Ex-Gujarat CM Rupani dies

Former Gujarat Chief Minister Vijay Rupani died on Thursday after an Air India aircraft carrying him and 241 others crashed near Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport airport in Ahmedabad in the afternoon, Union minister C R Patil said.

Rupani, 68, was the chief minister from 2016 till 2021, after winning the Gujarat Legislative Assembly elections from Rajkot West seat. The London-bound flight AI 171, which Rupani took on Monday, was carrying 169 Indians, 53 British nationals, seven Portuguese, and one Canadian national, apart from two pilots and 10 cabin crew members.

An Ahmedabad-London Air India plane carrying 242 passengers and crew crashed into a medical college complex here minutes after takeoff on Thursday, possibly killing all on board in one of the country's worst air tragedies.

There was no official count of those killed even hours after the Boeing 787 Dreamliner (AI171) crashed in the city civil hospital and BJ Medical College near the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport and burst



Rescue teams searching for survivers at the spot

As rescuers struggled to find survivors in the charred wreckage and pull out the injured, many of them with grievous burns, officials tried to assess the human magnitude of the disaster. Unofficial reports said chances of survival of those on board were remote and up to 25 people in the medical complex could also have died.

According to Air India, of the 230 passengers, 169 were

Indians, 53 British, seven Portuguese and one Canadian. The other 12 were two pilots and 10 crew members.

The pilot of the twin-engine wide bodied aircraft issued a 'Mayday' distress call, denoting a full emergency, soon after takeoff at 1.39 pm, the Air Traffic Control at Ahmedabad

The search was also on for the aircraft's black box -- the flight data recorder and cockpit voice recorder -- for clues to understand what happened in the last crucial moments.

Failure of both engines or a bird hit soon after take-off could be among the probable causes that led to the fatal crash of a Londonbound Air India aircraft with 242 people onboard, according to

Three senior wide-body pilots,

who are also instructors, said that looking at the videos of the crash available publicly, it seems that the engines could not gain the required thrust needed for the take-off, resulting in a fatal crash into the residential area seconds after it took off.

The specific reasons for the crash of the Boeing 787-8 air-

craft flying from Ahmedabad to London Gatwick will be known only after the completion of the detailed probe by the Aircraft Accident Investigation Bureau (AAIB). The experts mentioned the possible causes based on the available visuals of the aircraft as it went down.

One of the commanders said it does not seem to be the case of one engine failure because in such a scenario, the aircraft

would have been swinging but here, the aircraft was steady.

An Air India Boeing 787-8 Dreamliner with 242 people on board -- 230 passengers, 10 crew members and 2 pilots -- crashed immediately after take-off from Ahmedabad airport.

The flight, headed to London, departed at 13:38 pm from the Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport. The failure to achieve lift happened at a very low altitude of 825 feet.

Nearly 40 doctors have been wounded and at least one is in a critical situation. Speaking to NDTV, Dr Shyam Govind, an eye witness from the BJ Medical College said, "I and my junior doctor have been injured. 30-40 undergraduate doctors also suffered injuries and one to two students are serious.

Thanks to targeted retraining, TPS has become a routine classroom practice in many government colleges and polytechnics in Andhra Pradesh, with encouraging results in student participation and spoken fluency.


Seeding Systemic Change The turning point in this educational transformation came in 2007–08, with the launch of the Andhra Pradesh English Lecturers Retraining Programme,

Programme. Spearheaded by the Department of Collegiate Education in collaboration with the U.S. State Department's English Language Fellow (ELF) Program, the initiative trained English lecturers from degree colleges across all districts of the State. This retraining followed a cascading model:

- One lecturer per district was selected and trained at a central venue.
- These lecturers then trained 20
- peers in zonal workshops. Follow-up training was conducted in the home zones, reinforcing concepts and prac-
- Lecturers eventually graduated into roles as Master Trainers, conducting further workshops and mentoring.

Practical elements were at the core of the training—demonstration lessons, peer feedback, student-centered planning, and an emphasis on low-resource techniques like TPS and group tasks. The programme also produced custom handbooks and activity kits to help lecturers integrate CLT practices in large, diverse

After the success in degree colleges, the Department extended



CLT training to the technical education sector. Polytechnic lecturers received similar retraining. Consequently, the faculty thus trained developed workbooks following CLT method for diploma students. These workbooks focused on 21st century skills such as creativity, critical thinking and problem solving in addition to communication skills, workplace communication, and task-based learning, preparing students for job interviews, pre-

sentations, and collaborative tasks-critical components of employability.

At the heart of Andhra Pradesh's transformation in English language education stands Dr K Lakshminarayana, IAS (Retd.), the then Commissioner of Collegiate and Technical Education. Widely regarded as the architect of the CLT movement in the State, his leadership gave direction, scale, and sustainability to what began training. Dr Lakshminarayana believed that true student success depends not only on academic degrees but on the ability to communicate effectively in real-world contexts. His strategic initiatives-ranging from curriculum innovation, partnerships with international ELT bodies, use of educational media like MANA TV, and creation of a state-wide cadre of Master Trainers—brought a systemic and scalable shift to classroom

practices. The results were tangible. Student engagement in English classrooms improved dramatically, and campus placement rates soared from a modest 5-6% to nearly 30% in several government colleges and polytechnics. These

brought in through CLT. In 2008, his trailblazing efforts received global recognition when he was awarded the TESOL Global Advocacy Leadership Award at the TESOL International Convention in New York. This rare honour not only celebrated his contribution but also placed Andhra Pradesh on the international map of English language education reform. Dr Lakshminarayana's legacy endures in the classrooms he transformed, the teachers he empowered, and the students who today speak with confidence-because he believed English should be taught not as a subject, but as a lifelong skill for opportunity and inclusion.

The AP-ELF initiative and its extensions have left a lasting mark on Andhra Pradesh's educational ecosystem:

Dists told to make Hyd-style flood plans Harish slams Cong for ignoring

PNS HYDERABAD

With the India Meteorological Department predicting abovenormal rainfall in Telangana this monsoon, Revenue and Housing Minister Ponguleti Srinivasa Reddy directed all district collectors, especially those in the Godavari and Krishna basin areas, to be on high alert and initiate preemptive flood mitigation measures. "We must respond before the damage occurs—not after," the minister told officials during a high-level review meeting held at the Secretariat on

Citing last year's experience of flash floods causing extensive damage in riverine districts, Ponguleti emphasized that Hyderabad's disaster preparedness model should now be replicated in districts. To strengthen coordination and institutional response, a high-

constituted with the HYDRAA Commissioner, Fire Services DGP, Disaster Management Commissioner, Command Control Centre Director, and Commissioners Irrigation, Roads & Buildings, and Health departments. The committee is expected to submit its action plan within a week.

Ponguleti underlined the need for a complete shift from

outdated methods. "Revenue and disaster management departments must now adopt advanced technologies and real-time coordination," he said. Every district must formulate its flood response plan by June 30, detailing evacuation routes, relief camp sites, emergency contact numbers, and safety protocols. The Telangana Integrated Command and Control Centre in Hyderabad

will extend user IDs for live

coordination and alerts.

The minister instructed collectors to immediately begin surveying vulnerable areas along the Godavari and Krishna rivers and plan for permanent rehabilitation of highrisk settlements. "All families in flood-prone zones should be relocated and provided Indiramma housing for longterm safety," he said. Control rooms must be acti-

vated in high-risk zones, he

said, with rescue teams preidentified and trained in evacuation drills. Social awareness campaigns will be rolled out with the help of local volun-teers, SDRF, NDRF, and the fire services to prepare communities for emergencies.

He called for immediate inspection and repair of flood banks, canals, and stormwater drains. Emergency kits with boats, life jackets, dry ration packets, medical supplies, and water purification tablets should be pre-positioned in vulnerable mandals. Mobile medical units must be ready with adequate personnel and medicine stock.

Public engagement will also be a key strategy, he added. "Hold direct community meetings and use public address systems to spread awareness on flood safety. The public must be made part of our disaster

Yadav representation in Cabinet

Former minister and Siddipet MLA Harish Rao came down heavily on the Congress government for neglecting the Yadav community, stating that despite promises, the current regime has failed to deliver meaningful representation or development initiatives for backward communi-

Addressing a felicitation ceremony for meritorious Yadav students at the Sri Krishna Yadav Function Hall in Siddipet, Harish said that it was disappointing that the Congress government did not induct even a single member from the Yadav community into the cabinet. In contrast, he recalled, under KCR's leadership, Yadavs were given due recognition, including the construction of self-respect buildings at



Harish ridiculed Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy for taking back DDs issued to the Yadav community and questioned the sincerity of the government's commitment to backward classes. "You couldn't even distribute sheep units to Yadavs, but you managed to cancel allocations already made," he said, accusing the Congress of tokenism.

The former minister also

raised concerns about governance gaps, pointing out that despite schools reopening, the education department still does not have a minister. He said veterinary hospitals lacked basic medicines and alleged that key welfare schemes had been qui-etly shelved. "They scrapped the 'Mana Ooru Mana Badi' programme, and not a single classroom has been built under the Congress rule so far," he said.

