# Ration shops back in AP

## CIVIL SUPPLIES MINISTER MANOHAR SAYS FP SHOPS TO DOUBLE AS MINI MALLS

Minister for Civil Supplies Nadendla Manohar has announced that ration shops in the State will gradually be transformed into mini malls, with a focus on protecting public health.

Inaugurating the new system of ration supply at an FP shop at Vakalapudi in Kakinada Rural constituency on Sunday, the Minister said that within just four hours in the morning, ration commodities were distributed to 8.15 lakh families through 29,761 ration shops across the State. He said the government is using Fair Price shops to ensure transparency in the public distribution system.

Later, the Minister personally delivered ration goods to an elderly man, Krishnamsetty Gopal, at his doorstep.

Speaking to the media, Manohar criticised the previous YSRCP government for allegedly ruining the established ration distribution system. "Fair price shops used to operate from 8am to 12 noon and 4 pm to 8 pm.

But the previous government misused Rs 1,650 crore on 9,260 Mobile Dispensing Unit (MDU) vehicles that failed to deliver rations properly. They were parked in street corners, leaving people waiting," he said.

He claimed the government had falsely reported that 93% of ration



distribution was completed in a single day.

The Minister urged ration dealers to work sincerely and restore public confidence. He also assured that the alliance government would fulfil all pre-election promises.

Government Whip in the Legislative Council P. Hariprasad, Kakinada Rural MLA Pantham Nanaji, Civil Supplies Corporation Chairman Thota Sudhir, DCCB Chairman Tummala Babu, former Minister Chikkala Ramachandra- rao, Civil Supplies Commissioner Sourabh Gour, and Joint Collector Rahul Meena were present.

## JAGAN FLAYS GOVT FOR HALTING MDUs



**VIJAYAWADA:** YSRCP president and former chief minister YS Jagan Mohan Reddy criticised the TDP-led coalition government for halting the Mobile Dispensing Units (MDUs) that ensured doorstep ration delivery. He said the move affected over 20,000 operators from BC, SC, ST and minority communities, who had served even during floods. Jagan, in a post on X, called the move vindictive and accused Chandrababu Naidu of branding the workers unfairly as smugglers. He said the MDU system curbed corruption and benefited the poor. He also slammed the government for abandoning village secretariat staff, volunteers, and welfare services like clinics and RBKs.

## I & PR Minister urges caution amid rising COVID cases

Amid a rise in COVID-19 cases across the country, Andhra Pradesh Minister for Housing and Information & Public Relations, Kolusu Parthasaradhi, has appealed to the public to stay vigilant and adhere to safety protocols.

Addressing the media in Nuzvid, the Minister urged people to avoid large gatherings and strictly follow COVID guidelines at crowded public places like railway stations, bus stands, and airports. He underlined the importance of wearing face masks and maintaining social distancing in such areas.

Minister Parthasaradhi advised elderly persons and pregnant women to stay indoors unless absolutely necessary. He also recommended mandatory COVID testing for individuals arriving from abroad.

He directed health officials to ensure the availability of PPE kits and masks, and to remain on high alert. He asked the government machinery to be fully prepared to tackle any fresh outbreaks and to ensure that government hospitals are equipped to deliver quality treatment.

The Minister emphasised the need for coordinated efforts at village and mandal levels to raise awareness. Local officials were urged to actively educate the public and enforce safety protocols. Field-level surveillance and comprehensive health screenings should

## Thunderstorms, gusty winds likely in AP

Thunderstorms accompanied by lightning are likely to occur at isolated places in North Coastal Andhra Pradesh over the next 48 hours, and in South Coastal Andhra Pradesh and Rayalaseema over the next 24 hours, according to the Meteorological Centre.

In its daily weather bulletin issued on Sunday, the Met Centre also stated that gusty winds with speeds ranging from 30 to 50 kmph are likely at isolated places in Coastal Andhra Pradesh and Rayalaseema over the next four days.

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## 15,000 Health dept staff to be transferred

The Ministry of Health, Family Welfare and Medical Education has launched a large-scale general transfer exercise, expected to affect over 15,000 medical and administrative personnel across Andhra Pradesh. The transfers, which began on Sunday, mark the first such exercise since 2023 and have sparked significant interest and concern among government health employees following the issuance of new transfer guidelines.

The Finance Department had lifted the ban on general transfers on 15 May 2025, allowing individual



ministries to formulate their own transfer policies based on functional requirements. In line with this, the Health Ministry released its special transfer guidelines on 31 May, after

extensive consultations involving Health Minister Satya Kumar Yadav, the Special Chief Secretary, and heads of various departments. The revised rules are intended to streamline the system, address administrative challenges, and end prolonged postings that may have led to irregularities.

Under the new guidelines, administrative staff who have completed more than three years at a station will now be mandatorily transferred. This is the first time such a rule is being implemented to tackle inefficiencies caused by extended postings.

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## Rare Maha Kumbhabhishekam after 270 years

The famous Sree Padmanabhaswamy Temple in Kerala is set to witness a rare consecration ritual after 270 years, an official said.

Maha Kumbhabhishekam (Grand Consecration) will take place next week following the recent completion of long-overdue renovation work at this ancient temple.

The objective of the ritual is to reinforce spiritual energy and reawaken the sanctity of the shrine, according to temple authorities.

Such a comprehensive renovation and the accompanying rituals are being held at the centuries-old



shrine after a gap of over 270 years, and it is unlikely to occur again in the next several decades, temple manager B Sreekumar said here.

The 'Maha Kumbhabhishekam'

ritual will be held at the temple complex on June 8, he said.

Various rituals, including the consecration of newly built 'thazhikakudams' (three above the sanctum sanctorum and one above the Ottakkal Mandapam), the reinstallation of the Vishwakshena idol, and the 'Ashtabandha Kalasam' at the Thiruvambady Sree Krishna Temple (located within the main shrine complex), will be held as part of the event, Sreekumar said.

"The renovation has been carried out as per the directive of the Supreme Court-appointed expert panel in 2017. Though the work began soon after, it could not

progress much further due to the COVID situation," he said.

Later, various renovation works were completed in a phased manner from 2021 onwards, he said.

"The comprehensive renovation and the related rituals are being held at the shrine after centuries. It is a rare opportunity for devotees of Lord Padmanabha across the world to witness these rituals after all these years," he said.

He also said that steps are being taken by the temple management to ensure the smooth conduct of the sacred rituals, in adherence to the shrine's centuries-old traditions.

## All-party delegations assert PoK priority talks

All-party parliamentary delegations on Sunday emphasised a unified global stance against terrorism and asserted that future dialogues with Pakistan should focus solely on reclaiming Pakistan-occupied Kashmir (PoK).

Interacting with the Indian diaspora in Kuala Lumpur, Trinamool Congress MP Abhishek Banerjee, who is part of an all-party parliamentary delegation visiting Malaysia, said the next dialogue with Pakistan should be only on reclaiming PoK.

"We have been in talks with them (Pakistan) for decades, despite changes in various paradigms and governments. But one thing remains constant – the conflict with Pakistan."

"After what happened on April 22, where 26 people were killed at

point-blank range solely based on their religion and gender...I want the ruling dispensation to engage in dialogue with Pakistan only to discuss reclaiming Pakistan-occupied Jammu and Kashmir. Otherwise,

these terror attacks will continue," Banerjee, who is part of the delegation led by JD(U) Rajya Sabha MP Sanjay Kumar Jha, said.

India has made it clear that any talks with Pakistan will only be on

terrorism and PoK. India has tasked seven multi-party delegations to visit 33 global capitals to reach out to the international community on Pakistan's designs and India's response to terror, especially in the wake of the April 22 Pahalgam terror attack that killed 26 people.

Terrorism is a global menace to be addressed by humanity in unison was the all-party delegation's message as it concluded its visit to Algeria on Sunday.

The multi-party delegation was led by BJP MP Baijayant Jay Panda. "Terrorism is a global menace to be addressed by humanity in unison. ## TELUGU FAMILIES CAUGHT IN SIKKIM FLOODS

## AP govt launches rescue efforts

The Andhra Pradesh government has launched urgent rescue efforts to assist Telugu families stranded in flood-ravaged Lachung, Sikkim, after heavy rains and landslides disrupted normal life in the region.

Under the leadership of Union Minister for Civil Aviation Kinjarapu Rammohan Naidu, coordinated operations are being carried out to ensure the safe evacuation of those affected. Among them is Kurmanadha Rao, Tahsildar from Vizanagaram district, who has been stranded with his family for the past three days. His family includes wife M Uma (38), daughter Deekshitha (15), and son Jayansh Narayana (6).

Following instructions from M Ravi Chandra, Principal Secretary to the Chief Minister of Andhra



Pradesh, the AP Bhavan in New Delhi has been monitoring the situation closely and coordinating with key officials in Sikkim. The AP Bhavan team has established contact with Mangan District authorities, including District Collector Anant and Superintendent of Police Arun Tatal, to ensure timely assistance and logistical support.

Siddhara Rao has also been actively engaged in tracking developments on the ground and facilitating support for the Andhra Pradesh families.

Currently, road access to Lachung remains blocked due to major landslides. However, restoration work is progressing swiftly and is expected to be completed by tomorrow. All stranded individuals are reported to be safe, with food, shelter and other essential supplies being provided.

