP officeholders and hundreds charged or convicted in the 2021 Capitol riot. He even pardoned a pair

of reality TV stars who were serving time for bank fraud and tax evasion. In doing so, Trump has largely cast aside a process that historically has been overseen by nonpolitical personnel at the Justice Department who spent their days poring over clemency applications - thick packets filled with character references attesting to applicants' atonement and good deeds. Only those meeting strict criteria were then passed along to the White House. Those procedures appear to have been replaced by the caprice of a president known for his transactional approach to governance, his loyalty to supporters and his disdain for perceived enemies. It's created "a free-for-all" for those seeking clemency, said Liz Oyer, the Justice Department's former pardon attorney, who was fired in March. "The traditional process and practices," she told the AP, "all seem to have fallen by the wayside."

**Inmates believe Trump might hear them out** That has left an opening for prisoners like Eric Sanchez Chaparro, who is seeking a commutation for a drug and weapons conviction that carries a 19-year prison sentence. The optimism, he said, has never been higher for those behind bars. "In many ways I feel like he has the same point of view that we've got," Chaparro said in a telephone interview, noting that both he and the president were convicted of felonies. Trump was convicted last year on New York state charges of falsifying business records related to hush money payments to a porn star but was sentenced to no punishment. "Even though people try to put him down," Chaparro added, "he kept on pushing for his goal." The Trump administration did not disclose how many peo-



ple have reached out to Trump or White House officials to seek clemency, though some have boasted of doing so in colourful ways. Last week, Joe Exotic, the former zookeeper known as the "Tiger King," posted a song he said he wrote for Trump on social media, claiming he was "paying the time for a crime I didn't do." He's serving a 21-year sentence for the failed murder-for-hire of an animal-welfare activist.

**Wave of pardon applications lands at Justice Department** Since Trump retook office five months ago, his Justice Department has received more than 9,300 petitions seeking commutations of sentences or pardons. At that pace, the tally would blow past the approximately 15,000 petitions filed during the four years of President Joe Biden's Democratic administration. The Justice Department received about 12,000 petitions in Trump's first term. Clemency is perhaps the most unchecked power enjoyed by a president, as actions can-

not be undone by courts or other officials. Presidents can commute sentences - reducing or eliminating them - or bestow a pardon that wipes away convictions or criminal charges. Trump is hardly the first president to generate controversy over how he has handled such powers. Biden prompted bipartisan outrage in December when he pardoned his son Hunter, sparing him a possible prison sentence for felony gun and tax convictions. And Biden was sharply criticized - mainly by Republicans - for issuing preemptive pardons to protect lawmakers, former officials and his family members from what he described as a potentially vindictive Trump administration.

**Trump's handling of pardons is unprecedented, experts say** Even so, legal scholars say, Trump's approach to clemency has veered into unprecedented territory. The president, for example, tapped a vociferous political supporter, Ed

Martin Jr., to be the Justice Department's pardon attorney. Martin is a former defense lawyer who represented Jan. 6 rioters and promoted false claims that the 2020 election had been stolen by Democrats. Trump gave Martin the post after pulling his nomination to be the US attorney for the District of Columbia in the face of bipartisan concerns over his divisive politics. 



# Inside the mind of...

Kay Kay Menon, Neeraj Pandey and Vinay Pathak on Stillness, Scripts and the nuanced challenge of truly surviving the camera’s unblinking gaze, rather than just performing for it

In a quiet room away from the flashbulbs and high-security sets, the core team of **Special Ops 2**, gathered for a freewheeling conversation. If the series throws you into a world of cyber surveillance, coded messages and geopolitics, the conversation behind it was one of clarity, stillness and sharp personal memory. What happens when some of India’s sharpest creative minds sit across from each other, not on a high-octane set, but in a quiet room, away from the lens and lights? The conversation takes on a life of its own. That’s exactly what happened during an interaction with the trio behind **Special Ops 2**, Kay Kay Menon, Neeraj Pandey and Vinay Pathak. What was meant to be a quick interview turned into a masterclass in acting, writing and creative conviction.



Kay Kay Menon shared his admiration for the writing, saying, “All the actor needs to do is to follow and understand the subtext behind those lines and the way he is writing it. So, that makes my job easy.”

## FROM SCREEN TO SOUL: THE IMPACT

Kay Kay Menon returns with more grit, more restraint and even more shadows behind his eyes. Vinay Pathak reprises his beloved Abbas Sheikh with his signature blend of humour and steel. And Creator Neeraj Pandey remains the understated mastermind of it all, still insistent that “we’re just telling the story, what you take away is up to you.” **Special Ops 2** stars a powerhouse cast including

Karan Tacker, Shivam Nair and Tahir Raj Bhasin alongside Menon and Pathak. From regret over not killing a character to refusing to impress the camera, this was storytelling stripped of vanity. And that is perhaps what makes both **Special Ops 2** and this conversation worth coming back to. Streaming July 11. But the dialogue begins now.

### The Unseen Depths

There’s espionage, a world built not just on plot twists and shootouts, but on complex characters, silent stares and the weight of choices made in the shadows. If season one was about establishing the universe, season two pushes it into emotionally richer and technically sharper terrain. With returning favourites like Himmat Singh (Kay Kay Menon) and Abbas Sheikh (Vinay Pathak), along with new additions, the series explores the personal costs of operating in a world that thrives on deception. Neeraj Pandey, as always, remains committed to authenticity: “We don’t customise any messaging for any audience. It’s for you to take away. If it’s a film or a series, it’s up to you what you want to take away from it. I’m just telling the story. I’m just trying to speak what the characters are feeling, what they’re going through.” From that space of lived experience came a conversation both intense

and wildly entertaining. Neeraj Pandey, when asked about the most difficult scenes to shoot? “We can talk about some locations which were like a logistical nightmare. But still, the crew managed to hang in and complete those sequences.”