Harish expressed concern that PG students had been left in the lurch due to non-clearance of reimbursement dues, forcing many to halt their education. "This government was voted to power on hope and big promises, but it has failed to honour its word. People trusted Revanth's guarantees, but none have been fulfilled even after 600 days," he

be seen from miles away, losing altitude rapidly and combusting in a fiery blaze that sent plumes of thick black smoke spiralling up in the air. The aircraft climbed just about 600-800 feet before plummeting to the ground almost immediately, aviation sources said. Former Gujarat chief minister and BJP leader Vijay Rupani was among the passengers on the doomed flight to London's Gatwick airport.

"The aircraft departed from Ahmedabad at 1339 IST (0809) UTC) from Runway 23. It gave a MAYDAY Call to ATC, but thereafter no response was given by the aircraft to the calls made by ATC," according to a statement from the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA). Visuals from the

wreckage area showed bodies r-old aircraft could being pulled out and the inju many with burns, wheeled into the city civil hospital close by.

Eyewitnesses in Ahmedabad said the blaze was so intense that it led to several multi-storey buildings being burnt, trees singed and cars damaged. One image showed the snout of the plane crashing through the top floor of a building that appeared to be a dining area of the hostel of nurses and doctors. Elsewhere too, there were scenes of complete devastation with mangled metal of the wreckage, snarls of tangled wire and smoke rising from burning embers.

This is the first crash involving the Boeing Dreamliner, feted for its advanced features. It is also India's second biggest air disaster since 2020 when an Air India Express flight skidded off a wet

runway while landing at Kozhikode in Kerala and split into two. Of the 190 people on board, 21, including two pilots, in Ahmedabad were temporarily suspended and resumed towards the evening. The shock of the disaster echoed through political corridors in India and abroad with heads of states and others offering their condolences.

He also conveyed his heartfelt concern to those awaiting news about their loved ones.




curriculum remains unchanged and advised against the spread of misinformation, which could create confusion among students and parents.

18 injured as privates bus rams into lorry

A private travels bus, which was said to have exceeded speed limit, rammed into a lorry near Bondalakunta under Makthal mandal in the district, leading to serious injuries to 18 passengers, including the bus

According to police sources, a Volvo bus belonging to Durgamma Travels from Shivamogga in Karnataka, was heading to Hyderabad with 29 passengers. Áround 5 am on Thursday, the bus rammed into a lorry from behind on national highway 167, near the outskirts of Narsireddypalli and Jakler villages under Makthal mandal. The front portion of the bus was completely destroyed in the crash.

Upon receiving information about the incident, the police rushed to the spot and initiated rescue operations. Sub-Inspector Bhagyalakshmi Reddy stated that the 18 injured passengers were shifted to Makthal Government Hospital. For better treatment, seven of them were moved to hospitals in Raichur and Mahabubnagar districts.



Mamnoor Airport land acquisition hits a roadblock

Earlier it was thought that all hurdles for the revival of the airport were overcome, but suddenly the farmers started demanding Rs 4 crore per acre

PNS WARANGAL

Contrary to expectations, the land acquisition process for the Warangal Mamnoor Airport, which seemed to be nearing completion, is now taking a step forward and four steps back. Just as officials thought the acquisition was nearing resolution, farmers are raising new objections.

As part of the airport construction, officials and political leaders have been making serious efforts to acquire land from farmers in Nakkalapalli, Gunturpalli, and Gadipalli. Numerous meetings have been held with landowners and displaced farmers. At a recent meeting, authorities announced that compensation would be set at Rs 1.20 crore per acre and Rs 4,887 per square yard for private plots.

Although it seemed like everything had been settled, farmers are now firmly stating that the compensation is inadequate. They argue that there is a significant gap between the government-fixed rate and the prevailing private market value, demanding a minimum of Rs 2 crores per acre. Though the Collector exercised discretionary powers to fix Rs 1.20 crore per acre under a consent award, the farmers are refusing to give up their land



for even a rupee less than Rs 2 crore

The farmers insist that agriculture is their sole livelihood, and with the current compensation, they would need to spend Rs 4 crore to purchase a similar acre of land nearby.

They warn that if the government tries to forcibly acquire their land, they will protest by marching

to the Secretariat. Although the land acquisition process for Mamnoor Airport appeared to have reached its final stages, it has now regressed. Discussions between displaced farmers and officials have also advanced, with the authorities conducting multiple rounds of talks with landowners and private plot holders. Revenue officials explained the land rates to the farmers of Nakkalapalli, Gunturpalli, and Gadipalli.

Even though officials made efforts to offer compensation that was more than triple the government's market value, they could not go beyond Rs 60 lakh per acre. Taking into account the huge gap between government rates and market prices, the Collector used discretionary powers to fix Rs 1.20 crore per acre under the consent award scheme, and Rs 4,887 per square yard for private plots. Farmers said they would convey their decision within a couple of

The farmers said officials have

conducted several surveys over the years, claiming the land would be acquired for Mamnoor Airport. They expressed willingness to give land for district development but lamented that they would lose their livelihood. They emphasised that buying similar land in nearby areas would

A farmer shared, "I have 14 acres of farmland near the village. It's our only livelihood.

Officials said the entire land will be taken for the airport and offered Rs 1.20 crore per acre. But in nearby areas, private agricultural land is valued at Rs 4 crore per acre. If we get at least Rs 2 crores per acre, we can buy some land nearby and continue farming?

Teachers during *Badi* Bata programme have unpleasant experience

As part of the government's prestigious Badi Bata programme (enrolment campaign), teachers who went for the campaign had an unpleasant experience with parents. Teachers are going door-to-door in villages, urging parents to enrol their children in government schools for a brighter future.

In some areas, there was a good response, while in others, the teachers faced opposition and questions from the villagers.

The government launched the Badi Bata programme to increase stu-dent enrolment in government schools, and it is carried out strongly in the Adilabad district.

Since the first week of June, government teachers have been visiting villages, spreading the message to enrol children in government schools. They are promoting the facilities available in government schools, asking, "Does private school staff have as much experience as we do?" The parents questioned, "You are telling us to enrol our children in government schools, but where are your own children studying?" Teachers were left speechless and struggled to answer. Parents went a step further, asking, "Do you even have the right to promote this?" They firmly stated,

"First, enrol your children in government schools, and then come to us.' This left the teachers in a state of confusion.

They did not know how to respond or what to say. Only when they admit their children to these schools, people will have trust in government schools.

The teachers were also asked why, if government schools provide excellent education and all necessary facilities, the children of those who work in these schools are not attending them. "If the children of MEOs, DEOs, and other officials aren't studying in government schools, why should we trust them for our own children?" was the underlying question.

In villages like Yapalaguda in Adilabad and many others, teachers may face similar questions. Teachers, headmasters, MEOs, and DEOs must be prepared with answers. The question is: Will they be ready?

DELHI: SPIKE IN CASES OF HEAT-RELATED ILLNESSES

Hospitals across the national capital have been seeing a surge in patients due to the intense heatwave of the last few days, doctors said on Thursday. People who work directly under the sun are more affected by the heatwave, for which a red alert has been issued in Delhi. At Fortis Escorts Heart Institute, 7-10 per cent of the total outpatient department (OPD) patients have conditions linked to the heatwave, while 5-8 per cent have sought consultations for related symptoms, said Dr Avi Kumar, senior consultant of pulmonology at the hospital. "The cases that are coming are largely mild and not serious enough to require admission," the doctor said. At the Delhi government-run LNJP Hospital, authorities have designated a separate area for patients who are working under the sun. "The patients coming in are rickshaw-pullers, drivers, labourers, mostly those who are engaged in manual work. Patients come in with complaints of abdominal pain, vomitting, dehydration, dizziness. These cases have increases in the last three days," the official added.




DECLARE COW AS 'RASHTRA MATA'

Law & order situation in Tripura has improved: CM

Tripura Chief Minister Manik Saha on Thursday said the law and order situation in the state has improved and the crime rate has reduced by 10 per cent in the first four months of the current year.

Saha said his government has a zero-tolerance policy for drug abuse and smuggling and the law enforcement agencies have achieved good success in seizure and destruction of drugs and narcotics.

"According to NCRB reports, Tripura stands third from the bottom of the crime chart among the 28 states of the country. The overall crime rate has been reduced by 19.40 per cent in 2024 compared to 2023. An average of 10 per cent of crime has reduced in the first four months of the current year," he said.

"An average 106 per cent increase in seizure of drug and contraband items in 2024 compared to 2023 while 132 per cent increase in destruction of seized drug and contraband items during same the period," he said.

The CM said infiltration from across the border (Bangladesh) will not be tolerated and the number of Bangladeshis arrested without valid documents in the state increased by 16 per cent in 2024 compared to 2023.



Major air crashes in India

After a London-bound Air India aircraft crashed shortly after taking off from the Ahmedabad airport on Thursday, the spotlight is back on India's history with aviation disasters.