The Andhra Pradesh Bhavan is taking all necessary steps to expedite the evacuation and ensure the safety of the affected families. The government has assured that every effort is being made to bring them home as soon as possible.

# Kollu inaugurates FP shop in Masula

To ensure that essential commodities reach the public without diversion, the Andhra Pradesh government has resumed distribution through Fair Price Shops (FPS) based on public demand, said State Minister for Mines, Geology and Excise, Kollu Ravindra. The Minister, along with APSRTC Chairman Konakalla Narayana Rao, District Collector DK Balaji and Joint Collector Geethanjal Sharma, inaugurated Fair Price Shop No 7 in Rajupeta, 37th Division in Machilipatnam, on Sunday morning. They distrib-

uted five kg of rice, 0.5 kg sugar and one kg of toor dal to cardholders. The officials also visited the houses of two elderly beneficiaries, 65-year-old Boyina Suseela and Godavarthi Mahalakshmi. Suseela, a holder of an Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY) card, was provided with 35 kg of free rice, one kg of sugar and one kg of toor dal. Mahalakshmi received five kg rice, 0.5 kg sugar, and one kg of toor dal. Addressing the media, the Minister said that the State government, under Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu, Deputy CM Pawan Kalyan, HRD

## Govt reintroduces distribution of essential goods through FPS



Minister Nara Lokesh and Civil Supplies Minister Nadendla Manohar, is committed to good governance and ensuring transparency in the public distribution system (PDS). Responding to public appeals, the government decided to reintroduce distribution of essential goods through FPS starting June 1.

He noted that previously, rice distribution was marred by irregularities, including illegal diversions and described it as a "major scam" under the previous government. To prevent such issues, the CM has mandated that cardholders can collect their rations anytime from the 1st to the 15th of each month. Shops

will operate in two sessions: 8 AM–12 PM and 4 PM–8 PM. Each beneficiary is entitled to five kg of rice, 0.5 kg of sugar at ₹17, and 1 kg of toor dal at ₹67. For senior citizens, persons with disabilities, and bedridden individuals, door-to-door delivery will be ensured by the dealers. The district has around 5.22

lakh ration cards, with 1,059 FPS operational, confirmed Joint Collector Geethanjal Sharma. New ration cards are being processed, with 20,000 fresh applications in Machilipatnam alone. The State is also exploring distribution of millets like ragi and jowar as alternatives to rice.

# Ambati flays Naidu for 'hawk eye' remarks

## Jagan to visit Tenali tomorrow to console victims of police brutality

Pooh-poohing Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu's remark that he has a hawk eye, the YSRCP questioned as to what happened to its vision when Dalit and minority youth were beaten up at Tenali. Speaking to media here on Sunday, former minister Ambati Rambabu said the coalition is foisting false cases on the Opposition, and that YSRCP chief YS Jagan Mohan Reddy will visit Tenali on June 3 to console the victims of police brutality. "An attempt to murder case was booked against three youngsters -- John Victor, Doma Rajesh and Sheikh Babul -- on charges of attacking a constable. They should be arrested and produced before

court, but they were brutally beaten up in full public view to terrorise them. Filing false cases against those who question the government has become a norm showing no respect to democracy," he said. "Chandrababu has no moral right to speak on corruption as there is rampant corruption and his remarks during the pension disbursement at Konaseema Ambedkar district only shows his shallowness. He and his son have institutionalised corruption, and at the same time he said that he would bring in a corruption-free State. It's ridiculous," Rambabu said. Farmers are not getting MSP for any crop and all sections of people are unhappy with the coalition government, he added.

# GVMC rolls out monsoon action plan to curb vector-borne diseases

With the monsoon fast approaching, the Greater Visakhapatnam Municipal Corporation (GVMC) has put together a comprehensive action plan to tackle seasonal ailments and prevent the spread of vector-borne diseases across the city. The strategy is centred on three key pillars: intensified mosquito control, public awareness, and improved sanitation. GVMC Chief Medical Officer of Health, Dr. Naresh Kumar, revealed that 106 water stagnation points have been identified across Visakhapatnam. "Sanitation teams are on the ground clearing these areas. We're spraying drains, dropping oil balls in stagnant water, and even using drones to spray pesticides in hard-to-reach places," Dr. Kumar said. As part of its pre-monsoon preparedness, anti-larval operations are already in motion, with enhanced focus on fever-prone areas. The civic body has also rolled out fogging machines and initiated large-scale pesticide spraying, especially in localities with a history of high disease incidence. To strengthen operations, GVMC plans to recruit an additional 430 sanitation workers, supplementing the current workforce of 230 personnel dedicat-

ed to mosquito control. This recruitment drive is expected to be tabled in the GVMC council meeting in early June. A dedicated sanitation and vector control drive will be launched across schools and colleges from June 15, coinciding with their reopening. GVMC teams will conduct fogging and spraying in all hostels to safeguard student health. GVMC is working closely with the Health Department, along with ASHA workers, ANMs, and sachivalayam staff, to implement an intensive door-to-door awareness campaign. Residents will be educated on the need to eliminate stagnant

water and maintain hygienic surroundings. "We request citizens to support the field teams and follow simple precautions at home. Preventing mosquito breeding is the first line of defence against disease," said Dr. Naresh Kumar. While dengue remains the most commonly reported vector-borne illness, officials noted a steady decline in malaria and chikungunya cases in recent years. GVMC has also urged citizens to remain alert, report early symptoms like fever, and seek timely medical care to avoid health complications during the rainy season.



# Multispecialty health camp held at Burripalem

# Two youths killed in road mishap

In a tragic incident, two youngsters lost their lives after their two-wheeler reportedly rammed into a road divider on Saripalli Road under Pendurthi police station limits on Sunday. The bodies have been shifted to King George Hospital (KGH) for post-mortem examination. A case has been registered, and further investigation is underway.

# YSRCP to observe June 4 as 'Vennupotu Dinam'

## Day marks one year since formation of the NDA government

The YSR Congress Party (YSRCP), on Sunday, announced its decision to observe June 4 as 'Vennupotu Dinam' (Day of Betrayal), marking one year since the formation of the NDA government in Andhra Pradesh. The party plans to organise Statewide protests highlighting what it terms the government's failure to deliver on its promises over the past year. A preparatory meeting was held at the YSRCP district office in Visakhapatnam, chaired by Visakhapatnam district YSRCP president K.K.

Raju. Senior party leaders including former minister and MLC Botcha Satyanarayana, Rajya Sabha MP Golla Babu Rao, MLC Varudu Kalyani, and former MLA T. Nagi Reddy were present. During the meeting, the leaders formally unveiled the campaign poster for 'Vennupotu Dinam'. Speaking on the occasion, Botcha Satyanarayana alleged that the NDA government had failed to implement the majority of its pre-election promises, with only a marginal increase in pensions being executed.

# Spike in fatal road accidents raises alarm in Visakhapatnam

An alarming rise in road accident fatalities—primarily driven by over-speeding and irresponsible two-wheeler riding by youth—has become a serious concern in Visakhapatnam. The tragic deaths of two youngsters on the Telugu Thalli flyover late Thursday night have underscored the city's worsening road safety scenario. Despite barricades and

night-time restrictions, the victims are believed to have violated the rules, mistakenly assuming that reduced traffic will make late-night riding safe. The crash occurred shortly after midnight, highlighting the persistent disregard for safety regulations. Key city roads—including flyovers, Beach Road, and other main arteries—are increasingly turning hazardous, with frequent violations reported. These include underage riding, drunk

driving, triple riding without helmets, and dangerous stunt performances. "We live in constant fear when our children are out. We don't know if they'll come back safely," said a concerned resident from the city's north. According to traffic police, two-wheeler riders account for the majority of accident victims. Speeding and helmetless



riding are the most common factors behind fatal crashes. "From Beach Road to Sagar Nagar, reckless riding is rampant. Post-sunset, some stretches resemble race tracks," said a senior traffic official. The numbers reflect the seriousness of the problem. While 2022 saw 346 deaths from 1,353 road accidents, fatalities dipped to 209 in 2023 despite 1,180

crashes. However, in just five months of 2024, the death toll has already reached 263 from 1,094 accidents. Despite regular enforcement through speed checks, awareness campaigns, and penalties, officials acknowledge that change remains elusive. "Fines alone can't instill accountability," one officer said, citing instances of youth performing stunts with three riders on a single bike. Doctors at King George Hospital confirm that

head injuries from helmetless crashes remain the primary cause of death in two-wheeler accidents. "Helmets are life-saving devices. Skipping them often seals one's fate," said a senior surgeon. Authorities are now urging a shift in public attitude. "Tough laws help, but without a sense of responsibility—especially among youth and parents—our efforts won't suffice," a senior enforcement officer said.



# Min Durgesh reopens ration shops

In a key move to enhance food security for the underprivileged, Minister for Tourism, Culture and Cinematography Kandula Durgesh inaugurated the reopening of ration shops at Satyavada village in Undrajavaram Mandal. Replacing the previous mobile delivery system, the new coalition government under Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu has reinstated the distribution of essential commodities through fair price shops, ensuring uninterrupted access to necessities for poor families.