### Character Evolution

The interview began with the question of character evolution. “So how did it grow or challenge you as an actor?” Vinay responded in his trademark comic irony: “What I understood of the question is that you’re saying that looking at me, it seems like everything is challenging that comes my way... I think you should ask this question to the creator who makes it challenging every time. Why can’t he keep things simple?”

He continued, drawing a comparison to real-life hierarchy, “So I know if you go higher in the rank, you will realise how things become a little more intense. But on my level, even though I’m on a two-wheeler, things are not as simple.” On a deeper note, when I asked if there was one role that had changed his approach to acting, Vinay paused, reflected and said: “I don’t think of it as a role. But I think of it as a story. Because that’s what got me excited in the very beginning, to become the storyteller. So I think that’s what, Theatre, I would say.. For me, it started there.”

### Leaving Characters Behind

It was actor Kay Kay Menon’s candour that brought another level of gravity to the exchange. When asked what remains of his character Hemant Singh after filming, he replied with simplicity and honesty: “Nothing.” Would any character follow

Cybersecurity and cyber threats are present-day reality. A lot of what you see this season is inspired by real interactions and insights from people in the intelligence world. That authenticity has always been at the heart of our storytelling. — NEERAJ PANDEY

### IMPACT ON HIS ACTORS

When asked what stands out about working with Neeraj Pandey, both actors didn’t hold back in their admiration for his writing. “There’s something very surrealistically wonderful about his writing which just falls into the right place,” said Kay Kay. Vinay echoed this, calling the writing “authentic” and “precisely what makes the actor’s job easier.” Neeraj Pandey, modest as ever, refused to be drawn into compliments. “What people think of me is none of my business. What’s more important is the work that we are doing, in order to make something which is of some resonance, something that can stand the test of time, you have to bring your best foot forward.” And as for regrets? “I regret not killing a character... Originally, Abbas was supposed to die. In the seventh episode. But we took the right decision not to kill him.” That creative restraint, knowing when to step back for the sake of the narrative’s future.

Adhikari from Madhya Pradesh. Together, they presented Raga Madhukauns with Pt Durjay Bhaumik on Tabla, balancing control and grace in equal measure. The evening culminated with a special solo recital by Pandit Abhay Rustum Sopori, accompanied by Pt Ram Kumar Mishra on Tabla. His rendering of Raga Sohni carried the weight of memory and devotion. It was both personal and profound. Prof Aparna Sopori described the celebration as a cultural movement aimed at repositioning the Santoor as a symbol of India’s spiritual and musical heritage. Pandit Abhay Sopori reflected on the growing global recognition of the instrument, with performances this year extending to Argentina, China, Colombia, and various parts of India. The auditorium remained packed throughout. Listeners were part of a rare musical moment, where strings told stories, and silence sang between the notes.

## Art’s Emotional Resonance

Where colours question the soul and bronze breathes silence, a journey into the unseen self, says SAKSHI PRIYA

There’s something meditative about standing in front of art that speaks in silences, contradictions, and layered whispers. **Atmanaveshana**, an evocative exhibition of paintings and sculptures, felt like that quiet conversation one has not with the world but with the self. The name, which translates to “Self-Exploration,” was a fitting threshold to step through. The show brought together the emotionally resonant abstract works of Dr Amrit Kapoor and the contemplative bronzes of sculptor Suresh Kumar.

Walking into the gallery, the immediate impression was not of looking at art but of being looked at. Visitors stood still, some in front of colour-drenched canvases, others surrounding bronzed bulls, pointing gently and absorbing slowly. One older couple stood arm in arm before a painting from the *Dichotomy* series, exchanging glances, visibly moved. A young artist scribbled something into a sketchpad in front of a sculpture titled *Third Face*.

Kapoor’s works require time. They yield meaning gradually. The word “harmony” is often associated with music, but in these works, it takes on a visual cadence. In contrast, Dichotomy offers more tension. Here, Kapoor explores the conflict between heart and mind, a philosophical premise that unfolds through dissonant brushwork and disrupted symmetry. Lines clash, colours argue. One canvas in particular had deep strokes of crimson colliding with pale turquoise, a metaphor perhaps for emotional entanglement. There is discomfort in some of the works, but not despair, an honest admission that the self is not always at peace with itself.

Her final collection, *Utopian World*, turns outward, imagining a space where soul, morality, and happiness

find equilibrium. These paintings are lighter, less conflicted, but still thoughtful, like the pause after a long conversation, when all that remains is reflection. Across the room, Suresh Kumar’s bronzes provided an earthier gravity. Kumar’s sculptures feel grounded, tactile, and elemental. His *trilogy of bulls*, each cast in bronze, yet distinct in patina and energy, dominated the central floor space. Though static, there was nothing still about them. The posture, curvature and surface texture of each sculpture conveyed a subtle


motion, as if these beasts, emblematic of strength and resilience, had paused momentarily before resuming their journey. In Indian culture, the bull holds layered meaning, symbolising both raw power and deep spiritual rootedness. Kumar’s series embraces that duality. The largest bull had a matte, weathered texture, like it had emerged from cen-

turies of earth. The smallest gleamed with a smoother surface, youthful yet stoic. His piece *Life of Nature* echoed the same sentiment. Then came *Third Face*, a human visage sculpted in bronze, deeply meditative. Its expression was not mournful, but contemplative. This exhibition felt like the rare quiet room where one could hear their own thoughts.