From deadly mid-air collisions and fatal crashes due to poor weather conditions to runway overshoots at tabletop airports, the country has witnessed several tragedies over the decades.

Here's a list of the most devastating air accidents in India's aviation history:

- Air India Express Flight 1344 (2020): During the COVID-19 pandemic, Air India Express Flight 1344, operating as part of the Vande Bharat repatriation mission, skidded off the runway while landing at the Kozhikode (Calicut) International Airport on August 7, 2020. Amid heavy rainfall, the aircraft overshot the wet tabletop runway, plunged into a valley and split into two. Of the 190 people on board, 21, including two pilots, lost their lives.
- Air India Express Flight 812 (2010): Air India Express Flight 812 overshot the runway while landing at the Mangaluru International Airport in Karnataka on May 22, 2010. The Boeing 737-800, coming from Dubai, plunged into a gorge beyond the tabletop runway and burst into flames, killing 158 people. The tragic incident brought increased scrutiny to India's tabletop airports and landing protocols during adverse conditions.
- Alliance Air Flight 7412 (2000): Alliance Air Flight 7412 crashed into a densely populated residential area in Bihar's Patna while attempting to land on July 17, 2000. The Boeing 737-200 experienced a stall at low altitude due to the reported improper handling during the final approach. Sixty people were killed, including five on the ground. The accident prompted upgrades to approach procedures at smaller urban airports.
- Charkhi Dadri mid-air collision (1996): On November 12, 1996, 349 people were killed in what became India's most devastating aviation disaster. The tragedy occurred when Saudia Flight 763, a Boeing 747, and Kazakhstan Airlines Flight 1907, an Ilyushin Il-76, collided mid-air near Charkhi Dadri in Haryana.

The accident was the result of a communication failure and the Kazakh crew descending below their assigned altitude. Following the incident, India introduced significant aviation safety measures, including mandating the installation of Traffic Collision Avoidance Systems (TCAS) on all commercial

- Indian Airlines Flight 605 (1990): On February 14, 1990, Indian Airlines Flight 605 crashed while approaching Bengaluru's HAL Airport, killing 92 of the 146 people on board. The Airbus A320, a relatively new aircraft in India at the time, descended too low and hit the ground short of the runway, skidding onto a golf course. The investigation revealed that pilot error and unfamiliarity with the advanced digital cockpit of the A320 contributed to the tragic accident.
- Indian Airlines Flight 113 (1988): Amid poor visibility on October 19, 1988, Indian Airlines Flight 113, a Boeing 737-200, crashed on its approach to Ahmedabad Airport. The flight, arriving from Mumbai, struck trees and crashed short of the runway, killing 133 of the 135 people on board. Investigators pointed to pilot error, inadequate weather information, and procedural lapses by air traffic control.
- Air India Flight 855 (1978): On January 1, 1978, Dubai-bound Air India Flight 855, a Boeing 747, plunged into the Arabian Sea shortly after taking off from Mumbai, killing all 213 people on board. The disaster occurred only 101 seconds into the flight Director Indicator led the captain to misinterpret the aircraft's orientation. The crash took place in nighttime conditions over the sea, contributing to the crew's spatial disorientation.
- (1973): On May 31, 1973, Indian Airlines Flight 440 crashed during its approach to Delhi's Palam Airport. The Boeing 737-200 encountered severe weather and struck hightension wires just short of the runway. Of the 65 people on board, 48 died. Among the dead was prominent Indian politician Mohan Kumaramangalam. The crash underscored the need for improved weather radar at Indian airports.



There are reports that the Modi government is likely to roll out 33 per cent reservation for women ahead of the 2029 Lok Sabha elections. Talking about the achieve-

ments of the Modi government, Gadkari said the development of the country and the progress of villages, farmers, labourers and all sections of society in the past 11 years under the leadership of PM Modi is before everyone to see.

Global Gender Gap Index 2025



India has ranked 131 out of 148 countries in the World Economic Forum's Global Gender Gap Report 2025, slipping two places from its position last year.

With a parity score of just 64.1 per cent, Índia is among the lowest-ranked countries in South Asia, according to the report released on Thursday. India ranked 129 last year

out of 146 countries. "In 2025, India ranks 131st, with an overall gender parity score of 64.4 per cent. Compared to the 2024 edition, India sees a relative drop in rank due to the performance of other economies," it said.

The Global Gender Gap Index measures gender parity across four key dimensions: Economic Participation and Opportunity, Educational

Attainment, Health and Survival, and Political Empowerment.

The Indian economy's overall performance improved in absolute terms by +0.3 points.

"One of the dimensions where India increases parity is in Economic Participation and Opportunity, where its score improves by +.9 percentage points to 40.7 per cent. While most indicator values remain

the same, parity in estimated earned income rises from 28.6 per cent to 29.9 per cent, positively impacting the subindex score," the report said.

Scores in labour force participation rate remained the same (45.9 per cent) as last year --India's highest achieved to

In educational attainment, the report said, India scored 97.1 per cent, reflecting positive shifts in female shares for literacy and tertiary education enrolment, which resulted in positive score improvements for the subindex as a

"India also records higher parity in health and survival, driven by improved scores in sex ratio at birth and in healthy life expectancy," it said.

However, similar to other countries, parity in healthy life expectancy is obtained despite an overall reduction in the life expectancy of men and women, the report said.

"Where India records a slight drop in parity (-0.6 points) since the last edition is in Political Empowerment. Female representation in Parliament falls from 14.7 per cent to 13.8 per cent in 2025, lowering the indicator score for the second year in a row below 2023 levels," it said.





Falling Fertility Rate: Crisis or course correction

India's demographic story is changing and with it comes a new set of opportunities and challenges

ndia, with concerns about overpopulation, now faces a very different demographic dilemma - one marked not by too many births, but by too few. According to the UNFPA's State of World Population 2025 report, India's total fertility rate has dropped to 1.9, slipping below the replacement level of 2.1. This means that, on average, Indian women are having fewer children than required to maintain the population size over time. While India remains the most populous country in the world with a population of 1.46 billion, the nature of this growth is undergoing a significant shift. The days of large families are fading, replaced by a quieter but deeply transformative trend of smaller households and fewer births. This decline in fertility didn't occur overnight. It is the cumulative outcome of decades of social progress and change. More girls are completing their education. Access to contraceptives and reproductive health services has expanded. Urbanisation has reshaped lifestyles and aspirations. Cultural norms are evolving, with more women delaying marriage, entering the workforce, and asserting autonomy over reproductive decisions.

In 1960, the average Indian woman had nearly six children. Today, that number has fallen to less than two. This change is more than a demographic trend; it is a powerful indicator of women's empowerment. The falling fertility rate brings with it several positive implications. First and foremost, it reflects an increase in personal choice, particularly for women. It signifies that more individuals now have the option to decide if, when, and how many children they wish to have. As life expectancy rises currently at 74 for women and 71 for men - India will inevitably face a growing elderly population.

But this would also have negative impact as well. The country must prepare for a future in which fewer young workers support a larger ageing population. This could place immense pressure on public healthcare, social welfare systems, and family structures. A declining fertility rate can eventually lead to a shrinking labour force, which, over time, may hinder economic productivity and growth. Countries like Japan, Italy, and South Korea are already grappling with such consequences. India, though better placed demographically at the moment, must take lessons from their experiences to avoid similar pitfalls in the future.

Equally important is the need to address the deep regional and socioeconomic disparities that continue to exist within India. While urban, educated families may be voluntarily choosing to have fewer children, many women in rural and low-income communities still lack access to adequate reproductive healthcare and have limited control over their reproductive choices. This uneven access undermines the very foundation of progress that falling fertility is supposed to represent. Therefore, India's falling fertility rate should not be viewed with alarm, but neither should it be met with complacency. It is not a crisis, but it is a signal — a call for thoughtful planning and inclusive policy. As the UNFPA rightly emphasises, the focus should not be on population panic but on empowering people to make informed, autonomous decisions about their reproductive lives.

Trump takes aim at Ivy League

In a controversial campaign, President Donald Trump has launched an aggressive offensive against America's most prestigious universities, particularly by League institutions, through funding cuts, policy investigations, and harsh rhetoric

S President Donald Trump has targeted top US universities during his second term. He has been waging a war on Ivy League universities for the past few weeks. He has particularly targeted institutions such as Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Columbia, Cornell, Brown, Dartmouth, and the University of Pennsylvania.

This move has shocked the American higher education system. Academia now faces a significant challenge fighting against the administration. Trump's attacks also have a political dimension. They are viewed as a conservative strategy to reduce the influence of liberalism in higher education. They could be aimed at eroding the Democratic Party's traditional support base.

The affected universities, which include those with funding cuts, are located in areas where the Democrats received strong support. Many of these institutions are now facing funding cuts and grant restrictions, which have significantly impacted their research and educational programmes. Conservatives have often complained about a bias in these institutions. Some view that these are part of the Trump administration's effort to reshape higher education.

One speculation is that Trump harbours resentment towards Ivy League schools for not granting him an honorary degree or inviting him to speak at graduation, despite his graduation from the Wharton School. Most recent American presidents have graduated from Ivy League universities, including Trump, who attended the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania.