On the occasion, Minister Durgesh personally distributed ration supplies to beneficiaries and reaffirmed the government's commitment to efficient service delivery. He announced that ration shops will operate from the 1st to the

15th of every month. For senior citizens above 65 years and persons with disabilities, a doorstep delivery system has been introduced to improve accessibility.

The Minister criticised the former government for limiting ration distribution to designated points via mobile vans, which he said caused significant inconvenience. He stated that the current system, revived after detailed cabinet discussions led by Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu and Deputy Chief Minister Pawan Kalyan, is designed to serve people directly and fairly.

Durgesh also addressed issues surrounding ration card distribution, assuring that the government is actively correcting errors and facilitating comprehensive updates.

Highlighting Nidadavolu's agrarian profile, the Minister

noted that of the 3.4 lakh metric tonnes of paddy targeted for procurement in East Godavari district, 1.2 lakh metric tonnes were allocated to Nidadavolu. In response to a good harvest, plans are underway to procure an additional 10,000 metric tonnes. He added that payments to farmers are being made within 48 hours of procurement—sometimes in as little as six hours.

Reiterating his dedication to public service, the Minister said he has no private business interests and has been committed to addressing constituency issues since his student days.

Among those present at the event were TDP leader and Skill Development Chairman B. Shesaraao, Joint Collector Chinna Rayudu, RDO Rani Sushmita, and local leaders from the TDP, Jana Sena, and BJP.

## Ration shop dealers told to ensure quality

District Collector K. Vetri Selvi has directed ration shop dealers to ensure the quality of ration commodities and accurate weighing while distributing them to cardholders.

The distribution of ration goods through fair price shops commenced on Sunday. The Collector inspected the distribution process at a ration shop in Tangellamudi village and observed operations at ration shop no. 127, accompanied by relevant revenue officials.

Speaking on the occasion, she said that ration commodities are being supplied to 6,20,146 cardholders through 1,123 ration shops across Eluru district. She reiterated that the State Government is committed to delivering ration supplies to people above 65 years of age and the differently-abled at their doorsteps.

The Collector instructed shop dealers to maintain transparency and ensure proper delivery of commodities.

She also directed them to clearly display the price list and stock details of items supplied by the Civil Supplies Department.

She emphasised that ration shops must operate as per the government-mandated hours — from 8 am to 12 noon and 4 pm to 8 pm. All cardholders must receive their monthly ration by the 15th, while senior citizens and differently-abled individuals should receive theirs at home by the 5th of each month.

The Collector inspected the use of the e-POS machines and the weighing of rice during her visit. She urged dealers to carry out their duties without giving room for public complaints and interacted with beneficiaries to check the quality of supplies.

She was accompanied by Special Deputy Collector Devaki Devi, Tahsildar Seshagiri Rao, Deputy Tahsildar Ramesh, and District Ration Dealers' Association President Rajulapati Gangadhar.

# Nasanakota MJP School to be upgraded as jr college: Savitha

# PM will talk only if Trump gives him a hard time: Mahesh Country witnessing 'fascist' type rule, says Mahesh

"Why is the Centre, which offered a ceasefire to Pakistan, committing 'genocide' without talking to the Maoists, who are our citizens? Governments should act according to the Constitution. This is the basic principle of democracy," he said.

Mahesh Kumar Goud and the AICC Secretary Bastar in-charge, SA Sampath Kumar, attended a round table meeting at the Sundarayya Vignana Kendram on Sunday, organised by the Peace Dialogue Committee regarding the recent encounters.



Mahesh said the Congress is built on the foundation of non-violence. "We condemn violence by anyone. In the past, Naxalism was born due to economic inequalities. During that time, Naxalism reduced feudal atrocities in villages to some extent. But it gradually went astray and became a platform for settling personal differences."

"At the same time, without considering peaceful solutions to eradicate Naxalism, the Centre is committing misdeeds through Operation Kagar, citing peace and security as an excuse. Through this operation, attempts are being made to facilitate the looting of the mineral wealth in

forest areas by private companies. After coming to power, the BJP has been weakening constitutional institutions," he said.

He said that attempts are being made to gain political mileage by using religion and caste. Instead of implementing the promises made in 2014, the BJP is trying to remain in power by using religious sentiments.

He said there is a great need for secular forces to unite and that the time has come for people with democratic sentiments to unite. There is a need to teach a befitting lesson to the 'fascist' regime at the Centre, Mahesh added.

## Inspector, head constable caught taking bribe

On Sunday, ACB officials laid a trap and caught the Inspector accepting the bribe through the Head Constable. Both officials were taken into custody and will be produced before the ACB court on Monday, officials added.

Woman held for killing landlord in Odisha

A 57-year-old woman was arrested for allegedly setting her landlord on fire in Odisha’s Ganjam district, a police officer said on Sunday. The woman, a widow allegedly killed the landlord, a retired revenue inspector, by setting him on fire on Thursday at Subash Nagar under Baidyanathpur police station limits here to grab the properties of the deceased, the police said. The deceased, identified as Harihar Sahu (72) and the accused Sudeshna Jena of Amrutul in Sorada were staying alone on the first and ground floor of the house respectively in the area. While a daughter of the accused was staying in Hyderabad, another daughter was staying at Ambapua of the city, they said. On Thursday early morning, the accused entered into the room of the deceased and poured kerosene and set him afire while he was sleeping, the police said, adding, that Sudeshna has free access to the deceased’s room.



Passenger caught with 48 highly venomous snakes

An Indian who arrived at Mumbai’s Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport from Thailand was found to be carrying 48 highly venomous snakes and five turtles, an official said on Sunday. Customs officials intercepted the passenger on Saturday night after he got down from a flight from Bangkok, he said. During a search of his baggage, the Customs officials discovered 48 highly venomous viper snakes and five turtles, he said. A team from RAWV (Resqink Association for Wildlife Welfare) assisted in the identification and handling of these species, he said. The Wildlife Crime Control Bureau has ordered that the reptiles be sent back to the country from where they had been brought, as per the provisions of the Wildlife Protection Act, the official added.

Mamata opposing Op Sindoor to appease minorities: Shah

Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Sunday launched a blistering attack on West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee, accusing her of “stooping low” by opposing Operation Sindoor and the Wakf Amendment Bill to appease the Muslim vote bank, and alleged that the Murshidabad riots were ‘state-sponsored’.

Addressing party leaders and workers in Kolkata, Shah gave a clarion call to uproot the TMC government from power in the 2026 assembly elections.

“The tenure of Mamata Banerjee as the CM will end in 2026. The BJP will uproot this TMC government in the next elections. To appease the Muslim vote bank, Mamata didi opposed Operation Sindoor. By doing so, she is insulting the mothers and sisters of this country. You have not only opposed the military operation, but you have also played with the lives of crores of mothers and sisters,” Shah claimed.

The home minister said he has come to Bengal to ‘appeal to the women of the state and explain the value of sindoor



(vermilion) to those who are against Operation Sindoor”. Shah claimed the mothers and sisters of Bengal would teach Banerjee and her party a lesson in 2026 for opposing the military strike, launched in retaliation to the Pahalgam terror attack in April that left several tourists, including some from Bengal, dead.

Banerjee had recently accused the Centre of politicising Operation Sindoor for electoral gains.

Responding to the allegation, Shah said, “During previous regimes in which Mamata didi was also a minister, no steps were taken to deal firmly with terror attacks. But our

PM Narendra Modi took firm measures against terror attacks. But Mamata didi has a problem with it.”

For the sake of her vote bank, Mamata didi has “crossed all limits of stooping low”, he alleged.

“Pakistan-backed terrorists killed our innocent citizens in front of their families after asking them about their religion. Operation Sindoor was carried out to punish these terrorists. The headquarters of the terrorists were destroyed by entering Pakistan. However, Mamata didi was pained over the death of these terrorists. She opposed Operation Sindoor by issuing a cheap political statement,” he

claimed.

Shah asserted that the Centre had launched a “deep strike 100 km into Pakistan, targeting terrorist headquarters. “Numerous terrorists were killed, but this seems to trouble Mamata ji. By doing so, you are not only opposed to the mission but also disregard the sentiments and emotions of the women of our country,” he alleged.

Referring to the killing of tourists from the state in the Pahalgam attack, Shah claimed, “When tourists from Bengal were killed in the assault, Mamata didi remained silent, but now she is having problems with Operation Sindoor.”

Govt ready to address all concerns: Shekhawat

Says Oppn will have opportunity to seek answers

With opposition parties demanding a special Parliament session in light of Operation Sindoor, Union Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat on Sunday asserted that the government has nothing to hide and they will have ample opportunity to ask questions during the Monsoon Session, which is a few weeks away.

The BJP leader, however, expressed doubts about whether the opposition parties intended to seek answers and pointed out that Prime Minister Narendra Modi had spoken extensively in recent days on key national issues, including Operation Sindoor, that they have been raising.

The Congress on Sunday demanded the immediate convening of a special session of Parliament to discuss the military and foreign policy strategy in the wake of remarks by Chief of Defence Staff Gen Anil Chauhan.

The Congress also asked that the government take all parties and the nation into confidence and discuss India’s defence preparedness and strategy after Operation Sindoor.

Speaking to the media on Sunday, Union Culture and Tourism Shekhawat pointed

out that India’s parliamentary system already has well-established procedures for members to raise issues in both the Lok Sabha and Rajya Sabha and seek answers.