In the first few months of 2024, the Trump administration has moved aggressively to strip federal funding from prominent colleges and universities. On March 10, the administration took action against Harvard, Columbia, NYU, and 60 other institu-

tions. It also started investigations into possible violations of the Civil Rights Act due to incidents of antisemitic harassment. More than \$10 billion in research grants have been cut.

Immigration and Customs Enforcement has apprehended student activists. International students are not eligible for admission to Harvard, which also risks losing its tax exemption status. Trump has also banned international students from attend-

Harvard risks losing its tax-exempt status. These actions have raised tensions



University and the University of Pennsylvania have also suspended hundreds of millions in research grants. The Department of Education is investigating ten universities for alleged antisemitism and has warned others that similar inquiries may occur. Furthermore, it is examining 52 universities for illegal race-based projects.

Trump has introduced new guidelines aimed at limiting international student admissions, including a cap on visas, and he has publicly criticised Harvard, stating, 'Harvard needs to behave itself."

The confrontation marked a dramatic battle between Harvard, America's oldest

and wealthiest University, and the president, Donald Trump. "Everyone knows that Harvard has lost its way," Trump posted in X. "Harvard is a JOKE, teaches Hate and Stupidity, and should no longer receive Federal Funds."

Harvard is hard hit both financially and otherwise. They include funding cuts and agreeing to follow new federal oversight rules, including scrutiny of curricula, admissions, and research priorities. Taking legal action, Harvard has initiated court proceedings and received temporary relief when a federal judge suspended the policv that restricted international students from obtaining visas.

As to the reason for Trump targeting the Ivy League institutions, the administration has offered various explanations. Some believe that during the 2024 Presidential campaign, Trump pledged to cut funding and accreditation for colleges that propagate "antisemitic propaganda."

After he returned to the White House in 2024, Trump launched a campaign targeting Ivy League schools. The White House says this campaign was prompted by concerns that these schools are not doing enough to deal with antisemitism on their campuses.

This concern has grown due to the anti-Israel protests at US universities since the Gaza conflict escalated. It is unclear how long the Trump versus Academia confrontation will continue. It all depends on how long the affected institutions can withstand the pressure. Will it fight back or comply with the White House? Even if the targeted universities refuse to change their policies soon, some will start changing on their own. For example, Michigan, Ohio State, and the University of California have already made changes, and more to follow.

International students hoping to join these elite institutions now face uncertainty and must consider alternatives in other countries. They contribute vast amounts of dollars mainly to the US economy. Some are considering universities in other countries as alternatives. It is said that it takes years to build an institution but only moments to tear one down. The conflict is escalating, and the affected universities mav pursue more legal avenues. If it continues, American universities may lose talent, even as the Trump administration doubles

A Silent Revolution in Justice Delivery

he Legal Aid Defense Counsel System (LADCS) in India is emerging as a critical initiative to enhance access to justice for the poor and marginalized. Launched by the National Legal Services Authority (NALSA), LADCS operationalises the constitutional rights to life and personal liberty (Article 21) and the state's duty to provide free legal aid (Article 39A).

The system adopts a public defender-style approach, a shift from the previous model relying on part-time empaneled lawyers. LADCS ensures full-time, salaried legal professionals are deployed in every district under the District Legal Services Authority (DLSA).

These teams are typically structured with a Chief Legal Aid Defense Counsel, Deputy Chief, and Assistant Legal Aid Defense Counsels, aiming for consistency, accountability, and dedicat-

As a Legal Aid Defense Counsel in Gautam Buddh Nagar, the author highlights the practical impact of LADCS in bridging the gap between vulnerable individuals and the justice

system. Their responsibilities extend beyond courtroom appearances to include advocacy, strategy, counseling, and coordination. They manage bail applications, revisions, and appeals, monitor case progress, and provide contin- Committee responsible for evaluating LADCs' perfor-Collaboration with jail authorities, court staff, police, and families is also integral to protecting the rights of the

A key component of LADCS is the mandatory weekly jail visit protocol. During these visits, LADCs identify undertrial prisoners lacking legal representation or understanding of their cases, often their first interaction with the legal system after extended periods. They offer legal counseling, assess bail or discharge possibilities, and draft necessary legal documents.

Furthermore, LADCs report issues like custodial abuse, illegal detention, or procedural delays to the DLSA, contributing to both individual justice and systemic transparency. To uphold professionalism and integrity, NALSA's LADCS Scheme (2022) outlines operational and ethical guidelines.

Defense counsels are required to maintain client confidentiality, act without bias, and uphold individual dignity. Meticulous recordkeeping of case files, court orders, jail visit notes, and monthly reports is mandated, with review by the DLSA. Significantly, LADCs are prohibited from private practice, ensuring their undivided focus on legal aid and preventing conflicts

Each district also has a Monitoring and Mentoring

action for negligence or misconduct.

This institutional oversight aims to strengthen public confidence and professional accountability. LADCs are also expected to approach their work with empathy and social awareness, particularly in sensitive cases involving women, juveniles, disabled persons, or individuals from SC/ST or minority backgrounds, promoting a human-centric approach to justice.

From ground-level experience, the LADCS has shown tangible impact in Gautam Buddh Nagar, with many undertrial prisoners gaining access to bail, updates, and rightful representation.

By accelerating legal processes, LADCS helps reduce case backlogs and decongest jails, simultaneously restoring faith in the justice system. Courts also benefit from better-prepared defense counsels, leading to smoother case management. The system is not just about free legal services but about providing quality, ethical, and consistent representation.

While challenges like increasing awareness, addressing staff shortages, and expanding reach persist, LADCS is proving to be a foundational pillar of legal empowerment in India, defending constitutional values, human dignity, and the essence of justice for all.

California on the brink

California, home to Hollywood, Disneyland, America's busiest port, and now the world's fourth-largest economy, is facing a serious crisis. President Donald Trump has controversially invoked Title 10 authority to deploy 700 National Guard troops to Los Angeles without the consent of Governor Gavin Newsom — a likely presidential candidate. Alarming reports suggest the troops have been instructed to arrest the Governor if he interferes.

The crisis stems from aggressive ICE raids in Los Angeles, Compton, and Paramount, which led to over 100 arrests and sparked widespread protests. These quickly turned violent, with incidents of looting, arson, and vehicle ramming.

Governor Newsom has launched legal action against the federal move, while US Marines are also being deployed, raising concerns about military force being used against civilians.

Over 100 arrests during aggressive ICE raids have triggered unrest, prompting President Trump to invoke Title 10 and send 700 National Guard troops — reportedly with orders to detain the Governor if he obstructs. One nation one temperature!

Power Minister Manohar Lal Khattar's proposal to regulate AC temperatures so that they don't go below 20 degrees Celsius has been met with backlash by citizens worried that the Modi Government is interfering a little too much. It has pitted the 'greater good' of energy conservation against the consumer's right to choose. 'One nation, one temperature' and other hashtags are gaining ground on social media. The timing of the announcement — it was made as the country reels under extreme heat — has also been criticised.

Others argued that in the backdrop of rising temperatures, the Government should be working to make ACs more accessible for consumers, rather than bringing in "firstworld" policies to the country. Gandhi's 'Indian Opinion' and its message for the digital age

In today's digital world of misinformation and fleeting outrage, Gandhi's model of principled media — anchored in trust, restraint and purpose — offers a timeless blueprint for using technology to serve truth, not trends



n June 4, 1903, Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi launched The Indian Opinion in South Africa, a publication that became a vital tool in his struggle against racial injustice. As detailed by Ela Gandhi in her book, "Mahatma Gandhi and the Media — The Indian Opinion" a publication of the National Gandhi Museum, New Delhi, the seeds of this resistance were sown on June 7, 1893, when Gandhi, despite holding a valid firstclass ticket, was forcibly ejected from a train at Pietermaritzburg due to his race.

That freezing night in the station's waiting room marked a turning point; he resolved to stay and resist injustice instead of returning home. He also telegrammed the railway manager, urging corrective action against such discriminatory conduct. Ela Gandhi writes, "On that night, he rejected the idea of abandoning his case and immediately returning home to a life of dignity and respect. He rejected the idea of succumbing to the insults and accepting them as a way of life in South Africa. He decided instead to stay on and confront and transform the racist system".

His activism in South Africa spanned over two decades (1893-1914). During this period, he developed and refined his unique philosophy of non-violent resistance, which he termed "Satyagraha" (truth-force). He organised mass protests, boycotts, and civil disobedience campaigns against discriminatory laws, such as the Black Act (which required Indians to carry registration certificates) and the £3 poll tax (In 1913, the South African Government introduced a £3 tax on Indians, (mainly those who had completed their indentured labour contracts).

These struggles often led to (direct) confrontations with the authorities, and Gandhi, along with thousands of other Indians, faced numerous arrests and endured harsh prison sentences. His imprisonments — further drew atten-


tion to unjust laws through non-violent means — and were a deliberate act of civil disobedience for a righteous cause, further solidifying his resolve to fight injus-

Ela Gandhi notes that Gandhi had "Written hundreds of letters to the press about the irking racism and the various injustices suffered by South Africans. He wrote about the wretched conditions of service that the indentured

workers were subject to in South Africa. He produced the famous green pamphlet to discourage Indians from being lured into indenture by false sto-

Mahatma Gandhi's strategic use of alternative media was both innovative and deliberate. Deeply conscious of the press's influence, he also recognised



the ethical responsibilities inherent in journalism. As Ela Gandhi notes, "He was also aware of the responsibility that a journalist carried. As a writer or journalist, he constantly exercised discipline over himself to ensure that his reporting was balanced." The persistent injustices faced by the Indian community in South Africa, along with the imperative for organised resistance, prompted Gandhi to launch 'The Indian Opinion'. Recognising the inadequacy and bias of the white-owned press, he envisioned a medium that would serve not only as a newspaper but also as a pedagogical tool for disseminating the principles of Satyagraha. It became a critical platform for mobilisation and dialogue, anchoring the nascent Indian civil rights movement.

The Indian Opinion' began as a bilingual (later trilingual and quadrilingual) weekly, published in Gujarati, Hindi, Tamil, and English. Its primary objective was to articulate the grievances of the Indian community in South Africa, combat racial discrimination, and foster unity among diverse linguistic and religious groups. Mahatma Gandhi himself meticulously managed its production, writing a significant portion of its content, editing, and even doing manual labour at the press. The paper reported on legal cases, documented instances of injustice, provided educational content and served as a forum for community discussions. Through

'The Indian Opinion', Mohandas Karamchand Gandhi didn't just report the news; he shaped it, guiding his readers towards a deeper understanding of their collective plight and the imperative for non-violent resistance, and, simultaneously, Gandhi's

evolution as a leader.

Today, in a world grappling with the rise of divisive narratives and the proliferation of 'fake news,' 'The Indian Opinion's' commitment to truth and ethical communication remains profoundly relevant. The digital age has democratised information but has also unleashed a torrent of misinformation, making the discerning reader an endangered species. Imagine Gandhi in the 21st century, armed not with a hand-cranked printing press but with

Mahatma Gandhi might have leveraged social media platforms to disseminate his message in an era of instant gratification and viral content. His iconic quotes could become powerful memes, his calls to action amplified through trending hashtags. However, he would likely approach these tools with extreme caution, prioritising authentic engagement over superficial popularity.

He would use social media not for self-promotion, but for genuine community mobilisation, echoing the words of the Canadian philosopher Marshall McLuhan, "The medium is the message."

For Gandhi, the message was always truth and non-violence, and the medium would be moulded to serve that higher purpose. Just as 'The Indian Opinion' served as a hub for organising protests and passive resistance campaigns, a modern-day 'Indian Opinion' would perhaps be deeply embedded in online activism. It would facilitate virtual meetings, organise digital petitions, and livestream acts of non-violent civil disobedience.

Going forward with what Marshall McLuhan had said, Gandhi would not have succumbed to popularity metrics like 'likes' or 'followers'. Instead, as historian Ramachandra Guha in his book 'Gandhi Before India notes, Gandhi "was never interested in public applause... he was interested in public awakening".

Gandhi's commitment to self-sufficiency and ethical production was evident in 'The Indian Opinion's' operation. He believed in local control and minimising reliance on external, often exploitative, systems. In today's tech landscape, this translates into a powerful critique of centralised digital platforms and data

Mahatma Gandhi might have advocated for data privacy — as it is one of the greatest dangers people are facing. Further, going by his 'dharma' (righteous principles), Mahatma Gandhi would have advocated for ethical algorithms, transparent data practices, and the responsible use of artificial intelligence (AI), while cautioning about the dangers of the addictive nature of social media.

American media theorist Evgeny Morozov (2011) argues that online activism often gives a false sense of accomplishment — 'clicks have replaced commitment.' Mahatma Gandhi would challenge this hollow activism and call for real-world consequences. "It is not enough to be passively good; we must be actively good," he once wrote (Collected Works of Mahatma Gandhi, Vol. 27, p. 164). 'The Indian Opinion' of the 21st century would, therefore, focus on 'converting online energy into offline results'. Today's journalists often find themselves caught between TRPs, clicks, and ethical compromise. A 2020 Reuters Institute report lamented the declining public trust in mainstream media globally. Gandhi's 'Indian Opinion', however, would choose 'trust over traffic'.

If the 'charkha' (spinning wheel) was Gandhi's symbol of resistance and regeneration in the 20th century, the smartphone — used mindfully — could become its 21st-century equivalent. Mahatma would strongly advocate for its use with restraint, truth, and compassion.

Last, but not the least, Mahatma Gandhi did not romanticise suffering, nor did he glamourise technology. He was pragmatic yet principled. His digital philosophy would be grounded in Satyagraha not just in 'content', but in 'conduct'. His "The Indian Opinion" served that purpose.

Redefining the Capital: Modi Govt drives massive infra push across Delhi

¬rom Dehradun Expressway to Meerut Expressway and Central Vista to Bharat Mandapam — PM Modi executed projects worth approximately 1.50 lakh Crore in the national capital during his 11 years of tenure in the centre since May 26, 2014. Besides spending ₹53,000 crore on Delhi Metro projects, the central Government says around ₹68,000 crore has been directly spent on Delhi's development in the last decade. Furthermore, Detailed Project Reports (DPR) have been prepared for new infrastructure worth ₹24,000 crore in the pipeline. A major portion of the spending, nearly ₹41,000 crore, has gone into road infrastructure, while ₹15,000 crore was allocated to railway-related projects. Another ₹12,000 crore has been invested in airport-related infrastructure and surrounding connectivity. Projects like the Delhi-Merut Expressway, the Pragati Maidan tunnel, Dwarka Expressway, Urban Extension Road, and the Central Vista redevelopment have been some of the most visible changes that citizens can witness across the city.

Among the biggest completed projects is the Delhi-Meerut Expressway, which has cut down travel time to Meerut to just 45 minutes. This road has significantly improved the daily commute for residents in NCR towns. It is also part of a larger effort to expand high-speed corridors across India. The Government is also building the Delhi-

Mumbai Expressway, aiming to reduce the travel time between the two cities to about 12 hours. The Eastern and Western Peripheral Expressways, which had been stalled for years due to issues between state Governments, were completed during this period. These bypass highways were planned to divert heavy vehicular traffic away from Delhi. With an estimated 50,000 trucks that previously passed through the capital every day now using these routes, traffic congestion and air pollution in the city have seen some relief.

In addition to major expressways, the Urban Extension Road-II, built at a cost of over ₹ 7,700 crore, has created an alternative route connecting north and west Delhi to the airport and south Delhi. The road is expected to ease pressure on congested internal roads, especially for commuters from Harvana, Punjab, and Jammu and Kashmir who often face bottlenecks entering Delhi. While this road was originally the Delhi Government's responsibility, it was taken over by the National Highways Authority of India, with full support from the Centre. One of the key projects in central Delhi is the redevelopment of Central Vista, a project that has stirred both political and public debate. It includes the new Parliament building, which was completed in under four years. The Kartavya Path, formerly known as Rajpath, has also been redesigned under this project. Earlier plagued by traffic and poor pedestrian access, the area now



features better walkways, underground passages, and landscaping. The wider Central Vista plan includes the upcoming Central Secretariat complex, where several Government ministries will be housed under one roof. Another key transport intervention has been the Pragati Maidan Integrated Transit Corridor. Built to address traffic congestion during major events at the Pragati Maidan exhibition grounds, the corridor includes a tunnel that provides signal-free movement between Mandi House and east Delhi. This project has led to a significant reduction i n jams at ITO and on Mathura Road. It also

includes parking facilities for thousands of vehicles and several underground Uturns to manage traffic flow.

Near the airport, two major convention centres have been established — Bharat Mandapam and Yashobhoomi. Bharat Mandapam, located at Pragati Maidan, hosted the G20 summit and now serves as a venue for large national and international conferences.

Its construction also transformed the surrounding infrastructure, including roads and metro access. Yashobhoomi, built over 221 acres with an investment

of around ₹25,000 crores, is among the largest convention centres in Asia and can host up to 20,000 people at once. It is well-connected by metro and roads such as the Dwarka Expressway and UER-II. Efforts have also been made to boost rail-based regional connectivity. The first phase of the Delhi-Merut Regional Rapid Transit System, or RRTS, branded as Namo Bharat, is now operational between Delhi and a part of Meerut. When complete, the corridor will drastically reduce commute time between the two cities. Similar corridors have been proposed from Delhi to Panipat and Delhi to Alwar. These high-speed transit lines aim to bring surrounding towns into the fold of daily commuting zones, reducing the dependence on road travel and offering an alternative to private vehicles.