“The Monsoon Session is about to start in the next 20-25 days, everyone will get an opportunity” to raise their issues, Shekhawat said.

He emphasised that the government is willing to resolve any confusion or concerns raised by the opposition and there is nothing to hide.

“In my view, the opposition should first decide what exactly they want to hear from the prime minister.

“If their intention is truly to seek answers, then over the past three days, the prime minister has already spoken in detail from three different parts of the country on the current state of the nation, Operation Sindoor, and all the key issues the opposition has been raising,” Shekhawat said.

Delhi HC passes order protecting Sadhguru’s personality rights

The Delhi High Court has passed an order protecting the personality and publicity rights of Sadhguru Jaggi Vasudev, founder of Isha Foundation, and restrained various rogue websites and unknown entities from misusing his personality traits through the use of Artificial Intelligence in any medium or platform.

Justice Saurabh Banerjee passed an ex-parte interim order, saying the balance of convenience is tilting towards the grant of relief in favour of the plaintiff -- Sadhguru.

The court passed a ‘dynamic’ injunction in favour of Sadhguru, a form of injunctive relief which is being granted by courts in similar matters in recent years, primarily to protect parties like the plaintiffs here-in against rapidly developing



online infringement platforms.

“Therefore, the position of law apparent therefrom, which has since developed with the passage of time, clearly reflects that the rights of a plaintiff, cannot be rendered otiose in this world of rapidly developing technology and for that, enforcement of intellectual property rights on any social platform, including but not limited to, the internet as well alongwith the real world, ought to be visible and effective,” the court said.

Himachal to develop 77 new eco-tourism sites

Focus on the enemy, stop self-boasting: Kharge

Asks Modi to recuse himself from election campaign

opments linked to Operation Sindoor, Kharge noted that Congress delegations had travelled abroad for consultations. “Let them come back.

Till they return, it is not proper to be touring around and giving speeches,” he said.

The opposition leader in the Rajya Sabha reiterated the Congress party’s unwavering support for the Indian Armed Forces.

Expedite works under PMGSY in Wayanad  
Priyanka urges Union Minister Chouhan

Congress leader and Wayanad MP Priyanka Gandhi Vadra has urged the Union Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan to expedite works to be taken up under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana-IV (PMGSY-IV) in Wayanad district.

In a letter to the union minister of rural development, agriculture and farmers welfare, she said that out of the 331 habitations without all-weather road connectivity identified in Wayanad district, only proposals related to 64 habitations in Kalpetta block have been approved by the National Rural Infrastructure Development Agency



(NRIDA).

She said all the 331 roads have already been approved by the Kerala State Rural Roads Development Agency.

The works related to a total of 267

habitations across Sulthan Batheri, Mananthavady and Panamaram blocks are still awaiting approval from the NRIDA on the online management, monitoring and accounting system (OMMAS), she said in the letter.

“These blocks have significant tribal population.

The PMGSY guidelines stipulate that tribal villages in aspirational blocks will be prioritized,” the letter said, adding the works should be given approval and taken up at the earliest.

Vadra also said she has been informed that 25 unconnected habitations have been incorrectly categorized as connect-

Armed forces united by uniform not divided by religion: HC

The Delhi High Court has upheld the termination of services of a Christian army officer over his consistent refusal to fully participate in the weekly regimental religious parades and said the armed forces were united by their uniform rather than being divided by their religion.

A bench of Justices Navin Chawla and Shalinder Kaur rejected the petition by the Indian Army Lieutenant, who served as a ‘Troop Leader’ of a squadron, against the termination order passed on March 3,

2021, that dismissed him from the Indian Army without pension and gratuity.

The court opined that the petitioner kept his religion above the lawful command from his superior, and disobedience was an offence under the Army Act.

FISH THROWN AT GOVT OFFICIAL

Maha minister Rane acquitted in 2017 case

A court in Maharashtra’s Sindhudurg has acquitted BJP minister Nitesh Rane and 30 others in a 2017 case in which he was accused of throwing fish at a government official as well as abusing and threatening him.

As per the prosecution, Rane and around 100 others, on July 6 that year entered the Malvan office of assistant commissioner in the fisheries department Pradeep Vast to discuss issues related to the sector, abused him and then threw mackerel, which hit the latter on the cheek. Rane and others also allegedly threatened to burn fishing boats.

Rane and others were booked at the time under



Indian Penal Code sections 353 (assault or criminal force to deter public servant from discharge of his duty), 341 (wrongful restraint), 332 (voluntarily causing hurt to deter public servant from his duty), 141 (unlawful assembly), 143 (being a member of an unlawful assembly), 147 (rioting), 504 (intentional insult with

intent to provoke breach of the peace), and 506 (criminal intimidation).

In its order of May 21, details of which were made available on Sunday, the court of additional sessions judge (Sindhudurg) mentioned that Vast in his testimony did not state that Rane threw mackerel at him.

According to sources, the CM will likely visit Kedarnath on Monday.

The BJP government in Delhi led by Gupta completed 100 days in power on Friday. The BJP won the Assembly polls held in February this year, forming the government in Delhi after 27 years.

Voices from the sidelines in the mainstream

Booker prize for 'Heart Lamp' is a defining moment for India's vernacular literature which has been on sidelines for long

In a watershed moment for Indian regional literature, 'Heart Lamp,' a short story collection by Banu Mushtaq, translated into English by Deepa Bhasthi, has won the 2025 International Booker Prize. This is the first time a Kannada literary work has received this prestigious honour, making it not only a personal triumph for the author and translator but also a landmark moment for Indian vernacular literature on the global stage. 'Heart Lamp' is a piercing and poetic collection that centres on the lives of women navigating the grip of patriarchy. The stories are deeply rooted in the spirit of the Bandaya Sahitya movement — a literary rebellion that began in the 1970s in Karnataka. The Bandaya movement, meaning "rebellion literature," was born out of a fierce resistance to caste oppression, social injustice, and gender discrimination. It gave rise to a generation of writers and activists who used literature as a tool to confront the brutalities of the everyday, particularly those experienced by Dalits, women, and the working class.

Mushtaq's stories continue that legacy with boldness and empathy. They do not seek to flatter or pacify; they seek to reveal. The women in her stories are not merely victims — they are witnesses, rebels, and survivors. Through Bhasthi's nuanced and faithful translation, these voices have transcended linguistic boundaries and reached a global audience without losing the cultural texture that gives them life.

The International Booker Prize, one of the most esteemed literary awards in the world, is awarded annually for the best work of translated fiction published in the UK or Ireland. With a prize of £50,000, split equally between the author and the translator, it recognises not just storytelling, but also the essential art of translation — the bridge that carries one culture into the soul of another. Heart Lamp's win is a recognition of the power of collaboration and the importance of making regional voices legible and resonant to the world.

Historically, the global literary stage has mostly spotlighted Indian writers who write in English. While these voices have undeniably contributed to India's literary identity abroad, they have also, unintentionally, overshadowed the abundance of storytelling happening in Indian vernacular languages. With scores of scheduled languages and hundreds of dialects, India possesses an incredibly rich literary heritage. Yet, much of it remains under-translated, under-promoted, and under-read. This disparity has created a kind of cultural silence around the lives, struggles, and imaginations of millions who speak and think in languages other than English.

The recognition of Heart Lamp signals a necessary shift. It invites international publishers, literary institutions, and readers to turn their gaze toward the immense, untapped potential of regional Indian literature. More importantly, it affirms the belief that stories rooted in local realities — whether of gender inequality in rural Karnataka or caste dynamics in a small town — have universal resonance when told with honesty and craft.

The all-party voice against terrorism

Across party lines, ideologies, and regional divides, the all-party delegation stood not as politicians but as patriots, sending a clear and powerful message to the world: when it comes to confronting terror, India speaks in one voice

In the cacophony of India's bustling democracy — where debates are heated, elections are passionately fought, and ideological lines run deep — it's easy to believe that political discord defines our national character. Yet, beneath this noisy surface lies a quieter, more powerful truth: when the sovereignty and safety of the nation are threatened, Indians — across party lines — stand as one. The recent formation and international engagement of an all-party parliamentary delegation, following the horrific Pahalgam terrorist ambush and the resolute military response in Operation Sindhoor, stands as a poignant and necessary reminder that in the battle against terrorism, unity is not an option — it is a national imperative.

The terrorist strike in Pahalgam was not just another act of senseless violence; it was an attack on the soul of India. When extremists target not only human lives but also the spirit of democracy, the very idea of India comes under siege. The appropriate response to such horror cannot be drawn along partisan lines; it must emerge from a shared national conscience. Operation Sindhoor, a swift and courageous military action against cross-border terrorist elements, demonstrated the Government's readiness to act decisively. But it was what came afterward — the dispatch of an all-party delegation to take India's voice to the global stage — that truly reflected a maturing democratic ethos.

This delegation, led by BJP MP Baijayant Jay Panda and comprising representatives from the Congress, DMK, TMC, and other parties, travelled to Bahrain and the United States. They met high-ranking officials, including Bahrain's Deputy Prime Minister Shaikh Khalid bin Abdulla Al Khalifa, to present a united case against international terror networks. In their diplomatic engagements, the delegation did more than just speak; they represented a rare and powerful display of India's multiparty consensus.

The symbolism was profound. When the world sees India's political rivals — who often spar vociferously in Parliament — standing side by side to address a global issue, it takes notice. This wasn't a Government delegation in the narrow sense — it was an Indian delegation. The message was clear: terrorism is not a political issue to be leveraged for electoral gain, but a shared threat that requires collective resolve.

That message was underscored by Congress MP Dr. Shashi Tharoor in Washington, D.C., where he made a pointed and statesmanlike observation. He clarified that the delegation did not represent just the ruling Government but the Indian people as a whole. He openly acknowledged that while Operation Sindhoor was not flawless, its necessity and purpose



transcended political fault lines. His words captured the essence of true bipartisanship — not the denial of differences, but the prioritisation of national interest above all else.

This maturity in tone and intent marked a significant shift in our national dialogue. For too long, issues of national security have been fodder for political mudslinging. But terrorism is not saffron, green, or red — it is a dark and indiscriminate force. And to fight it effectively, we need all the democratic colors of India aligned.

The significance of this delegation goes beyond symbolism. The world today is interconnected, and terrorism is a transnational beast. Its networks operate across continents, its financing moves through shadowy channels, and its propaganda infects minds across cyberspace.

No single party, no matter how strong, can confront this alone. Nor can a single Government shoulder this burden in isolation. India's voice is strongest on the global stage when it emerges from a united Parliament, not just a ruling coalition. BJP MP Daggubati Purandeswari's comments before the delegation's visit to Europe reflected this sentiment. She reiterated India's zero-tolerance stance toward terrorism, not in the tone of a partisan leader seeking credit, but as a national representative. Her words were devoid of political jabs and rooted in conviction. That's the kind of leadership India needs

— firm, clear, and unifying.

India's strength as a democracy is built on its diversity: linguistic, cultural, religious, and political. That we continue to function — despite these complexities — is a tribute to our institutional resilience. But moments of national crisis demand more than functionality; they demand cohesion. From the trauma of the 26/11 attacks to Pulwama and now Pahalgam, we've seen glimpses of this unity. We now need to make it a habit, not just a reflex. Critics often dismiss all-party delegations as symbolic or ineffectual. True, they may not pass binding resolutions or sign treaties. But in international diplomacy, symbols matter. They shape perception, and perception shapes outcomes. When the world sees India united — not fractured — it strengthens our moral argument, elevates our credibility, and earns the respect of allies and adversaries alike.

This unity also counters dangerous narratives. By bringing together MPs of different faiths, regions, and ideologies — be it a Muslim Congress leader, a Sikh BJP representative, or a southern regional party figure — the delegation visibly refuted the claim that India's fight against terrorism is politically or communally driven. It underscored a critical truth: India's fight is not against any religion or community, but against those who threaten democracy and peace through violence.

However, the bipartisan spirit must not remain confined to overseas missions or emerge only during tragedy. It needs to be woven into the fabric of our domestic political culture. Imagine a standing National Security Council that includes leaders from both the Government and opposition. Picture regular all-party briefings on counterterror-

ism, cybersecurity, and intelligence reforms. These aren't utopian dreams — they're pragmatic steps toward institutionalising cooperation in matters of national interest.

Bipartisanship, importantly, does not mean the end of criticism. On the contrary, constructive critique strengthens democracy. But the ability to differentiate between electoral contests and existential threats is what defines a mature nation. When terrorism strikes, there is no ruling party or opposition — there is only India. And in those moments, the tricolour must fly higher than any party banner.

India is fortunate to possess a formidable defence establishment, skilled intelligence agencies, and a diplomatic corps that punches above its weight. But these pillars of national strength can only reach their full potential when supported by a united political will. The all-party delegation, in its spirit and substance, offers a hopeful glimpse of what that political will can look like when freed from petty rivalry. As the delegation concludes its travels, it would be a mistake to file away this moment as a brief detour from routine politics. The unity it represents must endure. Because terrorism is not a passing storm — it is a persistent threat. And our response must be equally enduring. Let it be a call to action. A reminder that when the stakes are high, our divisions can — and must-give way to a deeper allegiance: not to party, not to ideology, but to the Republic. If we can stand together abroad, we can surely listen better at home. And if we can do that, we will not only defend the idea of India — we will elevate it.

From Silence to Strength: Bihar's menstrual health revolution

For too long, a girl's period was something she had to hide. Whispers in classrooms. Embarrassed glances at homes. Silence where there should have been support.

But in Bihar today, that silence is breaking — and what's taking its place is powerful. Menstrual hygiene, once tucked away at the fringes of public policy and social conversation, is now entering our schools, community halls, Government offices, and most importantly, our homes. We're seeing a cultural shift — one that doesn't just improve access to pads or sanitation but fundamentally changes how we treat our girls and women.

This change matters. Because when girls can manage their periods with dignity, they stay in school. When women have access to proper hygiene, they show up fully — to work, to lead, to live. When communities understand menstruation without shame, the ripple effects reach education, health, gender equality, and ultimately, the kind of society we want to build. This is more than just hygiene. It's about justice. Progress is visible.

Under the Govt. of India's Menstrual Hygiene Scheme (MHS), and its dedicated implementation by Govt. of Bihar departments, the number of young women using hygien-

ic methods in Bihar has nearly doubled in recent years — from just 31per cent (NFHS-4) to almost 59per cent (NFHS-5).

This is better compared to the national average improvement from 57.6per cent to 77.3per cent. That's not a statistic — it's a sign of our collective effort: from frontline ASHA workers and teachers to mothers, fathers, and girls themselves. But let's be clear: we are not done.

A recent Sulabh Sanitation Mission study (2023-24) in Khagaria and Katihar reveals the harder truth — more than half the women surveyed lacked adequate menstrual materials during their last cycle, and 62per cent had no safe place to dispose of them. These numbers speak not only to a gap in services but to something deeper: a lack of choice, a lack of dignity, a lack of voice. That's why Bihar's Menstrual Health Management Road Map (2022-25) isn't just another policy. It's a promise — a coordinated, cross-sector commitment to treat menstrual health not as a side issue, but as central to our vision of an equitable Bihar. This means health departments working with education, rural development teaming up with sanitation, and everyone — from Government officials to local leaders — treating menstrual dignity as a priority, not an afterthought.

Real change is happening at the ground level. With UNICEF's support, we've introduced Saheli Kaksh — safe spaces in schools where girls can rest, change, and man-

age their periods with comfort and confidence.

Over 50 Government schools in Araria and Purnia now host these rooms, and more are on the way. But safe spaces must go beyond brick and mortar — they must live in the attitudes of teachers, classmates, and community leaders. We're also aligning existing schemes like the Mukhyamantri Kanya Uthtan Yojana and RKSK for our menstrual health goals. These programs have potential — but only if last-mile delivery becomes more accountable and more responsive. The gap between policy and people must close. And let's not forget this isn't just a "women's issue." Men and boys, fathers and brothers, teachers and panchayat leaders — every voice matters. When they step up, listen, and support, they help dismantle shame and build trust. That's what inclusion looks like. We must ensure that every Anganwadi has staff trained to support adolescent girls, that every health worker knows how to speak about menstruation with empathy and confidence, and that every school treats periods as a part of life, not a reason to leave class. The roadmap shall evolve. The programs shall deliver. And we shall keep listening to the girls whose lives we seek to change. Because this isn't just about managing a biological process. It's about unlocking potential, ensuring equality, and fighting for a future where no girl is held back by something as natural as her period.

# Bengaluru deluges spark urgent call for urban resilience

The unprecedented downpour overwhelmed the city's outdated stormwater infrastructure. The chaos exposed not only the city's fragile urban planning but also the wider ecological risks of climate change, as rising global temperatures amplify extreme weather events

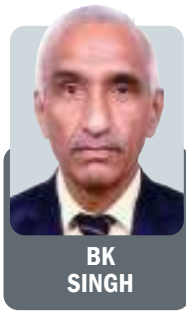
A record rainfall of 130 mm in 12 hours from the 18th May evening till the dawn of 19th May led to the flooding of houses, overflowing of city lakes, streets and underpasses being reduced to waterways, flyovers remaining closed for traffic for several hours, and halting public bus services in many parts of the city etc. Essential travels in the city remained disrupted for a large part of 19th May. Branches of trees have fallen and in some cases, the whole tree has been uprooted. Power outage in the city made matters worse and BESCOM received 33,000 calls in this period for restoration of power.

More than 20 lakes in Bengaluru have overflowed adding further misery to the citizens. It was the second-highest rainfall in a single day in a decade and BBMP found that things had gone out of hand. Agencies do their best to mitigate the misery of the people. The worst part of the story was that the two persons were electrocuted while trying to connect power to run the motors to drain out water from the houses and another human death also took place in the floods. State disaster response force deployed boats to evacuate people from flooded locations.

While Bengaluru's stormwater drains have a capacity of 70 mm of rain in 24 hours, the rain gauges located at Kengeri, Vaderhalli, Chikkabanavara, Chowdeshwarinagar and Kempegowda wards registered 132 mm, 131 mm, 127 mm, 104 mm, and 103 mm of rains in 12 hours' period respectively. Other areas like Kormangala, Baswagudi, Marthahalli, and HAL Airport also recorded more than 90 mm of rain. When the rains exceed the capacity of stormwater drains, flooding the streets and houses is inevitable. Flooding was not limited to low-lying areas alone but the areas at higher altitudinal locations like Koramangala, BTM, Jayanagar etc were also flooded.