Several projects have focused on improving the internal infrastructure of the city. The flyover at Dhaula Kuan, for instance, was finally constructed after years of delay caused by land availability issues. The flyover eased movement between west Delhi and the airport. Another area of focus has been urban housing and the regularisation of settlements. Under the PM-UDAY scheme, efforts have been made to provide ownership rights to residents of over 1,700 unauthorised colonies. Around 29,000 houses have been sanctioned under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Urban), and 3,000 flats for economically weaker sections were built with a total outlay of around ₹354 crore.

New public infrastructure has also included educational and cultural facilities such as the Veer Savarkar College at Delhi University, the Prime Minister's Museum, the Police Memorial, and the National War Memorial. Oxygen parks and green zones have also been developed in several parts of the city, intended as both environmental measures and public recreation spaces. In public transport, Delhi received support from the Centre for expanding its fleet of electric buses under the FAME scheme. The central Government funded a substantial portion of the cost of these non-polluting buses. Several projects are currently in the pipeline. Detailed Project Reports have been prepared for new infrastructure worth ₹24,000 crores, spanning over 120 kilometres. Among these are a 7-kilometre tunnel from Shiv Murti to Nelson Mandela Road, an elevated road connecting INA to the airport with possible extensions to Gurugram and Faridabad, and further extensions of UER-II to connect Alipur, Tronica City, and the Delhi-Dehradun route. A feasibility study is also being conducted for a tunnel connecting Sarai Kale Khan to IGI Airport, which could transform airport access for south and east Delhi residents. From new highways and tunnels to convention centres and transit corridors, the national capital has seen rapid transformation one that is reshaping how the city moves, works, and presents itself to the world.

Beyond the Optics: Why India's Strategic Focus Has Moved Past RIC

hen Russian Foreign Minister Sergey Lavrov recently called for the revival of the Russia-India-China (RIC) trilateral dialogue, it echoed a familiar, if somewhat outdated, diplomatic refrain. Labeling RIC as an "independent mechanism," Lavrov argued that the moment is ripe for its reinvigoration — especially given the reported easing of India-China border tensions. On the surface, it sounded like a classic Eurasian initiative: three major powers coming together to balance global influence and reinforce multipolarity. But in substance, the call appears more symbolic than strategic, driven less by genuine trust and more by

Moscow's shifting compulsions Originally conceptualised in the late 1990s, RIC was born out of a common need among the three nations to counterbalance Western dominance and to claim space in global decision-making. At the time, the idea of a trilateral dialogue made sense — India, Russia, and China were navigating a unipolar world, seeking to shape a more balanced international order. However, over the past two decades, the geopolitical context has transformed significantly. The foundational logic behind RIC has weakened as each member has chosen distinct strategic paths.

India's foreign policy has evolved through sustained engagements with a host of global actors — particularly the Indo-Pacific Quad (with the U.S., Japan, and Australia), France, and key Southeast Asian partners. These relationships are grounded in values like transparency, sovereignty, and a rules-based international system-values that China does not share. Beijing's military posturing along the Line of Actual Control, its strategic penetration into the Indian Ocean, and its use of economic coercion have deeply eroded trust in New Delhi.

Even Lavrov's claim of reduced border tensions is disputable. While disengagement has occurred in some friction zones, the larger strategic environment remains tense. Post-Galwan, India's diplomatic

recalibration has been clear: less sentimentalism, more realism. New Delhi is no longer willing to engage in platforms that pay lip service to unity while ignoring hard truths. RIC, under these conditions, appears increasingly disconnected from the region's evolving security landscape.

Russia's position further complicates the equation. While defence and energy ties with India remain strong, Moscow's growing dependency on China intensified by Western sanctions — undermines its role as a neutral partner. This tilt is not lost on India. Moscow's silence on Chinese aggression and its quiet alignment with Pakistani narratives in multilateral forums have not gone unnoticed. A recent decision to collaborate with Pakistan in reviving a Soviet-era steel plant only reinforces the perception of Russia's pivot away from India's sensitivities

Given these shifts, Lavrov's push for RIC should

be seen for what it is: a diplomatic move by Russia to maintain relevance in Asia without Western interference. RIC offers Moscow a platform, even if only symbolically, to present itself as a balancer. But symbolism alone does not constitute strategy. For RIC to be viable, it would require political will, mutual trust, and convergence on key issues — all of which are currently absent.

India, to its credit, does not reject any multilateral platform outright. It continues to engage in RIC, BRICS, and the Shanghai Cooperation Organisation. However, such participation is pragmatic, not preferential. These forums are now largely diplomatic tages rather than engines for transformative change. India's real focus lies on groupings where its values and strategic goals align with those of its partners. Moreover, India's democratic ethos increasingly diverges from the authoritarian and opaque governance styles of Russia and China. This divergence is more than ideological — it affects everything from crisis response to geopolitical alignment. Without shared principles and trust, trilateral mechanisms like RIC risk producing hollow rhetoric instead of substantive results.

It's also important to recognise that India isn't seeking to distance itself completely from either China or Russia. What it desires is strategic autonomy -

the ability to act in its own interest without being tied down by legacy frameworks or false notions of equidistance.

In this context, dialogue remains important, but only when it is based on reciprocity, mutual respect, and a willingness to address core concerns. Beijing's attempt to compartmentalise its relationship with India — engaging economically while maintaining military standoffs is something New Delhi has actively resisted. Under such conditions, expecting India to re-engage meaningfully in RIC amounts to ignoring ground reali-

ties. Any revival that does not address the trust deficit will remain superficial — serving little purpose beyond optics. Finally, the idea of multipolarity that once inspired RIC has itself evolved.

Today, the global order is shaped less by traditional power blocs and more by flexible, issue-based coalitions. India's active role in areas like digital governance, climate action, and global health demonstrates this shift. RIC no longer fits into this dynamic, forward-looking vision. Lavrov's appeal to revive RIC may resonate with diplomatic nostalgia, but it lacks contemporary relevance. The world has changed, and so has India. Clinging to outdated formats risks diverting attention from more effective collaborations. India's future lies in agile, purposeful, and valuesaligned partnerships. Dialogue is welcome, but only if it's grounded in realism — not rhetoric.



Sebi sets minimum two PAC meetings

Markets regulator Sebi on Thursday directed stock exchanges with commodity segments to ensure their Product Advisory Committees (PACs) meet at least twice a year, or more frequently if necessary. However, in the case of agricultural commodities, the PAC is required to meet at least once annually. Sebi's 'Master Circular for Commodity Derivatives Segment' in August 2023 issued various compliance requirements for stock exchanges and clearing corporations operating in the commodity derivatives segment. As per the Master Circular, each stock exchange is mandated to constitute a Product Advisory Committee for every group or complex of commodities that share common stakeholders or value chain participants, and on which derivatives are either currently traded or proposed to be introduced. Based on representations from market participants and following deliberations by Sebi's Commodity Derivatives Advisory Committee (CDAC), the regulator has revised the meeting frequency guidelines for PACs.



'Govt's focus should be on zero road fatalities'

The issue of road safety is very important, and the government's focus should be on working towards zero road fatalities, Minister of State for Highways Ajay Tamta said on Thursday. Addressing the National Summit on VRUs & Road Safety, Tamta said the government should work on ideas to reduce road fatalities. Also speaking at the event, UN Special Envoy for Road Safety Jen Todt called road crashes a silent pandemic and emphasized the urgent need to protect vulnerable road users like pedestrians, cyclists, and motorcyclists. Citing over 154,000 road fatalities in India in 2021, he stressed that while not every crash is avoidable, many are and those who die are often young people, daily commuters, and sole breadwinners. A key highlight of the event was the launch of 'Road Safety Paathshaala', a road safety module developed by TRAX for children aged 8 to 13

The Rourkela Steel Plant (RSP) of SAIL on Thursday said it has commissioned a state-of-the-art Ladle Furnace 2D (LF#2D). The newly operational LF#2D is a critical facility that will significantly boost productivity by ensuring a timely and efficient supply of liquid steel to the new slab caster alongside the existing ones. Curbs on rare Earth METALS China hints at holding talks with India

China on Thursday hinted at holding talks with India over its restrictions on export of rare earth materials, saying it is willing to enhance dialogue and cooperation with relevant countries to keep industrial supply chains stable.

China's recent restrictions on the exports of key metals caused widespread disruption in the manufacturing of automobiles and semiconductor chips in a host of countries, including India. "We are willing to enhance dialogue and cooperation with relevant countries and regions to jointly keep the stability of global industrial and supply chains," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said. Lin was responding to a question from PTI whether China is willing to lift restrictions on exports of rare earth metals to India as it began clearing export licences to the US and the EU.

Lin, however, reiterated that for specifics, the relevant authorities should be approached.

June 16, Indian



Ambassador Pradeep Kumar Rawat met Chinese Vice Minister Sun Weidong and held talks on bilateral issues. They discussed "common concerns" among others, a foreign ministry statement here said.

Reports from India spoke of growing concerns about shortages of the rare metals in automobiles and other industries. After several months of a

squeeze on rare earth metals over which China holds a monopoly, Beijing began clearing selective export licenses reportedly for the US as both countries held talks in London

over the issues. Rare earths are a group of metals consisting of 17 elements. Though present in several counties, their extraction is costly and messy, causing massive amounts of pollution.

According to the International Energy Agency, China accounts for 61 per cent of global mined rare earth production but controls 92 per cent of the global output.

US President Donald Trump on Wednesday announced that a deal with China "is done" after two days of talks in London, marking a turnaround in the trade war between the

two major economies. Trump's announcement came after the negotiating teams from both sides concluded two-day talks in London, where they agreed to resolve their trade disputes.

Retail inflation falls to 6-yr low of 2.82% on cooling food prices

Retail inflation dipped to an over six-year low of 2.82 per cent in May due to subdued food prices, remaining below the RBI's median target of 4 per cent for the fourth consecutive month, according to government data released on Thursday.

Consumer Price Index (CPI)-based retail inflation was 3.16 per cent in April and 4.8 per cent in May 2024. The previous low was in February

2019 at 2.57 per cent.
On easing inflation, the Reserve Bank effected a jumbo rate cut of 50 basis points last week, taking the total to 100 bps since February. Food inflation was 0.99 per cent in May, significantly lower from 8.69 per cent in the year-ago month, according to the National Statistics Office

(NSO) data. "The significant decline in headline inflation and food inflation during the month of May 2025 is mainly attributed to a decline in inflation of pulses & products, vegetables, fruits, cereals & products, households goods & services, sugar & confectionary and egg and the favourable base effect," NSO said in a statement.

The food inflation in May 2025 is the lowest since October 2021.

According to NSO data, inflation in rural areas was 2.59 per cent in May, while it was 3.07 per cent in urban India.

Among states and UTs, the highest inflation was recorded in Kerala at 6.46 per cent, followed by Punjab (5.21 per cent), Jammu and Kashmir (4.55 per cent), Haryana (3.67 per cent) and Uttarakhand

Gold jumps Rs 850 to Rs 99,340/10 g

Gold prices jumped Rs 850 to Rs 99,340 per 10 grams in the national capital on Thursday amid a rise in precious metal prices in the overseas markets, according to the All India Sarafa Association.

The yellow metal of 99.5 per cent purity climbed Rs 800 to Rs 98,800 per 10 grams (inclusive of all taxes). However, silver prices went lower by Rs 100 to Rs 1,07,000 per kilogram (inclusive of all taxes) on Thursday. The most traded gold contracts for August delivery bounced by Rs 1,585 to trade at Rs 98,289 per 10



grams. Subsequently, the contracts for October delivery rallied Rs 1,520 to Rs 99,214 per 10 grams on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX).

Meanwhile, spot gold increased by USD 15.74 per ounce or 0.47 per cent to USD 3,370.87 per ounce in the international markets. Globally, spot silver fell 0.54 per cent to trade at USD 36.05 per ounce.

BoM slashes retail loan rate by up to 50 bps

State-owned Bank Maharashtra on Thursday said it has reduced its interest rate by up to 50 basis points on retail loans, including home, car, education and other loans linked with Repo Linked Lending Rate.

The interest rate reduction by Pune-based lender is in line with the rate moderation done by RBI last week and the new rates are effective from June 10. With the rate cut, its home loan now starts from 7.35 per cent and car loan from 7.7 per cent, which is among the lowest interest rates in the banking industry, BoM said in a statement.

Sensex, Nifty tumble 1% on weak trends, geopolitical tensions

Benchmark Sensex tanked 823 points on Thursday following a selloff in oil & gas, power and capital goods shares in tandem with weak global market trends amid growing tensions in the Middle East.

The 30-share BSE Sensex dropped 823.16 points or 1 per cent to settle at \$1,691.98 with 27 of its constituents declining and three ending higher. During the day, it plunged 991.98 points or 1.20 per cent to 81,523.16. Snapping its sixday winning streak, the broader NSE Nifty tumbled 253.20 points or 1.01 per cent to 24,888.20. Fresh foreign fund outflows also dented investors' sentiment, traders said.

Among Sensex stocks, Tata Motors, Titan, Eternal, Power Grid, Tata Steel, Larsen & Toubro, Mahindra & Mahindra and Hindustan Unilever were among the biggest laggards.

Bajaj Finserv, Asian Paints and Tech Mahindra were the gainers. "Consolidation in domestic markets is evolving into a broad-based trend, now



extending to large-cap stocks. Valuation concerns and rising oil prices -- driven by Middle East tensions -- are fuelling risk aversion among investors.

"Adding to the uncertainty,

the US is considering unilateral tariff hikes on several key trading partners, with a decision expected within the next one to two weeks, ahead of an early July deadline," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Investments Limited, said.

The BSE midcap gauge tanked 1.52 per cent and smallcap index dropped 1.38 per cent. Among sectoral indices, power tumbled 2.19 per cent, utilities (2.18 per cent), oil & gas (2.10 per cent), realty (2.07 per cent), consumer durables (2.02 per cent), industrials (1.98 per cent), auto (1.71 per cent), consumer discretionary (1.67 per cent) and metal (1.63 per cent).

After the stake sale, RIL arm Siddhant Commercials' shareholding in Asian Paints dipped to 1.26 per cent from 4.90 per cent. With the acquisition of shares, SBI Mutual Fund's shareholding in Asian Paints rose to 5.15 per cent from 1.51 per cent.

Shares of Asian Paints went up 0.73 per cent to close at Rs 2,225 apiece on the NSE.



Rupee falls 7 paise to settle at 85.60 against US dollar

The rupee declined 7 paise to close to 85.60 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday amid a steep fall in the domestic equity markets and a rise in global crude oil prices.

However, a weaker dollar against major currencies capped the losses, forex traders said. At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 85.43 against the US dollar and traded in the range of 85.43-85.65 before closing at 85.60 (provisional), down 7 paise from its previous close.

The local unit had settled at 85.53 on Wednesday.

"The Indian rupee fell today (Thursday) after rising to 85.43 as oil companies bought the dollar after the oil prices touched USD 70 per barrel," Anil Kumar Bhansali, Head of Treasury and Executive Director, Finrex

Treasury Advisors LLP, said. "The rupee is expected to be in the range of 85.35-95.95 on Friday as we get the US PPI number and our CPI number." Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was down 0.43 per cent at 99.20.

Cricket, Culture and Check-ins

ricket in India is more than just a sport—it's a way of life. But in 2025, it's also becoming a way to travel. According to Skyscanner's Travel Trends 2025 report, 53% of Indian travellers are planning trips—domestically and internationally—specific

ically to attend sporting events this year. With the IPL 2025 season recently concluding and the World Test Championship final just around the corner, a new wave of Indian fans is packing the state of ing their bags not just for the stadiums, but for the cities, the cultures, and the experiences surrounding the matches.
We caught up with Taran Singh, an

avid traveller, cricket lover and content creator, to explore how this phenomenon-coined fan travel-is transforming tourism for a new generation of sports enthusiasts.



According to him, the passion for the game is no longer limited to what happens inside the stadium. "They aren't just turning up for the game; they're there for the full experience—the energy at the stadium, the buzzing

crowds and the thrill of cheering along-

side fellow fans," he explains.
Singh admits he once thought he was one of the few combining sports with travel. "But it turns out, I'm part of a much bigger trend," he says. Skyscanner's Pitch Perfect Journeys report confirms this: nearly 47% of Indian cricket fans are keen to travel—both within India and abroad—to watch live matches. "And it doesn't stop at the stadium," Singh adds. "Fifty percent of them are extending their cricket trips by three to four days, turning match days into mini-holidays."

A key reason for this trend? Inspiration from the digital world. "What's even more relatable is that 65% say influencers

and social media inspire them," Singh notes. "It's clear this isn't just about sport anymore; it's become a whole travel experience. That's exactly what I see in my community—people asking for tips, DMs about where to stay, what to eat, and how to make the most of a match city. Cricket isn't just a sport anymore. It's a reason to

In an exclusive chat with **The Pioneer,** avid traveller and cricket enthusiast **Taran Singh** delves into the booming trend of fan travel in India, where sporting events like the IPL are no longer just about the match, but about exploring new cities, cultures and experiences

the numbers back that sentiment. "Skyscanner's report shows that 80% of Indian fans want to travel for the IPL this year, and nearly half—48%—start planyear, and nearly nair—48%—start planning up to two months early," Singh shares. "Personally, it's the chants at the stadium, the connection with other fans, and discovering a city through cricket that makes it all worth it."

Having travelled across continents for cricket, Singh has some clear favourites. "In India, Wankhede tops my list," he says. "There's an unbeatable vibe when the stadium is packed, especially during the evening matches." But the post-match experience is just as important. "The real celebration spills out onto Marine Drive after the match," he shares. "Fans in jerafter the match," he shares. "Fans in jerseys, waving flags, soaking in the joy—it's a vibe. Whenever I'm in Mumbai, I always grab a vada pav and do some street shopping. It's now a ritual."