India's vaunted tech capital was paralysed as Manyata Tech Park, White Field and Electronic City tech companies also faced the brunt. Manyata Tech Park has been flooding in routine rains too. It was flooded eight months ago, flooded last week and experienced very heavy flooding following the 19th May rains. Bengaluru tech giants and real estate groups must rethink their urban design especially in and around Manyata.

It is located squarely in Hebbal Nagwara Valley, just below Nagwara and Rachenhalli lakes and the overflow of these lakes flows through the tech park to reach downstream lakes like Kalkere. The drains through Manyata Tech Park carry treated and untreated water, which gets mixed during flooding. Mixing of toilet water with rainwater is not only confined to the tech park area

but is also a characteristic of all flooded lands in urban areas.

Urban centres including Bengaluru are increasingly paved over with concrete and built surfaces, and rainfall no longer seeps/percolates into the soil and rushes in overloaded drains. Increasing the size and quantity of flow in the drains through Manyata will not be a proper and valid solution, as the downstream areas will face heavier flooding. 300 acres Manyata campus must be provided with a natural solution to capture rainwater during heavy floods. Water must be allowed to infiltrate the ground by minimising the pavements and concrete.

Bioswales comprising vegetation, mulch, bioaeration soil, gravel and perforated pipes can treat the water and can also cut the velocity of the flow of water thereby increasing the seepage of water in the soil and improving underground recharge. The commercial buildings should have green roofs and walls, which can reduce the runoff on the ground and support underground recharge. Manyata campus has the potential to handle large volumes of flood water efficiently, if the suggestions are kept in mind.

The main reason for the heavy downpour is the

convergence of two low-pressure systems. It also brought thunderstorms on 18th and 19th May. As the concentration of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere is reaching a dangerous level of nearly 425 ppm, from 350 ppm in the pre-industrial period, the planet is continuously warming.

The record of the warmest year 2023 was shattered in 2024, and 2025 is on course to shatter even this record. Despite Scientists cautioning against fossil fuel burning, world leaders have not shown any respect for Science and increasing the dependency on the consumption of fossil fuel as energy to boost growth.

This results in continuous warming of the planet. Sea surface temperature is rising and a lot of moisture is pumped into the atmosphere through an increased rate of evaporation. The accumulation of relatively more moisture in the cloud formation is inevitable and whenever temperature, pressure and wind conditions are favourable, heavy downpour occurs.

## A Soldier's Plea for Real-Time Patriotism, Not Posthumous Applause

Jai Hind! Today, I write to you not as a critic, nor as a cynic — not even as a disappointed fan — but as someone who has lived to be a so-called hero in real life and in real life as well. One in olive green, where orders are followed without question and sacrifice is routine. The other is under studio lights, where scripts replace strategy and stories stir the soul. My journey, from battlefields to film sets, has shaped me into a storyteller, a voice that speaks today not just from experience, but also for a purpose & cause — as an international TEDx speaker.

I am Major (Dr) Mohommmed Ali Shah (Veteran). I have commanded troops as a Major in the Indian Army, and I have performed on screen in National award-winning films like 'Haider', 'Bajranghi Bhaijaan', 'The Tashkent Files', 'Agent Vinod', 'Yaara', 'Avrodi' aagdes, Vodka Diaries, Majaz — Ae Ghame dil kya karun and many more. My heart has always stood at this strange, beautiful intersection — between the real and the reel, between uniformed action and cinematic expression. It is from that very space that I write to you today — with both understanding and anguish.

Operation Sindoor was not just a military triumph — it was a moment steeped in symbolism. Even the name was chosen with cinematic flair and reverence. Sindoor — evoking images of sacrifice, soil, blood, and valour. It could easily be the title of a powerful film. And yet, what followed has been disheartening silence from those who have long worn the uniform on-screen and draped the tricolour in their reels.

The film fraternity, the cricketing heroes, the influencers — those whose voices echo far and wide — have not spoken a word as yet and it is very disheartening, to say the least.

We've seen the outpouring of support when a film trailer is launched, or when a cricketer scores a century. We've seen hashtags trend for birthdays and box office milestones. So why does a real victory — Operation Sindoor — go unnoticed by you so-called stars & celebrities?

And yes — there have been a couple of murmurs. A stray comment here, a passing tweet there. A few individuals, almost cautiously, have begun to say something — but where is the thunderous, united voice? Where is that collective heartbeat of the industry that roars when a film releases or when an award is won? What we're hearing right now feels like whispers in a storm — barely audible, quickly forgotten. We're not asking for slogans.

We're not asking for parades. Just presence. Just one powerful, unmistakable voice that tells every soldier returning home: You are seen. You are celebrated. You are our country's real heroes.

And here's what hurts a little more: Right now, when the wounds are fresh when our jawans are



still returning from the line of fire, there is silence. But give it a few months, and someone somewhere in the industry will write a gripping script. A stellar cast will be signed. The promotional drums will beat, and the box office will roar. It'll be called Sindoor: The Untold Story or something equally poetic. And suddenly, everyone will remember.

But that's not fair, is it? To ignore the sentiment now, and cash in on it later. Patriotism isn't a plot device — it's a pulse. And it deserves presence in real-time, not just posthumous applause. I say this not with bitterness, but with a quiet ache. Because I know how closely our worlds are tied. The soldier and the storyteller. The play-er and the patriot. The screen and the sky. Not long ago, I wrote an open letter addressed to terrorists — challenging them with nothing but words, courage, and conviction. That letter went viral. Why? Because I spoke of Hindu-Muslim unity. Because I spoke not from a political platform, but from the heart of a soldier who loves his country — whole and undivided. I'm trying, in my small way, to bring sanity where there is noise, and hope where there is fear.

But I am just a Major — not a General. I am a passionate artist — not a celebrated star. My voice is small, and yet I try to make it count. I do not have millions hanging on to my every word — but you do. And that's exactly why your silence resounds so deeply. I have had the honour of safeguarding our National frontiers in the difficult terrains of J&K & the North East part of India.

I along with my brave colleagues have risked our lives on several occasions so that you all are safe & peaceful. We have lived at the border in bunkers barely a few meters away from the Pakistani post, where grenades were thrown at us with a frequency one never forgets. In those

bunkers, we didn't sleep — we waited. For the next grenade. For the next breath. For dawn. We learnt to embrace uncertainty, to celebrate survival, and to carry on without applause and yes we did give a befitting reply to the enemy.

I have witnessed life and death not through the lens of a camera, but through the fog of war. I have invaded terrorist hideouts not only on screen — but in actual counter-insurgency operations. That is not fiction. That is my memory.

And yet, I've also stood on a film set, correcting an actor's insignia out of reflex — not because I was acting, but because I had worn the original with pride and responsibility. That's how blurred the lines are for someone like me. And that's why I feel this silence so deeply.

To our respected cons like Amitabh Bachchan, Shah Rukh Khan, Akshay Kumar, M.S. Dhoni, Virat Kohli, Ranveer Singh, and Deepika Padukone — you have inspired millions with your talent, skill and charm. You've united this country in stadiums and cinemas alike. Your voice, even in a whisper, has the power to move a nation. If Pakistani actors could find the courage to post messages praising their army, despite the consequences they may face, then what is stopping us — citizens of a free and proud nation — from standing by our own?

So all I ask from you with an open heart: will you speak up when real-life heroes return from real — life missions after putting their lives in danger for you? This is not a boycott call. This is not outrage. This is an invitation — to remember that your influence reaches hearts the way even battle cries sometimes cannot. A post. A word. A gesture of respect — can go a long way in reminding the soldier that his courage is not invisible, not unacknowledged. You do not have to raise slogans. You just have to raise awareness.

## The Silent Architect: How geology shapes every structure we build

When we look at the marvels of modern construction — soaring skyscrapers, sprawling industries, intricate networks of highway and railway bridges and embankments, airports, and energy infrastructure — it is obvious to focus on the visible achievements.

Yet, beneath every asset we build, there lies an often complex and critical partner: the ground itself. The science, mechanics and behaviour of soils and geology profoundly shape what, where, and how we build.

Without a deep and arduous understanding of the ground beneath us, even the most ambitious construction projects can falter, while those that respect the principles through science, technology and sound engineering stand the test of time. Every infrastructure development project, whether it is a bridge, a tunnel, a power plant, or a logistics hub, begins with a simple but fundamental question: what lies beneath? This question is far from simple. The nature of the soil and rock at a site determines not only the type of foundation required, but also the feasibility, cost, and long-term safety of the entire structure. In some locations, solid bedrock offers a stable base for heavy loads, while in others, weak or waterlogged soils demand sophisticated engineering solutions to prevent settlement or collapse. The assessment of terrain and stability is not just a matter of routine; it is the first and most vital step in any construction process.

Geology is also very important for finding risks and lowering them. The Earth is not a static entity; it is shaped by forces that can be both gradual and catastrophic. Earthquakes, landslides, subsidence, hydraulic flows, and flooding are all rooted in the geological history of a region. A thorough geological survey can reveal hidden faults, ancient landslide zones, or underground cavities that might otherwise go unnoticed until disaster strikes. By understanding these risks in advance, engineers can design resilient structures, incorporating features such as flexible foundations, retaining walls, or drainage systems to safeguard lives and investments.