According to Skyscanner, Singh is far from alone in this. "Their report says 41% of Indians are keen on trying Mumbai's iconic yada pay when they

Mumbai's iconic vada pav when they travel for cricket. It also mentions that 57% love to shop during match travel—

something I totally relate to," he adds.
Internationally, Singh's most cherished cricket memory is at Lord's. "It's always been the dream—there's something surreal about its history and atmosphere," he says. "I'm hoping to catch the World Test Championship final there this June." He also praises the Australian cricket experience: "I had the chance to visit Australia during a recent tour, and it completely lived up

to the hype."

He adds, "Skyscanner's report reflects this trend too—56% of Indian fans are keen on travelling to Australia for cricket, and 46% are eyeing England. Between iconic stadiums and vibrant local cultures, these trips are what every cricket lover's dreams are made of."

For those just starting to plan cricket-centric travel, Singh offers practical guidance. "My biggest advice is to stay flexible," he says. "The demand for match tickets and flights surges quickly once the schedule drops, so having flexible dates and timings helps."

As for the perfect stadium spot? "I always aim for the upper-tier seats right behind the bowler's arm. You have a perfect view of the game and the field, and being higher up means you catch a bit more breeze—which, trust me, makes all the difference during long innings in summer."

Singh treats match day with a blend of excitement and military precision. "I double-check my ticket, ID, and entry time the night before—nothing kills the mood like realising you've forgotten something essential," he laughs.

His secret to a smooth day? Leave early. "I head to the stadium a couple of hours before the gates open to avoid traffic and long guers."

fic and long queues."

To save on travel, Singh gets creative. "I mix and match flights and airports, book one-way tickets with different airlines, or fly into one city and out of another—it helps save money. Skyscanner makes all of this really easy." Once he's inside, he taps into the buzz.

"There's something surreal about fans arriving in jerseys, drums playing in the

background—the energy building up to the game. I usually scout the food stalls early—pro tip: the best stuff runs out fast!" When it comes to match travel, Singh keeps it simple and efficient. "Packing light is the best," he says. "A good check-in suitcase makes life easier when you're running between airports and stadiums."

His must-haves? "My jersey, sunglasses, sunscreen, and some of my camera gear. And I always wear breathable clothes—something easy to move in."

With most stadiums limiting bag size, he sticks to a small sling. "Just enough for the essentials," he adds.

As a Gen Z traveller and content creator, Singh says his camera is as important as his ticket. "It's about capturing the vibe, the crowd energy, and the local culture—ensuring my audience can feel it through their screens," he shares.

He believes that some cities just light up for cricket. "Mumbai and Bengaluru are always buzzing—the cafés, the streets, the celebrations. According to Skyscanner, 57% of Gen Z fans say stadium atmosphere excites them most. I couldn't agree more"

couldn't agree more."

Post-match euphoria is where content magic happens. "After a big win, places like Marine Drive or India Gate turn into full-blown celebration zones-fireworks, singing, dancing. Capturing that kind of joy in such iconic locations? It hits differently." For Singh, Skyscanner is an essential travel companion. "IPL isn't just a hectic time for players—it's just as packed for fans like me who follow teams

from city to city."

He appreciates the flexibility it offers. "Their Price Alerts feature is a lifesaver. Once set up, it notifies you of flight price drops, so you know exactly when to book." Even better? "The Multi-City search tool. You can book all your trips in one go without hopping across tabs. Whether it's syncing with match schedules or finding last-minute deals, Skyscanner makes the planning smooth and cost-effective," Singh concludes.
In 2025, cricket is shaping not just

India's weekends-but its wanderlust. And if Singh's journey is any indication, fan travel is no fleeting trend. It's a lifestyle. "Cricket isn't just something I watch," Singh says with a smile. "It's how I see the world."



Answering another question, the producer shared that

When asked why they chose Tamil actor Dhanush over a Telugu actor, Sunil Narang responded, "If you narrate the story, will just anyone accept it immediately? Dhanush is looking for different kinds of roles and subjects, so when we approached him, he immediately agreed to do it."

One of the major challenges for the film was shooting at real locations. "We shot in the Bombay slums, which was a real challenge. He delivered a fantastic performance," said the producers. They added that they never thought about the budget while making this film. "Whatever the film needed, we put in that money. We are releasing the film on a large scale across around 1600 screens," said Sunil.

The producers confirmed that the film was made as a bilingual. "We shot the film in Telugu and Tamil, and dubbed it into Hindi and other languages," said Ram Mohan. He added that Dhanush is known across languages. "His films release in Telugu, he has acted in many Hindi films, and is currently working on another one. Rashmika is now a big star in Hindi too. Nagarjuna has also done Hindi films and is a known face. So, we believe this film will do well in Hindi and other languages too," said the producer.

Fellow quick Jofra Archer will also miss the opening Test, while Gus Atkinson is still recovering from a hamstring strain. Despite the setbacks, McCullum remains confident in England's bowling options. "There are



some quality bowlers that are unavailable but we have a nice, varied bowling attack with Chris Woakes, Sam Cook, Brydon Carse, Jamie Overton, Josh Tongue for the high-pace element," the former New Zealand skipper said.

"We have Shoaib Bashir, who is growing in Test cricket every day. We know we are going to be tested against India, and they will arrive prepared," he added.

India begin a new era after Test retirements of veterans Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma, and R Ashwin. The team will be led by Shubman and features Sai Sudharsan and Yashasvi Jaiswal. England all-rounder Jacob Bathel has been recalled and McCullum was all praise for the 21-year-old.

Azteca Stadium to feature hybrid field for 2026 World Cup

hybrid field, updated locker rooms, elevators and hospitality zones are among the new features of Azteca Stadium for the 2026 World Cup. Ollamani, the sports entertainment company that owns the stadium, also confirmed Wednesday that Azteca will reopen March 26, which will be 75 days before the start of the World Cup as Mexico City Mayor Clara Brugada announced recently.

"The centerpiece of the stadium's renovation is the people who visit it. Our in the world," the company said. their experience in every way," stadium director Felix Aguirre said in a statement.

The iconic venue closed last May for renovations ahead of next year's 48team competition hosted by Mexico, the United States and Canada. The 83,000seat Azteca, which recently was renamed, will host five games including the tournament opener. It also hosted the first matches in the 1970 and 1986 World Cups.

Ollamani, which is affiliated with Grupo Televisa, Mexico's largest television network, also said the stadium will have bigger capacity, but did not specify how many extra seats it will have.

It will be the second time that Azteca has a hybrid pitch - one was installed in 2018 but returned to natural grass a year later. The poor field conditions in November 2018 forced a last-minute change of venue for an NFL game

Los Angeles Rams. "The pitch, being subjected to intensive use, will have a new ventilation and suction system, thereby achieving better recovery, stability and resistance," Ollamani said in a statement.

The new locker rooms will be located at the center of the stadium under the luxury boxes and with a tunnel leading to the pitch. Before, they were located in the north and south part of it.

"The project includes new facilities in the competition areas, improving the experience of the player, fans and media in line with the most modern stadiums

LED screens inside and outside the stadium. Before the renovations, the stadium had just two big screens that were installed in 2015.

Ollamani did not provided specific details about elevators or escalators. In the past, the only way to move between the lower and upper sections was using an old ramp. The hospitality zones were also a necessity. The old stadium had a small concession area outside the venue, but inside there were no food courts and the fans were forced to buy from the vendors roaming the seating area.

Among other renovations, the stadium owner also announced a new press box area, improved restrooms, a 200-unit CCTV surveillance system and a new sound system. Originally, a major renovation was planned including a shopping center and hotel, but residents of Santa Úrsula, a popular neighborhood located between the Kansas City Chiefs and the south of the capital, opposed them.

ISSF World Cup: Sift Kaur Samra wins bronze in women's 50m rifle

ndian shooter Sift Kaur Samra tackled a strong field with aplomb to claim the bronze medal in the women's 50m rifle 3 positions event at the ISSF World Cup here on Thursday. The 23-year-old Samra, who holds the current world record in women's 50 metre rifle three positions event which she had set while winning the gold medal at the 2022 Asian Games, shot 453.1 in the eight-player final.

Norway's Jeanette Hegg Duestad won the gold medal with 466.9, while Emely Jaeggi of Switzerland bagged silver with 464.8. Emely was placed ninth in the qualifications with 590 but made the final as two markswomen among the top eight were shooting for ranking points only (RPO). Samra, who is from Faridkot, Punjab, was second in the qualifications with a total of 592 across the three stages

For the first time since 2021, the US Open is not increasing its prize money. It will be \$21.5 million for the second straight year, with \$4.3 million going to the winner. It remains the biggest purse of the four majors. The Masters was \$21 million this year, while the PGA Championship was at \$19 million. The British Open hasn't announced its total purse for next month at Royal Portrush. It was at \$17 million last year.

The US Open purse was \$12.5 million in 2020 and 2021 before making a big leap to \$17.5 million in 2022 at Brookline.

"I feel comfortable that we've been a leader in moving fast and bigger," USGA CEO Mike Whan said Wednesday.

The Players Championship has a \$25 million purse. The USGA and R& A get the bulk of their revenue from their Opens. They also use that game, including the Women's Opens and amateur events such as the Walker Cup and

Poland coach resigns after dispute with Lewandowski