The influence of geology extends beyond safety and stability; it also guides the selection of materials. The properties of local soils and rocks determine the suitability of aggregates for concrete, the durability of construction stone, and even the availability of groundwater for industrial use. In regions where high-quality materials are scarce, engineers may need to import resources from elsewhere, increasing costs and environmental impact. Conversely, a favourable geological setting can make a project more economical and sustainable. Engineering relies on a suite of advanced techniques to investigate the ground beneath our feet. Seismic surveys, movement monitoring, ground — penetrating radar, borehole sampling, and laboratory testing provide detailed information about subsurface conditions. This data is

is dependent upon the finance and technology from the US, other Western countries and China. UNCCC's annual climate conference at Baku, Azerbaijan has failed to address the issue and has brought a crack between the global north and global south. US President Trump has repeatedly abandoned the Paris Climate Accord, and other developed nations are also not prepared to finance and transfer technology to the global south. As a result, the world is not hopeful of containing the warming of the planet within 1.5 degrees Celsius.

We are left to face the warming world and its consequences like heavy downpours causing flooding, long dry spells followed by drought etc. disrupting our lives and livelihood.

In a situation when countries have to deal with increasing floods and droughts, the civic infrastructures would need modifications. The stormwater drains, which are designed to fully carry the flood water from incessant rainfall of 50 to 70 mm in 24 hours, will have to be remodelled for rains up to 200 mm in 24 hours. The natural drainage pattern and setting of the area should not be altered as far as possible.

Urban centres, where there is hardly any ground without concrete and pavements, must reorient themselves and form layouts where more areas are open for growing vegetation and infiltration of water in the soil. Underground structures/ basements especially in low-lying areas can be very dangerous for living and commercial activities. The entry and exit in such cases are often narrow and can pose a danger during emergency evacuation. Flood water can gush in and can cause human casualties.

At the most, basements should be earmarked for water storage and for the storage of serviceable and unserviceable articles. We should not forget the drowning of students in an IIT coaching centre, in Delhi during one such flooding last year. The wetlands in urban areas, stormwater drains and lakes must be kept free from encroachments. The green space in urban areas is quite important for countering the heat generated by concrete structures.

The choice of species for planting urban landscapes should be smart and shallow-rooted trees like Gulmohr, Peltoforum, rain trees etc. should not be grown. In the stormy weather and with incessant rainfalls, trees/ branches fall off leading to power outages and disruption of traffic. We should also not cover all around the base of the trees with concrete. Such trees do not get adequate seepage water from rainfalls are weak and malformed and are prone to getting uprooted in heavy winds.

This manufactured ground can be unpredictable, containing everything from old foundations to buried utilities and even archaeological remains. Building in these areas needs careful study and sometimes creative engineering to make sure everything stays safe and stable. In cities like Manchester or Rome, the legacy of past generations literally forms the ground on which new development must stand.

The relationship between geology and construction is not just technical; it is also deeply practical. Ignoring the lessons of geology can lead to costly mistakes, delays, or even catastrophic failures. There are countless examples, from buildings that have settled unevenly due to weak soils, to tunnels that have flooded

because of unexpected groundwater, to roads that have been destroyed by landslides. Each of these failures underscores the importance of understanding the ground beneath us.

Geology also informs the responsible management of resources. Industries such as mining, oil and gas, and groundwater extraction depend on geological expertise to locate and extract resources efficiently and sustainably. Their work not only optimises yield but also helps protect the environment by minimising unnecessary disturbance and preventing contamination.

Amid climate change and rapid urbanisation, the significance of geology is becoming more critical than ever. Rising sea levels, more frequent extreme weather events, and expanding cities all place new demands on our understanding of the ground. Engineers and planners must work hand in hand with geologists to design infrastructure that can adapt to changing conditions, whether that means building on reclaimed land, stabilising slopes in hilly regions, or managing groundwater in drought-prone areas.

Ultimately, geology is the silent architect of industry. It shapes our cities, guides our resource extraction, and ensures the safety and sustainability of what we build. By respecting and understanding the ground beneath us, we lay the true foundation for progress — one that is resilient, responsible, and enduring. The next time you cross a bridge, enter a factory or travel a new highway, remember that it is the unseen ground beneath — studied and respected through the science of geology that truly supports our progress.

Air India to retrofit legacy A321 ceo planes

Amid supply chain woes, Air India has decided to retrofit its 13 legacy A321 ceo planes that were earlier planned to be taken out of service while the first of the airline's legacy Boeing 787-8 aircraft will go for retrofit in July. Air India, which is slowly expanding its fleet and networks, has a total of 191 planes, including 64 wide-bodies and 127 narrow-bodies. Airline's CEO and MD Campbell Wilson told PTI that the first batch of the B 787s will go in for retrofit in July as there has been a little bit of push back because of certification delay of seats. "By the end of this financial year, hopefully about 68 per cent of the wide- body fleet will be upgraded and the complete fleet will be upgraded sometime in calendar 2027," he said in an interview. There are 27 legacy B787-8s with Air India. The carrier has already started the heavy refresh programme of the legacy B777s and two of them are already back in service. Heavy refresh of an aircraft includes having new carpets, seat covers, cushions and fixing broken seats. The refresh of these planes is expected to complete by the end of this year. According to Wilson, the supply chain situation is getting progressively better.



Coal India arm BCCL files IPO papers

State-owned CIL arm Bharat Coking Coal Ltd (BCCL) has filed draft papers with market regulator Sebi for its initial public offering. The issue will be entirely an offer for sale, as BCCL will not issue any fresh shares. Coal India Ltd (CIL) plans to sell up to 46.5 crore shares. "The draft red herring prospectus...of Bharat Coking Coal Ltd was filed with SEBI, BSE and NSE," CIL said in a filing to BSE. DRHP is a preliminary document that a company files with Sebi for a public offer. The DRHP filing pertains to the proposed initial public offering (IPO) of BCCL comprising an offer for sale of up to 465,700,000 equity shares by Coal India Limited, which remains subject to receipt of applicable approvals, market conditions, and other relevant considerations," the company said. BCCL, established with a mandate to mine and supply high-grade coking coal, plays a pivotal role in fuelling the nation's steel sector, which relies heavily on the company's coal for production and manufacturing processes. The development comes days after CIL arm Coal Central Mine Planning & Design Institute Ltd (CMPDIL) filed draft papers with Sebi for its initial public offering. Coal India accounts for over 80 per cent of domestic coal output.



LIC tops PSUs chart with record Rs 19,013 cr profit

State-owned Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) has emerged as the highest profit making company among PSUs in March quarter FY25, netting a little over Rs 19,000 crore. Last week, LIC reported 38 per cent jump in net profit for January-March FY25 at record Rs 19,013 crore as compared to Rs 13,763 crore in the corresponding quarter in the previous year. The insurance behemoth was followed by the country's biggest lender State Bank of India (SBI) with Rs 18,643 crore profit during the fourth quarter. However, SBI was ahead of LIC in terms of annual profit as it earned Rs 70,901 crore in FY25 as against Rs 48,151 crore of LIC. Among other PSUs, Coal India earned a net profit of Rs 9,604 crore in the quarter followed by Power Finance Corporation (PFC) earning Rs 8,358 crore and NTPC Rs 7,897 crore, as per the data available on stock exchanges. In the oil sector, Indian Oil Corporation (IOC) closed the fourth quarter with a net profit of Rs 7,265 crore followed by exploration giant ONGC at Rs 6,448 crore. Other Central Public Sector Enterprises (CPSEs) like REC Ltd posted a net profit of Rs 4,304 crore, Power Grid Corporation of India (Rs 4,143 crore) and Steel Authority of India Ltd (Rs 1,251 crore).

Indian aviation market emerging stronger: IATA

Indian aviation market is emerging stronger with growth in connectivity, networks and airport infrastructure, and the country also has the potential for producing sustainable aviation fuel, global airlines' grouping IATA said on Sunday.

However, the grouping also said that there is a high cost environment in India and

also high uncertainty for tax planning. Amitabh Khosla, Country Director India, Nepal & Bhutan at the International Air Transport Association (IATA) on Sunday said the Indian aviation market is witnessing a significant improvement on the back of emergence of stronger airlines within the country, the growth of connectivity and networks.

RBI expected to deliver 3<sup>rd</sup> consecutive rate cut

The Reserve Bank is likely to go for a third consecutive rate cut of 25 basis points on Friday as inflation continues to remain below the median target of 4 per cent, to push growth amid continued global uncertainty triggered by the US tariff moves.

Reserve Bank's rate-setting panel Monetary Policy Committee (MPC) will start deliberations on the next bi-monthly monetary policy on June 4 and announce the decision on June 6 (Friday).

The RBI reduced the key interest rate (repo) by 25 bps each in February and April bringing it to 6 per cent. Six-member MPC headed by RBI Governor Sanjay Malhotra also decided to change the stance from neutral to accommodative in its April policy.

In response to the 50-bps cut in the policy repo rate since February 2025, most of the banks have reduced their repo-linked external benchmark based lending rates (EBLRs) and marginal cost of funds-based lending rate (MCLR). "We do believe that given the



rather benign inflation conditions and the liquidity situation which has been made very comfortable through various measures of the RBI, the MPC would go in for a 25 bps cut in the repo rate on the (June) 6th. The commentary on both growth and inflation will be important as there are expectations of revisions in their forecasts for both the parameters," said Madan Sabnavis, Chief Economist, Bank of

Baroda.

He also expects that the RBI will detail its analysis on how the global environment would be affecting the Indian economy considering that the tariff reprieve provided by the US would end in July.

Aditi Nayar, Chief Economist, ICRA said with CPI inflation forecast to trail 4 per cent for a large part of this fiscal, monetary easing by the MPC is likely to continue.

"A 25 bps rate cut is expected next week, followed by two more cuts over the subsequent two policy reviews, taking the repo rate to 5.25 per cent by the end of the cycle," she said.

In its annual report released on Thursday, the RBI said monetary policy is committed towards achieving durable price stability, which is a necessary prerequisite for high growth on a sustained basis.

Singapore retains top spot as India's largest FDI source

Singapore continued to be India's largest source of foreign direct investment (FDI) for the last seven years, as the country received the highest inflows of about USD 15 billion in 2024-25.

The overseas inflow grew 13 per cent to USD 50 billion in the last fiscal.

The total FDI, which includes equity inflows, reinvested earnings and other capital, grew by 14 per cent to USD 81.04 billion during

the last financial year. It is the highest in the last three years.

FDI from Singapore in 2024-25 increased to USD 14.94 billion from USD 11.77 billion in 2023-24, according to the latest government data.

Singapore accounted for around 19 per cent of total inflows in 2024-25.

Since 2018-19, Singapore has been the largest source of such investments in India. In 2017-18, India attracted the maximum FDI from Mauritius.

ADB commits US\$ 10 bn plan for urban renewal

The Asian Development Bank (ADB) has committed up to USD 10 billion for India's urban transformation, including metro extension in the next five years, ADB President Masato Kanda has said.

"Cities are engines of growth...ADB will mobilize capital, accelerate delivery, and scale solutions that keep India's urban economy moving and people thriving on the road to Viksit Bharat by 2047," Kanda said after meeting Prime Minister Narendra



Modi here on Saturday.

The transformation plan includes sovereign loans, private sector financing, and third-party capital, ADB said in a statement.

The initiative is anchored by India's flagship Urban Challenge Fund (UCF), which ADB is supporting to attract private investment

for urban infrastructure, it said. Analytical work on growth hubs, creative city redevelopment, and water and sanitation upgrades in 100 cities across India are laying the groundwork for the UCF.

ADB is also committing USD 3 million in technical assistance to design bankable projects and strengthen the capacity of states and urban local bodies, it said.

As per estimates, India's towns and cities are projected to house more than 40 per cent of the population by 2030.

EARLY ARRIVAL OF MONSOON

Power consumption dips over 4% to 148.71 bn units

India's power consumption dipped over 4 per cent to 148.71 billion units (BU) in May, compared to a year-ago period, mainly due to unseasonal rains and early arrival of monsoon.

Power consumption was recorded at 155.15 BU in May, 2024, according to official data.

Experts believe the early arrival of monsoon as well as seasonal rains affected the power consumption as well as demand in May. According to the Indian Meteorological Department (IMD), the monsoon hit the Kerala coast on May 24, 2025, eight days ahead of its normal schedule.



The unseasonal rains also reduced consumption of electricity especially by cooling appliances like desert coolers and air conditioners during May, the experts said.

The highest supply in a day (peak power demand met) in May dipped to about 231 GW last month, from around 250 GW in May 2024. The peak power demand

touched an all-time high of about 250 GW in May 2024.

The previous all-time high peak power demand of 243.27 GW was recorded in September 2023.

According to government estimates, peak power demand is expected to touch 277 GW in the summer of 2025.

Experts said that power demand and consumption will be steady in the coming months.

According to the Meteorological Department, India is expected to experience hotter-than-usual temperatures from April to June, with more heatwave days in Central and Eastern India and the Northwestern plains.

Flouting of rules by pan masala manufacturers

NGT issues notice to Centre

The National Green Tribunal has sought a reply from the Centre regarding the strict enforcement of the Plastic Waste Management Rules by the manufacturers of gutkha, pan masala and tobacco products.

A bench of NGT Chairperson Justice Prakash Shrivastava and expert member A Senthil Vel noted the submissions of the petitioner's counsel that in October 2021, the



Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB) issued certain directions to 25 such manufacturers, including immediately closing down operations until they switched to environmentally sound alternatives, which were not complied with.

The bench, in its order dated

May 30, noted that according to the counsel, Anuj Aggarwal, certain provisions of the plastic waste management rules were being flouted.

These included the clause that "sachets using plastic material shall not be used for storing, packing or selling gutkha, tobacco and pan masala" and "plastic material, in any form including vinyl acetate, maleic acid, vinyl chloride copolymer (used in plastic coating) shall not be used in any package for packaging gutkha, pan masala and tobacco in all forms", the bench noted.



Reliance Infra targets Rs 3,000 cr defence exports in 2 yrs

Reliance Infrastructure Ltd, the flagship company of Anil Ambani's Reliance Group, is targeting Rs 3,000 crore from the export of 155 mm ammunition and aggregates by the end of financial year 2027, sources said.

In the current year itself, the company is estimated to export Rs 1,500 crore of large calibre ammunition. Reliance Infrastructure has already clocked exports of up to Rs 100 crore of artillery ammunition and aggregates and is aiming to be among the top three exporters of defence equipment in India, sources aware of the matter said.

The key export market for Reliance includes countries in the European Union, focusing on large restocking demand for artillery ammunition.

According to the experts, the market size for restocking is estimated at Rs 4,00,000 crore.

## Surveen Chawla recalls saying no to director's 'code language' advances



Actress Surveen Chawla, known for her compelling performances in *Sacred Games*, *Rana Naidu*, and *Decoupled*, has spoken out about the darker side of the entertainment industry—opening up about facing the casting couch multiple times during her career. In a candid conversation on *The Male Feminist* podcast by Hauterrfly, Surveen recounted harrowing experiences from both Bollywood and the South film industry, shedding light on the subtle and overt ways women are often objectified and propositioned in the name of work. Speaking in Hindi, she shared an incident where a filmmaker tried to forcibly kiss her despite knowing she was married.

"After the meeting in his cabin, he came to see me off at the gate. He had a huge office, and we had discussed my marriage during the meeting. Suddenly, he leaned in to kiss me. I literally had to push him back and asked, 'What are you doing?' Then I just walked away."

Another shocking instance involved a National Award-winning director who couldn't speak Hindi and communicated through an intermediary. Surveen revealed that the man tried to use vague, coded language to suggest spending time with her—an implication she wasn't willing to ignore.

"At first, I gave them the benefit of the doubt," Surveen said, "but eventually I had to ask, 'Are you really saying the director wants to sleep with me?' I told them clearly: 'Sir, I'm sorry, you're knocking on the wrong door. I am not in for bartering myself in exchange for work.'"

These lines, she admitted, are etched in her memory. Surveen's courage in speaking up comes at a time when conversations around power dynamics, safety, and dignity in the film industry are gaining momentum. By choosing to share these stories publicly, she joins the growing list of actors who are pushing for a safer, more transparent creative space for all.

# 'My priorities changed after motherhood'

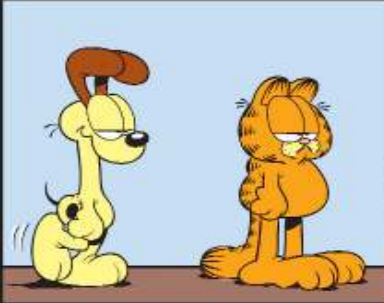

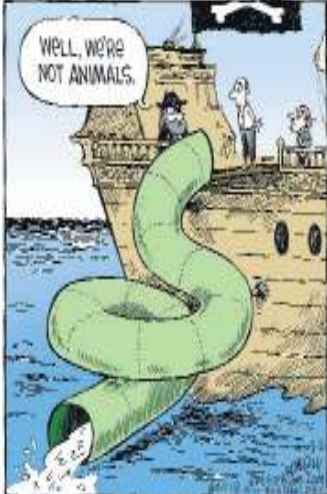

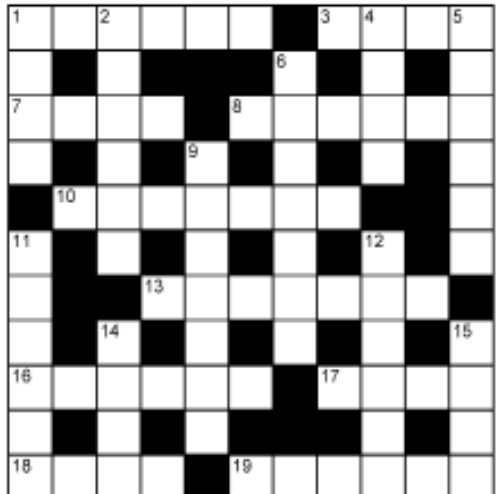

# Narane Nithin distances himself from debut film *Sri Sri Rajavaru*
